# **History Articulation Committee 2017-2018**

### **Supplemental Notes on Statistical Data**

#### Athabasca

- 1. Teaching load: Full time faculty carry 1 block (32 students) X 3 hours; Tutors can carry up to 4 blocks (128 students) X 3 hours
- 2. Course level: Given AU's unique course delivery, the level of the course was approximated as follows:
  - 1st year=100 level, 2nd year=200 level, 3rd year=300 level, 4th year=400 level
- 3. Lectures: Athabasca University has continuous enrollment and courses are offered in an unpaced environment for the most part but classroom based courses are offered through collaborating institutions e.g., 3 sections of HIST 224 was offered at Blue Quills First Nation College over the last 5 years.
- 4. Registrations: Given AU's rolling monthly enrollments the following definitions were set:
  - Summer 2017 defined as May-Aug 2017; Fall 2017 defined as September-December 2017; Winter 2018 defined as January-April 2018.
  - The reported registrations are unweighted. Therefore, no distinction is drawn between registrations in 3 credit or 6 credit courses.
  - The reported registrations are net i.e. they exclude early withdrawals. Since it takes about 3 months for early withdrawals to clear the system the Winter 2018 data might be overstated.
- 5. Dropped courses: A number of courses have been permanently closed because of low enrolment and faculty retirement.
- 6. Online courses target audience: Students who can't attend a traditional institution; those who have full time employment; those who live in rural communities; students who desire the flexibility of unpaced individualized study; students who desire online courses.

# **Camosun College**

- 1. The new course being added will replace Global Studies 200. It will be a 100 level course entitled Crime and Punishment in Canada.
- 2. Teaching load includes 2 hours of lecture and two 1 hour seminars (student registers in A or B section of that course) for day classes; 2 hours of lecture and 1 hour of seminar for night and film courses.
- 3. Anticipated hiring based on one retirement in the next fiscal/school year.
- 4. Course offerings and registration numbers include 2 HIST108 courses taught at Reynolds Secondary School and Mount Douglas Secondary School. Numbers were 16 and 14 respectively.
- 5. Registration numbers are taken from final class numbers after the drop date.

### **Douglas College**

- 1. Teaching loads: Full time faculty workload is 8 sections a year, 16 contact hours per week, according to the collective agreement. Courses are scheduled either as 1 time a week for 3 hours or 2 times a week for 4 hours; so actual contact hours vary depending on faculty schedule.
- 2. New courses: HIST 2206 History of the British Isles (in approval stage)

# **Kwantlen Poytechnic University**

- 1. Faculty:
  - increased demand for Canadian History has allowed us to increase Eryk Martin's workload from 50% to 75%
  - we anticipate increasing both Eryk Martin and Kyle Jackson to 100% by the end of the next academic year
  - Tracey Kinney will begin an Education leave in September 2018; replacement hires will be announced shortly
- 2. Teaching Levels:
  - KPU continues on year 39 of our 'pilot project' 3-hour course matrix, so all History instructors actually teach 8 x 3
- 3. Course Offerings:
  - new courses: HIST 1100: History through Film; HIST 2302: Consuming Passions –
    A Global History of Food; HIST 2314: Gender & Sexuality in Canada; HIST 3315:
    Radicalism, Resistance, & Revolution since the 1960s
  - dropped courses: HIST 3320: The Balkans; HIST 3392: The Home Front Britain during WWII
  - course revision: HIST 2150: Tea in China & Japan is now HIST 2359: Tea in Asia
- 4. Departmental Administration:
  - after 6 ½ years the Chair will pass from Tracey Kinney to Tom Thorner on May 15, 2018
- 5. Electronic Courses:
  - KPU is planning to offer 1-2 sections of upper level Asian History online in the 2018-2019 academic year; HIST 1160: Intro to South Asia continues to be offered in mixed mode (in person, or via podcast)

### **Simon Fraser University**

- 1. Part time Sessional: 5 different SI instructors teaching a total of 9 courses
- 2. New Appointments: 3 full time regular limited term appointments; 2 half-time term appointments and one CFL research appointment
- 3. On Leave: 7 faculty took a leave of some kind (study leave or unpaid LOA) but all but one were partial leaves: 4 faculty had 1-semester leaves, 2 faculty had 2-semester leaves, and one had a full 3-semester leave
- 4. Faculty with markers: this is calculated as follows: 15 courses ran with TA support; 12 instructors taught those courses (2 were term appt):  $(12 \times 100)/30 = 40\%$

### **Thompson Rivers University**

1. Teaching load: 5 sections per year x 3 or 4 contact hours for tripartite faculty (teaching, research, and service); 8 sections per year x 3 or 4 contact hours for bipartite faculty (teaching and service).

- 1. On Leave: 5 faculty on six month leave; 1 faculty on 1 year leave
- 2. New courses: HSTR 330E (Canada's 1960s), HSTR 340A (Military Intervention in Europe)
- 3. Dropped courses: 240 (Europe, Renaissance to the European Union); 305A (American Women to 1900); 305B (American Women, 1900-Present); 320D (Scottish History in Film, 1314-Present); 330B (Tragedy and Transformation in Colonial North America, 1500-1800); 338 (European Culture in Crisis, 1580-1696); 339A (Topics in Enlightenment Thought and Culture); 339B (A Social History of Enlightenment in Europe, 1680-1789); 339C (Enlightenment and Religion); 356 (Topics in the History of Science); 356A (Science and Religion in Europe from Galileo to Darwin); 367 (Rise and Fall of Imperial Japan); 369 (Hiroshima and Beyond); 428A (An Environmental History of the North American Forest); 443 (Atheism and Unbelief in Early Modern Europe); 466 (Migration, Race & Empire: Canada and the Transpacific), 483 (The City in History); 485B (Making 'Race' in the British Atlantic World).
