Although all History courses are taught in 3-hour blocs (or 2 x 1.5 hours), this remains the world's longest-running pilot project. Officially our teaching load is 8x4.

Beginning in September 2019 KPU History students will be able to register in a 3-credit practicum course (currently configured as ARTS 4800, with a practicum supervisor from History) designed to connect students with industry and provide them with meaningful work experience.

Pathway Status:

Due to its introductory nature and reduced long-form writing requirements HIST 1100: Reel History – History through Film has been granted pathway status for incoming students who need additional assistance with skills development

Online Courses:

While fully online courses are offered infrequently, we have launched pilot projects with mixed mode courses, including one (HIST 1160) that can be taken either online via podcasts or in person, depending on student preference and preparation level

<u>SFU</u>

- 1. There are 22 full-time research (tenured and tenure-track) and teaching faculty in History. History also has 3 full-time research limited-term appointments.
- 2. This is the number of all full-time cross-appointments.
- 3. There are no full-time sessional instructors in History; an individual on a short-term contract to teach either a full or partial slate of courses would be hired as a limited-term instructor.
- 4. 11 sessional instructors taught a total of 14 courses

- 5. Have been approved for a limited-term appointment to cover a faculty member's leave for 18mon
- 6. This is the number of faculty who went on one of the following kinds of leave: study leave, medical leave, unpaid leave of absence, and parental leave. All but one were for either one or two semester's duration.
- 7. All limits are History department imposed limits. These are not university-wide limits.
- 8. This number is a percentage of regular faculty who had marking support from teaching assistants; it does not include part-time term or sessional instructors who had marking support.
- 9. The limit on tutorials run by teaching assistants is 17.
- 10. The definition of "co-ordinator" is not understood and the term is not used in the History Department. However, two other administrative appointments in History get course release: the undergraduate and graduate chairs each receive 1 CR/YR.
