The year was 2003.

Nine students from our Bachelor of Applied Arts (BAA) in Psychology program became the first cohort to complete their four-year undergraduate degree with an added feather in their graduation cap: an additional one-year Honours Program. The additional Honours year included a focused search for a research topic and a faculty supervisor, a semester long Honours course for preparing their thesis proposal, followed by another semester of data gathering, analyses, and write-up.

This first BAA Honours cohort was a significant milestone for KPU. In the mid 1990s, Kwantlen which had begun as a relatively small 2-year community college, evolved into a degree granting "university College". In 1996, as a 'University College' Kwantlen, was given a mandate to develop

4-year undergraduate academic degrees. Psychology being the largest academic department at the time, took the lead to develop a unique degree with a focus on research, workplace and community service.

A very driven and hard hardworking Degree Development Committee was formed and chaired by Dr. Kevin Hamilton. The other main faculty members on the committee included Dr. Steve Charlton, Dr. Arleigh Reichl, Dr. Betty Rideout, Dr. John Marasigan, and Betsy Spaulding. Dr. Lana Trick was heavily involved in the first year. Under the supervision of Roger Elmes, Dean of Arts at the time, the Degree Development Committee began working on a conceptual vision for the proposed degree.

The Degree Development Committee conducted extensive research and consultation with various degree stakeholders. They contacted over 50 employers from the government and private sector and reached out to several professional organizations including the BC Psychological Association.

As part of their background work, the Degree Development Committee sifted through hundreds of documents from universities across Canada that offered Psychology degrees. An Advisory Committee was also assembled to help The Degree Development Committee formulate the BAA. The Advisory Committee consisted of senior faculty from UBC and SFU Psychology as well as representatives from local industry and government. It took several years for the Degree Development and Advisory Committees to generate a conceptual model that satisfied themselves, that other local universities would support, and that would stand up to the scrutiny of the Ministry of Advance Education at the time.

The ministry set a high bar and was looking for a unique applied undergraduate degree that could help employ students after graduation or put them in a position to continue studies at the graduate level. Once the Ministry approved the BAA-Psychology degree concept, work began to develop specific courses and their prerequisites, and to map and schedule the courses across a four-year degree path.

It was within this context that the Honours program was created as a continuation of the BAA. It was intended as a supplement for applied studies students who had completed their course work. Importantly, it would ladder students into graduate school by providing a closely supervised, independent research experience consisting of a fifth additional year of study. The Honours was designed to be a robust and rigorous program. Under the guidance of their Honours course instructor and primary supervisor in their first semester, and then under the exclusive guidance of their primary supervisor in semester two, students would complete all the pieces of their research and prepare a comprehensive thesis.

In the Fall of 2001, the first of KPU's Psychology degrees: The Bachelor of Applied Arts – Psychology (BAA-Psychology) was launched. Dr. Steve Charlton served as the first Degree Coordinator, overseeing the degree as the new program came on stream.

The initial years of the BAA and subsequent Hounours Program generated an enormous amount of work for our faculty as they developed and taught the new upper-level courses and tracked what was working well and what needed to be changed about the degree structure and implementation.

The first Honours class came to fruition in 2003, and the first Honours course was taught by Dr. Charlton. There were nine students in the first Honours cohort. Dr. Charlton was the primary supervisor for the four of them; Dr. Hamilton supervised one, and external faculty supervised the remaining four. Around the time the BAA was launched, Dr. Hamilton was under secondment to help develop the current Office of Research and Scholarship and the KPU Research Ethics Board. However,

he continued to remain involved in the degree program and in the Fall of 2004, Dr. Hamilton became the second faculty member to serve as Degree Coordinator followed by Dr. Arleigh Reichl and Dr. Jocelyn Lymburner who is the current degree coordinator.

As of 2006 and 2010, Psychology mounted two additional degrees, namely a more conventional BA and a BSc. Both provide students with the option of pursuing the Hounours Program. Dr. Dianne Crisp and Dr. Betty Rideout were the core faculty members who developed the BA degree proposal. As the special advisor to the Associate VP, Dr. Dianne Crisp had played a pivotal role in the process while Dr. Betty Rideout had shouldered the major responsibility of writing the BA degree proposal. The BSc degree development was headed by Dr. Jocelyn Lymburner and Dr. David Froc. Faculty members who have taught the Honours course are Dr. Daniel Bernstein, Dr. Dianne Crisp, Dr. Wayne Podrouzek, and Dr. Jocelyn Lymburner.

Moving to the present, eight students completed their Honours Program in 2016, bringing the total number of Psychology Honours graduates since the program's inception to 79.

We are proud of the faculty members who founded our degrees and Honours Program. We are also proud of the Degree Development Committee members, all the instructors of the Honours course, all the primary advisors and outside support, and, most importantly we are proud of our students who have added many feathers to the cap of our Psychology Honours Degree Program.



A conversation with Dr. Daniel Bernstein on Honours Program

Dr. Daniel Bernstein has been the Honours course instructor for over 3 years. He has also supervised 12 Honours students, the majority of whom have gone to graduate schools and have won entrance scholarships. Dr. Bernstein holds a Canada Research Chair position. He is known for his scholarly publications, his national and international research collaborations, his inspiring mentorship of students, and his Life Span Cognition Lab which is the hub of numerous research studies. I asked him to reflect on our Honours program.

Why have you chosen to be an Honours instructor?

The Honours class allows me to work closely with all the psychology Honours students each year. The breadth of topics, combined with different research styles, is really exciting and fun. I love watching the students grapple with and master their research, taking an idea from theory to practice. I love teaching the Honours class!

What is your goal when you plan Honours class - projects, invited guests, etc.?

I hope that the students will learn something valuable and useful. I structure my class as a graduate-school preparatory course, so I assign things that students will have to do later in their academic careers. These include manuscript reviews, grant writing, formal presentation of ideas, and lots of reading and writing. Students should leave the class with a taste of what it's like to be in graduate school. They discuss their own research and comment on each other's many assignments throughout the term.

Why is it important for students to take on an Honours project?

Any student considering graduate school and continued research should do an Honours project. Most graduate schools require or at least highly encourage that students complete an Honours degree. In fact, some graduate schools in Psychology will not accept students who have not completed an Honours degree. Even if the student does not continue with graduate school, completing an Honours degree will provide excellent analytic and research skills that will benefit the student in many jobs.

What is required of students to do a great Honours project?


Read. Read. Write. Write. Write. Work. Work. Work. Be receptive to feedback, and seek it often.

Would you recommend it for students who are not aiming for graduate schools? Why?

Yes, I would (see previous response). Although it's a lot of work, the Honours degree will show potential employers that you have the drive and verve to design, run, and complete a research project.

Any particular Honours project that stands out in your memory? Why?

I've been impressed by many Honours projects thus far. One of the standouts was the Honours thesis done by Levente Orban, who is now on faculty at KPU. Orban's thesis, under the supervision of Dr. Farhad Dastur, was on pregnant women's perception of spoiled food. For the thesis, Orban photographed decomposing food at various stages of decomposition, and then presented these photos in addition to a test of color discrimination to expectant mothers. The idea was that expectant mothers, early in their pregnancy, should be hyper-sensitive to color discrimination and food spoilage because they are trying to avoid foods that could harm their fetus. Orban and Dastur found partial support for this novel idea, and published their results in the journal, Evolutionary Psychology in 2012. Honours theses like this set the bar for and inspire other students in our Honours thesis program.

Psychology Practicum is a bridge between a university degree and a professional career of students' choice. It is a semester-long program offered in the summer term to students nearing completion of their undergraduate degree. Practicum is mandatory for students in the BAA and BSc program. It is optional for BA students. Students are required to find a placement with the help of the practicum supervisor before the start of the practicum term in summer. Their employer host is involved in the practicum experience of the student, providing opportunities to learn career-related skills. Each week, students submit a report on their practicum experiences, challenges, new skills, and how psychology courses they took at KPU helped them in the process. The practicum supervisor visits each student at the career site and meets with the employer host and the student to go over what might have worked well and what needed to be attended to. At the end of the term, students write a report, prepare a PowerPoint poster, and do a presentation to the class and also to the community at a later date if an opportunity arises.

Psychology Labs: A Learning Hub

The psychology labs on the Surrey and Richmond campuses are vibrant hubs for students. Their first introduction to the lab is through lab assignments. However, the labs also serve as a help center for students needing assistance with their other course tasks. Importantly, the atmosphere in the lab is welcoming and inviting to all. As such, students connect here with other students to learn and facilitate each other's school work.

As the senior lab manager, my role is to oversee the development and running of various hands-on labs as part of several psychology courses. For introductory psychology, we have labs on six topics. The most popular are the Sensation and Perception, and Polygraph Labs. At the second year level, there are nine topic labs and in the 3rd and 4th year level there are five topic labs. The latest one I developed is the Physical Challenge Lab for Aging and Adulthood courses.

Each term we run about 45-60 sections of classes. The labs are run during a class time, and many of them have a short assignment component, which we mark and send the report to the instructor.

Another important task we undertake is coordinating the psychology subject pool. The on-line registration system allows researchers to set up their requirements and students to register their participation. There are about 550 students participating in various research studies through this subject pool.

Of course, the various tasks we undertake cannot be accomplished without our team of student assistants. So thank you to the 2015-2016 student lab assistants: Daniel Derksen, Michelle Hunsche, Arifa Hafeez, Bea Joaquin, Cally Hanson, Neptune Law.

PERCEPTION: TRACING THE MIRRORED IMAGE IN THE PSYCHOLOGY LAB

How is the BSc Psychology lab different from the BA/BAA Psychology Lab?

"Why would I want to take the BSc Psychology degree?"

Although I'm new to the position of BSc Lab Instructor, I've heard these questions quite a few times from students.

The two biggest differences between the BA and BSc Psych labs are the material covered in each lab and how each lab is run. The material covered in the BSc psych lab tends to have a biology and anatomy focus to it with the more advanced labs touching on basic math, physics and chemistry. In contrast, the BA Psych lab tends to cover material more traditionally associated with psychology such as cognition, sensation, perception and aging. The BA lab covers a much broader array of topics than the BSc lab and is run as an open lab format while the BSc lab concentrates on the natural science aspects of psychology and is run as a closed lab.

When students ask me why they should take the BSc stream, I try to explain that the question they should be asking is "What is my interest within the field of psychology?" After a little inquiry on my part, I usually find that what students really want to know is which degree is "better". Of course, of the three psychology streams offered at KPU, none is better than the other, but they do offer different areas of course concentration. As a recent graduate of KPU's BSc psychology program, I think that the BSc stream is an amazing opportunity for students who are interested in learning about both natural and social sciences.

Connecting Minds 2016

The 7th Biennial Connecting Minds (2016) Undergraduate Research Conference in Psychology was again an astounding success! At Connecting Minds, students had the opportunity to present their research, be exposed to the research of others, socialize, and share information and experiences with students from many universities across Canada and the United States. Organized by the Psychology Department, the conference represented the combined efforts of students, faculty, administration, and sponsors. This year, the hard work of 12 student volunteers, 9 faculty moderators, and 12 members of the organizing committee (2 staff, 4 faculty, and 6 students) needs to be acknowledged in developing another excellent conference experience.


Connecting Minds 2016 welcomed 140 registrants over two days of conference events. On Friday May 27th, we showcased the first of two poster sessions with 19 excellent student posters! We also hosted four student panelists: two who provided a scholarship information panel, one who gave a presentation on successful application to graduate school, and one who presented on preparation and study

for the Graduate Record Examination. We concluded the evening with a reception that offered friendly conversation, food, music, and magic (performed by our very own Dr. Evan Lopes). On Saturday May 28th, we opened with a continental breakfast and then launched into the first series of two concurrent oral presentation sessions. A total of 28 orals were presented over six concurrent sessions. After lunch, the second poster session -with 25 student posters - was held.

Connecting Minds concluded with a keynote address by Dr. Jean Kilbourne, internationally recognized for her work on the image of women in the media and for her critical studies of alcohol and tobacco advertising. Connecting Minds was truly lucky to host a speaker of her caliber, who has been named by the New York Times as one of the three most popular speakers on university campuses and who the Boston Globe has described as a "superstar lecturer".

We look forward now to the continued success of Connecting Minds in preparation for CM2018.





Psychology Research Day

In Spring 2016, Dr. Levente Orbán taught research methods to all his four classes, which included the 2nd and the 3rd year levels. Students in each class conducted REB- approved research projects that required them to do a literature search, data collection, data analyses, and a research poster. Inspired by Dr. Marasigan's undergraduate research conference in preceding years, Dr. Levente Orbán decided to create an opportunity for students to have a conference-like experience in place of inclass oral presentations. And so it began.

He invited Dr. Daniel Bernstein to include his Honours class students to do oral presentations of their theses while Dr. Levente Orbán's students would do their poster presentations. Dr. Diane Purvey, Dean of Arts, offered her full support, and the Office of Research and Scholarship sponsored the event by printing all posters (over 50!), and providing breakfast and

a hot lunch for everyone. The conference took place on April 6th. There were eight Honours oral defenses and 50 research posters that showcased the research projects undertaken by psychology students. Dr. Arthur Fallick, VP Research energized students with his opening remarks. The event was very well attended: over 100 students, many psychology faculty, and administrators.

Lifespan Cognition Lab

The lab saw a productive 2015-2016 of social cognition research. We completed the first year of the lab's primary research project, the Lifespan Cognition Study, a comprehensive 4-year longitudinal study that examines perspective-taking, decision-making, and executive function in individuals ages 3 to 90. Research assistants tested nearly 300 children, young adults, adults, and older adults as a part of this project. In addition to our main study, research assistants designed and ran a number of projects examining topics such as hindsight bias, confirmation bias, judgments of truth, prospective and false memory, and risky decision-making. Over the last year, the lab brought on eight new RA's, a new lab manager, and a project manager to work on the numerous studies running in our lab. During this year, lab members Andrew Huebert and Megan Giroux successfully defended theses they worked on in the lab—an Honours and Master's thesis at KPU and SFU, respectively. A number of research assistants in the lab attended and presented on lab-related work at local psychology conferences this past summer: eight lab members presented posters and four gave talks at the Northwest Cognition and Memory conference and the Connecting Minds undergraduate research conference. Several research assistants authored or co-authored scholarly peer-reviewed publications based on work done in and outside of the lab including two book chapters, an article, and an encyclopedia entry. Looking forward, 2016-2017 is shaping up to be another productive year of research, honours theses, conference presentations, and publications!



IMAGe Lab: Issues in Media, Advertising, & Gender

Lab work this year focused on preparing for a new study of the effects of advertising images showing women with their mouths covered (i.e., 'silencing' ads). We searched the literature for constructs and measures, and collected pilot data to refine measures and to validate ads. (We discovered that our overtly sexist ads were not sufficiently sexist for today's students!).

In June the lab bid a very fond farewell to our manager, Amanda Paananen. We are extremely grateful for her leadership, and wish her all the best for her life after KPU. At the same time, we are exceptionally pleased to welcome Manmeet Chhina as our new lab manager.

MacLean Research Group: Investigation

DR. CARLA MACLEAN

Dr. MacLean was on maternity leave for most of the year; however, the MacLean Research Group still managed to undertake some exciting research. The two projects highlighted below focused on the effect of cognitive bias in the industrial investigation process.

The first project tested if the Self-Administered Witness Interview Tool (SAW-ITTM; Gabbert, Hope and MacLean, 2013), a psychologically based-paper-and-pencil witness interview tool, could mitigate witnesses' cognitive biases. Our results demonstrated that the SAW-IT elicited significantly more accurate, and fine grained, information from witnesses while maintaining an accuracy rate consistent with traditional investigation protocols. However, the deeper cognitive processing required by the SAW-ITTM did not mitigate the influence of prior knowledge on witness testimony. This research was presented at the International Investigative Interviewing Research Group Conference (iIIRG) in London, England in May. (Project collaborators: Drs. L Hope and F. Gabbert)

Our second project explored if prior knowledge affected workplace safety inspectors' identification of potential hazards on a worksite. Before making a decision regarding if a practice is safe or unsafe officers need to see potential infractions. This research explored if prior knowledge of the worker or organization under inspection affected officers' observations on a worksite. Findings from 125 Commonwealth Safety Inspectors revealed that knowledge of a company's unsafe history resulted in officers observing more potential safety violations on the worksite. (Project collaborator: Dr. L.E. Dror)



The Forensic and Applied Social Psychology (FASP) Lab

Our lab conducts both applied and forensic psychology research. We focus on program evaluation, crime desistance, offender reintegration, housing, mental health and more

In previous years, we conducted a project investigating Housing First Initiatives for Individuals with Concurrent Disorders. This project was a joint collaboration between the Centre for Forensic Behavioural Science and Justice Studies, University of Saskatchewan and Kwantlen Polytechnic University and was funded by the Government of Canada's Homelessness Partnering Strategy, Employment and Social Development Canada.



We are currently working on a project testing a theory of crime desistance in a sample of ex-offenders in the community. This is a joint project between KPU and Douglas College and is funded by the KPU Katalyst Grant Program and the Douglas College Research and Scholarly Activity Project Fund. We have conducted initial interviews with 100 ex-offenders in the community since January 2016 and are currently conducting follow-up interviews.

Imagine being in a 2nd year social psychology class where your task as a student is not about answering test questions. Instead, your instructor asks you each week to work in small groups and write and peer review your own exam questions for each topic of the course. At the end of the semester, you as a class have created over 800 questions! Importantly, you have mastered the topics so well you could create your own test questions. Not only that, your class -generated questions are to be used for a test bank to accompany an "open textbook" to be made available to future students for no cost or minimal cost.

Now imagine you are in a 4rd year Psychology of Genocide class. Your instructor shares with you the stories of holocaust and research around it. You are deeply moved and inspired to take on a special task. You use the recipes written by the women prisoners of the Nazi internment camps to bake cookies and pastries and do a bake sale on campus collecting money towards supporting refugees from Sudan and Syria

Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani calls these exercises part of his Open Pedagogy. Focusing on student engagement in the classroom using a variety of teaching tools, hands-on activities, and connecting students with the outside world has earned him the Dean of Arts' Teaching Excellence Award.

Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani has a passion for making student life not only exciting but also more affordable. How would he do that? He has taken the lead on developing textbooks that would be "open" to all students; i.e., available on-line for free or hard bound with a minimal price tag. With the strong support of KPU and BCcampus; a virtual education body of the provincial government, as well as from numerous post secondary schools across Canada and the US, he has helped launch a dynamic change in the way textbooks are used that significantly decreases the cost to students while empowering faculty to adapt these educational materials to serve their course goals.

Winner of numerous awards and appointed to various national and international education committees, Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani adds to the well-adorned feathered cap of our department.


The KPS had another active year with a variety of activities focused on supporting students' academic pursuits while aiming to build community along the way.
