Education advocate Janice Unwin receives KPU Honorary Degree

Kwantlen Polytechnic University will present Janice Unwin with an honorary degree at the June convocation to recognize her work over the past 40 years in the education sector.

Unwin started her career in 1979 as a physical education teacher and then a high school counsellor. She went on to work in many different roles including elementary and secondary school principal, as well as superintendent in Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows.

Most recently, Unwin has been recognized for her work with the Ministry of Education and Ministry of Advanced Education to modernize the K-12 education system. She has also worked with post-secondary institutions to ensure a seamless transition from K-12 to post-secondary.

“The one that brings me the most pride is the last chapter of the journey which was to assist the Ministry of Education and Advanced Education in transforming education across this province. The people I met, many of whom were from KPU gave me such hope for the future as we all wrestle with creating an educational journey that needs to exist in a rapidly changing world,” Unwin says.

“Janice Unwin has contributed considerably to the education sector in British Columbia. Her work with post-secondary institutions while revitalizing the K-12 curriculum so the next generation of students is ready for university speaks to her passion for education,” says Dr. Alan Davis, president and vice-chancellor of KPU. “KPU is proud to present her with this honorary degree.”

Looking back at her career she says her advice to the new graduates is to stay passionate in whatever adventure they embark upon.

“Try to give back in whatever way makes sense to them. Stay positive and don’t get down when tough times come along. It is all part of the learning journey which we all are hopefully on for life.”

Kicking Horse Coffee co-founder receives honorary degree at KPU

Kwantlen Polytechnic University will present [Kicking Horse Coffee](#) co-founder Elana Rosenfeld with an honorary degree to commemorate her entrepreneurial achievement of creating a world-renowned coffee company.

“I feel proud of where Kicking Horse Coffee is now and excited for what’s next. Last year we were named Best Workplace in Canada,” says Rosenfeld. “We’re the number one selling organic coffee in North America, and this year we’ve been recognized as Canada’s most trusted coffee brand by the Gustavson Brand Trust Index.”

“Elana’s entrepreneurial spirit is akin to what KPU stands for,” says Dr. Alan Davis, president and vice-chancellor of KPU. “Her optimism and resilience helped launch a company that is now recognized around the world and that speaks to her passion for what she does,”

In the mid-90s, after travelling the world, Rosenfeld wanted to stay in one place. Originally from Toronto, she decided to live in Invermere, B.C.

“I tried a few different things first – a whole food café, a fruit stand – before realizing my passion for coffee. Kicking Horse Coffee’s co-founder and I started roasting small batches of

coffee in our garage in 1996. My mom asked us, ‘What are you two gonna do? Make coffee in your garage?!’ and that’s pretty much what we did.”

Rosenfeld majored in religious studies and minored in women’s studies at McGill University in Montreal.

“People are sometimes surprised that I don’t have a degree in business, but I think my arts background continues to play an important role in the way I do business. It has helped me bring more humanity to the workplace. For me, that’s really what it’s all about.”

Rosenfeld says the advice she wants to give graduating students is to really think about what they bring to their future careers.

“I believe in the concept of building humanity – compassion, empathy, thoughtfulness – into business. I want students to know that they can create a sustainable business that’s both successful and people-focused.”

Cell blocks to books: one KPU grad's journey of adversity and perseverance

As a former gang member, Jordan Buna had seen a lot and been through more than the average post-secondary student when he arrived at Kwantlen Polytechnic University – but the academic world held new challenges.

“I remember when I first started going here, I would walk by the psychology lab but I was too intimidated to go in because I never thought I was smart enough to go here.”

The 35-year-old has overcome those challenges to cross the stage at convocation this week and land himself a job helping to keep young people away from gangs.

Life changed for Buna, who had started school by taking two classes a semester while going to work full-time, when he heard about the [Acting Together research project](#) run by KPU psychology instructor Dr. Gira Bhatt. The project, which aims to reduce youth gang involvement, introduced Buna to Sergeant Lindsey Houghton, who would go on to become one of the mentors in Buna’s life. It would also help him get the job he has now – working with the Surrey School District in a program called [Wraparound](#).

“If I didn’t go to Kwantlen and I didn’t work on the research project at Kwantlen and I didn’t meet Lindsey Houghton and didn’t create that presentation there’s a 100 per cent chance that I wouldn’t be doing what I’m doing now.”

Buna first came to KPU out of high school. He dropped out soon after and his life took a dark turn when he got involved in gangs.

“I spent about a year in jail for firearms possession and things related to the gang. I was 24 when I was released from jail so that was 10 years ago. So, kind of slowly, I started rebuilding my life, got a trades job.”

He was working as a heavy-duty mechanic when he decided to go back to school. He was 26 years old when he walked into the academic advisor’s office on crutches.

“I broke my ankle so I was off for eight weeks. I remember it always bugged me that I thought I was too dumb to do it – all the things that convinced me that I wasn’t fit to be successful.”

The other mentor Buna found at KPU was one he had known from early on in his gang career, when Buna would frequent the clubs and bars in Downtown Vancouver: KPU criminology instructor and current police officer with the Vancouver Police Gang Crime Unit, Keiron McConnell.

“Keiron used to be one of the nice police officers who would ask me to pack up my stuff and get out,” he recalls, “So I knew him from the enforcement side of things and then when I came back and finding out he is a prof here and I remember he saw me and looked at me and I told him what I was doing with the Acting Together stuff and he’s been another massive supporter of mine.”

“He was someone I exercised extreme caution around as a police officer. I now consider him a personal friend,” says McConnell.

Buna now comes to McConnell’s classes to give talks about his lived experience to students. He says McConnell is someone he looks up to, a big influence and mentor in his life who he now works with professionally.

“When I found out I was graduating, I remember so many

times him pulling me out of a bar and I just thought it was such a good thing for me because I know as a police officer he sees the worst of the worst and he probably sees people who don’t change, but it was important for me to have him on stage when I got that degree.”

And McConnell was there on stage at convocation.

“This is one of the proudest moments of my 30-year policing career and 15-year teaching career,” says McConnell. “It’s a pleasure to teach at KPU where we have the ability to know our students and to help them. I am proud of Jordan, who really is an inspiration to all of us. He faced great adversity, but made the right choices and now is a success story.”

Buna says although his parents were always involved in his life, he looked elsewhere as a teenager for mentorship.

“That was one of the biggest problems for me and why I went so far off track after 18 because I graduated from high school and I lost a lot of the older mentors in my life and it’s really difficult for kids or anybody to go through life without somebody to look up to and for somebody to hold you accountable.”

He is getting ready to go back to school for a master’s degree in counselling psychology in hopes of one day becoming a clinical counsellor. He reflects back to his life philosophy and adds some advice for future students.

“The only thing that’s more valuable than what’s in the books here is the wisdom that people have.”

Buna says the connections he’s made at KPU is what made his experience memorable as he found people to look up to and learned to persevere. It wasn’t always like that for him before KPU.

“I’m lucky, I had some really bad ones [mentors] but I managed to also get some really good ones too.”

President and Vice Chancellor Report

In addition to the usual rounds of administrative and governance meetings, there were several notable external and internal engagements in the period between Senate meetings.

I attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Society for the Study of Higher Education (as part of the Humanities and Social Sciences Congress) at UBC on June 2nd to participate on a panel on “Higher Education Reform: Continuing the Conversation on the Role of Blended Learning”.

Along with Fern Gabriel and Brandon Gabriel from the Kwantlen First Nation, Herman Ho and Andrew Chisholm from Facilities Services, and Joanne Saunders, Executive Director of Marketing and Recruitment we have been developing approaches to install some public art work as well as Indigenous signage on KPU’s campuses, starting with KPU Langley and the buildings at KPU Surrey. I met with Fern and Brandon on June 10th to continue the discussion and we will start to see the new signage in the fall.

June 4th to 7th saw the largest spring convocation ever at KPU. We awarded honorary degrees to educator Jan Unwin and entrepreneur Elana Rosenfeld, and we heard some wonderful student addresses.

The KPU Foundation Board met on June 11th and engaged in some long term planning.

The Senate Tributes Committee met on June 13th to consider new honorary degree nominations.

I gave a keynote address at the BC Prior Learning Assessment Network AGM on June 14th: “Open Education: an update on

KPU”

From June 15th to 19th I was invited to be part of the faculty to teach the Senior University Administrators’ Course offered in Winnipeg by the Centre for Higher Education Research and Development at the University of Manitoba.

The second of the President’s Community Advisory Committees met in Langley on June 20th, where we hosted key decision makers in the community on the plans for KPU and its role in the Langleys.

Kwantlen Polytechnic University is one of sixteen universities chosen to be part of the Canadian Pilot for the Carnegie Community Engagement classification. On June 24th we invited select community partners to help inform KPU’s involvement in this project. The Carnegie Foundation’s Classification for Community Engagement is an elective classification and has been the leading framework for institutional assessment and recognition of community engagement in U.S. higher education for the past thirteen years. It is based on voluntary participation by institutions. The elective classification involves data collection and documentation of important aspects of institutional mission, identity and commitments, and requires substantial effort invested by participating institutions. There are currently 361 campuses with the elective Community Engagement Classification in the US. <https://www.brown.edu/swearer/carnegie>. The initial convening of the CPC, hosted at Simon Fraser University in February 2019, brought together sixteen Canadian post-secondary institutions of different types from coast to coast to coast.

Organizational Development

Essential Skills for Managers Workshop - Close to sixty KPU employees attended a two-day "Essential Skills for Managers" workshop this May and June. Facilitated by Kwela Leadership Training and Talent Management, a Vancouver-based consulting firm, the purpose of this workshop was to provide new and existing leaders with little to no formal leadership training an opportunity to develop and practice skills in this area. Attendees ranged from faculty department Chairs to support staff supervisors to administrative managers.

PEOPLE SERVICES

Compensation

Preparation for the annual merit increase is underway. Development of processes and systems in support of the new compensation framework continues. Work continues on processes for talent review management.

HR Operations

HR's policy review process is ongoing and is also beginning the final pilot phase for implementing the automatic Request for Talent (RFT) process. HR is also at the pilot phase for automating employee clearance forms.

Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)

Meetings with Ellucian to discuss the optimization of HR's current systems and the identification of gaps that need to be addressed have been scheduled.

Office of the Vice President, Finance & Administration

FINANCIAL SERVICES

GENERAL:

The 2018/19 Audited Financial Statements were approved by the Board of Governors on May 22, 2019 and were free of any reportable audit errors. This is a significant success, and due largely in part to the efforts, diligence and cooperation of all Financial Services team members.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS AND PAYROLL:

Initiatives

The revised Investment Policy was posted on the KPU Policy Blog on May 14, 2019 for comment from the University Community. During the posting period, the team has been working with the Office of General Counsel to draft a Memorandum of Understanding between KPU and the Foundation, which will govern the agreement of having a shared Investment Advisory Committee. Terms of Reference for this committee are also being drafted. Financial Operations is also currently working on, or has draft versions available of the following policies which we expect to be posted and approved by the end of 2019: GV4 Signing Authority Policy, GV1 Selection of Auditors Policy, FM6 Banking Policy, and a new Cash Acceptance and Anti-Money Laundering Policy.

Financial Operations is progressing towards the institutional goal of becoming 'cash-less' with respect to tuition and related fees. The final decision on a service provider for international tuition payments is expected in mid-June, while discussions continue with Moneris regarding options to provide additional non-cash payment options for our domestic students.

Financial Operations continues to strategically reduce the number of KPU PCards in circulation, while also improving PCard processes and mitigating the risks associated with PCards. As Financial Services moves towards the implementation of the Concur travel booking system, we expect to see a further reduction in PCards as employees will be able to book their KPU-related travel through the Concur system.

Payroll Services has been developing an emergency plan to ensure that employees will continue to be paid in the event of a fire, evacuation, natural disaster, or other emergency situation. The finalized plan is expected to be complete in the Fall/Winter of 2019.

BUDGET AND FINANCIAL REPORTING:

Initiatives

The Financial Reporting team launched monthly meetings with all 23 faculties and divisional areas in late May/early June, with the objective of increasing proactivity and providing one-on-one customer support to divisional

leaders. In addition, now that Financial Reporting has stable month-end closes, the team can work with divisions on monthly variance analyses of budget vs. actuals, and year-over-year comparisons.

Planning for the KPU Foundation Audit by KPMG is underway and is scheduled to take place from June 10-14, 2019. The Reporting team has also been working with the KPU Retirees Association to assist with forms and quarterly financials.

The team's next initiative is to implement quarterly forecasting after quarter-end closes.

PROCUREMENT SERVICES:

Initiatives

Procurement Services currently has a number of major competitions underway, including the procurement of Campus Shuttle Services. An open competition for Applicant Tracking Software closed in May 2019, and the project team is currently evaluating proposals to shortlist for the Workshop and Demonstration stage. Planning is also underway for the procurement of food services across all KPU campuses, as the current contract expires in June 2020. Based on the findings of the completed needs assessment, we expect the drafting of solicitation documentation to be completed by the end of June 2019.

The staff of Procurement Services continue to assume a leadership role in BC Post-Secondary Sectorial Procurement initiatives with BCNET, and have recently participated in both Provincial Procurement Community of Practice and BCNET conferences. Procurement Management plan to evaluate and implement applicable continuous improvement ideas generated by the staff after attending these conferences. Ideas include: 1.) new ways of incorporating anonymity in the evaluation templates to enhance vendor's confidence in the final results, and 2.) strategies to improve privacy and data security by updating our solicitation schedule with the latest privacy requirements.

Procurement Services continues to work collaboratively with stakeholders, most recently working with the Divisional Business Managers and the Office of Research and Research Services on strategic sourcing, with the aim of strengthening the culture of proactive planning and procurement best practice.

A collaborative effort is underway between Procurement Services and BCNET to substitute traditional copy paper with Sugar Sheets, where feasible. The initiative is in line with the sustainability goals of Vision 2023, and results of the case studies completed show significant environmental, social and economic benefits following product adoption.

Office of the Vice President, Finance & Administration

CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY

SECURITY

- Additional officers have been added for the summer weekends at Langley campus to extend coverage hours to 6:00 AM to 6:30 PM.
- Security assisted in providing services to several high visibility functions on the different campuses, such as Science Rendezvous and the BBQ challenge.
- All campus Security teams met, debriefed with, and provided feedback to the Office of Emergency Planning in response to the recent all-campus evacuation.

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY

- Fire drills were completed at Surrey, KPU Tech, and Richmond and Langley campuses. Fire drills involved complete evacuation of buildings and involved participation of all students and employees.
- In collaboration with the Dean of Science and Horticulture's office, OH&S completed laboratory safety inspections at the Langley campus.
- The team is working with a consultant to review fall protection requirements at the Langley, Surrey and KPU Tech campuses. Review involves conducting fall hazard assessments, development of safe work procedures and training of employees.
- Working in collaboration with the Fine Arts department and WorkSafe BC, OH&S has completed review of chemical safety program in the Photography department.
- The annual Health and Safety Committee training day was held May 26, 2019. The event was a success and was attended by members from all KPU campuses; topics presented included Ergonomics and Bullying and Harassment.

EMERGENCY PLANNING

- The Emergency Operation Centre (EOC) opened for 4 days during Convocation. Minor behavioural issues arose with some spectators and all were approached and advised of proper protocol by the Manager, Emergency Planning.
- Emergency Planning assisted by providing presence and services to high visibility functions on different campuses, such as Science Rendezvous, the BBQ Challenge, and KPU day.
- The EOC opened for full active all-campus evacuation. A full report will be developed and documented for future reference and training opportunities.
- Emergency Planning is now part of the Behavioral Intervention Team and has been attending the meetings and assisting in the newest files that have come up.

- Emergency Satellite Telephone contract was found to be very expensive and therefore a new and different contract which will provide a saving of \$1100 per year was obtained.

SECURITY SYSTEMS

Civic Plaza

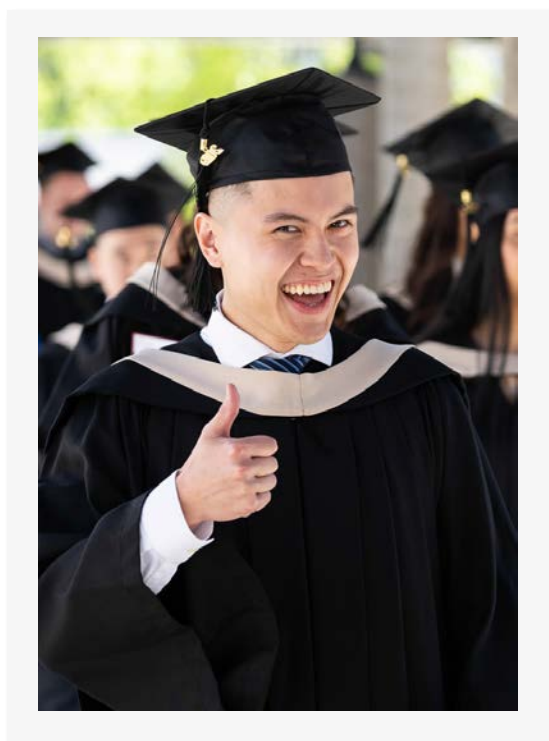
- Adjustment to the access control and alarm systems were made to accommodate City of Surrey as tenants on the 9th floor.

KPU Tech

- The University Space Committee recommended and space has been allocated for the Operational Control Centre Project. Funding for the room fit-up was approved in this year's budget.
- Updated software to manage BOSCH alarms panel has been acquired and installed and will facilitate easier management of users and codes across all appropriate campuses.
- Daniel Ha, our in house KPU locksmith has been busy attending to ongoing maintenance and repair requests. The number of requests has increased since moving to an in house locksmith from an outside contractor.

Langley

- CCVE and Access Control upgrade project is underway and currently in the cable running phase.



INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Staffing

The management team continues to work on filling vacant positions through backfilling and new hires. We are also assessing and working on staffing plans to ensure that adequate level of staff is in place within the department. This will allow for full support of all University services with the ability to build redundancy for vacation coverage.

Telephone System Implementation

- Consultant is in the process of completing the RFP. Next step will be to work with Procurement on the RFP to issue by end of June

Service Desk Renovation

- This project is currently in the design development phase; once the design is complete we will enter the permit process with the City of Surrey before construction can commence. The IT Service Desk will be relocated to Birch 104 just before construction begins. The length of time is to be determined.

Digital Ready Transformation

- IT will work to upgrade the Cloverdale 1853, Surrey 1140 meeting rooms, 5 E-classrooms in Richmond, 4 E-classrooms in Langley, Spruce 124, and study rooms in the libraries with updated AV digital ready technology. We are in the process of creating the schedule so approximate timelines are forthcoming; however, the 5 E-classrooms for the east wing at Richmond campus are expected to be completed by July 15th.

Business Continuity

- IT is implementing a secondary pathway to the Internet; this project is currently in progress, working with our sector partner BCNET, and the completion date is scheduled for June 17, 2019. Temporary fibre has been installed which IT has implemented as redundant connectivity prior to the permanent install. This project has been delayed by a few weeks due to unforeseen challenges with the City of Surrey and TELUS regarding

right of access. Issues have been mitigated accordingly and confirmation for completion is now June 17, 2019.

CRM Project

- The Contact Resource Management (CRM) project is currently in the procurement phase of the project and the team is working to fast-track the implementation in order to have recruitment live for the Future Student's Office (FSO) and KPU International by the start of the September recruitment cycle.

HR Applicant Tracking System

- The HR and Business IT teams are working to replace the outdated and manual process with a current cloud-based Applicant Tracking System (ATS). The search continues at the RFP phase which will conclude at the end of June. The team is targeting to have the new HR ATS implemented for November 2019.

Digital Business Transformation

- Ellucian consulting architects have been working with all the KPU business units (HR, Payroll, Finance, Student Services, International and Office of the Registrar) to review the current gaps in business service deliveries. We are looking to have a business roadmap in place by the end of August 2019 to allow KPU to strategically budget and implement a new Digital Business Plan over the next several years.

BANNER 9 Phase II – Application Deployment

- Banner 9 application rollouts are still underway. The new improved Web Registration Application has been soft launched to the summer students with a full rollout of both the new Student Profile and Student Registration in June 2019. The Fall Registration in July 2019 will utilize the new Student Web Registration app for a more robust and up to date student experience.

Information Security Program

- KPU Staff Information Security Awareness program presently under-review for improvements. This includes discovery for an alternative training software package that will provide improved functionality, administration and metrics. Job posting for a Senior Information Security Analyst is approved and underway; this position will provide dedicated security technical support. Selection and adoption of an Information Security Framework is in process. A KPU Information Security Incident Response plan is currently under review in draft form.

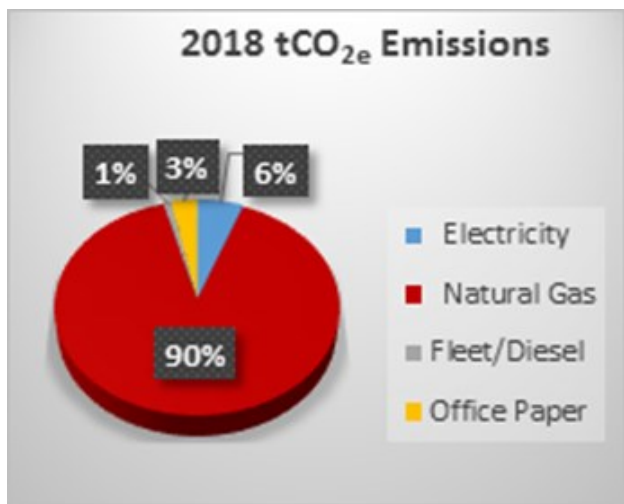
FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

Carbon Neutral Action Report

KPU has submitted its annual Carbon Neutral Action Report for 2018 as required under the Provincial Greenhouse Gas Reduction Targets Act and Carbon Neutral Government Regulations.

KPU's 2018 total emissions from all sources for carbon offsets were 2,422 tCO_{2e}. This is a reduction in Green House Gas (GHG) emissions of 6.8% since 2017, and a 10.6% reduction from 2007, the base year that the Province requires all institutions to use as a comparator. Overall, since 2007, KPU is 28.6% more efficient despite the growth in campus space and activity. An area of opportunity for the University in order to continue reducing our carbon footprint is to develop a strategy to address the burning of natural gas: of the 2,422 tCO_{2e} KPU produced in 2018, 2,186 tCO_{2e} were produced by burning natural gas.

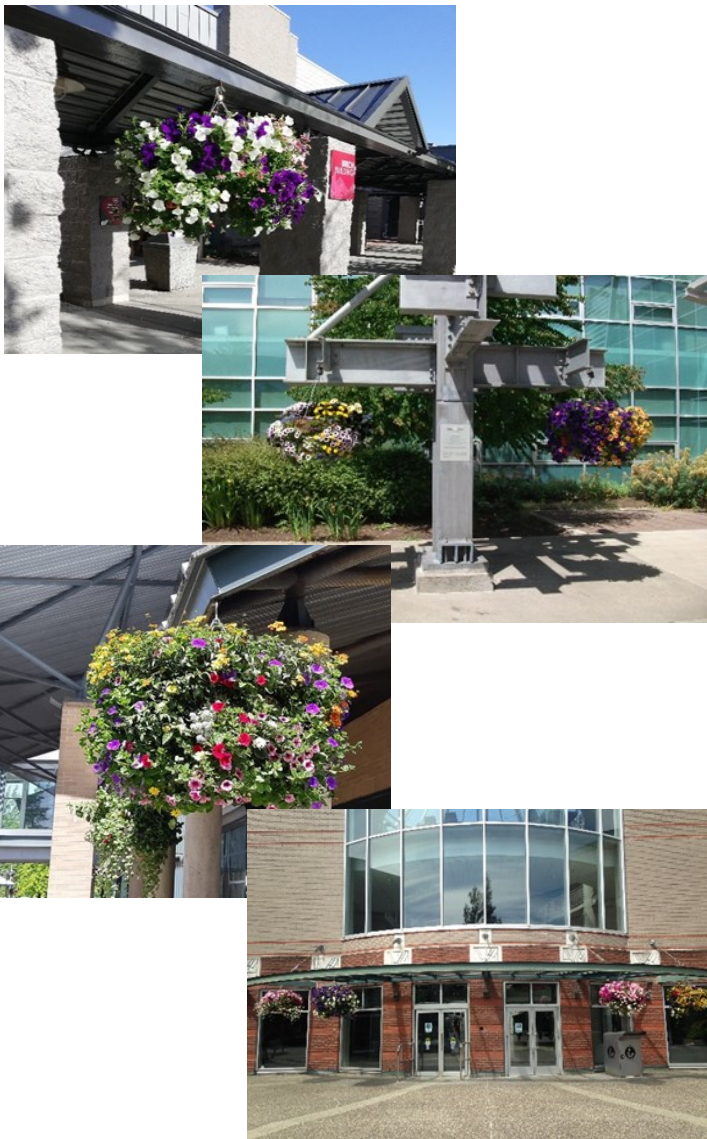
Looking ahead, KPU will need to continue formulating creative strategies that will reduce total emissions from all sources in order to achieve the 33% target set by the Province for 2020. Ancillary Services is currently in the process of procuring a third cargo van as part of the replacement and renewal plan for older fleet vehicles.

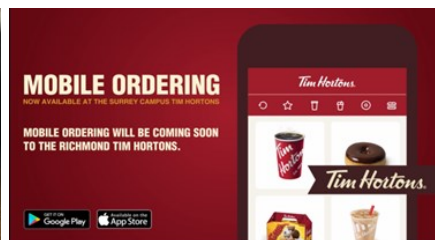
Food Services:

Office of the Provost & Vice President, Academic

As we approach the end of the regular academic year cycle, we do so having accomplished many good things. At the same time, we must acknowledge having been through some challenging transformative processes that will ultimately strengthen KPU and ensure its sustainability. Although it has only been one month since the last Board of Governors meeting the level of activity has remained high. Last week we celebrated our largest convocation to date with eight wonderful ceremonies, distinguished teaching and distinguished service awards, an honorary doctorate and several remarkable graduate convocation addresses. We also said farewell to our Dean of the Wilson School of Design, Carolyn Robertson, who did a remarkable job at steering the Wilson School of Design to its new building and its revitalized focus.

The most significant academic undertaking during this past month was the culmination of the Senate discussion on the proposal to discontinue the Faculty of Academic and Career Advancement last May 27. The outcome of that process will be the topic of a separate presentation at the Board of Governors meeting on June 26. The presentation will include a motion for approval from the Board of Governors.

KPU is presenting its first Graduate Certificate in Sustainable Foods and Security to the Board for approval. This graduate program is the first major step towards the establishment of graduate programs at KPU and represents a collaborative venture between the Faculty of Science and Horticulture, Faculty of Arts and the School of Business.

The long-awaited RS5 Intellectual Property Policy was approved by Senate on May 27. This marks a significant step forward for research at KPU. The process was led by AVP Research, Dr. Deepak Gupta following the original groundwork done by VP Teaching and Learning, Dr. Stephanie Chu. The policy incorporates the very best current practices to define and recognize intellectual property and will enable KPU to access research funding previously unavailable to the university. Kudos to Dr. Gupta, Dr. Chu, Josephine Chan and their numerous collaborators on achieving a win-win policy for all at KPU.

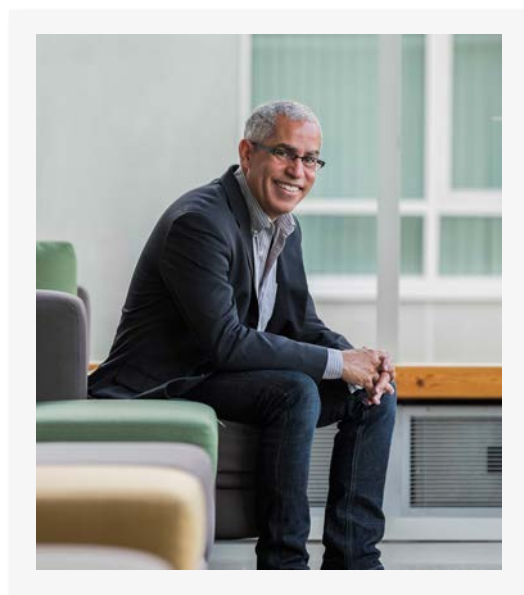
KPU is putting forth two candidates for the Canada Research Chairs Tier II nomination at the end of June. A rigorous, transparent and representative KPU selection process has identified two highly qualified scholar/researcher nominees from the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Science and Horticulture. We anticipate the results of the nomination to be announced in the Fall of 2019.

The Academic Plan 2019-2023 is now completing its first year of implementation. The Provost will be providing a full report at the June 26 Board of Governor's meeting outlining the status of the nine Academic Plan goals, their corresponding strategies and the impact, thus far, of the initiatives and timeline.

Faculty of Academic and Career Advancement (ACA)

ACADEMIC & CAREER ADVANCEMENT

CALP

The ACA Interim Dean and Divisional Business Manager met with KPU's Community Adult Literacy partners on May 30 to share best practices for programming, grant applications and reporting. KPU has five CALP partnerships: one in Richmond, three in Surrey and one in Langley.

Faculty of the Whole:

The ACA Faculty of the Whole meeting was held on May 17. After a brief business meeting, the Interim Dean thanked the many people who have been involved in leading the Faculty through the last several months of the GV9 process.

Applying Before Testing:

As will no doubt be noted elsewhere in this report a decision has been made by KPU to require students to apply to the university before taking any KPU placement test. We sincerely hope that this decision does not result in fewer students accessing the placement tests or registering in courses.

ACA Academic Plan

ACA has taken the first steps toward drafting an Academic Plan for the Faculty in response to KPU's Academic Plan 2023. There are many ways that ACA can contribute to the institution in moving forward on the goals of the Academic Plan and the process for accounting for these strategies will start in the ACA departments. The plan will also target many of the recommendations of the GV9 Task Force.

DDDE at Douglas College:

Interim Dean Begalka attended the semi-annual meeting of Deans and Directors of Developmental Education on May 24 at Douglas College. Topics covered included questions around practices of admission and assessment to developmental programming as well as the changes to developmental FTE targets. Barbara Binczyk from the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills and Training provided a ministry update.

As the Systems Liaison Person for Adult Special Education, the Interim Dean attended the ASE Articulation meeting on May 16. This meetings gives ASE providers from around the province the chance to share best practices and engage in the quality assurance process of articulating ASE course outlines. Ministry representative Barb Binczyk also presented an update at this meeting.

Colleges and Institutes Canada Conference:

Interim Dean Aimee Begalka presented as part of a Thought Forum at the CI Can conference on May 4-7. The title of the presentation was "Who's in the Classroom? Distinct and Overlapping Needs of International and Newcomer Students." Co-presenters were from Algonquin College and Colleges and Institutes Canada.

ACADEMIC & CAREER PREPARATION (ACP)

ACP English developed draft proposals to revitalize their Continuous Intake course offerings. These proposals are the UPrep and UStart proposals which offer a more focused, measurable approach to teaching Adult Basic Education. Work will continue on these proposals in late Summer 2019.

Enrolment at the Phoenix Kwantlen Learning Center is good and the program continues to be successful.

ACCESS PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES (APPD)

The 2018-19 academic year is winding down after another busy year. Students are out on their final work experience placements for the year and will come together one last time for pizza parties and evaluations the week of June 17.

Intake is mostly full for September 2019.

Teresa Swan and Fiona Whittington-Walsh have been invited to attend an open branch meeting with representatives from the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills & Training to speak about the Including All Citizens Project.

The department is at work on revisions to the program that will result in APPD having a Senate-approved credential. This work is related to APPD's ongoing efforts to align with KPU's admission and registration processes.

Instructional Associate Coordinator Kiren Uppal graduated from Vancouver Island University with her M.Ed. in Special Education.

Lastly, APPD students from all 3 campuses came together for the annual 'Survivor' themed activity where teams competed against each other with their newly acquired arsenal of work skills knowledge and made new friends in the process!





ENGLISH LANGUAGE STUDIES (ELS)

The ELS department continues to deal with uncertainty in our department due to potential lay-offs and current closure to enrolment for international Pathway students. We hope that our student enrolment will increase following the limited opening of Pathways 3 in September and the opening of

Pathways 1 and 2 in Summer 2020. Layoff mitigation strategies, including early retirement incentive packages, have also been implemented. Faculty on lay-off notice are waiting for confirmation of how many colleagues will choose to retire, which will result in the rescindment of some lay-off notices.

The ELS Curriculum Committee undertook program-wide course revisions as per the Quality Assurance Plan that followed the Program Review. These course revisions have been approved by Senate and will be taken to the BCCAT (BC Council on Admission and Transfer) next year. A number of courses that have not been offered in the last five years have also been discontinued.

The ELS Marketing Committee continues its successful work to promote the ELS program in the community to increase awareness of ESL opportunities at KPU with domestic students. Recent faculty marketing initiatives include presentations at New Directions in Langley and Douglas College in Coquitlam, as well as participation in the KPU Langley Open House. ELS faculty will also be taking part in the upcoming Breaking Barriers brunch, hosted by the Future Students' Office and the Faculty of Academic and Career Advancement. This event will provide community support workers the opportunity to network, meet faculty members and visit various service areas at KPU to receive up-to-date information about KPU's programs and services and learn how KPU can support the educational needs of their clientele.

KPU students bring science and art together to celebrate the Year of the Periodic Table

The periodic table usually contains a mass of information about each element, but rarely gives a sense of its colour. That's all changed thanks to an imaginative collaboration between Chemistry and Fine Arts students at Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU).

This fusion of science and art stemmed from the two disciplines sharing space in the Spruce building at the university's Surrey campus. The chemistry students researched the colour of each individual element as a molecule and the arts students used those colours to create abstract compositions.

"This is a wonderful example of KPU's polytechnic spirit," says Elizabeth Worobec, dean of the Faculty of Science and Horticulture. "Fine Arts meets Chemistry in a student art installation celebrating the Year of the Periodic Table."

"It's exciting to see the collaborative efforts between departments to create such a cross-disciplinary piece of artwork," says Diane Purvey, Dean of the Faculty of Arts. "This is a fantastic example of the creativity and skill both Chemistry and Fine Arts students share".

The finished artwork goes on display in the Spruce Gallery, KPU Surrey, tomorrow (June 12) at 4 p.m. The work will be on display until August 30, 2019.

"We are very proud of the success of this project, and the willingness and enthusiasm of the students in researching and marking the artwork," adds arts instructor Amy Huestis.

NEW PROGRAMS, POLICIES AND INITIATIVES:

Health Care Assistant Program Accessibility

To make the Health Care Assistant program more accessible, whilst keeping in line with the BC Health Care Assistant Registry and other education institutes, as well as strategies to boost enrolment in the HCAP, we are:

- Changing the minimum grade of B in BC English 11 and BC Communications 12 to a passing grade, this change will align with the Admissions Requirements more closely with those of other post-secondary institutions and the Health Care Assistant regulatory body.
- Removal of the mandatory information session. This will reduce the extra cost to students as the information is readily available online.
- Discontinuing HCAP 1260 (Technology course) outline and moving content to HCAP 1121 and HCAP 1136 course

outlines. This curricular change will decrease program credits from 34 to 33 (1260 course content is required at the start of the program to support student success and this will also reduce cost of the program and be more competitive with other post-secondary institutions). (The above to be presented to SSC on June 12th 2019).

- Pilot project for Fall 2019 – providing HCAP theory courses at the Surrey campus as a strategy to boost enrolment (lab classes will continue to be provided at the Langley campus).
- Partnership with four school districts (Richmond, Delta, Surrey and Langley) to provide Dual Credit starting in September 2020.

GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT

Partnerships

- Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) - International has concluded a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with TAC to explore potential collaboration in student and faculty mobility, particularly Canada-ASEAN Scholarships: Educational Exchanges for Development (SEED) program.
- Shanghai Polytechnic University (SSPU) - International has concluded an MOU with SSPC to explore potential collaboration in 2+2 articulation, faculty mobility and short-term programs.

Study Abroad

- Exchange - 46 exchange students from 27 different institutions will be attending KPU in Fall 2019, while 13 KPU students will go on exchange at our partner universities.
- International has processed ten applications for the Emerging Leaders in the Americas Program (ELAP) Scholarship for the incoming exchange students in 2019/2020 academic year. Successful applicants will receive \$7,200 from Global Affairs Canada to fund the semester abroad at KPU.
- International also received 25 scholarship applications for the One World International Scholarship, which is available to all KPU students who joined or will be joining a study abroad program. Successful applicants will receive between \$1,000 to \$3,500 towards their study abroad experience. The scholarship pool has increased from \$36,000 in 2018 to \$44,000 in 2019 due to an additional allocation from the Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society.
- Field School - Two faculty members and 22 students will be attending a two-week Arts Field School in London and Venice in June 2019. Students will take part in immersion activities related to culture and fine arts applications in an integrative learning environment.
- Summer School - Five students from KPU have received tuition waivers to attend the summer school at the University of Applied Sciences Northwestern in Switzerland.
- Pre-Departure Sessions - International held pre-departure sessions for KPU students who will be pursuing short-term academic opportunities abroad in South Korea, Thailand, Tanzania and the USA.

Student Life

- Summer International Orientation - In collaboration with the Orientation and Transitions team, orientation for new international students was held on May 2, 2019. Students had the opportunity to mingle with their domestic



counterparts, explore KPU Surrey, and meet many of the staff that will be supporting them during their studies at KPU.

- Victoria Trip - A group of 52 students, including domestic, international and exchange students participated in a day trip to Victoria on May 11, 2019. They visited various attractions in Victoria and spend time bonding and learning more about the capital city of BC.



- Teaching, Learning, Scholarship, and Research Symposium - In collaboration with the Learning Center, International conducted a presentation during the KPU Teaching & Learning Symposium on April 23, 2019. A panel of international students from India, Brazil and El Salvador also participated in the discussion.
- Canada Day with the KSA - In collaboration with the Kwantlen Student Association, International is planning the 2019 Canada Day event which will take place on June 26-27, 2019 at KPU Richmond. The event will feature food, music, games, and other attractions at no cost to participants. Hundreds of students and staff took part in the event last year with a similar turnout expected this year.

Advising

- As part of the internationalization effort, International participates in meetings with various departments within KPU to disseminate information and answer inquiries about support services that are available through

International to help faculty manage international students in their classrooms.

- In collaboration with Central Advising and Student Enrollment Services, International will be offering academic workshops in June 2019 to students who are currently in academic warning. International Academic Advisors will also reach out to students in academic probation to ensure that students have the support needed to succeed in the upcoming semesters.

INTERNATIONAL RECRUITMENT & ADMISSIONS

Recruitment—Agent Visits

- **China**—From May to August 2019, International will be visiting all active Chinese educational agents who are based locally in Vancouver to provide detailed updates on changes related to admissions such as English language requirements and the study permit deadline. The purpose is to keep agents apprised of all changes and to encourage students to commit to enroll at KPU to meet the international student enrolment target.
- **Korea & Japan**—Visits to local Korean and Japanese agents are also underway to reactivate the relationships. Because Korean and Japanese students are heavily reliant on introductory pathway programs, many of the agents had to redirect their students to other institutions in 2018 after KPU stopped accepting applications to introductory-level pathway offerings. With the re-opening of Pathway Levels 2 and 3 for summer 2020 intake, International is taking a proactive approach to inform agents and promote pathways to undergraduate programs.
- **India**—International welcomed a number of top Indian agents on their visits to KPU. They had the opportunity to tour the facilities at KPU Richmond and KPU Surrey and learn more about services available to international students. The discussion revolved around the challenges faced by international students and how the agents can work with International to better prepare future students for academic success in Canada.
- **Philippines & Vietnam**—International welcomed several agents from Philippines and Vietnam on campus visits. These agents have a strong presence in their respective markets and have expressed their enthusiastic commitment to promote KPU among their students.

NAFSA CONFERENCE 2019

The NAFSA Annual Conference & Expo unites nearly 10,000 attendees each year from more than 3,500 institutions and



organizations from over 100 countries. It is a learning and networking event for all international educators and organizations to support international education. The theme for 2019 NAFSA Conference was “*Global Leadership, Learning, and Change*”.

The KPU International team had more than 40 different meetings with current partner institutions, potential partners, education agents and other educational organizations at this year’s NAFSA conference.

Main Goals:

- Review and strengthen KPU’s existing partnerships and collaborations with partner institutions
- Explore new collaboration opportunities in different regions and therefore increase KPU student diversity
- Meetings with Canadian Trade Commissioners from different countries to discuss the current trends in their regions, student recruitment strategies, and potential partnerships development.



Office of Research and Research Services

ORS Restructuring

The former Office of Research and Scholarship is being transformed into a decentralized Office of Research Services (ORS), with a physical presence at Richmond (R3044), Surrey (within A2400), and Langley campuses. The AVP, Research's office at Richmond R3046 is being renovated and that is expected to be complete by June 2019.

A Confidential Assistant (to be based in Richmond) and a Research Compliance Manager (to be based in Langley) will be hired in the coming months as part of this transformation.

ORS is putting together a compendium of common policies and procedures for reference by KPU researchers. Legal forms and templates are being uploaded to a refreshed ORS SharePoint site.

A generic email address avpr@kpu.ca has been set up to streamline vetting by ORS staff and processing of documents requiring the AVPR's approval.

At the end of this transformation, ORS will have transformed itself into a team of accessible professionals with expertise in various facets of research administration and management.

Research Policies Development and Update

An overhaul of research policy frameworks is in progress. Members of the KPU community have responded to an open call to participate on a task force to create a new policy on animal care in accordance with the Canadian Council on Animal Care.

New Funding Eligibility

KPU is now eligible to apply for Mitacs funding. Two researchers are already preparing applications for Mitacs funding.

Inaugural Teaching, Learning, Scholarship and Research (TLSR) Survey

Together with Institutional Analysis and Planning, the Vice Provost Teaching and Learning and the Associate Vice President, Research collaborated on the 2019 TLRS Survey. Across KPU, 232 educators responded, for a 26% response rate.

Dimensions Charter

Following endorsements from the Senate and the President's Diversity and Equity Committee, President Dr. Alan Davis signed the Dimensions Charter committing to advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion in research at KPU. KPU's senior leaders also attended a workshop organized by Universities Canada on equity, diversity, and inclusion held June 2-3, 2019.

SSHRC Leaders

Dr. Gupta represented KPU at the bi-annual SSHRC Leaders meeting on June 5, 2019 organized by SSHRC. A key take-away is that SSHRC is looking to update their Partnership Development grant stream to be more responsive to the needs of community partners.

Strategic Research Plan (SRP) Summary Update

KPU needs to file a SRP Summary with major funders such as Canada Foundation for Innovation and Canada Research Chairs (CRCs) Program.

Follows inputs received from the Senate Standing Committee on Research earlier this year, the Office of Research is working to update the SRP Summary for KPU. This is an incremental effort that endeavors to align with Vision 2023 and the Academic Plan 2023. It also aims to ensure that the plan is inclusive of research across KPU.

The updated SRP Summary will also inform the development of an actionable Research Strategy for KPU.

Research Ethics Board (REB)

A call for a REB member was sent out for the upcoming vacant position on the REB. The selection process is underway.

The REB had a Q & A session and also moderated a panel discussion on Ethics at the April 2019, KPU's 3rd Annual Teaching, Learning, Scholarship & Research Symposium.

The REB continues to review Research Ethics Applications on an on-going basis.

INSTITUTE FOR SUSTAINABLE HORTICULTURE (ISH)

Eight KPU students have summer research assistant positions at ISH: 2 Horticulture, 1 EPT, 3 Biology (two working with Paul Adams), and 2 Chemistry (working with David Sud). In addition, 4 International graduate students are on Internship or Fellowship with ISH (3 France, 1 Cuba). A new EPT grad was hired for a year with an Agriculture Canada Career Focus training subsidy. Two Langley high school students will also have summer research positions at ISH for July and August, mentored by KPU Horticulture students. These two students carried out their science fair project at ISH under the supervision of Dr. Sepideh Tarhiri, and won in the Fraser Valley district. At the National Science Fair in Fredericton in May, Sarah Choi (16) and Neelah Hassanzadeh (16) were recipients of a Silver Award of a \$2000 entrance scholarships from Western University, the University of Ottawa, Univ. New Brunswick, Dalhousie, UBC, a Senior Excellence Silver Award from Youth Science Canada (Certificate and Medal). Their project: "BC Black Soldier Fly Frass: Improving Plant Health While Minimizing Environmental Impact" was related to a current industry collaborative with Enterra Feed Corporation and ISH. We are very proud of them!

Several projects are in progress this spring and summer with industry partners and ongoing research grants.

A1. ENHANCE THE EXPERIENCE OF OUR STUDENTS

Excel Seminar for Economic Faculty

On June 17 a seminar was held at KPU Civic Plaza presented by Dr. Humberto Barreto, the Q. G. Noblitt Professor of Economics and Management at DePauw University in Indiana. Dr. Humberto is arguably the top practitioner of Excel in the classroom. He puts on seminars annually at the American Economics Association (AEA) meetings and the summer conference promoted by the AEA's Committee for Teaching and Research in Economic Education; CTREE.

Research suggests students relate to economic learning more when they see how it explains information presented by the Bank of Canada, Statistics Canada, the FED etc. where Excel is an excellent teaching tool. Dr. Humberto demonstrates to instructors how to use the vast array of applications available in Excel which allows students to "play" with data while gaining a stronger understanding of economics.

Dr. Humberto has presented the summer 2 day-seminar for at least four years and the KPU School of Business is very fortunate to have him visit the Lower Mainland this year and present a seminar for our Economics team.

A2. ENRICH THE EXPERIENCE OF OUR EMPLOYEES

The School of Business would like to thank Dr. Darren Francis for his time as an Interim Associate Dean from Sep 1, 2018 to May 31, 2019. Darren not only provided much assistance to the operations of the Dean's office and academic units, but, also provided exemplary mentorship for our two newest Associate Deans. He was instrumental in helping to have the ACBSP report completed and submitted on time and has worked hard to help streamline processes within the Dean's office to increase efficiencies. Darren will be missed, but, we are pleased we will still be able work with Darren regularly as he returns to his chair and teaching position in the Applied Communications and Public Relations (ACPR) department.

C1. RESEARCH & SCHOLARSHIP

Loren Coutts, Associate Dean of the School of Business attended the Canadian Federation of Business School Deans' Associate Deans (AD) Research Meeting and Conference held at Brock University in St. Catherines, May 26-28.

The main topics discussed included: (1) the changing landscape for graduate programs and the implications on research, in

particular the shift to specialized master's and multidisciplinary master's programs; (2) an update on SSHRC activities and funding available to business schools; (3) the role of the AD in motivating faculty members to do quality research at different stages of career development; (4) the leadership role of the AD in promoting a culture of research involvement.

Loren noted that some of the challenges to doing research that the School of Business has identified such as a lack of research experience or the existence of significant time intervals since research was last done, or lack of time capacity to complete research with a full-time teaching load are common to other universities as well.

The School of Business is creating a Research Committee to begin looking at realistic and supportive structures to increase interest and engagement in business research. This committee will also be a support group for others within the education unit to consult with regarding intention for research, information on funding opportunities and assistance in writing applications.

Genesa Chartered Accountants – Connecting Curious Minds Business Leadership Conference

The School of Business was one of the sponsors for the Genesa conference held June 7, 2019. Faculty members Marc Kampschuur, Lindsay Clayton, Theresa Voorluys, and Nina Mosallaei and our students Amneet Sidhu, Hillary Fortin and Saskia Goodacre attended. The theme of the conference fit well with the KPU School of Business:

"Inspiring the depth of purpose before profit and redefining a traditional business world to one that welcomes taking risk in creativity, empowered action and co-leadership."

The conference was an opportunity for faculty and students to learn together.

Loren Coutts, Associate Dean of the School of Business recently graduated with a Masters of Education from the University of Victoria, British Columbia. He was able to attend his convocation in Victoria on June 10, 2019. Congratulations Loren.

KPU's School of Business Re-Affirmation of Accreditation

At the Accreditation Council of Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) Conference 2019 held in Houston, Texas, June 21-24, KPU's School of Business has been officially recognized for Reaffirmation of Accreditation during the closing ceremony of the event. The leadership team and the Quality Education Committee faculty were in attendance to celebrate the proud moment for KPU's business school. Lesley McCannell's ACBSP Regional Teaching Excellence Award was also presented and in Lesley's absence was accepted on her behalf by Stephanie Howes, Dean of the School of Business.

C2. INNOVATION IN TEACHING, LEARNING AND CURRICULUM

Arley Cruthers, Applied Communications faculty member, is the recipient of the "Award for Excellence in Open Education"

from BC Campus. BC Campus announcement: "Arley is an innovative leader in the open movement at KPU and an early adopter of open pedagogy at the university, having attended the Digital Pedagogy Lab in Vancouver in 2017. In 2019, Arley published an open textbook on business writing and received grant funding to work with external collaborators to include more diverse voices in the book and to incorporate Indigenous ways of knowing and Arley uses an open-pedagogical approach to curriculum development in all courses.



Recently Arley led two classes (50 primary and secondary students) to collaboratively research and write a report on the impact of textbook costs on students. Students then needed to remix the report into a different format for a different audience. One of the remix projects was a game to help instructors develop empathy towards students in relation to textbook costs. At the Cascadia Open Education Summit in 2019 Arley and three students presented the game and the research to an audience of educators from B.C., Washington, Oregon, and beyond. The presentation was very well-received and many took to Twitter to share that it was one of the best sessions at the conference.

Arley has inspired numerous others in the School of Business to embrace open pedagogy and open education resources, and is incredibly well-deserving of an Award for Excellence in Open Education. Arley will be presenting on the results of the research at the [2019 KPU Symposium](#)."

D3. BE ACCOUNTABLE TO OUR PARTNERS, GOVERNMENTS AND COMMUNITIES

In an attempt to facilitate strong connections between industry representatives and our Post Baccalaureate and Graduate students, The School of Business Success Coaches Team have started a series named "Industry Insider". The first event of the series was held on Friday, May 31st at KPU Civic Plaza campus. In attendance were three employers, KPU staff, and over 40 students (Operation and Supply Chain Management (OSCM), Technical Management and Services (TMAS), and Graduate Diplomas: Global Business Management and Green Business Management and Sustainability).

The event has been organized with networking in mind. Employers have presented their personal and industry

experiences to our students and our students have participated in a short Q & A, followed by informal discussions over coffee and snacks. Our desired outcome from the Industry Insider series is to facilitate easy access to specific information that our students cannot find on a website and provide them with an opportunity to get answers directly from industry. Our next event in the series is planned for November.

Youth Innovation Academy: An incubator for the next generation of ideas

Local youth come together to explore innovation. They participated in a Dynamic Challenge activity, interacted with mentors and were inspired by local entrepreneurs and innovation leaders. The event is produced through a collaboration between PowerPlay Young Entrepreneurs and the Rideau Hall Foundation. It is a signature event for the Canadian Innovation Week 2019 celebrations and was hosted by the Surrey School District. The event took place at the Surrey District Resource & Education Center on May 31. Guest speakers such Matias Marquez, Buyatab Online Inc., Chris Falk, Buyatab Online Inc., Valerie Song, AVA Technologies gave inspiring speeches about their backgrounds and how they reached their successes and humorously discussed how they learned from their mistakes and failures. More than 120 employees from across the university assisted with a range of Convocation activities such as greeting and way-finding, ticket taking, guest ushering, platform and student gowning as well as marshalling of the processional and recessional.

Thank you to those representatives from our Board of Governors who participated in the Spring Convocation. With your support and attendance along with so many others from across campus and our surrounding communities, KPU created a special event that was indeed memorable for our students and their families.

Online Graduation System Upgrades

Convocating students can now reserve their regalia online through a 24/7 service provided by our regalia partner, Gaspard. During Convocation, Gaspard has representatives onsite to ensure each graduate receives a personalized regalia package, specific to their sizing and credential requirements.

As well, grads-to-be now have the convenience of ordering guest tickets online through a service offered by our newest partners at CampusRigh (by RightLabs). This is a cloud-based system for ticket registration and collection that provides both print-at-home ticket capability as well as mobile-friendly e-ticketing options.

Co-operative Education

14 co-op students have already been placed for a Fall work term in such notable organizations as Canada Revenue Agency, WorkSafe BC, Maximizer Software, and First West Credit Union. Over 65 job postings for Fall are now available to co-op students, with more on the way.

PROGRAMS, POLICIES, AND INITIATIVES:

Newly formed Systems and Projects Team

The newly formed Systems & Projects Team within the Office of the Registrar is focused on projects related to the implementation of new student systems, as well as the enhancement of existing systems. This will not only include Banner, but also our growing number of ancillary systems, such as My Action Map (MAP), FAST Student Reporting, and Ad Astra.

Career Development Centre

The newly formed Career Development Centre (CDC) is currently completing a Co-operative Education Accreditation

Application for approval through Co-operative Education and Work-Integrated Learning Canada (CEWIL), to be submitted to the Accreditation Council later this summer. CEWIL has developed accreditation standards to establish co-operative education as an educational strategy, providing leadership in ensuring quality co-op programming. Maintaining accreditation criteria helps build quality into existing co-op programs, whilst providing a benchmark for the development of new programs.

Education and Awareness

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office continues to present across the University on the Sexual Violence and Misconduct Policy (SR14), the Student Conduct Policy (ST7), and on resources for students of concern in general. Already this semester the team has presented to the Traditional Chinese Medicine-Acupuncture and Graduate Nurse International departments.

Moving Forward Together - A Sexual Violence and Misconduct Forum

Jennifer Jordan, Director, Student Rights and Responsibilities, is a member of the Post-Secondary Sexual Violence and Misconduct Forum Working Group, formed to provide input and guidance to the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills and Training through the development of a two-day forum. KPU Richmond was the host site for the SVM Forum that took place in June.

The forum, co-emceed by Jennifer, was coined *Moving Forward Together: Building Capacity to Prevent and Respond to Sexual Violence on Campus*. The purpose of the forum was to support the work being done at post-secondary institutions in BC to prevent sexual violence and create safer campuses.

Indigenous Peoples' Month

Elder in Residence, Lekeyten, opened KPU's first Indigenous Peoples' Month with a prayer and talk on the importance of the resurgence of Indigenous education, brilliance and resilience. The opening ceremony was attended by KPU students and employees, observed from around the courtyard at KPU Surrey. President Alan Davis and AVP Academic Steve Cardwell both spoke on the importance of recognizing Indigenous cultures, education, and issues such as the MMIWG report, released earlier this month.

KAIROS Blanket Training – Indigenous Student Services Reaches out to KPU

Indigenous Student Services (ISS) facilitated a KAIROS Blanket training with the KPU English department. The group of 16 instructors participated in the educational activity, followed by a lively and respectful discussion. ISS truly appreciated the earnest and thoughtful questions posed and the dynamic discussion. ISS will continue to offer this educational training to KPU's employees and students.

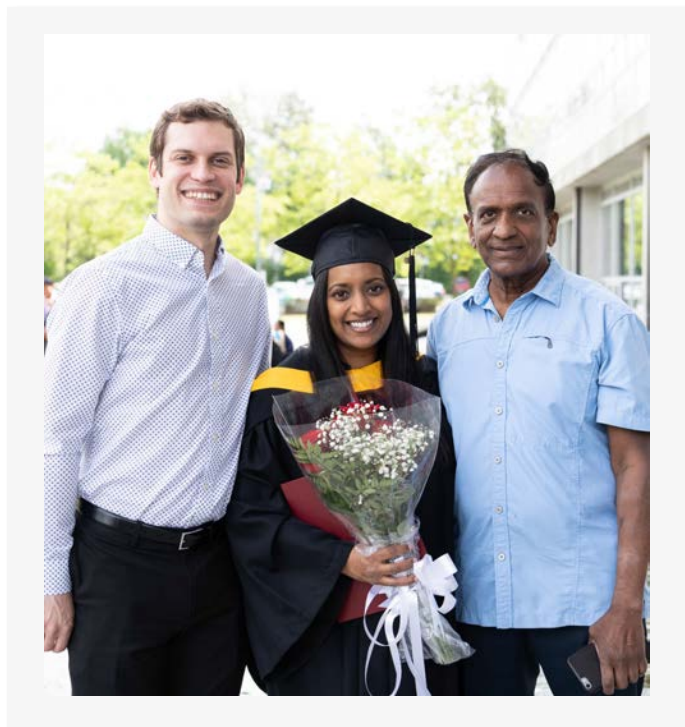
Summer Orientation

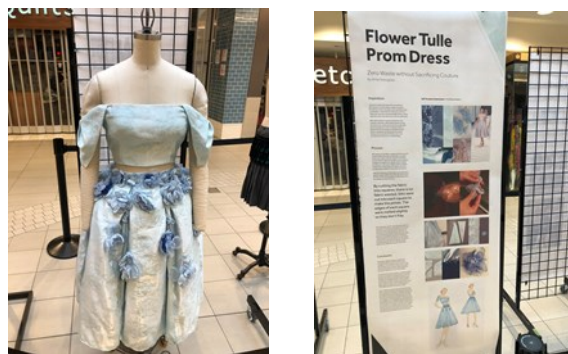
COMMUNITY / INDUSTRY ENGAGEMENT:

- Pro-D Day Campus Visit Monday, April 29, 2019 - As a follow-up, Dean Long visited the Wilson School of Design for a tour with David Young as part of his Professional Development Day. We are hoping that with this type of personalized outreach, teachers will feel more comfortable recommending our programs to their students.
- Product Design - The 2019 Graduating Class presented their final capstone projects on April 18th, to an engaged audience. Held on the main level of The Wilson School of Design, the students built and developed the exhibition within their last semester, alongside their exemplary work in Product Innovation.



- Interior Design staff member, Debbie Johnstone Bjerke, along with her energetic 11-year-old son, participated in the recent Science Rendezvous and Langley Open House on May 11th. Two student volunteers, Hannah Tabert and Darian Shepard, from the Wilson School of Design also attended and were kept busy with a button making activity for the steady stream of families in attendance. EMPLOYEE ENGAGEMENT

- KPU Day - Personal Branding Workshops, Friday, May 3, 2019 - Graphic Design for Marketing faculty presented a series of personal branding workshops for KPU Day. Visiting staff and faculty learned about logos, drew their own and then had their work transformed into laser cut key chains. John Belisle led the workshops, with support from faculty Mike Cober, Carmen Cheung (2nd year Graphic Design for Marketing student), and program coordinator Carley Hodgkinson. Natasha Campbell, Foundations in Design program coordinator, managed all projects using the laser cutter.
- The New School – Strategic Design and Management Master’s Program - Feb 25 – 28, 2019 - Natasha Campbell, Foundations in Design Instructor and Coordinator, served as a panelist for The New School’s Strategic Design and Management Master’s Program in New York. The MS program promotes what may seem as lofty ideals about the future of business, but how does this reconcile with the current circumstances of graduates? Natasha, along with other featured panelists, discussed approaches to mitigate practical issues such as cash flow, raising capital, dealing with the salary level/cost of living equation, making interim compromises, participation in gig economies, etc. The issue of realistic goal-setting was discussed as well as how to reframe and reimagine what “realistic” work means in today’s context.
- HASTAC Conference, Thursday, May 16 - Saturday, May 18, 2019- Foundations in Design instructors, Natasha Campbell and Jessica Bayntun, represented the Wilson School of Design at this year’s HASTAC (Humanities, Arts, Science and Technology Alliance and Collaboratory) conference hosted by the University of British Columbia. The conference, centered on the theme of decolonizing technologies and reprogramming education, highlighted the work of Indigenous scholars - particularly, Indigenous women and women of colour – while discussing the decolonization of technology in the past, present and future.
- Faculty of Interior Design, Paola Gavilanez and Erick Villagomez, were recently accepted to present at the [2020 Design Principles and Practices](#) at the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, NY in March 2020. This is the fourteenth international conference and the focus is on advocacy in design and specifically engagement, commitment, and action. The 5 themes for this year include Design Education, Design in Society, Designed Objects, Visual Design, Design Management and Professional Practice, and Architectural, Spatial, and Environmental Design. Paola and Erick will present on compact cities and exploring the need for transdisciplinarity when designing for small environments.
- Interior Design faculty member Erick Villagomez just completed the recording of a podcast with 360 Degree

City (<https://360degree.city/>). The podcast, which is scheduled to air on June 24th, focuses on settlements and the laws around scale and culture.

- Faculty and staff attended the Wilson School of Design curricular workshop on the K-12 curricular reform. Richmond School District representatives also attended to discuss changes and adaptations to the K-12 curriculum which includes the implementation of e-Portfolios (several schools in the district are also part of the Ministry test on this initiative).
- Faculty member Erick Villagomez’s book, “The Laws of Settlements: 54 Laws Underlying Settlements across Scale and Culture”, has now been released as an e-book on Smashwords and is also available on several other platforms including Apple Books. Erick teaches in both the interior design department at KPU and in architecture at UBC.
- Faculty team members have recently attended workshops tailored specifically on rubrics assessments by design and inclusive design, led by KPU Educational Consultants, Kristie Dukewich and Seanna Takacs.

INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT:

- Interior Design: The Design Field School for May 2019 concluded in Barcelona, Spain. Students and faculty began their travels in Granada, Spain where they visited several cathedrals, the Cartuja Monastery and Albaicin quarter, the Alhambra, several museums, and the Carlos V Renaissance palace. From Granada, they travelled to Barcelona where they toured six premiere museums, the roman underground tucked beneath a cathedral, Montejuiç, the gothic quarter and the many “Casa” developments, as well as the impressive Sagrada Familia and Santa Maria Del Mar (to name but a few). Students sketched, made observational notes, and gathered various data through a given “lens” of design and senses. This field school is also punctuated by various debriefings and potlucks in order to create community and to disseminate findings.

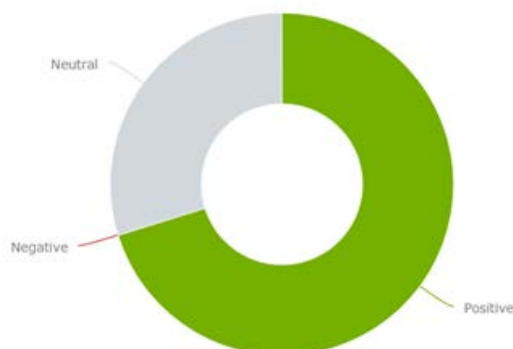

Group Tours and Presentations

REACH PRESENTATIONS

REACH is Surrey Schools after-school employment readiness program that supports students in developing knowledge and skills that are transferable in the process of seeking and attaining employment after secondary schooling, including both Grade 11 and 12 students. Anil Manhas, KPU Student Recruitment Coordinator, was able to go out to schools offering the program and provide presentations for these students regarding KPU general information alongside the distinction between a polytechnic institution and other post-secondary options, specifically as it pertains to employability following undergraduate studies. Schools that received presentations in May included L.A. Matheson Secondary, Frank Hurt Secondary, Princess Margaret Secondary, Kwantlen Park Secondary and Queen Elizabeth Secondary.

CLE/CLC PRESENTATIONS

May was a month full of Career Life Explorations and Career Life Connections presentations for students in the Surrey School District. In total 11 presentations were provided to students at various schools, discussing the importance of post-secondary education, and the amount of flexibility offered to students as it pertains to programming options at KPU. Specific attention was paid to ensuring that students were engaged and aware of the reality of employment and higher education options available following completion of undergraduate education. Few students were aware that any undergraduate degree could feasibly lead to a career pathway as a lawyer, doctor, or police officer and the myth-busting surrounding this was appreciated by teachers and students alike.

INDIGENOUS OUTREACH

Raman Dhaliwal (Indigenous Recruitment Portfolio, Student Recruitment Coordinator, Future Students' Office) has been working with Ethan from KPU Indigenous Services on a plan to build relationships with Indigenous high school students and support workers within the KPU region. This past month they presented at a staff meeting at the Richmond School District and individually met with small student groups (4-20 students) in Delta and Surrey to promote KPU.

NEW IMMIGRANT PARENTS WORKSHOP

Student Recruitment Coordinator, Dominic Wan, introduced KPU's programs, services, admission requirements and application process to approximately 30 new immigrant parents at the Surrey School District ELL Welcome Centre.

LORD BYNG SECONDARY SCHOOL OPPORTUNITY FAIR

Student Recruitment Coordinator, Dominic Wan and Dr. Fergal Callaghan from the Faculty of Science and Horticulture attended a career and education fair hosted by Lord Byng Secondary School. They met over 500 students from grade 8 to 12 and promoted KPU programs.



SUCCESS CAMPUS TOUR

Student Recruitment Coordinator, Dominic Wan, introduced KPU Richmond Campus to two groups of new immigrants of about 40 participants. The tour encompassed a tour of the campus, promotion of KPU programs, interaction with faculty members and students and highlighting the uniqueness of a polytechnic education experience.



JOBS CANADA FAIR

Student Recruitment Coordinator, Dominic Wan and Gurleen Bajwa from Human Resources represented KPU at this event. They interacted with over 100 prospects and promoted the various opportunities and programs available at KPU.

We started our generic ad campaign earlier this year, with a 149% increase in total spend during this period compared to last year. The total number of people seeing our ads (impressions) saw a significant increase along with the total number of people who engaged with our ads (199%). Our average cost per click for this period decreased by 17%, allowing us to reach more people at a lower cost.

EXPERIENCE

The Student Experience:

- BSN-AE Community Partners Survey: This survey will provide feedback from organizations with which BSN-AE students are placed for practica, including the ease of arranging the practica and students' effectiveness within them. The survey was launched on May 7. The survey was closed on June 11.
- School of Business Marketing Department Team Charter Survey: The SoB Marketing Department recently created a Team Charter to clarify how the team will effectively unite to do its best work in support of the success of students. The survey was launched on May 22.

QUALITY

Student Success:

- Conducting prerequisite analyses for the following courses: ECON 2350 and BIOL 1210
- Conducting analyses on the impact of EDUC 1150 in the success of international students.
- Conducting an analysis of Pathway students to understand rate of student progress through the Pathway, and their success on the Pathway, and in their Undergraduate Studies.

Service Improvement:

- 2019 KPU Day Feedback Survey: A survey to gather feedback from KPU Day attendees was launched on May 3. The survey includes questions regarding satisfaction with different aspects of the event and suggestions for improvements. The survey was closed on May 19 and a report was provided to the President's office.
- Teaching, Learning, Scholarship, and Research Survey: This survey was sent to all KPU employees who teach or conduct research or scholarship as part of their roles. It will inform plans to enhance supports and resources available for educators, researchers, and scholars. The survey was launched on May 6. The survey closed on June 9 and a report was provided to Stephanie Chu and Deepak Gupta on June 11.
- 2019 KPU Spring Leadership Conference Feedback Survey: This survey of conference attendees will capture their feedback on the event and suggestions for improvement. The survey launched on May 9. The survey was closed on May 19 and a report was provided to HR on May 21.
- KPU HR Community of Partners Survey: A survey was sent to the KPU employees who attended HR's May Community of Partners meeting to gather their feedback on the content and delivery methods. The survey was launched on June 10.

Program Review:

- Support is currently being provided to 32 programs (or cluster of related programs) that are at various stages in the program review process.

Course Feedback:

- We preparing to survey 957 sections in Summer 2019 between mid-May and mid-August.

Accountability to Our Partners:

- Supporting research being conducted on dual credit students (students who take KPU courses while in high school). This research, sponsored by the BC Council on Admissions and Transfer, aims to improve understanding of the experiences and performance of students completing at least one Dual Credit (DC) course in an academic area and transitioning to post-secondary studies. Our work included sending out a survey invitation to past and present dual credit students. Preparing anonymized student data for this study for delivery by the end of June.

Accountability to Government:

- Submitted the annual survey on the Tuition and Living Accommodation Costs (TLAC) to Statistics Canada.
- Together with IT and the Office of the Registrar submitted to the Ministry's Central Data Warehouse.
- Submitted the Annual FTE Report for Fiscal Year 2018-19.
- Prepared the Draft 2018/19 Accountability Plan and Report for submission to Board Governance meeting in June. This will be finalized and submitted to the Ministry in July.

INSTITUTIONAL PLANNING

Program Planning:

- Currently conducting the feasibility assessment for a proposed Bachelor of Health Science degree in Traditional Chinese Medicine.

Integrated Planning:

- Developing a new model to estimating enrolment for future terms, to estimate capacity for new International students. Used this model to estimate capacity for Summer 2020 so enrolment targets for New International students could be established.

Enrolment Management:

- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Summer 2019 and Trades Foundation 2018/19 are complete. Applicant funnels for Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 are running currently. The dashboards are updated every Wednesday. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants, and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of International applicants.
- High School Applicant Dashboard: This provides information on high school applicants including high school and contact information of applicants currently in BC High Schools. The dashboard is updated every Friday during the Fall 2019 application cycle and is used by the Future Student's Office in their efforts to convert applicants to enrolled students.
- The following dashboards have been updated: Summer 2019 Stable Date Enrolment Dashboard, Summer 2019 Classroom Utilization Dashboard, Fall 2019 Grade Distribution Dashboard, Fall 2019 Enrolment Dashboard, Fall 2019 Seat Analysis Dashboard.

KPU Nurses: Helping patients around the world

Despite a typhoon, school closures and much more, Kwantlen Polytechnic University's student nurses helped test over 7000 children in the Philippines for anemia and hearing over a period of two weeks.

Shauna Remin was one of seven Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) students from KPU who travelled with a group of UBC dental graduates and affiliates to the remote island of Siquijor, Philippines. She had never taken an international trip before so this was a first for her.

"If you asked me in the beginning I would say no, that's not for me," she recounts.

For the past eight years, nursing students have travelled overseas to help with various projects. The project started when BSN faculty member, Dr. Dianne Symonds, connected the KPU students with students from the UBC Dental Outreach Project and a Rotary Club in the Philippines. Every year, the club identifies the needs of the community that are then fulfilled to a certain degree by the students and instructors from KPU.

In 2018, the Rotary Club in Siquijor identified a need for testing hearing and anemia. The club arranged for the nurses to test students and adults at a number of schools during their two-week visit. The student nurses also helped at the UBC dental clinic.

But before heading to the Philippines, the student nurses spent several months researching the community's demographics, health beliefs and more.

"Although the students have been provided by faculty with an overview of how a day working in the dental unit, as well as a day working in the schools conducting hearing and anemia assessments, may play out, every day presents with

unpredictable challenges that the students must problem-solve as a team," says Dr. Lida Blizzard, instructor in the BSN program at KPU. "This opportunity has enabled BSN students to expand their world view of healthcare, and see the many opportunities that avail them in having both a regional and a global impact as Canadian citizens and student nurses."

Canadian Health standards prevent the student nurses from performing blood tests on patients so they have to look for physical signs of anemia.

"We assessed the children's eyes and nails and skin for signs of anemia so at that point if you're showing signs you're very anemic," says Remin.

Before heading to the Philippines, the nurses were trained by an audiologist in Canada on how to use a portable tuning fork for the hearing tests.

"You don't want to bring equipment into a place that they [the locals] can't use afterward," says Remin.

For Remin, this was the longest trip the mom of two had ever embarked upon. It also changed her perspective on travelling overseas to help others.

"I would 100 percent recommend people to explore the option of doing international work in any form. It's something that takes you out of your current way of thinking and puts you into a different perspective," says Remin.

Remin says the support she received from KPU helped her not only through nursing school but also earlier in her career when she received her diploma to become a medical secretary in 2002.

"KPU's been my home and I'm incredibly proud of the things I've been able to do because of how KPU has supported me," she adds.
