



### FIVE BIG IDEAS FOR DIPLOMA IN GENERAL STUDIES

If you are pursuing the **Diploma in General Studies** program, please note that this program offers a wide flexibility in the way that you, the student, design your own educational path. Given this, International Advising wants to assist you in some critical reflections on your course planning with 5 Big Ideas. Please take a moment to ponder these guiding questions for yourself:

- 1. What do I want to get out of my education experience at KPU? What do I need to do to get there?
- 2. What skills or knowledge do I want to develop at KPU in order to achieve my career goals?

## Big Idea #1: Two credentials in 60 credits?

Did you know that with careful course selection, it may be possible to complete a certificate alongside the Diploma in General Studies? This is possible due to Policy AC 14, 7 d, multiple credentials—Second Credentials.

What are some benefits of getting 2 credentials? While the Diploma in General Studies can be used for PGWP application, it does not provide a specialty. A specific certificate may assist you in learning industry-specific skills and demonstrate proficiency to a future employer.

These are 7 certificates that may fit well with the Diploma in General Studies:

Certificate in Non-Governmental Organizations and Nonprofit Studies – This program prepares students for
voluntary and entry-level work at NGOs, drawing on courses from Arts, Business, and possibly Science
which ensures familiarity with financial management and accountability, in addition to a background in the
innovation and social values often associated with the sector. Check out this video and career

If you started in a different diploma and have now changed to General Studies, you may have already started to meet some or all of the requirements of the certificate in the same field:

- 2. Diploma in Computer Information Systems → Certificate in Computer Information Systems
- 3. Diploma in Accounting → Certificate in Accounting
- Diploma in Business Management, Business Administration, or Marketing Management → <u>Certificate in</u> General Business Studies
- 5. Diploma in Criminology → Certificate in Criminology check out career & volunteer opportunities
- 6. Diploma in Fine Arts → Certificate in Fine Arts if you wish to build an art portfolio
- 7. Associate of Arts Degree  $\rightarrow$  Certificate in Arts If you plan to do 2 ENGL courses

Even if you started directly into General Studies, it may be possible to complete a certificate with your Diploma. Explore the certificates above, and discuss your ideas with an Advisor. ### Big Idea #2: Choosing Courses now for Future Programs


Do you have a C or better in your courses? You may want to consider an <u>Associate of Arts Degree in General Studies</u> over the Diploma in General Studies. The <u>Associate of Arts</u> is a recognized degree in the province of British Columbia, and may be helpful if you plan to continue to a Bachelor of Arts degree in the future. As well, if you are particularly interested in a field of Arts, you may wish to take the required courses in order to do an AA in another subject instead of General Studies. For example, AA in Criminology, Asian Studies, etc.

You may wish to discuss your ideas about education after your Diploma in General Studies with an International Advisor.

### Big Idea #3: Select Courses based on a Theme or Topic

Did you know you can course plan according to the themes you want to explore in your KPU education. Use the "<u>Search Courses</u>" option on the left hand column of the <u>University Calendar</u> to search courses across departments that are related to a theme, topic, or idea.

For example, if you were interested in exploring Indigenous themes in your studies, you can type in "Indigenous" and the tool will pull up all courses that are related to this. As you can see below, courses on Indigenous themes span widely across departments like ANTH, CRIM, ENGL, and INDG, and more.



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# Big Idea #4: How far along are you in developing Essential Academic and Workforce Skills?

In your program, you are given opportunities to learn and demonstrate essential skills at an appropriate level. It is up to you, the learner, to make the most out of these activities. <u>Policy AC9</u> covers the **Essential Skills** in KPU curriculum:

- a. **Creative Thinking and Problem Solving Skills**: Recognizes problems and generates new ideas; devises and implements plan of action.
- b. **Oral Skills**: Receives, attends to, interprets, and responds to verbal/non-verbal messages and other cues. Organizes ideas and communicates orally.
- c. Interpersonal Skills: Works with others effectively.
- d. Teamwork and Leadership Skills: Participates as member of a team. Contributes to the group effort and success.
- e. **Personal Management & Entrepreneurial Skills**: Displays personal ethics, adaptability, sociability, and resource management skills.
- f. Writing Skills: Communicates written thoughts, ideas and information in appropriate documents.
- g. Reading and Information Skills: Locates, understands and interprets written information in a variety of formats.
- h. Visual Literacy: Organizes and processes symbols, pictures, graphs, objects and other information.
- i. **Mathematical Skills**: Performs basic computations. Approaches practical problems by choosing appropriately from a variety of mathematical techniques.
- j. Intercultural Skills: Works well with people from diverse backgrounds. Respects individual differences.
- k. Technological Skills: Works with a variety of technologies.
- I. Citizenship and Global Perspective: Integrates an awareness of how social, organizational, and global issues are interrelated with individual and local concerns.

How can your educational choices influence your career and work opportunities? For one, it can help you develop transferable skills. Have a look at the World Economic Forum's Top 10 Skills of 2025 (source):
