

Subject-Verb Agreement

Grammatical mistakes can often distract the reader from the quality of your paper and bring down your grade. Therefore, learning how to fix these mistakes can make your writing more clear. This worksheet will help you to understand subject-verb disagreement, which is one of the most common grammatical errors, and give you practice in fixing it.

What is subject-verb disagreement?

Subject-verb *disagreement* is when the subject of your sentence and its corresponding verb do not match in terms of singularity or plurality. This is a grammatical error that can confuse the reader, and so, you want to achieve subject-verb *agreement*.

A subject is the “doer” in the sentence. *Ask yourself: “who is taking the action in this sentence?”*

A verb is an action or state.

| Sample Sentence | Subject | Verb |
|--|-----------------------------|------------------|
| Julie has been studying English for the past four years | Julie | has been (state) |
| Germany, Ireland, and Italy are all European countries | Germany, Ireland, and Italy | are (state) |
| David studies English at Kwantlen Polytechnic University | David | studies |
| Alex and George, who study at KPU, work at a restaurant | Alex and George | work |

How to check if you have subject-verb disagreement:

1. Find the subject that connects with the verb you are checking.
2. If the subject is separated from its verb, then ignore the words in between.
3. Make sure the subject and its corresponding verb match in terms of singularity or plurality.

Here are some examples of subject-verb disagreement:

| Error | Why this is an error | Corrected |
|--|--|--|
| <i>China, India, and Japan</i> <u>is</u> an example of an Asian country. | Here, the subject is the three countries: China, India, and Japan - not just Japan. Therefore, this subject is plural. | <i>China, India, and Japan</i> <u>are</u> examples of Asian countries. |
| <i>Everyone</i> in my class <u>have</u> their driving license. | <i>Everyone</i> is one unit, which makes this a singular subject. | <i>Everyone</i> in my class <u>has</u> their driving license. |
| <i>Julie</i> <u>say</u> that she wants to move to England. | <i>Julie</i> is one person, which means that this a singular subject. | <i>Julie</i> <u>says</u> that she wants to move to England. |
| The <i>box of tissues</i> <u>are</u> on the table. | The subject here is not tissues, but rather “box,” which is singular. | The <i>box of tissues</i> <u>is</u> on the table. |
| <i>Statistics</i> <u>are</u> a very popular course. | Although the subject “statistics” looks like a plural noun, it is considered singular because it is a category name. Therefore it is one unit. | <i>Statistics</i> <u>is</u> a very popular course. |
