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Coast Capital Savings donates \$500,000 to support Surrey students at KPU

Students from Surrey who attend Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) will get a financial boost thanks to a \$500,000 donation from Coast Capital Savings.

The Coast Capital Savings/PCI Development Endowment will generate \$25,000 annually to provide five \$5,000 bursaries each year to support residents from Newton, Whalley, Surrey Central or Guildford who are enrolled at KPU.

"Coast Capital Savings has a rich history as a corporate citizen here in Surrey. With our new building, we have made the conscious decision to put down even deeper roots in the city," explains Tracey Arnish, chief member experience officer at Coast Capital Savings.

"Working with PCI, we have a gorgeous new headquarter location in one of Surrey's fastest growing neighbourhoods. It was important to us that we do something tangible to celebrate our new home, our community and the youth who live and go to school here. This endowment signifies our commitment to building strong, educated and thriving communities for our young people. We are excited to see

the great things that this investment will continue to do for the students who receive these bursaries."

This is the second time Coast Capital Savings has donated a major gift to support students at KPU. In 2009, a \$1 million gift marked a milestone for both organizations – at the time it was the largest single donation received by KPU and the biggest single community investment for Coast Capital.

"Coast Capital Savings was among the first truly transformational donors to the university in its early years," says Steve Lewarne, executive director of advancement and CEO of the KPU Foundation. "With more than \$1.7 million gifted to KPU over the years, Coast Capital Savings has almost \$1.3 million in endowed funds with the KPU Foundation."

"These endowments will continue to support KPU students in perpetuity."

The new donation arose from negotiations between Coast Capital Savings and developer PCI when planning the credit union's new King George Boulevard headquarters. The bursary eligibility criteria reflect the donor's wish to help students from

The Deepak Binning Foundation has established a \$200,000 endowment fund for students at Kwantlen Polytechnic University. The funds will provide students with bursaries as well as a scholarship for the Punjabi Language and Culture program.

"Not only do the Binnings support local and provincial causes that matter, but they are also agents for social change," says Christine Brodie, director of the KPU Foundation.

At a ceremony held at KPU in Surrey, Paul and Jas Binning along with Sadhu Binning presented the donation, which will support general student bursaries of \$7,500 annually and a \$2,500 scholarship in the Punjabi Language and Culture program.

"We are pleased to be able to support so many deserving students pursue post-secondary education through our partnership with KPU," says Paul Binning.

"The endowment at KPU will be available in perpetuity and support student success through bursaries and scholarship for

years to come," says Dr. Salvador Ferreras, provost and vice president, academic. "This is the truest demonstration of philanthropy and for that we are eternally grateful to the Binnings."

The <u>Deepak Binning Foundation</u> was founded in 2000 by the Binning family after the loss of their son Deepak Binning to cancer. The foundation supports students at various educational institutions and BC Children's Hospital.

The accounting faculty at Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) and the Surrey, Langley, North Delta chapter of the Chartered Professional Accountants of British Columbia (CPABC) have announced the David Sale Endowed Memorial Award.

The \$20,000 endowment award was established in memory of David Sale, a dedicated accounting instructor at KPU, where he taught for 28 years. He was the Chair of the Accounting Department for six years. He also served on the CGA (Certified General Accountants) Board of Governors. Sale passed away in 2017.

"David Sale's legacy lives on through our outstanding Accounting program," says Stephanie Howes, dean in the school of business at KPU. "He was most instrumental in laying the foundation of quality and excellence in the program we deliver today."

KPU accounting instructor Laura Dallas spearheaded the creation of the award as Sale was her best friend and she was the executor of his estate.

"This scholarship means so much to me as I know his legacy will now live on for a long time at KPU," she says. "Because the scholarship is here I feel he will be remembered and respected for a long time to come."

At a ceremony on the Surrey campus, a plaque written by Dallas and dedicated to Sale was unveiled along with the new award. Sale's daughter, Rhea Sale, who crossed the stage at KPU a few weeks after her father passed away, was officially presented with her diploma in accounting as well.

"The family would like to thank all those at CPABC and KPU for their efforts in making this endowment fund come to life. David valued education and learning and it is an honour to have this fund established in his name," says the Sale family in a statement.

The KPU accounting faculty raised \$5,000 for the award which the university matched with \$5,000.

"The chapter has pledged \$10,000 towards the David Sale Endowment Fund which will support a perpetual scholarship for a deserving accounting student attending KPU who has the intent to pursue the Chartered Professional Accountant program," says Carl Markwart, vice-chair of the CPABC Surrey, Langley, North Delta chapter.

The total combined contribution of \$20,000 will result in a \$1,000 annual award for an accounting student in their third or fourth year at KPU.



The Honorable Navdeep Bains, Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development was at the Surrey Board of Trade lunch on March 6th, and KPU was one of the presenting sponsors. Later that day he held a similar forum for the community at KPU Richmond.

March 11th to 13th was the annual BC Tech Summit in Vancouver, and KPU was well represented with several displays, and through lots of engagement with industry.

On March 14th I spoke at the Maple Ridge Community Leaders Forum on Innovation on what KPU's role through our programs and applied research.

I joined the BCNET Governance and Nominating Committee meeting on March 18th and on the 20th I attended the board meeting of the Post-Secondary Employers Association (PSEA).



Organizational Development

A "Hiring Best Practices" workshop was held in March and more are scheduled for later this year. This is meant to provide hiring strategies known to advance the hiring process and provide information to help hiring managers identify great hires while complying with legal requirements.

"Continuous Performance Management – Giving Effective Feedback" workshops were held in March. The purpose of the





workshop was to move beyond how to facilitate a performance review and examine the best practices in continuous performance management – the role of on-going feedback that supports day-to-day improvement. These practices serve to align the organizational goals with the individual efforts of an employee.

"Having the Courage –Difficult Conversations" workshops will be held in April and May of this year. The purpose of this is to provide employees with the skills and confidence at managing difficult conversations when they arise.

Compensation

Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)

Office of the Vice President, Finance & Administration

FINANCIAL SERVICES

GENERAL:

Financial Services would like to extend our appreciation to the two senior members of the Payroll Services team, as well as our colleagues in Human Resources, for coming on campus during the February snow closure to ensure that employees were still paid on time. We would also like to thank our co-workers in Facilities Services for opening the Langley campus, and to IT for being on call during the closure.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS AND PAYROLL:

Staffing

Financial Operations is currently in the process of hiring two Accounts Payable Clerks. One will be a regular, full-time Accounts Payable Clerk II, as the previous incumbent has accepted a new opportunity in Financial Reporting. The second is for a temporary, full-time Accounts Payable Clerk, as the current incumbent is on extended leave. We expect to have both positions filled by the end of March 2019.

Payroll Services is currently hiring for a Manager, Payroll Services, it is anticipated that this position will be filled by early April 2019. This position is currently occupied by a Payroll Team Lead on an interim basis.

Initiatives

The Financial Operations team has been moving forward with various initiatives, including: drafting the revised Investment Policy and Procedures; drafting the revised Signing Authority Policy and related schedules; revising Bylaw 4 to reflect September 2019 tuition rates; developing a draft Cheque Signing Policy; preparing a report on the KPU's collection efforts as they relate to unpaid tuition, as well as the related procedures and industry norms; and, working with Financial Budgeting and Reporting on fiscal year-end activities.

Efforts on Purchase Card (PCard) process improvement, and the mitigation of PCard associated risks, continue to move ahead. A number of university-wide joint training sessions led by Procurement Services and Financial Operations have been scheduled throughout March to educate both Division Business Managers and Directors on current PCard processes, with the aim of increasing operational efficiency and reducing risk exposure.

Payroll Services, together with IT, have spent a considerable amount of time testing the Banner system process for issuing T4s, and are pleased to report that T4s were issued on February 26, 2019.

Payroll Services continues to develop and improve upon existing Payroll user guides in order to provide clarity on processes such as the accurate completion of time sheets for employees on flex schedules, and deadlines for submitting and approved time sheets and leave reports.

BUDGET AND FINANCIAL REPORTING:

Staffing

Financial Reporting welcomes Hannah Mapanoo, as the new Accounting Analyst, effective February 1, 2019. Hannah started with KPU in February 2018, and previously worked in Accounts Payable, specifically in FAST PCard Services.

Initiatives

The Budget and Financial Reporting team has commenced work on the 2018/19 year-end audit planning to ease the work load pressures associated with this process that typically occurs in April.

Financial Reporting is currently working on the potential consolidation of the KPU Foundation and all associated accounting analyses; it is expected this will be complete by March 31, 2019 and a path forward will be determined.

The Budget team continues to work on the development and finalization of the fiscal 2019/20 University Budget. It is anticipated the budget will be released into FAST Finance by mid-April 2019, following Board approval at the end of March 2019.

PROCUREMENT SERVICES:

Staffing

Procurement Services welcomes Jason Miller, as the new Associate Procurement Officer. Jason, who started on February 25, 2019, bring nearly 20 years of combined experience, most recently as a Purchaser at DME Limited. Jason's hire brings Procurement Services staffing levels to full capacity for this first time since August 2018.

Initiatives

Procurement Services continues to work on strengthening intergovernmental and KPU internal relationships. As a member of BCNET Steering Committees, KPU continues to play a leading and active role in guiding the consortium towards achievement of its expected outcomes. The Procurement Services team are active members of Provincial Procurement Community of Practice and frequently share lessons learned on unique and/or complex procurements. Procurement Services has recently joined two key KPU committees (Food Services and Environmental Sustainability), and looks forward to working collaboratively to create organizational efficiencies.

Procurement Services has implemented a strategic sourcing plan to enhance proactive planning and maximize value through needs consolidation, and the appropriate leveraging of cross institutional supply arrangements such as BCNET, Provincial Corporate Supply Arrangements and CAUBO. Preliminary tracking of eight major procurements completed and executed since July 2018 shows approximately \$1.1M in savings against project budgets.

Office of the Vice President, Finance & Administration

The implementation of electronic proposal evaluation has resulted in significant efficiencies and improved reliability of results. In addition, Procurement Services has adopted 'Negotiated Request for Proposal' (NFRP) for all service procurement as an alternative to the high risk and mediocre selection associated with the traditional 'Request For Proposal' (RFP).

Procurement Services has developed and launched a Three-Year Procurement Sustainability Action Plan, and the first initiative of conducting a survey and compiling a Procurement Sustainability Awareness Report is now complete. Next steps include increased Sustainable Procurement training for our Procurement Officers, and the development of a sustainability checklist to be administered during procurement needs assessments.

CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY

SECURITY

- Security has finalized working agreement guidelines between onsite Surrey Civic Plaza security and KPU's contracted security to effectively address any security incidences.
- The Security team continues to meet the increasing demands for extra coverage at KPU internal and external events.
- Security is reaching out to foster relationships with internal partners to maintain the low crime rate that has become the norm for KPU campuses.

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY

- OH&S has completed the inspection of the Sustainable Agriculture Lab and the two Richmond farms. Working with the department to update safety training program for employees, first aid requirements when working on the farms and safe work procedures for working with mobile equipment and other potential hazards.
- Completed fire drills at all campuses. Drills involved participation and evacuation of all students/ employees.
 The fire drill at the new Civic Plaza Campus was a training exercise to review responsibilities of supervisory staff involving Facilities, Security and the Civic Hotel response team.
- OH&S is developing a safe digging protocol with Facilities to ensure employee safety and prevent damage to underground utilities.

EMERGENCY PLANNING

 The Civic Plaza Emergency Response Plan provided by Century group has been obtained and reviewed by KPU's Emergency Planning team. A meeting will be held in the near future to ensure that Century Group, City of Surrey,

- and KPU are on the same page with respect to emergency protocols at Civic Plaza.
- Emergency Protocol information signage has been printed and will be installed across all campuses in the coming months. Installation of the signs will be launched in coordination with a training video so that students, faculty and staff will have the training to understand the protocols at the same time.
- Door Wedges were made by KPU's carpentry department at no cost using recycled wood. These door wedges are needed for earthquake incidents and will assist rescue teams, if needed. The door wedges will be stored in KPU's emergency container located at the Tech campus.
- KPU Satellite telephones were tested.
- New Monitor/TV Signage request approved for Sodexo;
- Lock Down Thumb Locks have been installed at Civic Plaza.
 These are turn locks that secure the doors and will be installed in strategic locations, enabling people inside the room to safely "lock down" in the event of an active threat. Civic Plaza is the first campus to have these installed, with plans for installation across all campuses in coming months.
- Campus Safety and Security are also in the process of receiving quotes for contractors to install Lock Down black out blinds for added safety in the event of an active threat. Installation is planned for Surrey and Langley campuses first, with installation planned for the remaining campuses within the next fiscal year.

SECURITY SYSTEMS

Civic Plaza

- Alarms, CCVE and access control systems are functional; access to the 9th floor has been provided to the City of Surrey.
- The entire campus was re-keyed by Daniel Ha, KPU Locksmith, and the data is being entered into new key tracking software.

Tech

CSS Locksmith/security systems workshop completed.

Langley

 Invitation to Quote compiled and has been put out to tender for access control and CCVE. A preliminary walkthrough of campus with potential interested bidders has been completed.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Staffing

The management team continues to work on filling vacant positions through backfilling and new hires. We are also assessing and working on staffing plans to ensure that an adequate level of staff is in place within the department. This will allow for full support of all University services with the ability to build redundancy for vacation coverage.

- Business Analyst / Project lead (Vacant) position to be posted soon
- Project Lead (Service Desk) filled internally (Don McGonigal)

Enterprise software project planning for 2019/20

Currently the Business IT Services area is working with Business areas on technology planning for 2019/20. We are the tracking approximately 80 significantly large projects for the institution ranging from operational to business improvement.

BANNER 9 Phase II - Application Deployment

Banner 9 application rollouts are still underway. A new Web Time Entry is now being deployed to the University community. The new improved Web Registration Application was slated for a March rollout, but has been pushed back into April.

SharePoint Review

Re-Engineering of some of the key SharePoint areas are in progress. IT has engaged Marketing to assist in rebuilding the main SharePoint web site to align its content with the needs of the University community. Ongoing discussions are in progress to enhance the overall usage of this product as a collaborative tool.

CRM Project

The CRM project has restarted with the reformation of the project team and gathering of functional area requirements. CRM Recruit is a recruiting and admissions solution that helps institutions manage recruitment and enrollment functions, facilitate engagement with students, and track enrollment goals. The team is reviewing current software options available to begin the process of product assessment and selection.

HRIS Update - Applicant Tracking and Talent Management Systems

KPU currently uses an extremely manual HR Application process to manage current job competitions. The HR and Business IT teams are working to replace this outdated process with current cloud based Applicant Tracking systems which will fully automate the application system and make the process simple for applicants, HR personnel and KPU users. A similar search has begun to automate the Employee Talent Management tracking, which will enable KPU's commitment to hire, manage, develop, and retain talented employees.

Business Process Optimization

The BANNER ERP system has been in place for over 30 years. During this time, KPU has evolved into a leading Polytechnic Institution, but has not evolved their current business and data models to reflect the changes in academic structure and processes. This project is designed to review current business practices within the HR, Finance, Student Services, and Office of the Registrar. We will be looking at how to better leverage functionality which exists within the current BANNER system and how we can augment with other software.

CourseLeaf

The CourseLeaf Project Phase I is well underway with the release of the Calendar component targeted for June 2019. CourseLeaf contributes significantly to the goals of efficiency, accuracy, and sustainability in the KPU academic course catalog and curriculum management processes. This replaces manual spreadsheet technologies that have been used to track this critical information.

Business Continuity

Implementing a secondary pathway to the Internet is currently in progress, pathway construction began January 2019 and was completed mid-February 2019. Fibre install and termination to be completed by March 15, 2019; the team is working with our sector partner BCNET toward the completion date scheduled for March 30 2019.

Telephony Project

The current telephone system has been End of Life since 2008 and will no longer be supported by the vendor or any other support providers as parts are discontinued and difficult to source. IT is working with a telecommunication consultant and internal stakeholders to build a strategy and roadmap for selecting our next generation of communication technology.

Civic Plaza

Technology Infrastructure implementation is 100% complete and is in operational mode.

FACILITIES SERVICES

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT (includes planning, design, renovations and new construction)

Surrey Campus

- Curb Cuts A new curb cut has been installed at the front of Surrey Main, further to a recommendation by PDEC, for increased accessibility.
- Bollards Installed In collaboration with Campus Safety and Security, we installed bollards at the north entrance of Surrey Main during Reading Week (Feb 18-22).



FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

KPU Tech Campus:

 Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) Upgrade and Renewal for IT Server Room - Installation of a new UPS system to back up the server room computer equipment in the event of campus power outages. The new UPS is an upgrade in power output from the previous 28kW to the new 40kW with a redundant backup power module.

Langley Campus:

 Header House Heat Exchange - Heat exchanger installed to separate the chemically treated boiler water heating loop from the greenhouse heating loop. This will protect the greenhouse growing area from treated water leaks, and the boiler loop from chemically treated water losses that cause system imbalances and corrosion damage to the boilers.





Surrey Campus:

 Arbutus Building IT Server Room Cooling System Upgrade Completed - A new cooling unit was installed to provide additional cooling needed in the server room to compensate for added heat output from the new IT and communication equipment installed.





Birch Building Air Cooled Condensing Units (ACCUs) Replacements - The two Birch building ACCUs were removed and replaced with two New York ACCUs. Major maintenance for this project included new copper piping from the Birch building mechanical room air handling units to the ACCUs, and new cooling coils with custom access hatches installed for both air handling units.

BCNet Redundant Pathway
 for Fibre Optic Cable Connection - To improve the reliability of the fibre optic internet service at the Surrey KPU campus, an underground pathway was tunneled and a redundant fibre optic cable was installed between the Telus connection at 126th street and Surrey KPU.






FACILITIES OPERATIONS / GENERAL

Print Shop:

The Print Shop was able to produce just over 4,800 Course Packs for sale to the students in the KPU Bookstore for the Spring Semester. Orders are already arriving for the Summer Semester. KPU International is submitting their material to have it printed for recruiting of approximately 10,000 booklets. These are then bundled up and brought to our mailroom for shipment to the various countries that KPU International is visiting. The Print Shop is also working with Alumni Relations on the 2nd edition of their magazine; 18,300 copies are produced of which 14,000 are mailing out.

Fleet:

We are in the process of procuring a new Mercedes Sprinter 2500 van to add to KPU's fleet. Marketing is working on getting both vans wrapped with KPU logos by the end of March.

Food Services:

- Food Truck Wednesdays at the Surrey Campus have been received well by students, faculty, and staff. We have established a good mix of trucks that are committed to KPU and we are continuing to search for additional trucks.
- We are currently looking for approved spaces at the Richmond Campus and the Langley Campus to extend Food Truck Wednesdays to



other campuses. Once approved locations have been determined, we will move forward with introducing them to Richmond and Langley on a trial basis to ensure the business volume is there.

KPU's multiple campuses are busy with a vast range of activities, new projects, community connections and conferences. Since our January 30 Board of Governors meeting we have experienced a bit of a whirlwind Spring semester.

The Provost would like to acknowledge that the many changes related to the development of our 2019/2020 budget have created a general atmosphere of concern and in some cases, anxiety amongst our community members. As KPU recalibrates its activities to match available corresponding revenue streams we've had to adjust both our delivery of classes as well as our expectations of continuous growth. We have, in collaboration with our Deans, made carefully calculated choices and have selected class reductions in areas that were experiencing low enrolment or whose high cost put undue pressure on our ability to support general education offerings. Foremost in our minds was the effort to minimize impact and disruption while allowing for progressive change. An inevitable consequence of these choices is an understandable impression, however unintentional, that the targeted areas are somehow of less importance to KPU. In all cases of reductions, we have sought to give programs opportunities to renew their offerings, seek new delivery models, offer courses on non-consecutive terms or years, focus on existing cohorts and to explore new career streams for students in those affected areas. The ultimate goal of the reductions will be to allow KPU to manage growth, development and innovation through a much more efficient, transparent and sustainable approach. Throughout this period of budget preparation, we have sought to keep our AEST leaders fully informed while attenuating periodic instances of misinformation disseminated through social media.

Challenges notwithstanding, KPU keeps moving forward with academic, trades and developmental programs and courses that are seeing high levels of enrolment, high community engagement and a positive profile impact. The list of activities below will give a good glimpse of the dynamic environment we support, encourage and communicate.

KPU's Academic Plan foregrounds the importance of teaching excellence in our learning community. KPU's Teaching and Learning Commons, our go-to place for all things instructional, is an active and inspirational hub of professional development activities that include everything from Instructional Skills Foundations, to Moodle Interactive Design workshops, WordPress pilots, web-conference training, intercultural teaching workshops, the popular 3 to 5-minute Share-a-thons, and a growing list of valuable, innovative teaching tools and teaching community networking.

KPU Library and the Open Education Office held a launch event on March 7 to introduce OPUS, the Open Publishing Suite: http://www.kpu.ca/library/OPUS

Open Publishing Suite (OPUS) collectively refers to a suite of services and tools offered by the Library in partnership with the Open Education Office. OPUS assists faculty and students in monograph and journal publishing or making their work available online, and offers a variety of publishing options. They offer support to KPU instructors to create or adapt open educational resources. Open Educational Resources (OERs) are materials licensed to be freely accessed, shared and adapted.

OPUS offers a range of services that includes Library assistance during conversion projects from Word documents to Pressbooks eBooks, including accessibility and copyright compliance checks. Of note is the fact that the first completed book has been added to the BC Campus Open Textbooks Catalogue: Introduction to Psychology Study Guide, by KPU faculty member Sarah Murray.

Other exciting developments at the Library include the Open Journal System, an open source journal management and publishing software developed by the Public Knowledge Project at SFU, used by over 10k journals in the world.

KPU's leadership in the field of Open Education took another leap forward with the introduction of Canada's third Zed Cred credential. The new Zed Cred is in the <u>Associate of Arts in</u> General Studies, which is a 60-credit two-year program.

On February 27, the CPS department launched a new course to meet the strong demand for qualified workers to maintain the network that safely delivers water to homes and businesses. Developed in collaboration with the BC Health Protection Branch and Metro Vancouver authorities, the <u>Introduction to Public Works</u> course will provide students with entry-level hands-on experience in the installation, maintenance and repair of water, sewer and storm drain systems.

The Provost would like to express a very public thank you to former Dean of the School of Business, Wayne Tebb who has just concluded a six-month secondment as Special Advisor for KPU Civic Plaza. In addition to his successful tenure as Dean,

Wayne was also instrumental in setting up the original conception of what is now a range of post-baccalaureate and grad diploma business offerings at KPU Civic Plaza. He was also responsible for steering the operations of our new campus during its first three months of operation. Wayne, a true lifelong learner, is on his way to a well-deserved leave to pursue further studies before returning to a faculty position at the School of Business.

Another big thank you to our former AVP Business Development and Innovation, Olen Vanderleeden who concluded his work at KPU on March 5. Olen was a tireless champion for opportunity who is partially responsible for the success of the Cannabis programs at KPU. Olen also led the development of the Strategic Infrastructure Grant proposal that culminated in the building of the new Spruce building. He inherited the CPS portfolio and transformed that operation into a promising and specialty-program unit that has positively raised the profile of KPU in the industry and local business community.

Assessment & Testing Services / Continuing and Professional Studies

- Assessment and Testing Services (ATS) continue to expand on now three campuses, Surrey, Richmond and KPU Civic Plaza.
 The department reports that accessibility exams and the need for consistent service to our Accessibility students has grown
 exponentially over the past year. Our new ATS centre at Civic Plaza is now complete and ready to begin programming a
 variety of assessments both internal and external. Given the interest expressed by the local community, ATS at Civic Plaza is
 shaping into our flagship corporate exam centre.
- Continuing and Professional Studies is offering new programs in Professional Management / Leadership Development
 Series, Hotel Asset Management, Digital Marketing, Natural Mind Meditation, Cross Connection Certification, Gas Appliance
 Service Technician Certificate, and a Commercial Beekeeping Caspian Program for Iranian students. CPS's partnership
 agreement with the Squamish Nation Training & Trades Centre in North Vancouver is growing to deliver new trades-entry
 and non-trades programs including Education Assistant and Foundations in Design to Indigenous students across metro
 Vancouver area.
- Continuing and Professional Studies has just signed MacEwan University as our fifth institutional partner delivering our range of Cannabis courses. They are in the final stages of negotiation with prospective Australian partners and meeting with representatives of the State of Durango in Mexico to partner with colleges and universities Durango, Sinaloa, and Chihuahua.

ACADEMIC & CAREER PREPARATION (ACP)

- Faculty members in ACP continue to serve students in need of upgrading in math, English or science. The department will host several provincial articulation meetings this spring, as well as attending articulation meetings at other institutions.
- A lot of collaborative work is being done with Future Students Office and Assessment and Testing Services to smooth out the assessment and registration processes for prospective students by reviewing webpage language and developing innovative strategies for following up with those who have taken a KPU assessment.

ACCESS PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES (APPD

- APPD is continuing its emphasis on professional development at the department level by incorporating PD events in department meetings. Recently, staff and faculty participated in a Universal Design workshop facilitated by Gina Buchanan. The next department PD event will be focusing on two topics, Moodle and Inclusion (with guest Janice Barr from the Richmond Society for Community Living).
- Some more exciting news Fiona Whittington Walsh and Teresa Swan (along with a student, InclusionBC, and Langley Association) were accepted to be panelists at Congress Disability Studies in June at UBC. They will be discussing their KPU "Including All Citizens" project. Con-gress is the largest scholarly conference in Canada with over 8000 attendees. - Additionally, APPD faculty member Pat Foreman is copresenting on community partnerships at the Inclusion BC conference in May.
- Intake for 2019-2020 is going well. All information sessions (day and evening) have been very well-attended and applications are arriving. There are 22 seats available on each campus and, to date, Surrey has given out 25 applications, Richmond 16 and Langley 18.
- Faculty on all 3 campuses participate in Transition Committees within their communities. APPD is facilitating discussions with Surrey, Langley and Richmond School

Districts around the need to develop a partnership program for secondary students transitioning to KPU. (Similar programs currently exist between school districts and Vancouver Community College and Douglas College). Discussions have already started with the Richmond School District. Additionally, the Vancouver School Board is inviting all Lower Mainland ASE providers to the table to discuss mini courses where students would receive certificates. They contacted Richmond faculty member, Pat Foreman, to be the KPU representative.

Recently, a Langley APPD student was profiled in local media. Trevor O'Neill performed a work experience with the Langley Fire Department where he had a unique opportunity to learn about his dream job! ENGLISH LANGUAGE STUDIES (ELS)

- Sixteen ELS instructors have received layoff notice for July 1, 2019. HR and the KFA are currently in discussions about layoff mitigation strategies, in the hopes of eliminating or reducing the number of layoffs.
- The ELS Marketing Committee continues its successful work to promote the ELS program in the community to increase awareness of ESL opportunities at KPU with domestic students with the result that enrollment has increased. KPU has started a slow return for a limited number of international students but only at Pathway 3 and above. This may result in a slight increase in enrolment for international students in our Level 3 courses. Recruitment of domestic ELS students will continue to be vital in ensuring sustainable enrolment numbers for our program.
- The PCIEN (Professional Communication for Internationally Educated Nurses) course is wrapping up with a celebration on Monday, March 18 to recognize the hard work these dedicated professionals have done over the

- last few weeks to prepare for their future nursing careers in Canada.
- ELS faculty on the Richmond Campus have reported success with Lunch and Learn Workshops and Open Access Lab times. We received the furniture to be used in our future designated space in Richmond which is currently transforming our Language Lab into a student-friendly meeting place.
- ELS faculty Melissa Swanink, Kerry Muir and Bahareh Shahabi Ghahfarokhi presented at the BCTEAL conference on Feb 23 with the theme "Navigating Change: A Balancing Act". With such a timely and relevant theme, several faculty attended as a team to support their presentation on "Developing Critical Thinking Skills and Agency through Socratic Circles". The workshop was well received and the presenters have been invited to give their presentation at other institutions.



KPU event challenges toxic masculinities

A rise in violence related to toxic masculinity and the growing media objectification of gender are some of the reasons Dr. Asma Sayed and Dr. Anis Rahman decided to host a panel discussion at Kwantlen Polytechnic University.

"It is important for people to understand issues of the socio-cultural representations of gender as the existing patriarchal structures not only affect women but also lead to unrealistic expectations for men," says Sayed, an English instructor at KPU.

They aim to challenge the concept of 'being a man' that keeps shifting and being redefined according to what they say are patriarchal needs. In addition to this, the panelists will speak to the objectification of gender through popular cultures and social media which are fueling toxic masculinities.

"It is important to discuss violence perpetrated through popular culture and social media so that we are better equipped to deal with it," says Rahman, a journalism instructor at KPU.

When it comes to societal and cultural representations, both Sayed and Rahman say that it's important for people to understand how toxic masculinity leads to homophobia and affects the LGBTQIA+ community or those that don't fall within socially-expected 'norms'.

"Unfortunately, we do not see enough evidence that people, in general, are well aware of differences and diversity within gendered and sexual identity spectrum," Sayed explains.

They believe there is change as campaigns like the #metoo movement create education around the issues. They hope this event leaves attendees and participants with a better understanding of exclusivity and internalized bias.

The event is organized in support with <u>South Asian Network for Secularism and Democracy (SANSAD)</u>. The Faculty of Arts at KPU is also supporting this event to enhance community collaboration to combat toxic masculinities.

Partnerships

The main aim was to explore ways for their students to improve their English language skills to be successful globally after graduation.
- <u>Toulouse Business School</u>—In February, 2019, KPU International hosted a visit with Francois Bonvalet, the General Director of Toulouse Business School in France. Partnership opportunities explored include student and faculty exchange.
- Kookmin University—In February, 2019, KPU International welcomed a visit from an existing partner Kookmin University in Korea. Current partnerships and future improvements were discussed in addition to faculty exchange opportunities.
- <u>Nottingham Trent University</u>—The student exchange agreement with the Wilson School of Design has been concluded, and the student exchange program is due to commence in Summer 2019.

Faculty Mobility

ELAP Scholarship for Faculty—Global Affairs has launched the ELAP Faculty Mobility Program which provides Cana-dian faculty with short-term opportunities to teach or conduct research in Latin America and the Caribbean, at the college, undergraduate and graduate levels.

The maximum grant value per faculty is valued at \$7000 CAD. The duration of the short term mobility is for a three (3) week minimum, and eight (8) week maximum participation in the program. The host institution must be at the collegial level and above and recognized by local authorities and will have to provide an invitation letter stipulating that they support the project or courses proposed.

During a recent visit to South America, KPU International reached out to active partners to inform them of the faculty mobility program and to seek their interest in receiving KPU faculty. The following partner institutions have expressed a strong interest in hosting KPU Faculty:

Study Abroad

 One World Scholarship—Sixteen students were granted scholarships to participate in global learning opportunities.
 These included exchange programs, Fine Arts Field School, Love Volunteer program and the Cuba internship.

 ELAP Scholarship—KPU International received four students from Brazil, Uruguay, Cuba and Colombia through the Emerging Leaders of Americas Program sponsored by Global Affairs Canada. Students will be studying at KPU for one semester.



Student Life

- In March 2019, KPU International will host an immigration seminar to provide international students with the most up-to-date information on their study visa requirements.
- KPU International hosted a trip to Capilano Suspension Bridge for students from our partner Male Leaf School. Three other events were also offered since January 2019, including Flyover Canada, a welcome party for exchange and visiting students, and the black history month in collaboration with the Library.





Advising

- KPU International conducted three Academic Standing Workshops for international students who are in academic warning and probation. The workshops were done in collaboration with the Learning Centre to ensure that students have the tools required to succeed in their studies at KPU.
- KPU International completed a training session with the Justice Institute of British Columbia on navigating challenging conversations. The purpose of the training is to enable Advisors to handle difficult conversations that may arise as they advise international students.
- KPU International attended a training session offered by MOSAIC on facilitating effective responses to disclosures of sexual assault. The training was offered to staff and instructors at various learning institutions in the Lower Mainland. The topics covered barriers and challenges faced by international students and what can be done to support them.

INTERNATIONAL RECRUITMENT & ADMISSIONS

Applications

- KPU International is still operating on a conservative quota model based on capacity for Fall 2019 and Spring 2020. However, in response to the recent increase in the quota for Fall 2019, KPU International is now reaching out to students, school counselors and educational agents to increase the number of applications to meet the new target.
- In consultation with IAP, OREG, Finance and BPAS, KPU
 International has identified a series of obstacles in the
 admissions process for international students. These
 issues are being discussed in order to streamline the
 admissions process, decrease inefficiencies and address
 barriers to increasing diversity in KPU's student
 population.

Recruitment

Visiting Students—As part of the new strategic enrolment plan, KPU International has started promoting the visiting student program in emerging markets. These are feepaying students who usually register for second- and third-year classes, which help absorb excess capacity. The first group of students from Taiwan who have completed their studies provided very positive feedback to their home institution, who is now planning to send another group of students to KPU in Fall 2019. KPU International is also in discussion with an educational partner in Germany to set up a similar program with two German universities.

Regional Updates

 China: The Spring 2019 recruitment will begin in early March 2019. It will focus on offshore school visits and agent fair participation. School visits include face-to-face training sessions for both school counselors and graduating students. The presence at agent fairs is essential for effective brand and relationship management with top agents.

Korea and Japan: KPU International participated in the ICEF Japan & Korea Roadshow. The meetings with the agents from both countries were very productive and insightful. Most of the agents have not worked with KPU before. Establishing local agent networks will help expand our presence in these two agent-reliant markets. In mid-March 2019, KPU International will participate in the



largest Canadian education fair in Tokyo organized by the Embassy of Canada, followed by meetings with the newly-signed agents and provide comprehensive training to agency staff. Indonesia: In Feb 2019, KPU International attended an event organized by the Embassy of Canada in Jakarta and Canadian Education International (CEI). This event included recruitment fairs in two cities, Surabaya and Jakarta, which consisted of visit to local high schools and networking lunch with education agents, high schools' Principals Guidance Counsellors & Trades commissioner.

Malaysia: KPU International attended a four-day recruitment tour involving visits to top local and international schools, as well as participation in the annual Edu Canada Fair in Kuala Lumpur. This provided KPU a platform to present its programs and to meet with students, parents and school counselors to build awareness about KPU.



- Singapore: KPU International attended a two-day program of school visits in Singapore, as part of the ASEAN Edu Canada Tour. KPU International visited eight schools in Singapore and met with prospective students, their parents and schools guidance counselors.
- Vietnam: In March 2019, KPU International attended a Canadian Education International – CEI Vietnam (education agent) annual spring fair in three key cities: Da Nang, Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City. The event showcases

approximately 80-90 Canadian institutions at all levels: K-12, language schools and post-secondary institutions. This event provided us the opportunity to promote KPU and to meet with prospective students, their parents and a one-on-one meeting with the Canadian Trade Commissioner - Vietnam.



- Turkey: Due to an economic crisis in Turkey last year, the
 drastic increase in domestic unemployment rate has
 renewed the interest in studying abroad, especially among
 mature students. KPU International will focus on
 promoting Post-baccalaureate and Graduate Diploma
 programs in this market.
- Latin America: KPU International visited Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador and Colombia in January and February 2019. The purpose of the trips was to attend student recruitment events, provide updates to agents and training new staff in existing agencies, provide information sessions about KPU, attend high school visits and connect with Trade Commissioners for market updates and to discuss mobility opportunities for students and faculty.



 Starting March 1, 2019, Marina Jordão will serve as a Field Representative based in Sao Paulo, Brazil. She will be representing KPU by attending events, workshops, high school visits, agent training and other recruitment-related tasks. She will also provide ground support to Brazilian students, agents and partnering institutions for student and faculty mobility.



• Africa: KPU International attended events in Mauritius for the first time in February 2019, and received 26 applications through the fairs organized by partner agents. The country holds strategic value for recruitment of African students. Apart from having the highest GDP per capita in Africa, local students follow the British education system and often pursue their post-secondary studies abroad given limited options on the island.





Office of Research and Research Services

Katalyst Research Grants - call for application March 4, 2019

 Twelve applications received and will be adjudicated by the Internal Grants Committee on Monday, March 18th.
 The total ask is \$244,038.00 and approximately \$150K is available for this call. Results to be communicated to applicants by March 21st.

Nomination of two Canada Research Chairs (CRC)

 The KPU Nomination Committee met on February 22nd to adjudicate 11 CRC applications. Two proposals were selected for nomination – one submission to CIHR and one to SSHRC.

Intellectual Property (IP) Policy Development

Aligned with Strategy 3.2 in Academic Plan 2023 to 'Develop and implement KPU Intellectual Property and Commercialization policies,

- Initial discussion with KFA representatives regarding the latest draft of the IP policy occurred about two of weeks ago. Will be scheduling a meeting with the broader KFA executive to discuss and get their inputs further.
- NSERC has also reviewed the current draft, and they view it quite positively. It is seen as one that is flexible and not in conflict with their IP policy or guidelines.
- Our current draft has been shared with Academic Council, Dean's Council, the Advisory group, and the Polytechnic University Executive (PUE), among others. It has been endorsed by the PUE to go to the policy blog for the six week posting, starting today.





 Lincoln Saugstad will be helping with scenario development work and FAWs so that the application of the IP policy framework, together with other policies, legislation, and agreements becomes clearer.

Recent External Funding

 Deborah Henderson, Institute for Sustainable Horticulture was awarded \$25,000 NSERC Engage grant titled 'Biological demand Extended Efficiency Fertilizer'. Mandeep Pannu was awarded \$5,040 NSERC Connects Grant titled "5th Annual Symposium on Cyber Security and Digital Forensics". Engage grant applications recently submitted to NSERC by Deborah Henderson and Paul Adams.

Recent Internal Funding

 The 0.6% Faculty PD Fund – February 1, 2019 call received 36 applications for a total ask of \$297,926. The committee recommended 31 awards totaling \$140,087.00. The next call for applications is June 1, 2019.

Research Ethics Board

 The REB continues to review minimal risk applications and provide support to researchers and students on the KPU review process. An ad-hoc external reviewer was contacted to weigh in on a more than minimal risk application with clinical implications

ACHIEVE is Canada's premier undergraduate conference hosted by one of the most distinguished and largest business schools, the Ted Rogers School Management. Since its inception, ACHIEVE has been designed to further the personal and professional development of accounting students, as they grow into future business leaders in the accounting industry. KPU, School of Business sent a team to the CaseIT event in Vancouver Feb 17 to 22, 2019. The premier international undergraduate MIS business case competition. Student Volunteering



PROGRAMS, POLICIES, AND INITIATIVES:

FAST Student Reporting

The Office of the Registrar is now implementing FAST Student Reporting, providing self-service reporting for key stakeholders in the Registrar's Office and Dean's offices. This allows the monitoring of important aspects of student activities, such as admission and registration levels, academic history reports and grading.

Introducing FAST Student Reporting will not only enhance operational efficiency across units, it will provide greater transparency of critical day-to-day operational data used for important decision-making.

Four different reports have been shared with Faculties:

- Applicant Report: allows users to query application records and filter by student ID, admission term, residency status, admit type, admission decision, Faculty, academic level, program and major.
- 2. Class List Report: allows users to run class lists for particular terms and course sections.
- 3. Multi Class Report: allows users to generate a list of students across multiple course sections (by course, by instructor, and by course type).
- 4. Academic History Report: allows users to query the courses a particular student has taken, or search for all students who have completed a particular course in a particular term. The information can also be filtered down by final grade.

Education and Awareness

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office continues to present to various areas of the University on the Sexual Violence and Misconduct Policy (SR14), the Student Conduct Policy (ST7), and on students of concern in general. During the Spring semester they presented to the Trades Faculty, Divisional Business Managers, Criminology department, Millwright students, Access Programs for People with Dis-abilities students, and the Student Awards and Financial Assistance department.

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Liaisons also con-ducted workshops at all four campuses, presenting on Bystander Intervention, Consent and Healthy Relationships and How to Receive a Disclosure.

Physical Health & Wellness

Sport & Recreation supported 147 participants across all 4 Intramural leagues (indoor soccer, badminton, volleyball and basketball) and approximately 55 participants for Richmond Ping Pong. The department also organized a doubles badminton tournament for the first time.

KPU participated in *Bell Let's Talk* Day, a Canada wide campaign aiming to end the stigma around mental health. KPU's newly formed Health Promotion department coordinated the event in collaboration with representatives from Sport & Recreation, the Student Rights and Responsibilities Office, Indigenous Services for Students, and the Kwantlen Student Association. Booths were set up at all campuses to promote the campaign, as well as KPU's health and wellness resources, engaging both employees and students in a robust dialogue around mental health.

The Multi-Faith Centre hosted its 5th annual UN World Interfaith Harmony Week during the first week of February. This year's theme was on neighbourliness and was kicked off with a 16 Kilometer Interfaith Pilgrimage in partnership with the Surrey Interfaith Council. Events on campus included *Pancakes for Peace*, a breakfast that was attended by external stakeholders from various faith and secular based communities, and was closed out with a screening of Mr. Roger's documentary "Won't You Be My Neighbour", followed by a closing ceremony at Grassroots Café.

Pink Shirt Day

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office, along with partners across Student Services, encouraged students and employees from KPU to practice kindness and wear pink. Departments and Faculties from around the university gathered for a group photo on Pink Shirt Day.

Surrey Open House Participation

Several departments from Student Services hosted booths at KPU's Surrey Open House, welcoming over 1,000 new faces to the KPU campus. The teams were able to engage with prospective students and community members, speaking to new transitions and current services offered through their respective departments.

SAFA Supports Students in Need

During the Spring 2019 term, the Student Awards & Financial Assistance department awarded a total of \$280,800 to 232 of 875 applicants of students in high financial need. Funding allocated for this bursary came from donor and institutional funds.







Library Launches OPuS

During Open Education Week OPUS (Open Publishing Suite) was officially launched by the Library. OPUS collectively refers to a suite of services and tools offered by the Library in partnership with the Open Education Office. Filling a gap in support, OPUS assists faculty and students in book and journal publishing, making their work available online and offering a variety of publishing options including support for KPU instructors to create or adapt OERs (Open Educational Resources) licensing the materials to be freely accessed, shared and adapted.

OPUS includes:

Pressbooks

- Assistance for conversion projects from Word documents to Pressbooks ebooks
- Full or partial conversion support is available
- Already formal contact/interest from 7 faculty projects with several more identified
- First completed project is Psychology Instructor Sarah Murray's Introduction to Psychology Study Guide; a 16chapter text including inline images, videos and interactive study questions covering curriculum for KPU's PSYC 1100 and PSYC 1200 courses. It has been included in BCcampus' Open Textbook Library.

Open Journal Systems (OJS):

- OJS is open source journal management and publishing software developed by the Public Knowledge Project at SFU, used by over 10,000 journals in the world.

Doing Research with help from an OER Grant

In January, Celia Brinkerhoff (Librarian, Science and Horticulture) was awarded an Open Education Resource Grant for the creation of videos to supplement the online *Doing Research*, a set of learning resources aimed at increasing the Library's information literacy programme. These tutorials are built on the BCcampus Pressbooks platform and will be available for sharing and further adaptation by other academic libraries to enhance their teaching and learning resources.

Focus on Black History Month

- Second year Product Design students of Production Technologies made a field trip to Columbia Plastics in Langley, where students had the chance to see injection molding machines of different capacities in action. They also made a field trip to Peregrine, a furniture manufacturing company based in Burnaby that specializes in wood and plastic furniture for retail and service industries.




- Third year Product Design students met with Rob Nathan, the lead product designer at Bionic Power, a Vancouverbased company that has designed and developed a knee brace that captures the power generated by walking to charge batteries. The technologies were originally developed by Max Donelan, PhD, Professor in Biomedical Physiology & Kinesiology at Simon Fraser University. The resulting products were initially developed for use by the US military and met with great success: Allowing soldiers to charge devices directly or charge a single battery, reducing the weight in batteries each soldier carries by as much as 15 lbs. The company is currently developing products to assist children with cerebral-palsy. In this application of the technology, the power generated is used to drive motors which assist children in their physiotherapy to help strengthen and train their muscle and reverse the debilitating effects of the condition. Rob Nathan has been designing footwear for a decade for a host of leading North-American bands. He has extensive knowledge and experience developing products for mass production from concept to manufacture and is an expert in designing with metals and polymers. He explained the design process, material development, and prototyping methods he and the engineers at Bionic Power use to test and improve each design iteration. This intimate discussion allowed the students to ask important questions about the cutting edge-technologies and material this company is using and to learn first-hand about the product development process from an industry expert. From the instructor, Sholto Scruton: It was a pleasure to share with the students the amazing work of this local company. I was proud to reaffirm that the design methods, development processes, and software that we teach at the Wilson School of Design are consistent with those this industry leading company uses.
- Product Design Students and their Instructor visited the Sea Island Base of the Canadian Coast Guard as part of early stage research for their project: Design of a Passive Thermal Response Device for Hypothermia Victims; a Burrito for Marine Environments. They were met by Cameron Knight, Dive Supervisor, who kindly provided a

2.5-hour tour of the facility, including their Communication/Control Centre, Equipment Room, and the Canadian Coast Guard Hovercrafts. The students had an opportunity to ask questions about rescue incidents, current rescue protocols, see the equipment they use, and enquire about their needs and equipment opportunities for design.



 Technical Apparel and Product Design students visited the Laboratory for Exercise and Environmental Physiology at SFU to hear about research conducted by Dr. Matt White (DETA Advisory Committee member) on performance, apparel, and thermal environments. The students were shown the Climatic Chamber that can be used for testing apparel in thermally challenging environments, and enjoying some ice cream at -20C (the chamber can be set for temperatures between -60C and +85C).



RECOGNITION:

Divya Dias, alumni and past winner of a local NEWH Scholarship, was invited to a NEWH Leadership Conference in Miami February 7-9, 2019 (hospitality industry event). She was one of the guests of honour who represented the local Vancouver Scholarship winner chapter at the conference. Divya was joined by interior design alum, Santiago Arcila, who has become an advocate for new and emerging designers and works to assist NEWH at the local level. Santiago was also a panelist at the conference.

Sam Stringer, a 2016 grad of the program and current Lab Coordinator for the Wilson School of Design, had her work displayed in a number of December and January publications, including Vanity Fair and Vogue.



- Wendy Armbruster, a 1995 and 2015 grad of Fashion & Technology, has been named a finalist for the 2019 Mompreneur Award of Excellence due to her work in the breast feeding community and the fashion industry by creating Snugabell for breast feeding moms.
- Megan Baker, Interior Design alum (2014), was featured in Western Living Magazine's holiday issue in late November. The subject was "How to Design a Gorgeous Holiday Table". Megan has been featured in a variety of magazines, online articles, and has been a guest speaker at various trade shows over the years.
- Two Interior Design Alumni, Jeremy Senko and Alexandra Palmer, both just completed and passed their NCIDQ examinations. NCIDQ certification is the interior design industry's professional exam that indicates they understand interior design principles. Because the exam is quite strenuous, clients/employers can have great confidence in the professional work of those who are certified.
- Alum Jeremy Senko (2013) was recently promoted to Senior Interior Designer with local Vancouver-based design firm BYU. The firm is run by two KPU grads: Ada Bonini and Cheryl Broadhead. This was one of the quickest promotions (junior/intermediate/senior) that BYU has seen in quite some time.

MANAGING RISK:

Ongoing risks to mitigate for the Wilson School of Design are recruitment, conversion, and registration of future students. As well, quality assurance, industry feedback, and curricular relevancy are critical to the long term sustainability and excellence in Design programming. To this end:

- Gabrielle Durning, Events and Communications Coordinator, attended the Annual General Meeting for the National Portfolio Day Association in Sarasota, Florida in January, to represent the Wilson School of Design as a member. Gabrielle was successful in her bid to have Design host the 2019 Vancouver National Portfolio Day event again (2018 was our first-time hosting). It will be held at the Wilson School of Design on the Richmond Campus on Saturday, November 16th 2019, from 11am to 3pm. It is worth noting that this event was the largest Portfolio Day event held in Canada and second largest in North America.
- In order to encourage more applications to the program, Interior Design faculty held an information session evening in January which targeted both high school and mature students. The session was very well attended (over 30 people registered) and many who attended brought along parents to ask questions and tour the facility and resources. Due to the success of this evening event, next year, faculty will target evening sessions in the fall (for early applicants) and again in early January to catch late applicants.
- Given administration's concerns with hosting LGBTQ students in Marrakesh, Morocco for this year's (2019)
 Design Field School (homosexuality is illegal in this country), instructors for the field school have changed the itinerary to a Spain-only destination. Although some students expressed disappointment in the change, the core group is looking forward to the Spain itinerary which will take them to Barcelona and Granada in May 2019.
- The Interior Design department has been hard at work for the past year reviewing curriculum content and collecting student projects/evidence for its external accreditation review from the Council for Interior Design (CIDA). January and February were spent writing the detailed report for the accreditation body to review. This report includes a detailed account of how the program meets all of the 16 standards set out by CIDA – "Professional Standards 2018". The site visit and review will happen in late April 2019 with the program report submitted shortly thereafter. This external review will help to define any curricular changes and conclusions to set forth for KPU's Program Review which will take place in fall 2019.
- The Fashion & Technology program held 3 Saturday workshops to help potential students prepare for submitting their portfolio. Applicants had the opportunity to ask questions about the program and their application process including the interview and portfolio components.
- Fashion Marketing held two Information Sessions to bring more awareness to the program and to give a clear

- overview of what potential students should expect from the program. The info sessions were also an opportunity for applicants to ask any questions in regards to applying to the program.
- Sue Fairburn, faculty member in Product Design, taught a
 Portfolio Building workshop for applicants to the program
 to assist them to develop a portfolio that is interesting,
 cohesive, and highlights what they've done to show who
 they are now and who they plan to be as a future
 designer.

COMMUNITY / INDUSTRY ENGAGEMENT:

All Design programs intersect with their external professional communities and industry on an ongoing basis. Over the past two months, there has been a great deal of activity. As well, we received the following testimonial that highlights the current engagement and opportunity for the Wilson School of Design:

"During the development of our flagship DrillCover product, Arbutus worked with students in Product Design program at KPU to optimize the design of our textile cover for usability and manufacturability. The students were tremendously creative and explored avenues our engineering team hadn't considered; the faculty were skilled at facilitating that creativity. What was also impressive was the lab space at KPU, which allowed for rapid iteration and the ability to test multiple seam construction methods quickly. We had no idea that KPU harboured such a state-of-the-art facility and it impressed industry partners on site visits.

We ended up hiring one of the students, Jaymes Williams, to continue the development of the product through to launch. Jaymes was highly capable and ready to contribute right away. It was clear that integrating the perspective of product design to our team of mechanical engineers early on was a smart decision. The product launched successfully. Jaymes continued to develop additional products on the platform, including our SawCover and Textile Guard products, which users love. KPU played a pivotal role in making our early stages of business successful, when so much was riding on the design of one product. We've now shipped enough product to help surgeons reach 36,000 patients, as well as enable veterinarians to treat 21,000 animals.

My advice: startups designing products for scale should engage product designers early on and KPU is where to find both talent and cutting edge technology."

- The fourth year Graphic Design for Marketing students began their work placement practicums on February 4th. Seventeen students were placed with a variety of different organizations to gain valuable industry experience in the last semester leading up to the completion of their design degree. - Interior Design faculty member, Erick Villagomez, recently completed several graphic poster designs focusing on the provinces of Canada. This project was created in conjunction with Point Two Design.

- Faculty member and Interior Design Coordinator, Dr. Lucie Gagné, recently guest lectured to a graduate class with Dr. David Zandvliet from Simon Fraser University. The topic highlighted Lucie's research on Henri Lefebvre and space as it relates to transdisciplinary field schools. Grad study participants were educators from the valley who are deeply invested in understanding space as it relates to education and experiential learning. The lecture also included a walking tour to understand space in all its forms.
- Sholto Scruton, a faculty member in Product Design and owner of his own studio, Sholto Design Studio, is working with local landscape architectural firm, Enns Gautier, to design custom site furniture for the re-development of Vancouver's historic Blood Alley in Gastown. He is also currently working with a local tech business to design and create 500 desks for their Vancouver offices.
- Sholto has also designed and is building several tables for the Canadian Embassy in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. This is the latest set of furniture pieces he has been commissioned to produce for the Global Affairs Canada. He has designed and created many furniture pieces for Canadian embassies abroad since 2017. These pieces now live in Embassies in Hong Kong, Brussels, Tanzania, Hanoi, Rabat, Barcelona, and Amman and in many other cities around the world.

 Graphic Design for Marketing instructors, David Young, Mike Cober, and Carley Hodgkinson, attended the Graphic Designers of Canada (GDC) Educators Roundtable held at the VCC Downtown campus. Educators from Capilano University, VCC, Langara, UVF, and KPU gathered to talk about spec work, design competitions, and student ethics. Participants also spoke to the changing nature of the discipline and shared support documents that describe future skills for graphic and communication designers.

RESEARCH:

- On February 6th, Victor Martinez, Product Design faculty, participated in the workshop "Derelict Fishing Gear" organized by the NGO, Global Ghost Gear Initiative. Several port authorities from British Columbia, NGOs, First Nations representatives, and federal and provincial government officials were present (Victor, was the only one from academia). The goal of the workshop was to start a conversation and find possible synergies to tackle the great problem of lost fishing gear in our oceans. Victor made some interesting contacts that will enhance the research he is conducting related to transforming lost fishing nets into 3D printable filament.
- Victor also volunteered to be part of the task force for the drafting of the Intellectual Property policy led by Deepak Gupta, KPU's AVP Research. The task force has been meeting regularly and has worked on several versions of the policy, which is getting closer to being ready for presenting to stakeholders.

INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT:

- Shaun Cheung, Deputy Head of the Department of Fashion and Image Design of the Hong Kong Design Institute, met with our Design and International team to discuss possible partnerships with KPU. Further examination of curricular consistency and opportunities will occur before entering into a Memo of Understanding.
- Design was thrilled to host visiting scholar, Tero Marin, from Metropolia University in Helsinki, for a week. Tero shared his expertise on service design, and user-centred design and research with students from Graphic Design for Marketing, Product Design, Foundations in Design, and Fashion Marketing. He also led a Continuing Studies course on Night Time Photography on Grouse Mountain. Thanks go to the interdisciplinary faculty team that worked together to bring Tero to KPU.




Media exposure during this period totaled 819 mentions, divided into 738 positive, 72 neutral, and nine negative, all of which were budget-related (source: Meltwater).

OFFICE OF ADVANCEMENT

As of March 11, 2019, the Office of Advancement has raised \$3,091,000 for the current fiscal year. This exceeds the fiscal year goal of \$2.5 million. Since the last Board of Governors' Report in January, \$1,221,000 was raised, largely due to two significant contributions: a \$300,000 gift from the Kwantlen Student Association to top up existing endowments for student support, and a new donation from Guard.me International Insurance for \$500,000 to provide international student support through scholarships and bursaries.










RICHMOND DISCOVERY DAY





FUTURE STUDENTS' OFFICE DROP IN APPOINTMENTS

January and February the Recruitment team worked closely with faculty in the limited intake programs with conversion calling to ensure applicants had read and understood their admission information. The goal was to assist applicants in meeting the initial March 1st document submission deadline and answer questions they may have. In Jan and Feb, the Recruitment team called applicants from Legal Admin, Health Unit Coordinator and all Design programs.

New initiative:

Dominic Wan, Student Recruitment Coordinator (Richmond school district portfolio) has recently expanded his off campus drop-ins at Hugh Boyd Secondary school. This is the first Richmond Secondary School to take part in our newly offered recruitment initiative.

As the numbers show (to the left), the total number of users on kpu.ca is down but the number of sessions per user and page views are up. This is explained by the fact that the users who are coming to the site are more engaged and are taking multiple actions across multiple owned channels (website, apps, etc.).

The analytics show that we are being more "efficient" this year. This is further verified by the fact that the "number of sessions/user" and "page views" is up. As we receive more engaged leads to our website, they are likely to spend more time, viewing more pages, and coming back to the website than if we were to simply have an increase of less engaged traffic coming to our website.

Institutional Analysis & Planning

EXPERIENCE

The Student Experience:

- Study Abroad Survey: The survey is designed to provide KPU International with feedback on the experiences of the KPU students who studied abroad between Spring 2018 and Fall 2018. The survey was launched on January 28 and closed on February 17. A report was provided to KPU International on February 19.
- BSN-AE One-Year Follow-Up Survey: The survey of September 2015 cohort was launched on January 28. The survey provides the BSN-AE program with feedback about graduates' employment and education activities, as well as feedback about the program. The survey was closed on February 24 and a report was provided on February 25.
- BSN One-Year Follow-Up Surveys: The surveys of March 2017 and July 2017 graduates were launched on January 31. The survey provides the BSN program with feedback about graduates' employment and education activities, as well as feedback about the program. The survey was closed on February 24 and a report was provided on March 4.
- Surveys of Graduates of Health Unit Coordinator Program:
 This is an ongoing survey and required for the program articulation. It also provides feedback to the program on how to improve the program. The surveys of January 2017 and September 2017 graduates were launched on February 6 and closed on March 3. A report was provided to the program chair on March 4.
- Survey of Graduates of GNIE Program: This information is required for their program articulation and is an ongoing survey. It also provides feedback to the program on how to improve the program. The survey of August 2018 graduates was launched on February 28.
- 2019 Short Survey on Student Satisfaction: A short, 5-minute version of our biennial Student Satisfaction Survey was launched on January 25 to gather feedback on the course registration process and students' overall educational experience at KPU. The survey closed on March 3. A tabular report of the results is being prepared.

QUALITY

Student Success:

- Developed dashboard to track Student Retention, including the pathways and progress of students who entered as undeclared. Contains new measures that require further review and refinement. New interactive features implemented using web-based, mobile-friendly Power BI technology.
- Conducted an analysis of the progress of Preparatory and Pathway level student to assess their progress. For Preparatory students this consisted of assessing progress

- to Pathway, Undergraduate or Vocational levels. For Pathway students this included assessing progress along the Pathway, as well as to Undergraduate or Vocational levels. This was for the SSCAPP Task Force on the Provost's ACA GV9 Task Force Proposal.
- Conducted additional analyses of Academic Standing of Domestic and International students by Faculty.
- Completed analyses of success of Visiting and Exchange students for KPU International. This included assessing student performance by partner institution and country of origin.
- Working on Part 2 of the Pathway study to understand how student progress through the Pathway to Undergraduate Studies.

Service Improvement:

 2018 Library Employee Survey Comparison Report: A tabular report comparing the results of the 2018 and 2016 surveys is being prepared for the Library.

Program Review:

 Support is currently being provided to 27 programs (or cluster of related programs) that are at various stages in the program review process.

Course Feedback:

 Course Feedback surveys for Spring 2019, involving approximately 2,000 sections, are underway.

Accountability to Our Partners:

- Completed the Languages Canada Annual Membership Survey.
- Assisted the Library in completing the Association of College & Research Libraries (ACRL) Library Trends and Statistics Survey.

Accountability to Government:

- Began work on the March 2019 compliance of International students to Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC).
- Facilitated KPU's participation in the Student Housing Demand Survey initiated by the Ministry. The purpose of this survey is to assess demand for student housing across the province.

INSTITUTIONAL PLANNING

Program Planning:

 Finalized the feasibility assessment for the Economics Minor in Essential Data Analytics. Awaiting feedback on the draft feasibility assessment for the Post-Baccalaureate Diploma in Mental Health and Addictions.

Integrated Planning:

- Updated enrolment estimates for Fall 2019 and developed estimates for Spring 2020, and determined capacity for new International students.
- Provided Finance with data on the FTE counts by Course Faculty for FY201/18.
- Using information on course section and domestic student counts calculated the invoice for foregone tuition in ESL and ABE (these courses are tuition-free for Domestic students) on behalf of Finance.
- Produced a compendium of data on the Faculty of ACA for the for the SSCAPP Task Force on the Provost's ACA GV9 Task Force Proposal covering enrolments, delivery statistics and student outcomes.
- Updated an earlier analysis of Health Foundations Program students to determine who will be ready to apply for admission into Nursing and Psych Nursing Programs in the coming terms. This extended the analysis from Fall 2018 to Spring 2019 to provide information to the Faculty of Health for planning purposes.
- Health Foundation Graduates Analysis: conducted a study to understand how long it takes to complete the certificate program, the grade distribution of graduates and how many declare into either the Nursing and Psych Nursing Programs. This information will be used to help predict number of students who will be ready to declare into either the Nursing and Psych Nursing Programs in the future.
- Health Foundation Repeats Analysis: conducted a study to understand the rate at which each Health Foundation Course is repeated, and how often, to aid in understanding rates of progression to completion.

Enrolment Management:

- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Summer 2019, Fall 2019 and Trades Foundation 2018/19 are running currently. The dashboards are updated every Wednesday. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants, and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of International applicants.
- High School Applicant Dashboard: This provides information on high school applicants including high school and contact information of applicants currently in BC High Schools. The dashboard is updated every Friday during the Fall 2019 application cycle and is used by the Future Student's Office in their efforts to convert applicants to enrolled students.
- Revised the Interim Enrolment Dashboard to make it easier to use and update and began providing weekly updates for Summer 2019.
- The following dashboards have been updated with data for the previous term: Classroom Utilization dashboard for Spring 2019, Enrolment dashboard for Fall 2018, Seat dashboard for Fall 2018.
- As part of our preparation to migrate our Dashboards from EXCEL to Power BI, have migrated 7 of our 9 Student data dashboards into a single web-based Power BI prototype.
- Created the Spring Employee Dashboard. This dashboard provides information about the number of employees by employee group (faculty, staff and administration), as of the end of January 2019. It includes comparable data for the two previous Spring terms. (See excerpt below).




