Office of the President and Vice Chancellor

In addition to the regular round of administrative and governance meetings, the following activities are of note:

On March 31st I joined a virtual event hosted by BC Campus: "The Empty Chair: From Anti-Racist Intention to Action in B.C.'s Post-secondary System ".

On April 1st, I was pleased to join the regular meeting of the Indigenous Advisory Committee, and on April 5th, I attended the graduating performance of the students enrolled in MUSI 2020 "Global Drumming and Cultural Expression" and LANC 1870 "Introduction to Bhangra Dance".

On April 5th we were also pleased to announce the appointment of Peter Smailes to the position of VP Administration, starting June 1st.

On April 8th I met the new principal at the Maple Leaf School at KPU Richmond, Yvonne Chester, and on April 10th I was so pleased to attend the Spring Open House at the <u>historic Joy Kogawa house</u> in south Vancouver, and to witness the official launch of the exhibition "Symbolising Obasan". This began as an assignment in Greg Chan's ENGL 2301: Canadian Literature in English class in the fall of 2019 and developed into a partnership with Ying-Yueh Chuang's Fine Arts students.

On April 12th I was invited to attend the launch of the South Asian Legacy Project at Surrey's City Hall. This is an initiative of UFV, and KPU's Dr. Balbir Gurm was a community volunteer on the management team and co-editor of the magnificent book.

On April 13th I met in person for the first time a new member of the Board of Governors, Kelly Frederick for a tour of KPU Langley, and on April 14th I was pleased to make some welcoming remarks at the KPU Retirees Association annual meeting "The Age Friendly University"

On April 27th I joined my colleagues Randall Heidt and Drs. Purvey and Jhangiani in a presentation to CiCan on how KPU responded to the pandemic and how the university has been transformed as a result. On my return on April 29 I was very pleased to join others in the KPU Surry Library to launch the $\chi^w \Rightarrow \chi^w \acute{e} \dot{\gamma} \Rightarrow m$ Indigenous Collection: the work of Rachel Chong, Indigenous Engagement and Subject Liaison Librarian, and her colleagues.

KPU is participating in the McConnell Foundation initiative with about 30 universities across Canada in a collaboration on the Climate Emergency. A call to action has been drafted and discussions are underway to extend the collaboration nationally, modelled on a <u>Swedish initiative</u> and to link with groups such as the Federation of Canadian Municipalities. This was shared with the Environmental Sustainability Committee on May 5.

On May 3rd I joined a virtual Presidential Experience Lab hosted by EAB which featured IDEO, a global design firm, to explore the application of design thinking to higher education's thorniest challenges.

On May 4th I attended a session hosted by the team reviewing the provinces COVID response to provide input and on May 5th I had my first chance to meet with members of the new KSA executive. May 6th was of course the glorious KPU Day at KPU Tech where we were able to get together for the first time in this way in 3 years.

On May 9/10 I participated in the CAEL review of KPU's readiness to serve adult learners., and on May 10th I joined with my colleagues to meet with school superintendents or their designates from lower Mainland school districts and to seek their input on how we can better inform and connect with schools and parents.

On May 11th I joined my presidential colleagues in BCAIU to meet with the Minister of AEST the Honorable Anne Kang, to discuss the government's Future Ready initiative that seeks to anticipate a skills shortage in BC. Later that day I attended the regular Governance and Nominating Committee of BCNet.

May 13th and 14th saw the Business Meeting and Workshops of the signatories from across Canada of the Scarborough Charter on Anti-Black Racism and Black Inclusion in Canadian Higher Education which I attended at UBC and online with several colleagues from KPU. It considered collection and use of data, knowledge-sharing, community-making and Black Flourishing.

On May 20th I received a briefing on the recommendation of the KPU Task Force on Antiracism, and on May 24th I was able

once again to participate in the New Employee Orientation. The KPU Board had its regular meeting on May 25 th and on May 26th I attended the YWCA Women of the Year Award gala to cheer on our own nominee, Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh.

Spring is performance review season for all administrative employees and it is an opportunity to reflect on the past year and set goals for the next: it is a rewarding and important process. A lot of time is booked between February and June on these reviews.

Considerable time also has been taken with administrative search processes for the Provost, 2 Deans, and a number of Associate Deans.

On June 1st I attended the state of the city address at a breakfast meeting hosted by the City of Surrey and then I met with Dr. George Melville and others to sign the Property Trust Deed, for which George had kindly agreed to be the Settlor.

On June 8th I had lunch with MLA Aman Singh, former member of the Board, and on June 10th joined the University of Illinois System President's Advisory Council virtual meeting.

On June 13th we kicked off a task force to look at KPU's future with respect to its global profile, including a consideration of international student enrollments. This task force will be reaching out across KPU and beyond to gather opinions and data later this year.

I had the pleasure of filming conversations with former President Skip Triplett who was instrumental in establishing KPU, and the university college before that. This will be used to compile a video for our 40+1 celebration later in the year and to archive for the 50th anniversary, which will be here before we know it.

EXPERIENCE

- Student Satisfaction Survey: This survey collects a broad range of information from students on their experience at KPU to identify areas for improvement. After an extensive consultation process, it was launched on October 28 and closed on November 18, 2021. Reporting in this period has included the release of two full reports (all questions broken down by international/domestic status and Faculty, respectively), and a presentation on diversityrelated results to the President's Diversity and Equity Committee.
- Senate Orientation Survey: This survey collected feedback from attendees of Senate's Orientation Day, held in August 2021. In order to give new Senators and members of Senate Standing Committees time to participate in their roles, the survey was launched on February 10 and closed on March 13. A report of the results was sent to the Vice Chair of Senate on March 16.
- Task Force on Anti-Racism (FTA) Survey: OPA facilitated this survey on behalf of the TFA. It was sent to all KPU employees and asked about their experiences of racism at KPU, whether BIPOC employees and students are fully supported, and ways to implement anti-racist goals within and outside the classroom. The survey was launched on February 17 and closed on March 10. The survey data was provided to the Chair of the TFA on March 11.
- Library Survey of Students: This biennial survey collects information relating to use of and satisfaction with various library resources, facilities, and services. The survey, sent to half of all students enrolled in the Spring 2022 semester, was launched on February 8, and closed on March 8. A report of the results was provided to the University Librarian on April 8.
- Sexual Violence and Misconduct Survey: OPA facilitated this survey on behalf of the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training. The survey, sent to the half of all students enrolled in the Spring 2022 semester who did not receive the library survey, was launched on February 7, and closed on March 7. We are currently awaiting the results from the Ministry.
- BSN-AE 1-Year Follow-Up Survey: This is a recurring survey for graduates of the BSN-AE program, conducted approximately one year after graduation. Graduates provide feedback on how well the program prepared them for practice. The survey of the November 2020 graduates launched February 3 and closed February 24. Due to a low number of participants, the results will be combined with the next cohort of graduates.

- BSN Program Completion Survey: This is a recurring survey for students about to graduate from the BSN program. Students provide feedback about the program including their development of professional competencies and overall satisfaction. The survey of the Spring 2022 graduates was launched on March 14, closed on April 3, and a report of the results was provided to the program chair on April 19.
- Indigenous Student Co-op Survey: This survey was sent to all Indigenous students enrolled in the Spring 2022 term. Covering their awareness and interest in co-op, barriers and incentives to participating, and how the integration of Indigenous employers and mentors would impact their interest in co-op, the survey was launched on April 13 and closed on May 8. A report of the results was provided to the Career Development Centre on May 20.

QUALITY

Student Success:

- Mathematics Assistance Centre Survey: This survey was sent to all students registered in MATH 1102 or MATH 1112 during Fall 2021. The survey covered students' awareness, use, satisfaction, and mode preferences, was launched on November 23, and closed on December 14, 2021. The results were delivered, alongside the MACrelated results from the Student Satisfaction Survey, to the Math Department on April 14.
- Conducted research to assess the different English proficiency requirements used for admission to undergraduate studies by examining the academic performance of International students who were admitted to undergraduate programs through, with particular focus on Duolingo. This was used to inform the decision to continue to use Duolingo as one method of assessing English proficiency.
- Conducted research to examine the outcomes of Pathway students according to the English upgrading courses they took (ENGQ or ELST).
- Conducted research that assessed differences in the academic performance of students who registered in a class before class start and on the first week and 2nd week after class had started. The results were used to inform the decision to continue to all a two-week add/drop period at the beginning of the semester.

Quality Assurance Processes:

Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR). The SSCPR approved 31 reports since September 2021, as follows:

- \Rightarrow 4 self-study reports;
- \Rightarrow 8 external review reports;
- \Rightarrow 6 quality assurance plans;
- \Rightarrow 13 annual follow-up reports on quality assurance plan progress.

Completed the data collection for the following program reviews:

- \Rightarrow Diploma in Brewing and Brewery Operations (May 2022)
- \Rightarrow BA Minor in Language & Culture (May 2022)

Course Feedback: Course Feedback surveys for Spring 2022 were conducted for 1808 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 838 reports to instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors.

Accountability to Government and Partners:

- Completed the Central Data Warehouse submission to the Ministry in May. This process is a collaboration with the Office of the Registrar, IT, and other departments.
- Submitted KPU's FY 2021-22 FTE Report to the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training in May.

- Submitted KPU data to Statistics Canada for the Tuition and Living Allowance Survey in May.
- Submitted KPU data to Polytechnics Canada for on application, enrolment and graduate numbers.
- Submitted the bi-annual compliance report on the status of KPU international students to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada for Spring 2022 in April.

INSTITUTIONAL PLANNING

Integrated Planning:

- Produced the VISION 2023 Progress Report: March 2022 with benchmark data for the KPU Board.
- Conducted analysis of conversion rates, including admitted students who don't enroll to understand the potential for increasing conversion to enrolled students.
- Conducted an assessment on unmet demand trends, and the type of students more likely to experience unmet demand. Unmet demand refers to the inability of students to get into courses by the Stable Enrolment date that they had waitlisted in during the registration period.
- Provided data on high school student transitions, and used this to assess trends in domestic enrolments in BC and in particular in KPU.

 Developed enrolment projections for Summer 2023, and updated the projections for Fall 2022, and Spring 2023. This information was used to develop International enrolment targets and caps for Summer 2023.

Enrolment Management:

- Converted OPA Reports in Excel into Power BI, the tool KPU is now using for our dashboards. The following reports are now in PowerBI: Academic Standing, Enrolment Tracking (for Summer 2022), and Current Enrolment Report. Other reports will follow.
- Created the Over-Enrolment interactive report based on the KFA Collective Agreement Letter of Understanding. This dashboard presents both the planned and actual over -enrolments in sections, courses, subjects, departments and Faculties for Summer 2022.
- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Fall 2022 and Spring 2023 are running currently. The

dashboards are updated every Wednesday. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants, and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of International applicants.

- Applicant Tracking Reports: Provide weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted, and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for Fall 2022 and Spring 2023 are ongoing.
- Created the Stable Enrolment report for Summer 2022 as of May 23, 2022 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard.

PEOPLE FIRST CULTURE

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI)

- In March, Trina Prince, KPU's Manager of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion, developed and launched a "Relearning Gender" workshop which will be offered in-house to KPU employees on a continual basis.
- The development of KPU's first Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Decolonization (EDID) Action Plan is well underway. A first draft of recommended actions was presented to the steering committee on April 12th and a second draft is targeted for completion by the end of May.
- In May, KPU received approval from the BC's Office of the Human Rights Commissioner in response to a special program application to preferentially hire and retain Indigenous candidates for support staff positions over the next five years. This is in addition to approval received in February to attract and retain Indigenous candidates in faculty and administrative positions. As a next step, HR has begun to explore partnering with an Indigenous consultant to support KPU's Indigenous employment and workplace inclusion goals.
- On April 22, the HR department participated in a workshop entitled "Recognizing and Dealing with Microaggressions in the Workplace". The goals of the workshop were to raise awareness within the HR department of microaggressions and their impact, and to gain tools for dealing with them whether as a bystander, a target, or an aggressor.

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Employee Workshops

 Human Resources offered several professional development workshops to KPU employees which included: Mental Health First Aid; The Working Mind (Employee and Manager versions offered); Having the Courage: Difficult Conversations; Respectful Relationships in the Workplace; and Relearning Gender.

Onboarding and Orientation

• KPU held a virtual New Employee Orientation on May 24, 2022. Facilitated by KPU's Organizational Development team, approximately 38 new and continuing employees registered to attend the online event.

PEOPLE SERVICES

Health and Benefits

- A Manager of Health and Wellness position has been created to oversee the Health and Benefits department. This new role will develop and implement new wellness strategies, including mental health strategies, to support a healthy and engaged workplace environment.
- Health and Benefits has shifted its approach to COVID-19 based on the direction from the Public Health Office and the BC Centre for Disease Control, which includes treating COVID-19 as a normal respiratory illness. This change in approach has resulted in an increase in creative solutions to ensure the well-being of KPU staff, while ensuring medically supported accommodations are in place.

Human Resources Information Systems (HRIS)

- HRIS is currently in consultation with Ellucian Banner, Payroll, and IT on revamping the HR and Payroll system setup to ensure that we are continuing to utilize the system efficiently and effectively.
- To keep up with the increased demand for system maintenance, custom reports and updated processes, the HRIS team has increased the number of positions on its team.

Payroll

• In May, the Payroll team finalized their transition from Finance to HR with a move of offices. Payroll is now located with the HR team office on the Langley campus.

Total Compensation

- The Executive Compensation Disclosure has been completed, reviewed by the Board and signed off by the Board Chair.
- Merit based increases have been approved effective July 1st, 2022 for those administrative employees who are eligible. The compensation team has completed an analysis of each administrative employee's eligibility for the salary increase based on the required criteria.

PEOPLE RELATIONS

The People Relations restructure is in its first phase and three new managers have been appointed:

- Kim Hunter Manager, Human Resources Business Partners
- Navneet Sidhu Manager, Talent Acquisition and Recruitment Services
- Brittany Berger Manager, HR Administration

All three individuals are seasoned HR practitioners and have served KPU in the capacity of HR Business Partner. They are well positioned to work with the Director to build their new teams and move the People Relations strategy forward.

RISK AND SECURITY

Campus Safety & Security

• On March 31st, the Surrey RCMP was called to Surrey Campus as a result of a threat received about student intransit to campus with a firearm. As a precaution, the entire Surrey campus was locked-down while authorities conducted their investigation. The University activated an incident management team to provide support to the incident and led campus communications. The authorities did determine the threat to be a hoax and the lock-down was lifted and normal operations resumed the same day. The team is now focused on performing a review of procedures and feedback received to ensure key learnings are incorporated into protocols for any future events.

Emergency Planning

 The Office of Emergency Planning has been working on the development of an After-Action Report (AAR) which presents findings of KPU's preparedness for and response to the March 31st Surrey Campus Security Threat. Based on the feedback received through email, follow-up discussions and a formal debrief, a review of best practices and lessons learned, a number of recommendations have been identified. Progress has also been made on finalizing an emergency procedures poster, an active threat educational video and ensuing KPU campuses are equipped with the necessary emergency supplies.

Risk Management

Organizational Risk is currently working with all of the academic areas to continue with the implementation of KPU's Enterprise Risk Management program by conducting risk identification and assessment meetings with various strategic partners across the University. Risk is working closely with its broker partner and KPU's IT department to identify quick wins for the University to improve its Cyber risk profile to better align KPU with insurer expectations for the upcoming cyber insurance renewal in the fall. In addition, Risk is continuing to explore ways that the strategic risk appetite can be embedded into KPU's culture and decision making going forward.

Occupational Health & Safety

- Occupational Health & Safety (OH&S) completed its first <u>Annual Summary Report</u>. This report highlights initiatives and reviews Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) from January 1st, 2021 – December 31st, 2021. KPIs provide a baseline for the OH&S department to continue to look for ways to enhance and improve KPU's safety program in support of the University's commitment to providing and maintaining a healthy and safe working and learning environment.
- OH&S launched a refreshed <u>SharePoint webpage</u>. The site provides an overview of all elements within the OH&S program, including accident/incident reporting, Joint Occupational Health & Safety Committees, policies, procedures, programs and more. With the lifting of COVID -19 restrictions, and in alignment with Public Health guidance, KPU has now shifted to its <u>Communicable Disease Plan</u>. OH&S continues to promote the plan which highlights core infection controls measures to prevent the transmission of communicable diseases including COVID-19 in the workplace.

Office of the Chief Financial Officer

FINANCIAL SERVICES

Staffing

The Financial Reporting team is happy to announce that they have recently permanently filled two vacancies. Tara Wilson, a seasoned CPA, joined the team in the Accountant role in April and Jaskaran Atwal joined the team as an Analyst in May 2022.

The contracts for two consultants who supported the team through the year-end are ending at the end of May 2022.

A third consultant who was supporting the team wrapped up their contract at the end of March 2022.

Activities and Initiatives

The Reporting team has had their heads down over the past few months as they focused on the year-end audit and year-end Ministry reporting. As they move forward the focus will turn to training and creating a work plan for the new team members to ensure engagement and growth within the team.

Over the summer, the team will be supporting the KPU Foundation audit before their focus will turn to KPU and KPUF Charity returns, the SOFI report and multiple Research Reports.

BUDGET AND PLANNING

Staffing

The Budget and Planning team recently welcomed two new Analysts, Jaskirth Sandhu and Rajan Aujla, to their team in May 2022. We are happy to announce that these two new employees are also KPU Alumni.

Activities and Initiatives:

The Budget and Planning team has finished their heaving lifting on the FY 2023 budget and has successfully uploaded it into the financial system. They have now turned their focus to the FY 2024 budget development and timeline.

As we increase our staffing levels across all three teams we are also transitioning tasks and responsibilities to ensure that the activities are aligned with the functional group. The Budget and Planning team is also now focusing on training their new team members.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

Staffing:

In February 2022, the Operations team welcomed Maria Corazon Hontiveros as the successful candidate for the Accounts Payable Clerk role. She comes to the team with experience from another post-secondary institution. At this time the Operations team is fully staffed.

Activities and Initiatives:

The Operations team has been busy over the past few months supporting the T2202 and T4A process in addition to successfully supporting the year-end close.

The team has now finalized the testing of a new PCard program

to be rolled out in FY 2023. This new PCard program will facilitate a paperless approval process through the FAST Finance system.

The team is currently working with OReg to facilitate a smooth financial transition of the Entertainment Arts students from Langara.

PROCUREMENT SERVICES

Staffing

The hiring process has been completed for a vacant Procurement Officer position and a candidate has been identified. Subject to a successful background check, an offer will be made.

Activities and Initiatives

A re-alignment of procurement portfolios to strike a better balance and equity of the workload for the Procurement Officers has been finalized and formal transition to the new portfolios will be completed during June 2022.

Staffing

The Director of Business Performance & Advisory Services resigned during the period and recruitment is underway for a replacement. In the interim, the Chief Financial Officer has been appointed to oversee the responsibilities of the division.

Activities and Initiatives

ACADEMIC PORTFOLIO

- 14 chairs have been supported by the Provost's Office to attend various Chair Academies over the summer. As this is a new initiative, we will be debriefing the experience with chairs.
- The Provost's Office has been working with CAEL (Council for Adult and Experiential Learning) to develop a mature learners' strategy. While visiting KPU on May 9 and 10, representatives from CAEL met with staff, faculty, and leaders and have also met with students and employers. We eagerly await their report.
- Coffees with the Provost continue monthly and have been well attended.
- CourseLeaf update: Second Software Module Approved for Deployment
- The project KPU has undertaken to update its curricular management software has reached another milestone. The software
 module to support Course Outlines has now been approved for deployment later this summer. Updated software supporting
 the University Calendar has been deployed for over a year. This second module will integrate with the University Calendar,
 will provide a more intuitive user experience for faculty curriculum developers, and will create a transparent and automated
 workflow through the curricular governance system. The timing to kick off a third module, which will support Program Development, is currently under negotiation with the software vendor, and will likely add this third integrated unit in late 2023.

Faculty of Academic & Career Preparation

The initial work of the ACP Visioning Group wrapped up in April and a proposal will go to Faculty Council in June for the beginning of wider faculty consultations. Thanks to Sean Conway, Elizabeth Spalding, Teresa Swan and Kim Tomiak for their thoughtful and collaborative work on this project, as well as to AVPA David Burns for his leadership.

EVENTS

- The BC Council on Admissions and Transfer for English as an Additional Language (BCCAT EAL) annual meeting was held on May 8-9 in Burnaby. Members also had the option to attend virtually. Three faculty members from ELS attended this two-day event online. One of the topics discussed was English for Academic Purposes (EAP) for credit. Capilano University, Vancouver Island University and Camosun College have successfully implemented 100 Level credit-bearing university courses for EAP. There was a consensus that EAP students deserve credit for their high level of English language proficiency even though they are students in English speaking post-secondary institutions, much like earning credit for a French course. Other themes discussed at BCCAT included English placement tests (for example, Duolingo), overall drops in enrolment due to the pandemic, challenges with navigating the return to campuses (for example, face-toface, online, and blended instruction). Many EAL departments across the province faced layoffs during Covid.
- Dean Aimee Begalka attended the Adult Special Education Articulation Committee meeting on May 25, and the biannual meeting of the Deans and Directors of Developmental Education on May 26. She was also pleased to attend the YWCA Women of Distinction Awards Gala on the evening of May 26 in support of KPU nominee Fiona Whittington-Walsh.
- Heather Collins, the new contact for EAL in the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training (AEST), announced at BCCAT that there will be an increase to base funding for ABE and EAL programs. These monies to be applied to course development and delivery.

STUDENT SUCCESS

 The two winners of the 2021 ELS Endowed Awards were announced. Congratulations go out to Mengze Gao (Season) and Ishaan Khetarpal, who each received \$1200 in recognition of their academic achievements and dedicat



-ion to their communities. Applications for the 2022 awards are now open. Members of the ELS Awards

Committee work alongside the KPU Foundation to promote and adjudicate these departmental scholarships.

 Students of LCOM (Literacy Course for Adults with Intellectual Disabilities) experienced a variety of successes, including reading comprehension improvement with one student progressing two full grade levels. Ten LCOM students will continue their educational journey at KPU in Fall 2022. Nine students have been admitted to the Employment and Community Studies program, and one student will take ENGQ 1079 to improve their written communication.



 At times student success in LCOM can be difficult to quantify in typical educational terms. A parent email captures the joy of learning and shared LCOM student success:

"Louise, I wanted to say thank you to yourself and Val, for teaching ***** in your class this year. What a success it was for her! She struggled in the beginning with technology issues, but persevered. Her interests increased so much, and I really appreciate that. She now follows Chris Hatfield, she said the other day that the space station is over the Caribbean, and she had to teach me all about that as she now knows more than I do about space! And she did a short presentation to our parent group of her day program and all the parents were really impressed, and that was completely from her experience in your classroom. It gave her confidence to try things that are new to her. She enjoyed sitting with others at lunchtime, and sometimes buying something from the cafeteria. She learned to navigate the campus during Covid, what an experience for all. So, thank you so much for being a part of her experience!

PRESENTATIONS/COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

 Chris Traynor, chair of English Upgrading, and Lesley Hemsworth, co-chair of English Language Studies, as well as the Dean, participated in the Institutional Review of KPU conducted by the Council on Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL) on May 9 and 10. As well two ACP students agreed to be interviewed by a CAEL representative about their experience as adult learners at

KPU. CAEL's review investigates the ways in which an institution's policies and practices can be fine-tuned to support learners who are returning to education after a gap or who have family and work responsibilities.

- Dr. Teresa Swan, EACS instructor, presented to BC's Initiative for Inclusive Post-Secondary Education on her thesis a Critical Perspective of Adult Special Education. The presentation was made at the Raising Consciousness: 5th Annual Symposium on Inclusive Post-Secondary Education on May 3-5, 2022.
- The EU Department is thrilled to recognize English Upgrading faculty member Janice Morris, who was the recipient of the 2022 KPU Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) award. The JEDI award "celebrate[s] members of the KPU



community who demonstrate outstanding commitment, inno-vation, and leadership in working towards intersectional social justice, dismantling systemic barriers, and building a culture of equity, diversity and inclusion at and around KPU." As many members of KPU and the wider community are aware, Janice dedicates an immense amount of time and energy 358 days a year as Festival Director to the annual KDocs film festival, Metro Vancouver's premiere social justice film festival. Janice received her JEDI award at KPU Day this spring at KPU Tech.

- ACP Dean Aimee Begalka continues to participate in the Surrey Childcare Task Force. The group recently produced a <u>Surrey Community Childcare Action Plan</u> in conjunction with the City of Surrey, which was presented to Surrey City Council for approval in March.
- The Dean is also a member of the Langley Local Immigrant Partnership Committee, which has produced a <u>strategic</u> <u>plan for 2022-25</u>, including four priority areas:
 - * Ensuring Settlement Success
 - * Building Belong
 - * Developing Community Capacity
 - * Supporting Meaningful Employment
 - * The Dean was happy to participate in a visit to Capilano University's Early Childhood Care and Education program on April 4, along with the Provost, the AVPA, and two members from the Metis Nation of BC, to learn about how Capilano's curriculum could be translated to KPU's context.

- Within the KPU community, the English Upgrading department maintains a close relationship and shared programming with the Phoenix Drug and Alcohol Recovery and Education Society on site at the Society's holistic treatment centre next to Surrey Memorial Hospital. The Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 terms for KPU's Continuous Intake classes at Phoenix were marked by significant change.
- Management changes and a dramatic alteration to the room assignments and building configurations at the Kwantlen Polytechnic Learning Centre have affected KPU's program delivery. The classroom, office, and computer room were all moved to the basement. As usual, the construction plans fell behind schedule leaving us without a classroom until late November. This coincided with the many COVID-19 protocols put in place at Phoenix; the result was that students worked almost exclusively online or through correspondence for the first term. The upside is that KPU now has a dedicated space as a classroom complete with four student computers. The move to the new space is almost complete. Spring saw a return to inclass instruction at Phoenix though some students were reluctant to chance on-site attendance. Given the unusual circumstances, online and correspondence for those students was made available. All-in-all the last two terms at Phoenix have been successful with reasonable attendance and student progress given extremely trying times.
- In a joint presentation with EU and FSO, ELS had an opportunity to share ELS program information with settlement workers who serve newcomers and their families in the Richmond School District. There was very positive feedback and there are plans to organize a tour of KPU's Richmond campus this fall.
- The ELS Advisory Committee met in April. There were attendees from various local school districts, a community college, and organizations such as Diversity and SUCCESS. Community partners shared information and experiences related to enrolment demographics, returning to campus, online and blended instruction, and assessing, tracking, and meeting student needs.
- At the April Community Adult Literacy Program (CALP) meeting, the CALP providers report that though some sessions are offered face-to-face, the learners prefer to continue meeting remotely. Overall the participation in CALP programming has increased with offering the sessions via Zoom. The session that offers child minding will be returning face-to-face.

STAFFING

• ELS has seen some increase in student enrolment. As a result, ELS has offered work to some members from the

Qualified Faculty List for the summer term. It is wonderful that some of the valued members of the ELS team are back to help rebuild the program.

INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

- The Faculty of ACP provided a copy of the book Braiding Sweetgrass, by Robin Wall Kimmerer to each ACP faculty and staff member. In Braiding Sweetgrass Kimmerer brings together her scientific knowledge as a botanist, and as a member of the Potawatomi Nation, her understanding that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. The author's Indigenous ways of knowing and her academic training creates a compelling read – one in which the reader can easily comprehend the value of traditional Indigenous knowledge as a stark comparison and/or enhancement of scientific instruction.
- The ACP Indigenous Reading Circle met on May 13 to discuss Tomson Highway's memoir *Permanent Astonishment*. The next meeting will be October 14, when we will discuss *Braiding Sweetgrass*, by Robin Wall Kimmerer. A copy of this excellent book has been given to each member of the faculty in support of the Indigenization pillar of the ACP Academic Plan.

PROGRAM/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

- The recently formed ACP Standing Committee on Research and Scholarship Committee comprises Janet Webster, EU faculty member, Teresa Swan, Access Programs faculty member and the Dean of the Faculty, Aimee Begalka. This committee was formed in February 2022 and has held three meeting so far. Dr. Farhad Dastur was invited to the March meeting to assist with formulating a direction appropriate for the Faculty of Academic and Career Preparation, and he was also invited to speak at the ACP Faculty as a Whole Meeting to assist with supporting ongoing scholarship of teaching and learning initiatives within the Faculty.
- ELS continues to be involved in the English Placement Test Working Group in conjunction with other areas of the

University. A motion was put forth to continue to use Duolingo in placing students. This motion was passed and presented at the SSCAPP.

- LCOM (Literacy Course for Adults with Intellectual Disabilities) historically offered on Surrey campus expanded to provide an additional cohort on Langley campus in the 2021-22 academic year. LCOM continued to provide face-to-face learning during the pandemic. During this time the number of applicants warranted a second cohort offering.
- Access Programs continues with recruitment of students for the redesigned Employment and Community Studies (EACS) program. We have had 250+ attendees resulting in 75 applications to KPU/EACS. The department team has offered many online and in-person information sessions over the past 5 months as well as participating in community transition events. EACS has been well received by the community. The choices future students now have to select courses and semesters with fulltime or part time options are a welcomed new program format. Credits (preparatory) leading to a Citation in Employment and Community Studies have added to the credibility of the program as well.

SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

- EU faculty member Sue Lee recently responded to a BCCampus call to support UFV researchers Drs. Candy Ho and Linda Pardy who were conducting a study to "explore faculty perception on knowledge transfer and career development." Sue noted it was inspiring to chat about the ways that Upgrading instructors play a key role in getting students to think about applying skills to professional settings.
- Dr. Teresa Swan presented the Employment and Community Studies Program at the ASE Articulation meeting May 25, and she and Gillian Sudlow will present their work on E-Portfolios at the Selkirk College Teaching and Learning Conference on June 8.

EVENTS:

- The Arts Annual Faculty Meeting was held via Microsoft Teams on Wednesday, May 4th, with a Star Wars theme, featuring a Yoda icebreaker, a Pecha Kucha panel and Entertainment Arts introductions.
- Psychology Honours Thesis Defenses: The Psychology Department held its annual honours student thesis defenses on April 25, 2022. Thirteen students presented and defended their theses, and all performed extraordinarily on the examination. The event was held in person, while offering a remote online option.
- Open Doors, Open Minds: an annual event held to welcome Indigenous secondary school students to KPU by experiencing a hands-on approach to learning for the first time. On April 28th Indigenous high school students spent the day visiting "mock" classrooms, participating in active demonstrations with hands-on experiences, and learning about the different programs that KPU has to offer. The Faculty of Arts hosted a Journalism and Communication Studies mock classroom titled "Fake News." This activity encouraged students to read a variety of news stories to determine what articles were real. The "Fake News" mock classroom was held by Chad Skelton, Journalism and Communications Studies Chair.

Austen and her contemporaries, culminating with Canadian authors Chelene Knight and Madeleine Thien. In alignment with International Women's Day, the panel highlighted how women have shaped, and continue to shape, our literary history and contemporary culture through their artistic work and the stories they tell.

All are working as Field Technicians, in three different areas: Environmental Due Diligence & Remediation; Hazardous Materials; and Indoor Environmental Quality. - Our 4th year Physics for Modern Technology students completed a number of impressive final year projects this year. Notable mentions go to Ben McClennon's suntracking photovoltaic system and George Tso's raman spectroscopy system in collaboration with Surrey-based company Teledyne Photometrics. The practical projects continue to be a huge factor in the employability of our students.
- KPU Brewing students Mike Patterson and Michael Hodgson's Signature Series beer, Summertime Witbier, won bronze at the 2022 Canadian Brewing Awards (CBA) on May 14th in the German style (weiss) wheat beer category. Brewing instructor Jon Howe, who helped the team brew their Signature beer again for this competition, attended the awards ceremony in Calgary and accepted the award on behalf of KPU.



PROGRAM/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

- KPU's Physics department program review committee completed the self-study portion of the Physics for Modern Technology program. The study found satisfaction in the course from current students and alumni as well as support for its aims and the quality of students produced from employers. The study also outlines potential strategies for growth of the program. In line with the findings of the self-study the department is renewing its marketing strategy and is in particular looking for ways of increasing retention of the large number of students who come through our first-year programs as well as developing alternative pathways for students to join the program via other routes.
- In Summer 2022, Jennifer DeBenedictis (PHYS) is trialing a fully-paperless laboratory report system for the Phys 1100 labs. Students are taught easy ways to capture images of either hand-written work or data captured by computer program, and how to paste those images into a digital lab workbook. Later, the lab instructor runs a VBA macro of Excel to copy the student's work into a marking rubric. This rubric allows the instructor to grade and comment upon their student's work with just a few mouse clicks. A second VBA macro converts the completed rubric into a PDF that can be returned to the student. This paperless lab report system both saves students money at the bookstore, and makes grading easier for their lab instructor.



INTRODUCTION

It has been a whirlwind three months since the last report. The major theme of this period has been connections and engagement. The re-emergence from a post-pandemic hibernation has meant that we have run straight into all the social, community, business and industry connections that were allowed to lapse or atrophy due to Covid restrictions.

Although our student engagement activities never quite slowed down, it has been great to be able to support our students in their career and community building activities.

Community Engagement has been a process of reaching out and connecting with all the past and future community partners that have emerged in the last two years. We are busier than ever connecting and ensuring that Faculty of Trades and Technology is an integral part of the South Fraser community, though our connections reach from Squamish to Hope.

Finally, the beginning of KPU Tech Campus Coffee and hosting KPU Day on our campus allowed us to connect in-person with many of the people who work at our institution. Career Development

- May 25 Joel took part in the ITA webinar on Automotive Service Technician: Program Updates and Moving to the Single Credential. The hosts discussed timelines for moving from progressive exams to standard level exams (SLEs), as well as what to set the percentages to for institutional coursework and versus the ITA exam.

BCATTA

BCATTA members are administrators from public post-secondary institutions across BC which offer trades training funded by the ITA. 

PRESENTATIONS/ COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

CPHR Conference

Staff from the Melville School of Business Dean's office (Matt White and Alysha Karpun) attended an in-person CPHR Conference alongside FSO staff (Alex Leach) on April 26 and 27. The Melville School of Business booth saw a lot of traffic with the goal to not only promote our programs, but also build rapport with potential employers for the Melville Business Strategy Internship program. The Conference also had an online portion May 4-5 where we were able to promote the above as well as our website and social media pages, as well as capture a list of warm leads!

North Delta Rotary Club's Starfish Program

Faculty of ACCT John Shepherd's Rotary Club's Starfish pack program is now dropping off 132 food packages a week at North Delta Elementary schools, costing \$2,500 per week. Federal emergency COVID funding is finished, though it obtained \$80,000 from sundry sources. Other Rotary members accessed an additional \$38,000 in funding from different sources. The Club got initial approval from the City of Delta for its ecological park concept. Now, Club members will fine tune the MOA for approval first by municipal staff and then by City council. The Club approved \$5,000 for the project. John figures that using that as seed funds, along with the municipal contribution to the project, it can be magnified to \$50,000 to conduct phase one of the park project for supplies, along with "sweat equity" of the volunteers to do the grunt work. The Starfish program operates out of Delta Assist on 120th Street which isn't too far from KPU's Surrey campus. The volunteers package food deliveries from Save-on-Foods on Thursday mornings. The volunteers are senior citizens and deal with approximately one ton of food per week (130 food packages, helping to feed approximately 300 elementary school children).

Melville Business Strategy Internships

The Melville Business Strategy Internships applications opened for the September 2022 intake to both students and employers. 33 applications were sent to Mitacs for approval for funding for the May internship intake. As of May 19, 45 students have applied for the September intake.

ACHEVE Case Competition

The Melville School of Business sent four BBA students to the ACHIEVE Case Competition in Toronto, Ontario from April 28-May 1. Faculty member and coach Laurence Ling accompanied the team.

In a letter to the Dean's office, the participating students (Micah Sherart, Megan Ellis, Simrat Gill, and Harika Singh) said: "The 18th annual ACHIEVE 2022 conference and competition was a valuable experience with several precious lessons. The theme this year was "The Intangible Shift," with a strong emphasis on crypto-assets. Daily workshops imparted insights from PwC on crypto-usage and from Richter who shared advice



on networking.

Of the 13 teams competing, Toronto Metropolitan placed 3rd, Ontario Tech 2nd, and the University of Saskatchewan placed 1st. Speaking with the top three teams we noted common success factors. Most attended Achieve previously, students had defined team roles, and many members were expecting to graduate next year. Networking events included participants from a variety of public/private practitioners, recruiters, and industry professionals. Developing contacts in Toronto was also extremely valuable as we met common corporate sponsors and recruiters found in Vancouver. Achieve was a memorable event that will facilitate our ability to find work with national/international companies locally represented.

We were also eager to learn how other universities manage inperson case competitions. Each of us connected with organizing students, volunteers, members of TMU's accounting society. Our roles as member of ASK at Kwantlen place us in a position of privilege to share findings should KPU choose to host a similar event.

We are grateful to have represented our school at this conference and would like to thank KPU for making this possible."

Lindsay Wood: JEDI Award

On May 6th at KPU Day, School of Business Co-op Instructor Lindsay Wood was awarded a Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) Award from the President's Office for her work in developing Anti-Racism resources, curriculum, and professional development to increase inclusion and belonging for students engaging in work-integrated learning opportunities. Projects have focused on exploring emotional intelligence from an intercultural perspective, addressing UNESCO SDGs and practicing team and intercultural skills.

Students will participate in class and as research assistants, and Stephanie plans to draw on knowledge from across KPU.

The Office has embarked on a strategic planning process.

- Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani, AVP, Teaching and Learning, continues a listening tour of academic departments in conjunction to strategic planning with the Office of Teaching and Learning. Dr. Jhangiani has visited a total of 24 departments, as well as the Faculty of Trades and Technology Faculty Council.
- Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani chaired the latest meeting of the Quality Enhancement Working Group of the BC Digital Learning Advisory Committee. This group has drafted guidelines that will be considered by the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training prior to a wider consultation process this summer.
- Upon her return, Dr. Marcelina Piotrowski has assumed stewardship of the university-wide Academic Integrity Strategic Advisory Committee. The group has been formed in order to provide input and feedback on related questions, research, and potential strategies. Regular updates from this body will be provided at the meetings of the Senate Standing Committee on Teaching and Learning.
- On May 11, the Senate Standing Committee on Curriculum approved the draft definitions and categories for course delivery models, along with the related guidance for course planning and scheduling. This was preceded by approval from SSCTL on May 5. This motion was approved by Senate on May 30
- Dr. Rajiv Jhangiani joined other members of leadership, staff, faculty, and students in a series of meetings on May 9 & 10 designed to assess KPU's capacity to serve adult learners. These sessions were led by representatives of the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL).
- Dr. Jhangiani designed and delivered training for members of the Senate Micro-credentials Committee on May 13.
- Alana Abramson (Faculty of Arts) continues her work on a project related to restorative justice and academic integrity, with plans for a self-paced module, educational video, and policy recommendations, among other deliverables expected soon.
- Heather Clark (Wilson School of Design) has completed the development of PLAR Assessor Training Materials as part of a Ministry-funded project to pilot strategies to better serve working adults and lifelong learners. More information on how to access this new training opportunity will be shared with faculty and instructional staff.

- Since establishing the Digital Badge Committee (DBC) in December 2021, which holds a mandate to review and approve KPU Digital Badges, the DBC has approved its first two digital badge proposals: Respectful Workplace Training for Employees and Respectful Workplace Training for Managers. ePortfolio Institute Team Request for Student Assistants in Support of ePortfolio Advancement at KPU. Overview: To advance ePortfolio use across KPU, a team from the Teaching and Learning Commons (TLC) and the Wilson School of Design (WSD) were accepted into the 2022/2023 AACU ePortfolio Institute. By supporting the implementation of ePortfolios in the WSD program-wide, knowledge gained and resources developed will be accessible to support the broader KPU community.

- Kristie Dukewich, Faculty of Arts. Project title: Investigating Effective Multimedia Design in the Context of Semester-Long Courses. Overview: Multimedia learning takes place when people learn from images and words together. Research and theory from cognitive psychology, social psychology, and instructional design have all be used to propose and investigate specific design principles for effective multimedia learning. In this study, we will be applying multiple multimedia design principles at once to evaluate the importance of multimedia design in the context of an actual classroom environment.
- Tara Lyons, Faculty of Arts. Project title: A Study Examining the Experiences of 2SLGBTQ+ KPU Students. Overview: The goal of this project is to better understand the experiences of 2SLGBTQ+ students at KPU and to investigate potential gaps in teaching, supports, and services. The data will be used to craft recommendations for KPU faculty, departments, services, and administrators to improve the experiences of 2SLGBTQ+ KPU students in classrooms and in the KPU community as a whole.

Overview: "Storying UDL" is an open-source introductory resource to Universal Design for Learning (UDL) theory and practice that centers the perspectives of disabled, chronically ill and neurodivergent students. The resource will be useful to faculty who want to embed UDL in their courses, as well as for KPU students who want to understand UDL. The project will also share voices of students with disabilities with the KPU community and invite us all to think more critically and engage more deeply with accessibility and inclusion.

New Climate Emergency Guide

KPU Library has a new Climate Emergency guide that addresses the topic and issues such as climate anxiety and taking action.

This digital information guide was designed as a place to start to educate students about the climate emergency. It offers a variety of resources on a variety of topics; for example, on climate policy on the local level, climate science podcasts, and decolonization and climate justice. We've encouraged instructors to share this with students or incorporate it into lessons. INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

Library Instruction and Assistance Activity

Our librarians continue to provide flexible options for instructors to arrange library research skill instruction. Our in-person sessions have been increasing steadily with the return to campus. Since the beginning of March, we have taught 55 sessions, and we have enjoyed seeing and interacting with our students in-person. One KPU instructor said, "My students just wanted me to pass on a big thank you for your incredibly helpful and informative sessions last week. They really appreciated you walking them through the research process in such a practical and hands on way and helping them feel less anxious about jumping into their research for this culminating project. And I really appreciated getting to sit in and hear how you led them through each research tool, step by step. "

We also continue to see regular activity from students using our virtual reference and research help chat, AskAway. In the month of March alone, KPU librarians answered 181 questions from KPU students. AskAway is collaborative service between 30 institutions across BC and the Yukon and managed by BC Electronic Library Network. In their latest report, Actions & Achievements 2021, published in May, BCELN reports an overall 62% increase in questions over pre-pandemic years, and a KPU student's feedback is quoted to say to "...keep up the good work and thank you for all the support and guidance to students during these hard times".

PROGRAMS/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

Collection Updates

We've had plenty of additions to our digital resources this season, continuing to expand our collections for our users. One of the challenges of collection development is to cover the depth and breadth our users need; this seasons' additions has helped us fill some information gaps.

The <u>B.C. Historical Newspaper Collec-</u> tion allows users to access three historical newspaper archives from the ProQuest Historical Newspapers collection. This collection includes news, editorials, ads and images from the Vancouver Sun (1912-2010), the Times-Colonist (1884-2010) and The Province (1894-2010). Newspapers



provide important content and perspectives for unique insights including Indigenous history, local industry news, and regional stories. Access to the B.C. Historical Newspaper Collection has been made possible thanks to the British Columbia Electronic Library Network (BC ELN), the BC Libraries Cooperative, and Focused Education Resources.

<u>SAGE Skills: Business</u> is an interactive resource that helps students develop business skills and transition from university to the workplace. There are five modules this resource currently covers: Data analytics, entrepreneurship, leadership, organizational communication, and professionalism. There are different types of interactive content, ranging from self-assessments, scenarios, downloadable data, written overviews, and videos.

<u>eHRAF: Archaeology</u> and <u>eHRAF: World Cultures</u> are two eresources that will be of particular interest to those who are conducting research and needing information in anthropology and primary ethnologies.


KPU Library was pleased to open a new Indigenous space and collection at our Surrey campus library this spring. It is on the ground floor of the library, across from our Research Help Desk. We hosted an intimate gathering on April 29 to officially open the space.

Rachel Chong, Indigenous Engagement and Subject Liaison Librarian. The collection features works by Indigenous authors, and $\chi^w \partial \chi^w \dot{e} \dot{\gamma} \partial m$ was designed to make Indigenous culture and history accessible. Featured elements include circular shelves—to emphasize the importance of circle learning and sharing—display cabinets for Indigenous art, and seating upholstered in a custom design by Metis artist and Wilson School of Design graduate, Jennifer Lamont.

The space was designed as place for people to gather and seek knowledge about Indigenous cultures and their land, and a place to feature the works and voices of Indigenous authors and creators.



Updated Learning Zone Signs at Surrey Campus Library

After roughly four years of temporary signage, KPU Library was pleased to install updated, permanent Learning Zone signage with the help of KPU Marketing and Facilities and funding from the Post-Pandemic Initiatives Fund. The Learning Zones at Surrey campus library help users self-select the learning environment they wish to study in.

Student space at the library spans three floors, and there are a diverse set of needs and expectations from our students. Some need to collaborate with their peers, some need a quiet place to study. With more students returning to campus, we recognized the need to prioritize our students' needs and use of space. The goal of this project was to improve student experience and use of library space by visually establishing zones and optimizing the space. We've simplified the zones, extending them to encompass each of our three floors. Providing official and clear structure for appropriate levels of noise and interaction allows our users to self-select and self-regulate their behavior. The result is a shared, harmonious space that reflects the diverse needs and expectations of students.

PRESENTATIONS/COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

- Technical Apparel Design students were hosted by Mustang Survival to learn about the local gear and apparel company's development and design process, and to tour their factory. The tour was lead by 3 alumni who are now employed at Mustang Survival.
- Industry leaders David Westwood Allula Composites, Dan Green – former Design Director of Arc'teryx, Edita Hadravska – Design Director at Aritzia, and Bart Scicchitano – Design Engineer, Fox, Race Face, Easton Cycling and Marzocchi joined the fourth year Product Design students for critiques of their final projects throughout the months of January and February. The students gained great insight through the involvement of these experts and WSD is grateful for their involvement.
- On March 14, through a third year Graphic Design for Marketing class (GDMA 3230 Marketing Communications Design 2), Corey Ripley from Exhibit A Design Group presented a guest lecture by reviewing several comprehensive case studies regarding branding and marketing projects, from start to finish, and revealed some secrets about Exhibit A's working process. The session was an in-depth "deep dive" into what is involved within a typical project from a "real world" studio. The students appreciated the level of detail Corey brought to his presentation.
- Interior Design faculty member, Paola Gavilanez, moderated the Interior Design Keynote for Buildex on March 24, 2022. The theme of this year's keynote was the future of work. The pandemic changed how people live and work. In this "In Conversation with" session, participants were asked what the before and after looks like for interior designers and their practice. The session was sold out and well received!



- Year 4 Interior Design students presented their final capstone projects (typically 20,000 sq ft) of a repurposed building using a specific typology to redesign. Students researched and articulated their clients, topic, and building. Projects ranged from affordable multi-housing, to a micro-brewery, to second stage housing for women fleeing domestic violence. This presentation event was held on the 4th floor of the WSD. Various industry professionals were on hand to critique the final projects including: Chip and Summer Wilson, Stuart Rothnie - HCMA; Danielle Nelson - Michael Green Arch; Sandy Fraser - Fraser Design Inc; Sara Remocker - DIALOG; Jenica Lee - CHIL; Shelley Penner - Penner & Assoc.
- Second year final presentations for residential projects occurred on Apr 12. Guest reviewers included Jennifer McRoberts, KPU grad and principal at Bethink Interiors; Dyvia Dias, KPU grad and designer at Westbank; Joanne Wong, KPU grad and designer at Perkins & Will; and Jade Crabbe, KPU grad currently finishing her master's at SFU and owner of Green Jade interiors.
- Graphic Design for Marketing faculty member John Belisle delivered several "illustration for design" workshops this past spring at local Richmond and Vancouver high schools. The workshop, delivered in person, was designed to lead students through a typical design process from brief (design a community stamp) to sketching and ideation, to good roughs, to critique, using basic analog materials. The workshops are a great opportunity for WSD to make direct contact with art and design teachers in the Lower Mainland and to introduce students to new skills and to creative engagement. John Belisle and Carley Hodgkinson will continue to offer high school workshops this coming fall, in collaboration with the Future Students' Office.

PUBLICATIONS/SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

Graphic Design for Marketing faculty members Erin Ashenhurst and Carley Hodgkinson travelled to New York City from May 13 to 17 to attend the NYCxDesign Festival, a 10 -day event featuring art, architecture and design. As part of the festival, they attended four open studio tours at the Brooklyn Navy Yards: SIN, a ceramics and housewares studio; Hush, an experience design firm specializing in data mining and light installations for Google, Meta, Nike and HBO (photo attached); Terraform, a futurist collective looking at sustainable building materials; and Bednark, a full service manufacturing firm working with high end retail clients like Balenciaga to build custom storefronts and experiences.

INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

 On March 2, Charline Meyer (Fashion Marketing 2021, Grad) visited the Fashion Marketing 2nd year Fashion Buying class as a virtual guest and shared her experience as an industry professional. After she moved from France to Canada a few years ago, she worked at Aritzia as Accounts Payable Coordinator and Product Coordinator. She is currently working at MEC as an Associate Product Line Manager.

- Work has been completed on a Beta-version of the WSD Materials Library. It was developed by Product Design Student Research Assistants Rebekah Mercs (3rd year) and Bailee van Rikxoort (4th year) under the supervision of Sue Fairburn and Melanie Bland. Funding for the project was provided by the Teaching and Learning Innovation Fund.
- Technical Apparel Design students went on a kayak tour of Say Nuth Khaw Yum park (Indian Arm) on April 8th, with Deep Cove Kayaks, to gain first-hand experience with technical apparel challenges within BC's outdoor environment.



Students from the Wilson School of Design recently travelled to Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec City as part of KPU's 2022 Design Field School. This is the first time in two years that faculty and students were able to embark on travel as part of KPU. Two faculty accompanied 20 students on this field school experience from April 26 to May 10, 2022. The scholarship includes admission to this year's DesignThinkers Vancouver conference as well as the opportunity to introduce a speaker onstage.



The professional work-integrated learning that 3rd year Fashion and Technology students manage is always growth-filled and diverse. The group spends the fall semester completing personal and professional skill and goals assessments. They research companies and roles that align with career aspirations. They consider where they can apply tools and practice workplace scenarios of interest. Building portfolios, refining resumes, practicing mentor chats, setting up interviews, coordinating schedules - all done by the students, with guidance and coaching. The students complete their practicum work hours throughout the spring and summer terms. The program worked with grad entrepreneurs and new contacts at many companies including John Fluevog Shoes, lululemon, ArcTeryx, Allison Wonderland, Vitae Apparel, Revol Undies, Free Label, Made Outdoor and Paper Label. Students have thrived and below are two summaries from students about what they learned and how they secured employment with their chosen partners.

Emma Samson: lululemon

"Throughout the fall semester, I prepared for my practicum placement by creating an online portfolio. I had the opportunity to be matched up by with a mentor to give me feedback and share their own experiences to help me in my preparation for the industry. My semester prepared me well as I worked at lululemon working closely with the Men's Bottoms team focusing on men's mainline 'sweat' bottoms and underwear. In this placement, I navigated the working world as I shifted from the educational setting. There were many differences between working and being a student but I was able to apply many hard and soft skills that I have learned throughout the program. Some of the skills that were required were Microsoft Excel and Adobe Illustrator with which I learned to be proficient because of my practice and experience through the program. Other skills I used were my attention to detail, organization, and strong verbal and written communication skills. Being a student with a full course load helped me gain resilience through managing multiple tasks and competing priorities which I constantly had to be conscious of while working. These skills, learned and developed through my course instruction, allowed me to excel at my practicum

placement. I have had the opportunity to stay on with the Men's Product Development Team in a support role during the summer. It has been an extremely valuable experience which will help me grow in my final year as well as when I enter into the workforce. I cannot emphasize enough how important this experience was for me as a student as it readies me for the workforce with a renewed confidence."

Alex Taras: Made Outdoor

"Our first semester in preparation for the practicum was a very exciting and informative time in learning about myself and what role(s) would best fulfill me in our widescoping industry. I was connected with Fashion and Technology alumni, Cheryl LeBarr who owns MADE Outdoor, an apparel brand. All the practical skills I've been taught at the Wilson School of Design have translated directly into my practicum and now work experience at MADE. I've done a touch of drafting, a lot of Illustrator work, applied my textiles knowledge for materials sourcing, construction knowledge for manufacturing prep, and creative design processes for my own projects within the scope of the company (a privilege I have at the startup)."

PROGRAM/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

 The Foundations in Design program held a small year-end social on April 11th to celebrate graduating students of the program at the Wilson School of Design.



- The Product Design fourth year class held a year-end, inperson graduation exhibit on April 21st. Students presented their capstone projects to guests, including industry representatives, KPU and family supporters. The third year students presented their major group project as well.
- On Thursday April 28th, the graduating class of the Fashion and Technology program hosted a designer spotlight event on campus. Graduates displayed their portfolios, prototypes and process work from thesis collections that they have been working on throughout the year. Friends,

family, industry partners, community members, and the KPU community were invited to attend. At the event we saw applicants and incoming students, alumni, and many others. Many of the alumni and industry partners came to take part in the event and see what graduates had worked on in addition to doing some recruiting for job openings. The Fashion and Technology faculty could not be more proud of these graduating students and their accomplishments. They not only overcame the challenges presented by the onset of the global pandemic near the end of their second year, but have completed some outstanding work!

 Graphic Design for Marketing held its annual grad event on Friday, April 29. 4th-year students organized a virtual showcase called "The Last Stop" in which industry guests were invited to share snacks and stories while viewing prepared videos of student portfolio work. The 22 graduating students were split into two sessions, with about 60 industry members in attendance, including Domain 7, St Bernadine, ZAK Creative, ION Design, Porchlight Press, Studio Think and Will Creative. The event was fun, fast and well-received, and led to the unveiling of the grads' portfolio website. The students created a social media campaign, website and designed custom picnic boxes for the event. This video link is a sample of their work for the semester and a short look at the event.



- High schools have been quite keen to come onto campus for building tours and to introduce their students to WSD programming. On May 17th we hosted a group of 40 students from Nanaimo District Secondary School with students engaging in a workshop about careers in the fashion industry with KPU faculty member Sharon Greeno, and a workshop in one of our production labs to make a zippered bag, led by program chair, Heather Clark. We saw 18 students from Semiahmoo Secondary in Surrey on May 20th, and these students engaged in a workshop in the production lab on campus and made their own "tool rolls". All school visits have been supported in building tours by FSO team member, Amanda Naseri, and by a team of outstanding Fashion and Technology student volunteers.
- On May 11th, the board members and new executive director of the BC Apparel and Gear Association (BCAG) met on campus at WSD with some members of the BC Fashion

Educators Coalition. Fashion and Technology program chair, Heather Clark took part in this productive and insightful conversation, in which both groups shared insights and highlighted areas of need and support. The groups plan to meet again in the coming fall, and in the meantime look forward to working on a number of initiatives which will provide opportunities for collaboration.

- Graphic Design for Marketing held their spring Advisory Committee meeting on May 11. In addition to updates on program changes, eight 3rd-year students attended the meeting to show work and receive industry feedback. The portfolio review sessions were followed by a Q + A, with questions prepared by students, including: "How do you manage creative blocks and lack of energy to design?"; "What are some common errors that young designers and students make in their work?; and "What are some important skills you look for when hiring a young graphic designer, besides their design skills and knowledge?".
- The FASN 3900 Special Topics Specialty Machinery course was held from May 10-26 on campus. Students learned how to use the specialty machines with a focus on knit and tech wear.



Office of the Vice President, Students

The following reports from Student Services (Office of the Registrar, Student Affairs and International) outline the key activities undertaken recently by the departments under the Vice President, Students. Scotiabank Strive

The KPU Scotiabank Strive dual credit program successfully launched in the spring, funded through a ScotiaRISE grant in collaboration with the Future



Students' Office. This initiative will provide high school students with dual credit post-secondary education opportunities, mitigating barriers and challenges that stood in the way of considering post-secondary. Students will benefit from all the supports available to them at KPU while earning high school and post-secondary credits. The program will run over six semesters, alternating between Surrey and Richmond school districts.

The Spring 2022 semester saw the successful completion of the debut term of the Scotiabank Strive program with 14 students who completed ARTS 1100

New EducationPlannerBC (EPBC) Module

KPU worked with EPBC to implement the latest EPBC module, which most notably included the AEST preferred gender question on KPU's online admission application to provide a more inclusive experience for our students. As part of this roll out, students are also able to view and update their gender in online self-service. With EPBC requiring all institutions to move to this module by the fall, KPU is one of the first institutions within the province to implement the update.

Admissions Selection Improvements for Nursing Program

The Admissions and Systems team has worked with IT over several months to implement a new admission selection process for the Nursing program. This new process will be expanded to also support admission selection for Psychiatric Nursing.

Fresh Look for SES and FSO

Student Enrolment Services (SES) and the Future Students' Office (FSO) were given a fresh new look incorporating Indigenous artwork by KPU alumni Roxanne Charles, incorporating *Welcome You All* messaging with the KPU timeless colours.





Final Grade Entry Receives Makeover

Enhanced functionality has been added to faculty online selfservice, providing faculty with a user-friendly interface to update or enter final grades, with the added function of exporting final grade lists to a spreadsheet.

Simply Voting - Senate Election Spring 2022

The KPU Senate election was held in late March using a new voting platform called *Simply Voting*, a popular voting management software for post-secondary institutions. While the faculty seats were acclaimed, the Student Representative to Senate online election ran smoothly, with 488 votes being cast.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

Student Academic Standing

KPU has pursued a coordinated effort toward the improvement of student academic standing rates, defined as an overall cumulative GPA of 2.00 or higher. A *Student Success Task Force* chaired by the AVP, Student Affairs was established in 2019. An early outcome from the Task Force was the establishment of an Academic Standing Dashboard through KPU's Office of Planning and Accountability. There are now five years of data available through this dashboard showing substantial improvement in student academic performance. Overall, between the fall of 2017 and the fall of 2021, we've seen the number of international students <u>not</u> in good academic standing reduced from 32% to 16% and for domestic students across the same period, a reduction from 16% to 9%.

With more analysis still required, it is thought that increased participation and enhanced programming in key orientation events, greater awareness and integration of student supports and services through KPU faculty, and policy enhancements providing students with greater flexibility for adding/dropping courses are significant contributors to this improvement in student academic standing.

Co-op Employer Recruitment & Information Sessions

Virtual co-operative education employer recruitment and information sessions saw 65 participants per session in an interactive overview of the program showcasing the benefits and processes of hiring a KPU co-op student.

Growth in the Career Development Centre

The Career Development Centre shows 687 new students registered on KPU's student job board, *Career Connection*, along with 180 new employers. A remarkable 1,394 employment opportunities were posted, with students assisted through 121 career advising appointments.

Co-operative education saw 434 postings, 105 student placements and 131 Info Session participants this past spring. In summer term they have seen 489 postings, 97 student placements and 69 Info Session participants.

Assessment & Testing Services on the Move

The Assessment & Testing Services (ATS) team moved from KPU Surrey Main to a new location in the Fir building. The ATS

administrative office is now located in Fir 118, which is separate from the testing centre next door in Fir 116. The access exam room has been temporarily relocated from Main 161 to Fir 114, pending the installation of 2 pods in Fir 118 to support accessibility students with quiet, private spaces for their exams.

Sport & Recreation Tournaments Begin

The Sport & Recreation department recently introduced a shortened intramural tournament season. Volleyball, badminton and basketball leagues ran for five weeks and had a total of 144 participants. This is a great increase in overall participation, as pre-pandemic data showed only basketball having sufficient registrants to move forward with an official league.

Peer Wellness Team Back on Campus

The Peer Wellness Team, comprising a student assistant and several student volunteers, welcomed back on-campus activities in April. Throughout the pandemic, the team had only hosted virtual social events and resource sessions. Over the summer the team will take a hybrid approach and host both on campus events as well as virtual sessions.

The inaugural Peer Wellness newsletter was released in May, and hardcopies are available at all drop-in sessions, while virtual copies can be found on the Peer Wellness webpage.

Multi-Faith Centre Q&A

The Multi-Faith Centre chaplains hosted a dialogue session for *First Year Festival* organized by Orientation & Transitions. This session was an introduction to the Multi-Faith Centre and the concept of chaplaincy in a post-secondary context. During this session, chaplains from various faiths and secular worldviews answered questions and discussed how they support students at KPU. This session was recorded to be posted on the MFC webpage.

Blended Academic Advising

Advisors transitioned back to campus adding in-person appointments and continuing with online advising services to better meet student needs. 2,296 appointments were booked with 64 in-person at the Surrey, Richmond and Langley campuses while the remainder were facilitated online.

Advisors supported increased numbers of students being referred in the *Early Alert* program. In this reporting period, 152 student referrals occurred after triaging 1,526 referrals. Over the past year, advisors served 2,056 referrals, a 17% increase from the previous year.

In collaboration with high school counsellors, advisors have facilitated the pilot program *Headstart*, referring at-risk secondary students to a dedicated advisor in their first year at



KPU to navigate their transition to university. In its first year, the program established the opportunity for proactive reach out, creating a deeper connection between students and advisors, allowing students to feel comfortable asking for support prior to challenges arising.

Summer New Student Orientation

The Summer New Student Orientation took a hybrid approach, including an in-person component with 758 students attending *KPU Welcomes You* at our Langley, Richmond and Surrey campuses. The Online Orientation Moodle module had 848 participants, and 2,656 students viewed the Live Virtual Orientation. Over the course of the programming, 28 orientation and 19 event production assistants volunteered their time and talents to support the initiatives.

Peer Mentorship Kicks Off

In the pilot year of the student mentorship program *KPU Collective*, 192 new students participated and connected with 17 student leaders participating in events and workshops that support their transition to university life.

Student Awards and Financial Assistance Broadens Reach

The Student Awards and Financial Assistance (SAFA) department received 460 completed general awards applications. We are excited to see a 15% increase in applications from the previous program year and to coordinate the awards program in celebration and support of KPU students.

As an equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI) initiative, SAFA added an EDI self-identification question to the award application to support the increased number of diversity-based donor awards and increase student applications for EDI-based awards.

Indigenous Services for Students Welcomes Coordinator

Indigenous Services for Students is pleased to announce that the Coordinator, Indigenous Student Transition and Engagement position has now been filled by Jennifer Lamont, a recent KPU graduate. The coordinator is responsible for delivering specialized, culturally-relevant programming that supports the transition and engagement of a diverse Indigenous student population at KPU. Jennifer will be working directly with Indigenous learners to provide guidance, advice, programming and events.

Student Affairs Goes to School

We're sharing in the excitement and sending our collective best wishes to two members of the Student Affairs management team who are embarking on educational journeys as doctoral students in 2022/23. Lisa Higashi, Director of Student Success, has been admitted to Colorado State University's PhD in Educational Leadership, and Paula Broderick, Manager of Orientation and Transitions, has been admitted to Lancaster University's (UK) PhD in Higher Education – Research, Evaluation and Enhancement. We wish them well as they balance these exciting educational journeys with the demands of their KPU roles, benefitting KPU and our students as a result no doubt!

We are additionally excited for two members of the Student Affairs management team who have recently completed graduate studies. Lynda Beveridge, Director of Counselling and Accessibility Services completed her PhD in Education at SFU in 2020 but was only able to participate in the pomp and ceremony of an in-person convocation this May. Jennifer Jordan, Director of the Student Rights and Responsibilities, is also participating in a convocation ceremony this June at Royal Roads University where she has successfully completed her MA, Conflict Analysis and Management.

We also offer sincere congratulations to Theresa Voorsluys, Manager of Academic Advising, who recently achieved the designation of Certified Executive Coach (CEC) through Royal Roads University. We couldn't feel more grateful to benefit from Theresa's ongoing development and significant skillset and experience in the areas of team building, leadership development and career development.

KPU INTERNATIONAL

Office of Global Engagement

Global Indigenous Learning Experience - Summer Virtual Exchange with Australia

KPU has partnered with Edith Cowan University (ECU) in Australia to host KPU Canadian Indigenous (First Nations, Métis, Inuit) students for a unique learning experience. This inaugural program is a 4-week virtual cohort experience running from June 20 - July 21. KPU and ECU Indigenous students will explore the similarities and differences between First Nations People in Australia and Indigenous people (First Nations, Inuit, Métis) in Canada. Students in the cohort will meet twice a week synchronously and will hear from Indigenous leaders and collaborate with Indigenous students from Australia. Students of this program are eligible to apply for a \$500 scholarship that will go towards their tuition at KPU.

Nottingham Trent University (UK) Partner visit – May 17

Esteemed guests from our partner institution visited the Surrey Main and Richmond campus on May 17, co-hosted by KPU International and the Faculty Arts. Nottingham Trent University's Gareth Williams (Associate Dean, School of Social Sciences) and Miriam Park (Principal Lecturer, Internationalization and External Partnership, School of Social Sciences) became two of our first visitors since 2020. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed in 2020 between KPU and NTU to facilitate Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) and Student/Faculty Exchange in the area of Arts and Design. Since then, two successful COIL projects were completed with the Faculty of Arts. Our guests enjoyed a roundtable discussion

with program chairs and faculty members of the Faculty of Arts, then went to visit the Wilson School of Design and met with Dean Andhra Goundrey.

Office of International Recruitment, Admissions and Articulation

KPU Field Representatives Visit Vancouver

KPU International Field Reps Ramit (India), Marina (Brazil), Regine (Philippines), and Sandra (Vietnam) visited our KPU Campuses in April to meet with staff, faculties, KPU leaders and tour all campuses and the Greater Vancouver area. The trip was a big success and concluded with a KPU International event at the Langley Campus.



International Admissions

As the state of COVID improves in many countries, KPU has seen significant increases in applications from emerging markets. The number of applications from Hong Kong increased by 50% compared with last year. Applications from Sri Lanka increased from single-digit last year to 47 for this upcoming Fall semester.

Admissions for 228 international students from Langara College were transitioned to KPU's new Entertainment Arts (ENTA) program for Summer 2022.



International Recruitment

KPU International is officially back on the road.

- KPU International attended an event organized by Languages Canada. More than 35 agencies from Mexico met in Quebec City to re-connect and discuss the future of this promising market. KPU International also attended the ILF student recruitment and agent event in Mexico, the ILAC student event and ICEF Agent Conference in Toronto.
- KPU International field representatives in the Philippines and Vietnam attended numerous in-person events with partner agents. Our online presence in the region through Facebook marketing has helped generate interest in our offerings and increased attendance at the education fairs we attended. For Fall 2022, Philippines surpassed Vietnam as the top source country in South East Asia (representing nearly 60% of students from SE Asia).



International Scholarships

\$100,000 in International Regional Entrance Scholarships Awarded

Twenty students from KPU's key emerging markets received scholarships of \$5,000 in recognition of their academic achievements and successes.

\$200,000 in KPU International Merit Scholarships Awarded

As part of KPU International's commitment to supporting international students' academic journey, 40 eligible students with high academic achievements received a one-time Merit Scholarship of \$5000.

Office of the Vice President, External Affairs

This report highlights the work of the Vice President External Affairs division, including Advancement, Alumni, KPU Foundation, Government Relations and Marketing and Communications.

NEW FUNDRAISING RECORDS SET

Fiscal Year 2022 was a record year for the KPU Foundation. We received a transformational gift from George and Sylvia Melville of \$8 Million to name the Melville School of Business. We also received a bequest from Evelyn Oberg for Horticulture for \$4.65 Million. KPU also donated \$7 million to the Foundation from surplus funds to reduce financial barriers for future, current, and graduating students.

In total, \$21,896,843 was raised in Fiscal 2022 to support students and applied research. While there are several extraordinary gifts in that total, the annual fundraising activity nearly doubled the previous year's activity as all signs point to a year of recovery from the economic impacts of Covid-19. In Fiscal 2022, the KPU Foundation received 4,670 donations for an average gift of \$5,116. This extraordinary year represents a 250% increase over the previous year's activity

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

KPU Government Relations is experiencing a busy Spring season with lots of engagement with our local, provincial and federal government officials. We are currently developing an engagement plan to ensure we use time effectively, while both the Legislative Assembly and House of Commons break until September.

- In collaboration with Dr. Alan Davis, KPU Government Relations will be submitting a summary to the BC Pre-Budget Consultation Committee in June covering the following topics: Support for Indigenous Students, Support for Student Mental Health, and Applied Research.
- The 2022 redistribution of federal electoral districts is underway. The Commission's current proposal, based on the latest census information, adds one additional riding to BC (increasing BC seats to 43), and proposes that Surrey's five electoral districts be redistributed into eight ridings. The current and proposed changes can be viewed <u>here</u>. Public engagements will occur between June and September 2022.
- The redistribution of provincial electoral boundaries is also underway. The Commission may recommend up to 93 electoral districts (there are currently 87 in BC). The Commission is accepting submissions from the public until May 31, 2022, and the preliminary report is expected to

MEDIA AND COMMUNICATIONS SUMMARY

February, March and April have been a busy time for a Communications team operating at half capacity for much of the period. They issued 19 media releases that garnered nearly 140,000 LinkedIn impressions and more than 20,000 Twitter impressions across 20 social media posts. Through proactive and reactive efforts, Communications was involved in almost 500 news stories with an estimated combined reach of about 1 billion readers and viewers (source: Meltwater).

Overall, KPU received 1,156 media mentions, with 918 of them being positive. Communication highlights included the launch of the Centre for Entertainment Arts (news release, website and coordinating communications among internal and external partners for transferring students), highlighting the coming addition of more than 100 nursing seats, supporting the provincial announcement regarding the next wave of electric vehicle training, and promoting the Bachelor of Fine Arts student showcase.

Communications transitioned KPU out of COVID-19 pandemic communication protocols and provided instant support for the RCMP situation on March 31.

On the web content front, revamped EDI and Trades web pages went live, refreshed content was submitted to the Wilson School of Design and the Melville School of Business for review, and initial updates for the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Science and Horticulture were drafted.

UNIVERSITY SPACE, DESIGN & CAPITAL PROJECTS

Richmond Entertainment Arts Program - KPU has welcomed students to attend the newly launched Entertainment Arts (ENTA) program classes at the Richmond Campus on May 9. The first six classrooms and five offices were prepared to support the tech-heavy program. The SE portion of the Richmond Campus Main building's 2nd and 3rd floors will undergo a refresh of the overall look and feel for September 2023 to ready an additional five classrooms for ENTA.



Spruce Building – Chemistry Lab 108 and 110 – The existing stainless steel sinks and countertops, 6 at Lab 108 and 4 at Lab 110, that were installed in Spruce were replaced with larger, deeper epoxy sinks. One of the sinks in Lab 110 is designed and installed following ADA standard requirements for physically challenged users. The millwork was replaced with lab-suitable metal cabinets.



Birch Building Entrance Lounge Furniture – Existing furniture from Surrey and Richmond was reupholstered (rather than purchasing new) to match the finishes specified for the new furniture in the Birch cafeteria.



Fir Washroom Renovation – The renovation of the 2nd and 3rdfloor men's, women's and accessible washrooms in the Fir Building is complete. The washrooms were improved with new plumbing fixtures, automated faucets and flush sensors, wall tiles and flooring, lighting, washroom accessories, and grab bars.



Fir Building Accessibility Improvements – The accessibility improvements in Fir Building are near completion. The main scope of work includes adding a ramp to the courtyard area leading to Fir, filling in the sunken study areas between Fir & Spruce, and improving the colour contrast in the interior stair steps and lighting levels in the stairwells.

Workstation Refresh – The office furniture in KPU International (Cedar 1145) and Facilities Services (Surrey Main 250) were refreshed with new open-concept workstations and ergonomic chairs.



Assessment & Testing Services – ATS was relocated from Surrey Main 138 to Fir 114, 116 & 118 at the Surrey Campus.



Surrey Room Reassignments - Storage room Cedar 1080 (10m2) was assigned to Tim Hortons to provide the additional storage required to expand menu offerings. Fir offices 2432

(8m2) and 2433 (8m2) were assigned to English instructor Asma Sayed to support her Canada Research Chair regarding research in South Asian artistry and social justice and to develop an Asian Canadian Network (SACNET).

Tech Reassignments - Classroom 2116 (77m2) was assigned to FSH as a multifunctional CADD teaching space for lectures, student project workspace and Virtual Reality (VR) computer stations. The student learning experience will be enhanced by incorporating VR technology into CADD program delivery, learning outcomes and teaching tools. Classroom 2114 (52m2) was assigned to FOTT for use as an unrestricted, generalpurpose eClassroom.

Cloverdale Security Gate Upgrades – Two automated, cantilever sliding gates with aluminum pickets were installed at the Tech Campus as part of Risk & Security's provincially funded capital project. These high-tech fencing components provide more precise control of access to the Tech Campus courtyard and enhanced security by utilizing the SmartGate system, which provides access and gate control by using an app on your mobile phone.



ANCILLARY SERVICES

FEED BC - KPU is part of the Feed BC PSI Partner Network Working Group, which delivered the 'Common Ask' letter to Compass, outlining the common interest in furthering the use and promotion of local foods on campus. The Group met with Compass at SFU to discuss targets, tracking and reporting, local food sourcing and promotion, and more sustainable solutions to disposable food packaging and cutlery within our oncampus Food Services. Compass has committed to a minimum of 30% local spending with all their current PSI partnerships.


KPU Bookstores continue to see increased foot traffic, with the start of the summer semester, especially at Surrey. The Bookstore has secured a new food provider for chocolate and sundries and has a new and broader range of grab-n-go options. Langley Bookstore has seen increased sales, specifically in food, with the cafeteria being closed. We have been working with Marketing to distribute the "welcome back" gifts, choice of either blanket or \$50 gift card for KPU crested merchandise, which has resulted in increased sales for the Bookstores.

Parking - Asphalt repair Lot L1 and L2 at the Langley Campus and Lot S4 at the Surrey Campus due to winter weather damage. KPU has awarded a long-term contract to Concord Parking Inc. for parking management services at all of its campuses. We are working through the transition plan and finalizing the details to onboard Concord with a July 1, 2022 start. The switch from Impark to Concord will have no impact on parking or enforcement rates.

MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS

Campus Interior Repainting - Significant effort was put in by Facilities teams at all campuses to refresh interior areas with a fresh coat of paint.

- KPU Tech: 14 classrooms, 1 meeting room, 4 corridors, 2 entrances, the student lounge, and the Auto Systems Laboratory.
- Richmond: Hallways around Tim Horton's and Maple Leaf World School; main atrium walls and pillars and the library arch and walls for mural installation
- Langley: Nursing main floor and atrium areas, 26 instructional classrooms, 3 meeting rooms, and 3 stairwells.
- Surrey: International offices and common area; Facilities Services; 3 main central stairwells were painted at the Surrey Campus.



Langley Crawlspace and Walkway – Structural repairs of the crawlspace were completed to provide additional structural support beneath campus chiller equipment. A protective waterproof membrane paint coating was applied to the walkway between the South and East buildings to prevent water ingress into the building structure.



Surrey Cedar Building Heat Curtains - High capacity Electric heat curtain units were added to two entry doors near Tim Hortons at the Cedar building to help reduce conditioned warm air from exiting the building during the winter months.



Office of the Vice President, Administration

Frost Free Exterior Hose-bibs Replacement - A total of 22 hose bibs were replaced at Surrey and Langley with a modern and more robust 1/4 turn unit that replaced a ten turns model prone to failure. While seemingly minor in issue, the



lack of access to exterior water supply plays a significant impact on teaching, day-to-day maintenance, and landscaping functions.

Emergency Container Outfitting - The delivery and outfitting of two new Emergency Planning storage containers at Richmond & Surrey required challenging outfitting to ensure structural strength and relative weatherproofing; measures included attaching steel shelving after it was insulated with two inches of foam.



Ministry Audits on Building Infrastructure - VFA/Gordian acts as a consultant for the provincial government to ensure all public organizations have an asset portfolio and condition assessment audit of their existing infrastructure. VFA completed their five-year repeating audit for KPU; the asset inventory includes everything from system-level lighting and fixtures & finishes to major mechanical, electrical, and building envelope systems. Information in the VFA audit guides the annual allocation KPU receives from the Ministry each year on its deferred maintenance/capital renewal program.

Carbon Neutrality – The Facilities team engaged FortisBC and met twice to discuss the use of Renewable Natural Gas as an avenue to achieve or augment our carbon-neutral goals. This measure looks promising for KPU and other institutions with the existing infrastructure that is currently heated with natural gas. Further discussions are planned. IT INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES

Mobile Workforce Project

The Mobile Workforce implementation is ongoing. Faculty transformation takes priority and to date we have deployed approximately 511 laptops to faculty. Staff laptops deployments are running in parallel and approximately 313 laptops have been deployed.

WiFi Access in Parking Lots

WiFi installation is complete. Outside wireless WiFi location maps for the new installations have been created updated to the KPU website. Hardware from the old temporary locations have now been removed. No further updates on this initiative.

Campus WAN Upgrade

Internet and campus interconnect links in Richmond, Langley and Cloverdale campuses are all being upgraded. Langley's 1GBps – 5GBps upgrade is complete as is Richmond's 1GBps – 10GBps upgrade; the latter had been particularly timely as it is

currently being used to support the Entertainments Art startup as CEA's vendor had not been able to setup their primary WAN connection in time. BCNet ran into problems with the fiber link at Cloverdale and the 1GBps to 5GBps upgrade will need to be rescheduled for June.

Digital Arts Program

IT has completed phase 1 of this initiative which involves setting up the required networking infrastructure to connect the 6 classrooms within the Richmond campus to support the new Digital Arts program. This includes the upgraded campus WAN link that the program is temporarily utilizing as the primary connection to CEA's vendor to support the digital arts program. We are in process of scheduling a test and turn-up of the primary circuit to CEA's vendor which is targeted for June.

Phase 2 which involves technical infrastructure requirements gathering and planning is underway.

AV and Digital Classrooms

- Completed 29 instructor desk upgrades run through facilities and beginning the next round of 18 required upgrades.
- The final batch of 40 Extron controller upgrades for this cycle of refresh has started – currently in procurement stage
- New classroom install (Surrey Fir 126) scheduled for June 15 2022.
- Kramer VIA firmware, server application, and desktop/ laptop software upgrades are being planned with different work groups.

IT APPLICATION SERVICES

The Curriculum Information Management System - Course (CIM) Project

The CIM project is currently planning for a soft go live in June 2022. The project team continue with data cleanup, training and documentation with a full roll-out completed by August 2022 to all curriculum developers. On the horizon for this fall is to start the next phase of the CIM project for Program development.

BANNER Cloud Migration Project

The University is underway with Ellucian to migrate the BAN-NER ecosystem to the cloud for October 2022. Currently the BANNER Cloud migration project is 2 weeks behind in completing the initial setup of the AWS cloud environment and the project team is monitoring the impact. Once KPU has access to the environment, we will move to s test migration of the BAN-NER ecosystem to the cloud.

BANNER Initiatives

The Banner teams are currently working on the bi-annual Ban-

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ner Upgrade on June 5th. Since last report the teams have implemented several features Faculty Self Service grade module, Education Planner BC upgrades, Banner Digital transformation initiatives, BANNER process improvements and working with Finance and HR on the fiscal year end. Current initiatives include, Moneris Ecommerce rewrites, Online Transcript requests, Financial Aid upgrades and a FAST upgrade.

Other Projects

- Preferred Name/Gender Updates: The preferred name committee has made several changes to current processes and applications to display preferred name where applicable, and continue to work with the team to make these changes. Also, the team continues to align changes in gender orientation identification in BANNER with the ministry standards communicated to KPU.
- Student/Employee Card Software Project: The current implementation of a new KPU Card system is nearing completion with updates to the look of the KPU Card. The new application offers more secure features and the ability for KPU to offer a mobile card platform.
- Fusion Fitness Project: The implementation of a new fitness application to allow for better management and a web interface for the KPU Fitness department. This will also allow better integration better with the KPU Card and BANNER as well as door access.
- Single Sign-on Security Updates: Implementing stricter controls around KPU single sign-on and password management.
- Bookstore Cloud Migration: Migration of the current bookstore (PrismRBS) point of sale to the cloud will be completed by November 2022.

INFORMATION SECURITY SERVICES

Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) Expansion

All third-party vendor access now requires Virtual Private Network (VPN) and MFA into on premise KPU systems as a standard to support service level agreements and system configurations. In addition, all Banner administrative access will require MFA as part of the increased security requirements for the Banner Managed Service project. This continued expansion will protect the Confidentiality, Integrity and Accessibility of KPU's data and computing systems.

KPMG Cyber Security Vulnerability Assessment and Penetration Test

KPMG has completed the Information Security Vulnerability Assessments and Penetration Testing covering all KPU Server, Network and Wireless technologies. Penetration testing (or pen testing) is a security exercise where a cyber-security expert attempts to find and exploit vulnerabilities in a computer system. The KMPG security expert could not successfully exploit vulnerabilities and access any KPU confidential of sensitive data. KPU Information Security is presently working with Information Technology to fulfill the recommendations in the KPMG report to reduce the security vulnerabilities and associated cyber risks. The overall outcomes of these assessments show that KPU Information Security and IT has been successful in reducing Information Security risk at KPU.

Staff Security Awareness Assessments and Training Program for High Risk KPU Departments

Targeted phishing simulations and security awareness assessments for high risk departments is presently underway. The outcomes of theses assessments for IT, HR, Office of the CFO have demonstrated that the Information Security Awareness program has been successful in greatly reducing the risk of staff falling victim to phishing threats. Assessments are presently underway for International and Student affairs. Ongoing customized security awareness training programs are being developed for all departments that may store and process confidential and sensitive information.

Cyber Incident Response Training

KPU Information Security and Emergency Planning has developed and delivered successful Cyber Incident Response training for the Information technology staff. The next phase of this important training and planning is to include the IT Cyber Incident Response plan into the KPU Emergency plan to coordinate with key stakeholders like General Counsel, Privacy and KPU internal and external Communications.

Cyber Insurance Self-Assessment

KPU IT and Organizational Risk have been working with a Cyber Insurance expert from Marsh McLennan to complete a Cyber Insurance self-assessment. The assessment is now complete and the outcomes has provided insight on the type of Information Security protections Cyber insurers are looking for to successfully obtain a policy. In addition, KPU Organizational Risk uses the completed assessment when they go to market with the next Cyber insurance renewal in the fall.

CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY PLANNING ("CCP")

Pathway Toward Reconciliation

CCP has been working to support Student Services and Len Pierre to develop 'xé?el+' or a strategic pathway for KPU towards advancing reconciliation and facilitating systemic transformations. CCP is also preparing a set of Architectural and Public Realm Design Guidelines, which will build upon the KPU2050 Official Campus Plan and incorporate recommendations on incorporating Indigenous design perspectives.

R6 Rapid Bus Line / Transit Plaza

CCP is working with TransLink and the City of Surrey as part of the R6 Rapid Bus planning to advance a more central and con-

venient "front door" stop location along the 72nd Avenue frontage of our Surrey Campus. In response, CCP has prepared concepts for an enhanced plaza area that will connect KPU students and employees taking transit with the heart of the Surrey campus. The concepts create a transit-oriented gateway for KPU Surrey and an opportunity to collaborate with First Nations to ensure Indigenous cultures and values are included and celebrated through this improvement to the campus' public realm.

Learning Gardens

CCP has been collaborating with Facilities, the Faculties of Arts and Science and Horticulture, as well as members of KPU's Indigenous Advisory Committee, on preparing design concepts for a Learning Gardens project. The Learning Gardens are among the first initiatives toward enriching the open space network of the KPU2050 Official Campus Plan (OCP), and through them the aspiration to foster awareness, dialogue, and reflection on critical issues including reconciliation, diversity, equity, inclusion and, will expand the learning environment outside, where some of our greatest teachings can be found. The Learning Gardens, emerging as a quick impact project under the OCP, will help to further support KPU's vision as a "transformational learning environment". They further KPU's goals for innovative pedagogy, and will be rooted in place, community serving, respectful to the environment and accessible to all.

KPU Surrey Childcare Facility

In April 14 2022, the Province announced that it had approved KPU's application for funding under the new child care spaces fund, which supports the design and construction of a new 61 space child care facility at KPU Surrey. This is an exciting announcement that will bring much needed child care spaces to

support KPU families and other priority communities as well support KPU's plans to establish an Early Childhood Education program.

Over the coming months, CCP will be working with a consultant team to facilitate the detailed design process and engage with Indigenous and KPU communities to ensure the future child care facility meets a broad spectrum of needs while thoughtfully and conscientiously including Indigenous values and principles.

Tsawwassen Farm School

CCP has been working with the Tsawwassen First Nations as well as Facilities Services to bring improvements to support the ongoing success and operations of the Tsawwassen Farm School. Recently, Tsawwassen First Nations has also acknowledged the good work and successes of the Tsawwassen Farm School by approving a longer-term extension to the License Agreement.

The longer term agreement improves KPU's ability to garner more resources and financial supports for the farm school, community engagement and farm development. KPU has, along with TFN, contributed resources to the development of the Farm School. The farm and farm school program is an exemplar of how an Indigenous Nation and a university can work together to advance food security and sovereignty goals.

Garden City Lands

CCP continues efforts with the Department of Sustainable Agriculture and Food Systems, Facilities Services, Risk, Security, and the City of Richmond on plans to design and construct a barn to support farm operations and securely store equipment. CCP anticipates detailed design to take place over the next few months, with construction slated for completion by end of March 2024.
