Office of the President and Vice Chancellor

Several of us are participating in a 7-session BC Campus webinar "Pulling Together" that discusses various aspects of how to work towards Reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples. After the September 29th webinar, Lekeyten and I proudly raised an orange flag at KPU Surrey to recognize the National Day for Reconciliation on September 30th.



On October 1st I was pleased to attend the Salmon and Cranberry Harvest Celebration at the Kwantlen First Nation community near Fort Langley. Here I am with KPU alumna Samantha Jack and Cheryl Gabriel, co-chair of KPUs Indigenous Advisory Committee.



On the same day, I was able to also welcome interested future students and their families to KPU Surrey's Open House, which was another great success. It was wonderful on October 4th to attend an in-person new Employee Orientation.

On October 7th many attended the launch of the Task Force for Antiracism Report, with powerful remarks from Lekeyten, Dr. Asma Sayed, Parliamentary Secretary Rachna Singh, MP Sukh Dhaliwal, and UBCs' lead on Antiracism, Dr. Handel Kashope Wright.



That evening I was pleased to attend the annual DARPAN awards, where KPU was a proud sponsor. Here I am with Anita Huberman, head of the Surrey Board of Trade and a shot of some amazing Bhangra dancing.





On October 12th I joined Polytechnics Canada colleagues in a rich discussion with the President of the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada, Dr. Alejandro Adem.

I was able to pop in and out of the Teaching and Learning Commons Appreciating Teaching Excellence events on October 13th and 14th, and on October 15th I sat at the head table with senior BC politicians at the BC-India Business Network Grand Diwali Gala in Vancouver.

Quality and Qualifications which I will report on at a future meeting, and on October 25th and 26th I attended the Universities Canada Fall meeting virtually.

October 24th was Diwali and the students at KPU organized a wonderful celebration at KPU Surrey and had my first attempt at painting diays.



The Maple Ridge needs assessment process moves slowly ahead with the procurement of the eternal consultant nearly complete, and I attended the first of several partner meetings with the community on November 1st at the School District 42 offices.

On November 2nd to 4th I was in Ottawa for the fall Board meeting of Polytechnics Canada, and on November 9th I was invited to speak by Zoom to the Centre for Higher Education Research and Development at the University of Manitoba on "The Future of Work on Campus".

The Council of Adult and Experiential Learning annual meeting was held on November 15th to 18th where I was invited to present on KPU's experience and transformation as a result of the pandemic. On November 22nd I was in Toronto for a special Universities Canada workshop on Institutional Autonomy and Academic Freedom.

On November 18th I attended the BC Cabinet and First Nations Leaders' Gathering at the Vancouver Convention Centre. The Gathering is organized in partnership between the First Nations Leadership Council and the Government of British Columbia. It is one of the largest gatherings of provincial and First Nations leaders in the country and this was its first meeting since 2019.

On November 29th I hosted another President's Dialogue with Gwynne Dyer on the topic of "Planetary Maintenance Engineers".

Attached to this report is a list of planning activities that are currently underway which the Board may be interested in hearing more about as they evolve.

PLANNING ACTIVITIES, FALL 2022

The KPU Global Task Force:

This is a group comprising faculty, students and administrators which is exploring the development of a vision and strategic direction for KPU which would feed into the next strategic plan as well as long-term financial planning. In so doing it may reimagine the role of International Education generally in area such as:

- · Reputation and brand
- KPU in a global society
- The role/impact of technology-enabled learning
- Selectivity
- Programming
- Services
- Allocation of resources among faculties and departments
- Faculty and student experiences abroad
- Academic culture
- Student Life
- Long term financial sustainability
- Global Development projects

The xé?el+ pathways:

The strategy is nearly ready, and Gayle Bedard, AVP Indigenous Leadership, Innovation and Partnerships, is now with us and a member of the Polytechnic University Executive.

The EDI Action Plan:

The EDI Action Plan is nearly complete and will help KPU address inequities among its workforce and inform organizational development, policy etc.

The Task Force on Anti-racism:

The final report is now available, an Office for Anti-racism has been established, and an Implementation Committee will be struck shortly.

KPU 360:

KPU 360 is an emerging concept whereby we are exploring new models for serving mature students.

KPU's engagement with Employers:

While KPU is very engaged with employers in our region, we will harvest all these connections to see how complete this engagement is and to identify gaps.

Succession Planning:

Section 23 of the Board Governance Manual lays out my responsibilities and that of the Board in making sure there is a smooth and planful transition for the presidency, and I report to the Board Human Resource Committee on that regularly.

For the succession of the 30 or so members of the President's Circle, Laurie Clancy and I report twice a year to the Board Human Resources Committee to identify where we have bench strength and where we are at risk: we can identify immediate, short term and long-term possibilities, and the Board itself is of course directly involved in the hiring and termination of all VP positions.

Community Scan Post-lock down:

KPU is undertaking a Community Scan of its region to inform future strategic planning. Items included for each community in the region may include (but not limited to):

- Population trends and demographics;
- Enrolment trends and demographics of the K-12 public education;
- Economic trends and plans;
- Municipal Official Community Plans;
- K-12 long range capital plans;
- Post-Secondary capital plans;
- Post-Secondary enrolment trends and demographics; and
- Status of Childcare and community partnerships.

5 Year Financial Plan:

The CFO will be developing a 5-year financial plan for KPU as we enter what many consider to be a tough and uncertain economic period in Canada.

Health Education:

In the context of the 3rd hospital being built adjacent to KPU tech in Cloverdale, an extensive consultation is underway, led by Dean Sharmen Lee, to determine KPU's role in developing the talent needed to serve the Health sector.

South Asian Community:

We will be exploring with a group of faculty and staff how KPU might better organize its interface with the South Asian community in our region.

Sustainability Development Goals:

These UN goals form a framework for considering what we do (and don't do) in advancing sustainability. Dr. Candy Ho is leading a project to take stock of KPU's current activities. This is one of a number of frameworks and benchmarking systems that the Environmental Sustainability Committee is using to track KPU's progress. The current Sustainability Framework is available here.

EXPERIENCE

- Student Satisfaction Survey: This survey collects a broad range of information from students on their experience at KPU to identify areas for improvement. After an extensive consultation process, it was launched on October 28 and closed on November 18, 2021. Reporting in this period has included presentations to Academic Council, the Enrolment Sustainable Planning Council, International, the Global Task Force, Student Services, the Disability Inclusion Group, the Pride Advocacy Group, reports on the demographic characteristics of English Upgrading students, recruitment and retention at KPU, and the results of open-ended questions throughout the survey, as well as an infographic report on the diversity of the student body.
- Sexual Violence and Misconduct Survey: OPA facilitated
 this survey on behalf of the Ministry of Advanced
 Education and Skills Training. The survey, sent to the half
 of all students enrolled in the Spring 2022 semester who
 did not receive the library survey, was launched on
 February 7, and closed on March 7. The results were
 received from the Ministry on June 1 and shared with the
 Student Rights and Responsibilities Office. Due to a low
 response rate, the results cannot be used.
- BSN-AE Community Partners Survey: This is a recurring survey that provides feedback from organizations with which Bachelor of Science in Nursing – Advanced Entry students are placed for practica, including the ease of arranging the practica and students' effectiveness within them. The survey launched April 25 and closed May 29. A report of the results was provided to the program chair on June 6.
- Program Advisory Committees Survey: This is a new survey inviting PAC members to share their perceptions regarding the effectiveness of the PAC, their satisfaction with PAC-related opportunities, and how connected they feel to KPU. The survey launched April 7 and closed on June 15. Results provided one metric in the 2021/22 Institutional Accountability Plan and Report. Further reporting is underway.
- BSN Program Completion Survey: This is a recurring survey for students about to graduate from the BSN program. Students provide feedback about the program including their development of professional competencies and overall satisfaction. The survey of the Summer 2022 graduates was launched on July 11, closed on July 24, and a report of the results was provided to the program chair on August 29.
- GNIE Graduates Survey: This is a recurring survey of recent graduates from the GNIE program, designed to provide

- feedback on the program and report on their nursingrelated work experience and readiness for nursing practice in Canada. The two most recent surveys closed on May 29 and August 4, respectively. Due to an initial low response rate, a combined report from both surveys was created and sent to the program chair on August 29.
- HCAP Graduates Survey: This is an ongoing survey of recent graduates from the HCAP program, designed to provide feedback on the program and report on their health-related work experience and readiness for practice. The survey launched August 16 and closed on September 6. A report was delivered to the program chair on September 20.
- Community Perception Survey: Conducted every few years, the Community Perception Survey asks residents of the KPU region about their level of awareness and perceptions of KPU. The survey launched June 21 and closed July 11. Results provided two metrics for the in the 2021/22 Institutional Accountability Plan and Report. Further reporting is underway.
- Senate Orientation Survey: This survey collected feedback from attendees of Senate's Orientation Day, held in August 2022. The survey was launched on September 27 and closed on October 20. A report of the results was sent to the Vice Chair of Senate on November 2.
- Melville School of Business Mission Statements Survey:
 This survey collected open-ended feedback on proposed new mission statements created by the School. It launched on October 25, closed on November 2, and the data was delivered to the School's project consultant on the project on November 2.

QUALITY

Student Success:

- Conducted research on the value of EN 12 (B) as a prerequisite for BIOL 1110. The research is being used to inform decision making on whether to keep or remove this prerequisite.
- Provided a report that would provide information to understand the path from admissions to graduation taken by International student graduates in Diploma in General Studies.

Quality Assurance Processes:

 Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR). The SSCPR approved 5 reports since September 2022, as follows:

- * 2 self-study reports;
- * 3 quality assurance plans;
- Four programs started the program review process in October 2022:
 - * Criminology
 - * Asian Studies
 - * Economics
 - Technical Management and Services
- Course Feedback: Course Feedback surveys for Summer 2022 were conducted for 1083 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 723 reports to instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors.

Accountability to Government and Partners:

- Completed the Central Data Warehouse submission to the Ministry in October 2022. This process is led by the Office of Planning & Accountability in collaboration with the Office of the Registrar, IT, and other departments.
- Submitted KPU's FY 2022-23 Interim FTE Report to the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training in November.
- Collaborated with Human Resources in preparing and making the FY 2021-22 Human Resources Data Base submission to the Post Secondary Employers Association.
- Submitted the 2021/22 Institutional Accountability Plan and Report to the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Training in mid-July. This includes information from across KPU on key initiatives carried out or being planned to address KPU's strategic priorities, as well as the Ministry's priorities set out in its mandate letter to KPU.

INSTITUTIONAL PLANNING


Integrated Planning:

- Produced the VISION 2023 Progress Report: November 2022 with an assessment of progress based on data reported in the 2021/22 Institutional Accountability Plan and Report.
- Developed an outline for the domestic enrolment strategy, pulling together data on enrolment headcounts and FTEs, unmet demand, fill rates, applicant conversion, recruitment and retention.
- Produced a report of the results of an in-depth analysis of the 2021 student satisfaction survey results to better understand factors that influence student retention.

- Developed enrolment projections for Fall 2023, and updated the projections for Spring 2023, and Summer 2023. This information was used to develop International enrolment targets and caps for Fall 2023.
- Developed tuition revenue estimates for the FY23/24 budget based on enrolment scenarios for domestic and international students in FY23/24.
- Created the Success by Discipline dashboard for chairpersons (in the School of Business, for now) to provide data needed for their planning activities.
- Created Retention dashboards specifically for Limited Intake Programs as well as one that provides an Overview of Retention at the Undergraduate and Graduate level.

Enrolment Management:

- Ongoing update of OPA Reports in Power BI, the tool KPU is now using for our dashboards. The following reports are now in PowerBI: Academic Standing, Grade Distribution, Applicant Funnel, Enrolment Tracking, Current Enrolment Report and Over-Enrolment Report. Other reports will follow.
- Updated the Over-Enrolment interactive report based on the KFA Collective Agreement Letter of Understanding. This dashboard presents both the planned and actual overenrolments in sections, courses, subjects, departments and Faculties from Summer 2022 to Spring 2023.
- Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for Spring, Summer and Fall 2023 are running currently. The dashboards are updated every Wednesday. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants, and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of International applicants.
- Applicant Tracking Reports: Provide weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted, and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted who actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for Spring 2023 and Summer 2023 are ongoing.
- Created the Stable Enrolment report for Fall 2022 as of September 20, 2022 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard.

PEOPLE FIRST CULTURE

Employee Engagement

Coinciding with the start of the fall semester, KPU Engage activities ramped up again to ensure our employees have an opportunity to connect and share interests with their colleagues. All employees are invited to partake in regular events such as virtual Jeopardy, TEDTalk Thursday, KPU Cooks, and Meowy Club.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion

On October 3rd, HR welcomed two Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Advisors to the team. They will continue supporting the HR team and the entire institution with re-examining and adapting policies and practices to align with equity, diversity, inclusion and decolonization principles.

With the goal of developing an Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Decolonization (EDID) Action Plan, the EDID Action Plan Development Committee worked hard throughout the summer to finalize a set of draft recommendations which will be shared with all employees for further feedback this fall.

HR has recently partnered with the Diversity Institute from Toronto Metropolitan University. The Diversity Institute will be supporting KPU in updating its accommodation policy, employment equity policy, and administrative search policies and drafting an Accessibility policy.

In support of KPU's commitment to the Government of Canada's 50-30 Challenge, HR's EDI team has partnered with the Office of Planning and Accountability to collect data from Senior Management and the Board. The goal of the program is to challenge organizations to increase the representation and inclusion of diverse groups within their workplaces, while highlighting the benefits of giving all people a seat at the table.

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Employee Workshops

Human Resources offered several professional development workshops to KPU employees which included: Relearning Gender; Cultivating Calm: Mindfulness, Stress and You; The Working Mind (Employee and Manager versions offered); Managing Your Money; Having the Courage: Difficult Conversations; True Colours; Gratitude in the Workplace; and The Journey to Wellness.

Onboarding and Orientation

KPU held a virtual New Employee Orientation on September 28, 2022. Approximately 30 new employees registered to attend the online event. HR also piloted a New Employee Meet and Greet where 40+ new employees gathered in-person on KPU's Surrey Campus to informally socialize and network with one another and meet the executive leadership team over light refreshments. Given the success of the event, it will be offered on an ongoing basis.

PEOPLE SERVICES

Health and Benefits

Health and Benefits has recently welcomed two new members to the team. The team has been focusing on refining practices, developing new processes, and identifying areas for improvement. Recently, KPU joined the post-secondary committee on mental health to discuss suggestions, successes, and best practices in supporting mental health in the workplace. In addition, Health and Benefits has engaged and collaborated with Sports and Recreation to identify opportunities to enhance existing wellness offerings for both employees and students.

Total Compensation

The Compensation team has launched an exciting project to refresh KPU's administrative performance management program. The objectives of the project are to assess KPU's current performance management program to identify strengths and areas of opportunity, refresh the performance management framework and design elements, and launch a new performance management program, coupled with a successful change management and engagement plan for the 2024 performance review season. The team has partnered with Mercer, a Human Resources consulting firm who has experts in the performance management space, on this project.

PEOPLE RELATIONS

In response to the growing and changing needs of the university and to ensure that HR is allocating resources to areas that best support our internal clients, the People Relations team has completed a restructure. HR budget has been reallocated to create three new Manager roles: Manager, HR Business Partnerships; Manager, HR Administration; and, Manager, Talent Acquisition and Recruitment Services.

The introduction of the Manager, Talent Acquisition and Recruitment Services and a team of recruiters, marks the creation of a new HR Center of Excellence which will focus on an essential aspect of our growing institution. The newly formed team is still in its infancy and three Talent Acquisition Specialist roles are being actively recruited for. It is anticipated that these positions will be filled in early December. The team will support the university in hiring for all excluded positions as well as provide assistance to hiring managers on hard to fill BCGEU and faculty roles. This team will also support in providing resources, training, and support to the KPU community on all recruitment related topics.

LABOUR RELATIONS

This year, KPU joined the BCGEU Multi-Employer Table (MET) for BCGEU bargaining. The MET consists of local BCGEU bargaining units and seven participating colleges and teaching universities represented by PSEA.

During the week of September 19th, the members of the MET negotiated a tentative agreement on matters that are of common interest across the post-secondary sector, including:

- a process to establish a framework for a common job evaluation plan and a common wage grid, across the sector.
- a Joint Benefits Committee.
- The Shared Recovery Negotiating Mandate (as set by the BC government) plus Flexibility Allowance (an additional 0.25 per cent of total compensation base), to be determined at the local level how this is spent.
- Retroactive to July 1, 2022.

At present, the specifics of this tentative agreement remain confidential until the conclusion of main table bargaining and ratification of the local collective agreements. At that time, the tentative agreement reached by the MET will also be ratified, and KPU will become a participating member of the common agreement.

RISK AND SECURITY

Emergency Planning

- A university-wide earthquake drill was held in October as part of the Great British Columbia Shakeout. KPU participated in the drill by testing the activation of the Emergency Notification System and encouraged the KPU community to practice their 'Drop, Cover and Hold' position.
- A KPU Safe App awareness campaign was initiated to promote and encourage staff and students to download the app. This app is a tool that will allow the institution to better communicate and send messaging to employees in the event of an emergency. The awareness campaign included increased messaging to the KPU community

- through displaying posters on sandwich boards, utilizing digital signage and posting on social media.
- Emergency procedure posters are now displayed across all campuses and outline actions to take during various emergencies. To compliment the poster, the Office of Emergency Planning is developing more comprehensive emergency procedures and working towards creating an online learning module.

Occupational Health & Safety

- KPU conducts fire drills annually as required by the BC Fire Code to help prepare building occupants for an organized evacuation in case of fire or other emergency. This summer, OH&S, in collaboration with KPU's Facilities team, scheduled and successfully completed fire drills at the Langley, Cloverdale, Richmond and Surrey campuses.
- OH&S introduced the first edition of its 'OH&S at a Glance' report. The report will be produced tri-annually to share safety metrics and trends observed at KPU with the Joint Occupational Health and Safety committees.
- OH&S successfully organized and completed its annual Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee training event. Seventeen (17) committee members attended the training which highlighted psychological health and safety in the workplace.

Risk Management

 Organizational Risk continues to collaborate with departments and KPU's insurance broker to work renewing various insurance policies (e.g. Cyber Security, Commercial Auto Fleet, and Kidnap and Ransom). New this year, Risk partnered with a professional art appraiser to evaluate KPU's art pieces spread across campuses. The in-person review of art pieces was completed in August and the results have been presented to KPU's insurer.

Security Operations

• The Security Operations team is in the process of increasing security officer staffing at several campuses in response to feedback received from the KPU community and a review of staffing levels at comparable universities. The team has provided close security support to several high-profile events including municipal election debates, student union elections, and the recent visit of a government official. Security is in the process of upgrading security incident reporting management software with an anticipated implementation date of Jan 2023. Work continues on outreach with KPU staff and building partnerships with local law enforcement.

Office of the Chief Financial Officer

FINANCIAL REPORTING


Activities, Initiatives and Achievements:

The Financial Reporting team has met a significant number of deadlines over the past months including the KPU and KPU Foundation year-end audit, Supplementary Financial Information (SFIR) report, Statement of Financial Information (SOFI) report, KPU and KPU Foundation Charity returns, quarterly Ministry reporting and multiple research reports, all while training new team members on processes and reporting requirements. The Financial Reporting team has successfully set up the structure and reporting required under the new Entertainment Arts program and completed the first reporting reguirement. In addition, the team has also set up the structure to facilitate the distribution of funds to students from the Barrier Reduction fund provided by the KPU Foundation and set up reporting processes for the year Deferral funds, to ensure appropriate reporting at year end. The Financial Reporting team has also undertaken a project to review and reconcile Special Purpose Funds in order to ensure that all remaining balances are accurate and are in line with the funding agreements.

BUDGET AND PLANNING

Staffing:

The Budget and Planning team recently welcomed Liliana Figueroa Leon as its second Financial Reporting Systems Coordinator. Liliana has been working with the Financial Operations team as an Accounts Receivable Collections Officer since early 2020. The teams are working closely to balance workload and training while the Operations team seeks a replacement for the Accounts Receivable Collections Officer position.



Activities, Initiatives and Achievements:

The Budget and Planning team is well into the development of the Fiscal 2023-24 University Budget. The team has already rolled over base, ongoing budgets and has been working with the divisional units to support them on their budget requests for the upcoming review cycle.

The Budget and Planning team significantly updated the budget process this year and has been implementing and supporting the University with this much more streamlined process. Overall, the budget is scheduled to be presented to the Board of Governors for review and approval almost two months earlier than the prior year, allowing for budget holders to plan their FY2023-24 activities before the new fiscal year begins.

The team also kicked off the Variance Reporting process in September 2022. As the team is now fully staffed, team members are beginning to perform in-depth reviews and ensure that commentary and variances are reasonable to support decision making. In addition, the team, through collaboration with Human Resources, fine-tuned their process for reviewing RFT's to ensure they were only being engaged when there is a budget risk that needs to be managed. The team is also currently assisting Financial Reporting for the capital process and this is expected to transition as the new Financial Reporting team members get up to speed and the open positions are filled.

The Budget and Planning team is thrilled to announce that Debb Moffatt, Accountant, recently successfully completed her Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA) practical experience requirements which is the final hurdle in her journey to become a designated CPA. Debb is a KPU graduate and was able to complete her experience requirements while working within KPU's Financial Services team. Well done Debb!

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

Staffing:

Nonie Wooley, a long serving Accounts Payable Clerk retired after 30 years of service to KPU. In addition, Liliana Figueroa Leon, our Accounts Receivable Collections Officer has transitioned to a new position on the Budget and Planning team. The Financial Operations team is now in the process of looking to fill these two positions.

Activities, Initiatives and Achievements:

With the help of the IT department, the Financial Operations team has moved the current travel pre-authorization paperbased approval to a paperless process. Testing is complete and training on the new online approval process will be forthcom-

ing.

The Financial Operations team, along with the Office of the Registrar, has continued to support the transition of the Entertainment Arts program from Langara College over the past few months. Work also continues on an initiative to transition all vendor payments from cheque payments to EFT payments. Doing this will reduce cheque processing costs, create efficiency and strengthen internal controls whereby vendors will be able to receive their payments quicker but also ensure operational compliance.

PROCUREMENT SERVICES

Staffing:

Procurement Services is pleased to report it is at full staffing capacity as of October 2022. Much appreciation to staff who kept the wheels turning during that time

Strategic projects in the Procurement cycle:


In October 2022, Procurement posted the following competitions: Surrey Cedar Air Source Heat Pump (HVAC) Upgrade and Badging Platform.

Welcome back to Betty Hoang, Senior Business Advisor, who has returned from maternity leave!

Activities and Initiatives:

BPAS recently conducted a Follow-Up process in September 2022 that determines whether progress has been made on previously issued recommendations. 11 additional recommendations were closed from previously issued audits, which results in 19 completed out of 41 recommendations. All of the remaining 22 recommendations are currently in progress.

ACADEMIC PORTFOLIO

In partnership with BCcampus, approximately 50 leaders across KPU have been taking part in a series of workshops entitled *Pulling Together: A Guide for Indigenization of Post Secondary Institutions for Leaders and Administrators*. Led by Dianne Biin and Dawn Smith, the seven 1.75 hour sessions began on September 15, 2022 and will culminate on December 1, 2022 with a feast at the Tsawwassen First Nation.

Policy Consultation Engine

The Provost's Office has provided draft AC9 *Skills and Outcomes* on the <u>Policy Consultation Engine</u> for feedback until October 17, 2022. Over the next few weeks, the policy writing team will consult with the Senate Standing Committees on Policy, Teaching and Learning, Program Review, and Curriculum. It is anticipated that the drafts will proceed to the KPU Policy Blog later this fall for Phase Two posting.

CURRICULUM TEAM

The course outline software, CIM-Courses, is functioning well; several outlines have progressed through their complete governance workflows and are ready for publication in the next update of the University Calendar. The contract with the software vendor includes the ability to request refinements on an ongoing basis. The Project Team receives and responds to feedback received from users and prioritizes refinement requests.

Development of the CIM-Programs software module is on schedule, and will be based on the revised Academic Policy AC10 which was implemented in January, 2022 and on the simplified Program Development and Revision forms approved by Senate in September, 2022. This module is scheduled for rollout in the 2023/24 academic year.

Work Integrated Learning (WIL)

<u>Dr. Larissa Petrillo, Lead Advisor, Work-Integrated Learning at KPU</u>

November 2022

Serving as the new Lead Advisor, Work-Integrated Learning (WIL) at KPU, Larissa Petrillo continues ongoing work with this crucial portfolio at KPU. A meeting of Practicum instructors took place on October 12, 2022 to review an updated chart of Work-Integrated Learning offerings at KPU. Dr. Petrillo will be working with Marketing to incorporate the material into the revised site for experiential learning at KPU.

<u>Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh, Lead Advisor, Disability, Accessibility, and Inclusion</u>

Main Activities

IACP Admissions Pathway

The main focus in April-May was creating an admissions category for new IACP students.

Individuals with intellectual and or developmental disabilities experience a wide range of K-12 educational opportunities in BC. Most students with intellectual and or developmental disabilities have the label "special needs" which requires them to have Individualized Educational Plans (IEP). These individualized educational plans generally mean they will receive different certificates than students without disabilities. This subsequently limits their opportunities for enrolling in education at higher levels.

Because students with intellectual disabilities are often funneled into the Evergreen pathway and denied taking the required academic courses in high school, these students cannot meet the basic admission requirements of KPU. Because we are aware of these barriers, we needed to create a new pathway for these students. By creating a specific pathway into KPU, IACP is addressing educational discrimination and creating a wide, institutional support structure so that students with disabilities can succeed. Students won't be welcomed into IACP without going through an admission process and they won't be placed in classes without instructor approval and without supports. The entire process from admissions, course selection, course instruction, graduation is designed to address systemic discrimination while supporting learners and faculty.

The Lead Advisor had meetings with OREG and Associate Vice-President, Academic, to create a suitable pathway. It was decided that students would use the existing General Interest (GI) Admissions Category as the pathway. Students using the GI, do not have to satisfy any academic requirements. They can take up to 12 credits before having to satisfy the English requirement. The first two-three IACP courses are supporting students with expressing how they learn, expressing their knowledge, identifying any accommodations or additional supports, and fostering the culture of being a student. This will help students build confidence in their academic abilities. After completing up to 12 credits, students will satisfy the English requirement by either taking the English Proficiency Test (EPT) or English 1100 or 1200.

The final admissions process includes the following:

- An applicant pursuing the Including All Citizens Pathway (IACP) may be considered on an individual basis through a holistic assessment of educational background, life experience, academic goals, and personal achievements.
- Each applicant under the IACP admission category will be

- evaluated by the IACP Admissions Committee composed of the Lead Advisor, one faculty member and IACP instructor/ mentor, one EACS faculty member, and one representative from Admissions.
- The evaluation can include but is not limited to, an interview, official letters of recommendation including letters from MCFD Navigators, and community endorsement. The committee will have the authority to recommend to the Registrar students for admission and determine if specific conditions are required for enrolment.

IACP Applications

The Lead Advisor created an IACP webpage that provides a brief over-view of the pathway and how to apply as well as an IACP email address. She held two online zoom info sessions for potential students, family, and Ministry of Child and Family Development (MCFD) Navigators. For sustainability, the Lead Advisor will start working with FSO on ways to advertise the pathway with the goal of having application deadline in March with Interviews in early May.

In consultation with OREG, Lead Advisor created an accessible Expression of Interest (EOI) Form in plain language for IACP applicants to fill out and submit. EOI form is used for students applying under the General Interest Admissions Category. Lead Advisor will work with OREG to transform the standard EOI form into one that is fully accessible and in plain language.

In consultation with MCFD key advisor, Meaghen Taylor-Reid, IACP instructor/mentor Dr Jennifer Hardwick, IACP instructor/mentor and UDL Fellow, the Lead Advisor created an interview process and template. Pat Foreman, Education and Community Studies (EACS) Program and Dr. Jennifer Hardwick were included in the interview process. Nine applicants were shortlisted for interviews. Zoom interviews were held between June 24-July7. Seven applicants were chosen to start Fall 2022.

Lead Advisor sent out letters of acceptance and started preparing the new students for registration and orientation. Held orientation tour for new students on August 31. Elder Lekeyten and Cheryl Gabriel welcomed the students. Worked with OREG in getting the students registered in their classes. Throughout July-August the Lead Advisor was corresponding with new students and/or family members.

- An accessibility guide committee has been created with Trina Prince (Manager of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion) that will include guidance on digital accessibility
- Secured two new faculty members to join the IACP team to teach POL 1200 and SOCI 1125 starting Spring 2023.
 Discussions and meetings are taking place for two additional faculty to start teaching new courses in Fall 2023

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

The academic integrity team has established a Communicating Risks of Contract Cheating Working Group to investigate how to communicate the risks of extortion and contract cheating to students. This group includes representatives from Legal Counsel and the Students' Rights and Responsibility Office.

A website dedicated to academic integrity (www.kpu.ca/academicintegrity) launches October 17, the start of Academic Integrity Week. The website is intended to provide easy-to-understand information about ST2 Academic Integrity Policy and Procedures, as well as educational and prevention information on academic integrity. This launch marks the completion of Phase 1 of website development. Phase 2 will focus on translating the website and expanding the resources available.

The academic integrity team has organized workshops, talks, and a panel for students and faculty throughout Academic In-

tegrity Week (October 17-21). The academic integrity team will also be interacting with students at booths at all campuses during the week.

A project was launched to implement Turnitin software effective Summer 2023. Turnitin is a Moodle-integrated plagiarism detection software.

The team met with the Learning Centre team to give an overview of academic integrity violation reporting and investigation process as well as the key trends and themes in academic integrity in order for staff to be better supported in conversations with students.

PRESENTATIONS/COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

- The Appreciating Teaching Excellence event, hosted by the Teaching Commons, provided an opportunity for TLC faculty Jovita Vytasek and Alice Macpherson to present KPU 100. As well, Lee Beavington presented a PechaKucha Sharing, Wild Spaces: The Power of Place-based Education. Supported by KPU's Teaching and Learning Innovation Fund (\$9,990), this multi-year project includes three student researchers. KPU Wild Spaces cultivates place-responsive learning that promotes self-regulation, enhances community engagement, physical and mental health, and land-based pedagogy.
- The English Upgrading department maintains a close relationship and shared programming with the Phoenix Drug and Alcohol Recovery and Education Society on site at the Society's holistic treatment centre next to Surrey Memorial Hospital. This English and math upgrading program supports students who are transitioning to new stages of life through their recovery process.
- English Upgrading faculty member and KDocs Founder and Festival Director, Janice Morris, continues to work tirelessly with the KDocs team in preparation for the upcoming "KDocsFF 2023: People. Places. Power." which will run February 22—26, 2023, at the Vancouver International Film Centre.

INITIATIVES/ACTIVITIES

- The Access Programs department was awarded funds from the Canadian Western Bank for the development of an EACS Entrepreneurial Training Program.
- A variety of new initiatives are in the development and implementation stages including the use of Pebble Pad in all EACS courses, designing of the Digitial Student Learning Community, and EACS Entrepreneurial Training Program.
- Lee Beavington is hosting an ARTS 4800 Arts Practicum student as part of the KPU Wild Spaces project (funded through the Teaching and Learning Innovation Fund).
- Earlier this year Lee Beavington was invited to present at the Indigenous Advisory Committee, and in 2022 he met and consulted with many local Indigenous experts and knowledge keepers. Lee arranged for Joseph Dandurand (Kwantlen) to give an outdoor storytelling workshop for the KPU community. In developing the stalew (Fraser River) field school, Lee consulted Len Pierre (Katzie) to

- discuss Indigenous ways of knowing, canoed alongside Brandon Gabriel (Kwantlen) with the Rivershed Society (a trip he coordinated), consulted with Nathan Wilson (Musqueam/Tsawwassen) at Deas Island to hear his stories of fishing these waters, and met with Albert (Sonny) McHalsie Naxaxalhts'i (Stó:lō) to discuss field school collaborations. Lee was honoured to be given an oral tour of local Indigenous lands by Lindsey Wilson (Hwlitsum) and Debbie Miller (Katzie) in March. In the hopes of better understanding decolonization and landbased initiatives, Lee also consults and collaborates with Rachel Chong (Métis), Melinda Bige (Lutsel'ké Dené), and Jennifer Anaquod (Muscowpetung Saulteaux). They are his mentors in this journey.
- In the process of developing the staləw (Fraser River) field school, Lee Beavington met and consulted separately with artist/professor Erica Grimm, arts educator Zuzana Vasko, Deb Jones from Cougar Streamkeepers, and FINA instructor Liz Toohey-Wiese (his colleague in this journey). He then saw an opportunity and coordinated for the Upstream/Downriver: Walking the staləw Watershed exhibition, which is a "collaborative research-creation project that addresses climate change at the local, granular scale of the lower Fraser River watershed," to be featured in the Spruce Gallery at KPU this past September. In addition to being open to the KPU community, this exhibition currently serves as the learning environment for the FINA 3202 Special Topics in Studio Arts course, Fraser River/staləw Studies, being offered fall 2022.

- The Access Programs (AP) Department were excited to launch their newly revised Employment and Community Support (EACS) Program at a 96% enrolment rate. The department is receiving positive feedback from students and families on the updated curriculum and program delivery model.
- English Upgrading is excited to be collaborating with the Tsawwassen First Nation on a new initiative to offer Adult Upgrading courses on the ancestral lands of the Tsawwassen peoples. This new program began in September and is supporting Indigenous students to upgrade their skills for access to new employment and post-secondary opportunities.
- English Upgrading faculty member Janet Webster has signed her courses on to KPU's Climate+ challenge, which requires students to engage with issues surrounding the climate crises and focus their learning through a critical, solutions-focused lens. The Climate+ challenge is part of KPU's sustainability vision, and EU programming, which helps students develop essential critical thinking and literacy skills for university study, is well-suited to support KPU's students as they widen their understanding of the

Faculty of Academic & Career Preparation cont'd

complex issues we all face with the current climate crisis.

- The initiative to support KPU undergraduate students with English language development, continues: ELS faculty member Melissa Swanink has a .5 embedment release within The Learning Centre to support Melville School of Business (MSB) students, while Susan Saint has a similar release to focus on the Faculty of Science and Horticulture. In addition, Joanna Daley has a fulltime release to provide language support to post-bacc and graduate programs in the MSB.
- The Learning Centres have offered a total of 51 Academic Skills Workshops since July 2022 with an astounding 1,135 students participating. The workshop topics include: Balancing Life & Learning: Self-Care and Productivity, Establish Good Habits, Exam Preparation Strategies, Excel Basic & Intermediate Skills for University Students, Find Your Writing Voice: Authentic Writing Without Fear, Learning from Mistakes, Master Your Memory, Monitoring Your Learning Through Rubrics, Note Taking Strategies for Online Learning, Plan Your Semester, Reading Texts and Taking Notes, and Say No to Procrastination.
- A newly developed TLC 3-hour outdoor workshop offered in Fall 2022, Write it Out: Find Your Writing Voice was inspired by Felicia Rose Chavez' book, The Anti-Racist Workshop: How to Decolonize the Creative Classroom.
- Enrolment in KPU 100 continues to rise since the initial pilot in Fall 2020. The course, Introduction to University Learning is taught by TLC Learning Strategists and delivered through a blend of synchronous and asynchronous sessions. To date, 62 cohorts have been offered with 2,463 student registrations. Between August 8-26, 496 students participated in 13 cohorts, which nearly doubles the enrolment in Fall 2021 with 268 students in 10 cohorts. August 2022 student evaluations of the learning objectives provide strong support for the utility of the program. Respondents indicated a 90-97% capacity to accomplish a range of objectives from navigating a course syllabus, to strategies for self-care and working in teams to being able to discuss the process for creating semester and weekly schedules. The same respondents indicated 80-95% satisfaction with technical skills learnt with accessing and using Moodle successfully.
- Head Start is an adapted version of KPU 100 used to support new KPU students who have been identified by their high schools as being at risk. The course creation was a collaborative effort between The Learning Centres, Academic Advisors and Central Advising. July 2022 was the second iteration of Head Start. 16 students participated in the 5 sessions between July 19 and August 9, 2022.
- Three cohorts of 40 Tutors participated in a 6-hour Fundamentals training and development course on September 17, 2022. Tutor training is a great support to

- the KPU community as TLC tutors offer assistance in a variety of topics and have logged over 2,137 hours of academic tutoring from July to September. In Fall 2022 Tutors have offered 18 workshops to 655 students. Tutor training materials were updated and adapted to incorporate First Peoples' Principles of Learning to Support Tutees which included whole person learning and the concept of Two Eyed Seeing. https://kpu.pressbooks.pub/leveltwopeertutoringfundamentals/chapter/incorporate-first-peoples-principles-of-learning-to-support-tutees/
- Over the last academic year, Learning Strategists, led by Christina Page in collaboration with Jeannette Paschen (BUSI chair), have been working with subject matter experts in the Business Diploma program to support the embedment of learning strategies into each of the diploma courses with a focus on anchor skills. To date, over 43 different resources have been developed and PD has been provided with learning strategists. The new curriculum and approaches launched Fall 2022 semester.
- DESN 100, a collaborative project with the Wilson School of Design Dean and faculty, is an adaptation of KPU 100 that focuses on the types of learning activities that Year 1 Design students need for program success. The Learning Centres piloted the course from August 22 26, 2022, with three cohorts that all included three synchronous interactive sessions and 14 activities imbedded in the course for students to complete and submit. The feedback from participants was quite positive about the utility of the learning during the 10 hours.

STUDENT SUCCESS

 Students in the EACS 0022 Disability Rights course partnered with Vancouver Island University students in the Education Assistant and Community Support Worker Program, to discuss the importance of classroom learning supports.

Arts Speaker Series "It's Just Leadership"

We walked the lower part of Cougar Creek and collected garbage and materials along the way, both to clean up the creek, and to source materials for our project. The following two weeks were intensive in-class work periods with Tracie and Erica. Students learned safe practices when working on ladders in the gallery, proper knots, techniques for hanging large scale materials, and how to work in groups effectively. These types of hands on experiences are so beneficial to our students, to help give them confidence to take on large scale work, to know the professional skills of installing work in a gallery, and Tracie and Erica were so generous in teaching the students what they know about being artists that install work in the public sphere.

* Partnering with 3 artists and faculty members at Trinity Western University was such a positive experience, and I am hoping in the future we can have more partnerships between our institutions. I have offered to visit as a lecturing artist at their campus with their senior studio students, and I can foresee future collaborations with students applying for exhibitions at each other's institutions. Being able to pay each of these artists honorariums provided by the PDEC grant helps to acknowledge the time and effort they took out of their busy schedules to install their work at KPU and attend the closing reception.

the aftermath of COVID, a pandemic that has taken an enormous mental health toll on our population, this project aimed to improve the mental health of our students through the promotion of on-campus social connections. Students enrolled in Psychology 3350: Advanced Topics in Psychopathology were tasked with developing and implementing a multi-pronged strategy to address student loneliness on campus. Emerging from this project, and now appearing on the Surrey campus are a number of tangible outcomes of the students' hard work and the generous funding we received from KPU for this project.

- Psychoeducation: Students produced a series of Infographics designed to provide the university community with information and strategies to cope with loneliness; to reduce the stigma associated with loneliness; and to promote social connections. These infographics are posted on Surrey campus (sample below). Students additionally wrote articles for the KSA Runner, and put together presentations to be used at First Year Orientation for domestic and international students.
- * Ping Pong Table in Cedar Courtyard. One of our student teams worked hard to put together a solid pitch for a Ping Pong Table on Surrey campus and the table found its home in the Cedar courtyard. Ping Pong is a low barrier, social game played around the world. KPU Sports and Recreation has agreed to manage the ping pong table, providing equipment to students at no cost. The table has been in regular use and is popular with both staff and students.



* Refurbishing of Fir 151 and Fir 152. A student group worked closely with KPU staff to design and refurbish two social spaces in Fir building. These spaces are now aesthetically pleasing, informal gathering areas for students, equipped with newly covered furniture, charging stations, and white boards. These spaces will also include magnetic poetry kits to inspire student creativity and communication.

Conversation Cards. Over the next month, multiple conversation card stations will exist around Surrey campus. A selection of conversation starters (e.g., "What do you think is the ideal age? Have you ever



traveled to a location simply because it was featured in a movie or song? What will you miss most about being a student once you graduate") will be placed in spaces that students regularly spend time (e.g., Main lobby, the cafeteria, grassroots café, the airport lounge in Cedar).

* Message Boards. Seven message boards have been installed around campus. Peer Support has agreed to manage these boards and, on a weekly basis, will write a prompt on the boards (e.g., Before I die, I want to...; What makes you smile? I am grateful for...). Whiteboard markers will be available to students to respond to these prompts. This initiative considers diverse student needs and is a low barrier way to engage socially with peers.

and real-time polymerase chain reaction (RT-PCR) techniques to reveal APOBEC-3G expression in multi-feline cell lines, primary cells, nodes and gut tissues. They illustrated how the innate antiviral protein propelled the viral genetic material to temporarily establish latency in the cytoplasm, conveying the importance of small animal models in research. In addition, they concluded that the results of their investigation might shed light on the role of the innate antiviral factor in the fight against human pathogens. 
Abhijit Sen: Paper Published in Issues of Information Systems

Melville Business Strategy Internships Update

Our Student Success team, led by Work-Integrated Learning Coordinator Magdalena Mot, has been continuously working on supporting the Summer 2022 Melville Business Strategy Internship (MBSI) Cohort of 33 interns. This first cohort will complete their internship mid-November. At the beginning of July 2022, the team started to set in motion the Fall 2022 MBSI Cohort, which had 24 interns. These students started working in September and are now one month into their six-month internship program, which will end in March 2023. Four months of close collaboration with over 15 industry partners,

as well as working internally with other departments within KPU, made the launch of the Fall cohort a big success.

The Melville School of Business is currently working on the Spring 2023 MBSI Cohort, where 30 internships offerings are awaiting successful candidates. These internships are subject to successful funding proposals to Mitacs, which is covering half of the \$10,000 internship costs and RBC Foundation, which is presently covering around 20%. Of the 30 internship positions available in Spring 2023, 13 are Marketing related and 17 are a combination of IT, HR, Accounting, Supply Chain, and general business roles. Our team has received 157 applications and 92 students have been vetted as eligible. The vetted students will be matched to available internship roles based on their current enrollment at KPU in specific business credentials, as well as their skills, knowledge, and previous work experience. Industry Partners will then shortlist and interview matching students and will select successful candidates. The student success team is working tirelessly to make this new cohort another success!

Four student interns volunteered to shoot content for the Melville School of Business faculty showcase video, which goes live on February 23, from 4:00-6:00pm PST. We are excited to showcase the incredible work our interns are doing in the community! We thank the KPU Marketing department and Major Events team for spearheading this project.


Christina Shorthouse: SDG Open Pedagogy Fellowship

Institute for Sustainable Horticulture - Funding Advancement

- A long-awaited NSERC ARD (\$225,000) grant was approved in August for a 3-year project entitled: Novel Microbial Tools and Tactics for Cutworm Control in Wine Grapes.
- In addition to the NSERC grant, a \$30,000 MITACS grant was received to specifically hire students for the project, and our industry partner Andermatt Canada was able to use its research credit of \$20,000 (part of the 2019 Synergy Award to D. Henderson and Andermatt for our previous applied research partnerships over 5 years). This research will apply in the field, several years of research from the lab into biocontrol of two cutworm species causing major damage to wine grapes with the goal of eliminating the use of chemical insecticides and registering new microbial biocontrol products in Canada. The site of the research is a collaborating organic vineyard in the Okanagan Valley with significant cutworm challenges.

Institute for Sustainable Horticulture – Graduate Students' Internships Completion

- ISH said farewell to three graduate students from AgroSup Dijon in July and August.
- These students spent 20-week internships at ISH completing applied research projects toward their degrees in France. The three titles of the research were:
 - * Development of qPCR assays for the detection/ quantification of Trichoderma atroviridae in soils (Lauryne Dos Santos). Lauryne was supported by the Applied Genomics Centre, Paul Adams and his technical staff to complete this project.
 - * Biocontrol of Trichoderma aggressivum in Agaricus bisporus production with a novel Bacillus subtillis strain (Pamela Pawua).
 - Fermentation and algal metabolite products to support the recovery of agricultural soil damaged by flooding in Sumas (Audrey Tiercin).

Applied Genomics Centre – Funding Advancement

 The AGC received \$1 million co-funding from British Columbia Knowledge Development Fund. The number of research projects under the Genomics and Metabolomic Solutions for BC Agriculture project will double over the next five years, creating more research jobs for AGC faculty, staff and students focused on agricultural innovation. This funding boost will support the lab expansion and equipment purchases needed to support these new applied research opportunities for KPU and our community partners in B.C. An iScan array system was already purchased using these funds, making KPU's Applied Genomics Centre the only lab in Western Canada utilizing DNA analysis technology in the study of agricultural genomics.

Applied Genomics Centre – Research on Cow Disease

 Using technology developed at the university's Applied Genomics Centre, KPU researchers are leading the way in a fight against cow disease by testing milk from across Western Canada. In partnership with the WestGen Group of companies, the AGC is working to understand if and how the bacterium Mycoplasma bovis impacts the health of the animal in order to help producers make informed decisions.

Applied Genomics Centre – Lab Renovation

The AGC is expanding! Construction to Spruce room 126 started on October 17. The space will be renovated to the same standards of the current AGC Biosafety Lab in Spruce 214. Construction will include sound proofing to minimize noise transfer to the adjacent rooms and hallway. This work is expected to be completed by March 2023.

This site orients new faculty members to good pedagogical practice in course design and supporting student success, familiarizes them with key policies required for teaching and assessments, introduces faculty to the KPU technologies ecosystem, as well as the supports available from the Teaching & Learning Commons. This site also provides key professional development opportunities. We also received feedback that new hires are interested in faculty development before they officially begin at KPU. To that end, we have duplicated the T&L faculty orientation and the Foundations of Teaching Excellence Modules in our external Moodle server to support their desire to learn.



INITIATIVES/ ACTIVITIES

Reference work

In keeping with the stronger in-person presence on most campuses and a return to more in-person classes, librarians have seen an uptick in our research support services since the start of this semester over last. To date, we've answered nearly 200 more reference and citation questions than over the same period in 2021.

Similarly, KPU's use of our chat reference service, AskAway, also saw a 10% increase over the same period last year, which confirms our impressions that those users who "found" us on AskAway during the pandemic will continue to use the service for its flexibility and convenience. In a survey of AskAway users, one student testified the following: "I would like to comment on how helpful and kind the librarians are. Truly the best! Their patience while I asked them countless things was honestly amazing. Thank you for your help!". We aim to continue to serve to meet this high standard.

Lastly, our virtual reference drop-in service, <u>Zoom a Librarian</u>, is back again, just in time for term papers and citation support. On our Zoom a Librarian service, students, faculty, and staff

can ask questions about citations, research, and more. This service provides one-on-one time with librarians.

Faculty Picks for Diving into the Disciplines

The aim of this list is to introduce students to new fields of interest. Books on the list are chosen based on recommendations from ARTS faculty and instructors. Books on this list have been chosen because they are engaging, well-written, and accessible to people outside of the discipline. This list might help a student decide a major or be a source of inspiration. Materials on this list can also be suggested as further reading for students eager to learn more about a certain discipline.

Book Displays

In each of our KPU Library locations, we continue to highlight materials in our collection through our book displays. Recent examples of these displays include a display for Pride Month in June and a display for National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. Our book displays serve as a way to promote materials covering important or relevant topics that may be of interest to library users. These displays encourage learning, critical thinking, and discovery.



SERVICE UPDATES

Text Message Notifications from KPU Library

Library users can now receive notifications by text message. This optional service enables users to opt into text notifications regarding their library account. These notifications might include messages regarding overdue items, hold notifications, or bills. Through this service, KPU Library is able to better connect to its users and gives users more freedom in how they would like to receive communications from the library.

Laptop loan program

Our laptop loan program continues to prove popular. Almost 300 laptops have been loaned out for the Fall 2022 semester! Through this program, students are able to focus on their studies without needing to worry about locating or purchasing a laptop or personal computer. Beyond these semester long loans, we also continue to provide short term laptop loans for students and employees.

SPACES

χ^wəχ^wéyəm expansion

KPU Library continues to work to "Indigenize Library Practices and Inspire Reciprocal Reconciliatory Relationships" (KPU Library Strategic Plan 2021-2023, Goal 3). As part of this goal, we are expanding the χ^w e χ^w e $\dot{\gamma}$ em space to our Richmond, Langley, and Cloverdale libraries.

 χ^w e $\dot{\gamma}$ em, meaning "oral storytelling" in həṅdəminəm, first opened earlier this year at KPU Surrey. This space houses KPU Library's Indigenous collection and is a space for reflection, learning, and sharing. The space will host oral storytelling events and have QR codes users can use to listen to recorded stories and histories. χ^w e $\dot{\gamma}$ em has also featured exhibitions of Indigenous artwork and items, including an exhibition in June called Present Traditions, an exhibit of contemporary Indigenous apparel.

The $\chi^w \ni \chi^w \in \dot{\gamma} \ni m$ spaces that will be created at our other campuses will similarly work to centre Indigenous voices and perspectives at KPU Library. The $\chi^w \ni \chi^w \in \dot{\gamma} \ni m$ spaces at Richmond, Langley, and Cloverdale, will be opening soon.

EVENTS

New Student Orientation: Our New Student Orientation event was held on August 31st, as part of KPU Orientation Week. After a morning spent in the main Richmond Campus building, our new students came to the Wilson building and were welcomed by our staff and faculty. Students were divided into two groups, and participated in two very different but engaging activities. Group 1 was gathered into



small teams of 5 or 6 people and participated in a design challenge. Group 2 were led to our 4th floor event space where they created custom tote bags using textile paint and custom block prints. These unique block prints were designed by some of our student assistants, then cut out on our laser cutter. Students then switched activities, and capped off the day with some snacks and mingling.

<u>Virtual Career Panel</u>: On October 20, we held an engaging virtual design career panel which was attended by students and alumni. Our panel was moderated by our very own, Sharon Greeno, fashion industry maven and one of our most passionate faculty. Our panel of industry experts were kept on their toes by some deep-dive questions about career paths, insider tips and industry standards. The session was recorded and can be viewed here.

<u>Career Expo</u>: On October 28, we held an in-person Career Expo in the 4th floor event space of our building. We hosted exhibitors, such as Arc'teryx, lululemon, latse, Aritizia and Tommy Hilfiger. Our students and several alumni attended, and made some valuable connections. Each of the exhibitors were thrilled to attend and have a unique opportunity to connect with potential future employees.

<u>Virtual Portfolio Day</u>: As members of the National Portfolio Day Association, we have had the unique opportunity to participate in a series of Virtual Portfolio Day events. Most recently on October 14th, we had the pleasure of meeting with a range of potential students from all over the world, however, mainly from the United States. These events enable us to expand awareness of the Wilson School of Design and recruit new students. Many students that we met with had not heard of WSD prior to the event, and now have us on their radar to consider for Fall 2023.

<u>IDS Vancouver – Trade Show:</u> The Vancouver Interior Design Show brings together designers in both architecture, product, and interior design under one roof to review new materials and innovations. Student across all four years of interior design either volunteered at this event or participated in walking the floor and attending talks on Trade Day. As part of the day, Interior Design students participated in IDIBC's Student Design

Charrette. The charrette brings together students from other interior design schools to mix and create a project which they present to a panel of industry judges. 4th year Interior Design student Tayah Mawer was the winner along with Michelle Ye from BCIT. As winners, Tayah and Michelle were invited to attend IDIBC's Shine Awards where they were recognized on the grand stage.

Product Design — Escape Pod Project: We recently had an exciting afternoon with our 3rd year Product Design students presenting their group projects, "Escape Pod". Their design brief included creating a series of prototypes to envision an acces-



sible pod-like space on campus for our students to study, destress and unplug. The workshop was supported by BC Canadian Wood Council Guest Speakers Robert Malczyk, Principal at Timber Engineering Inc. Jennifer Yu, M. Eng, P.Eng, Technical Manager Wood WORKS! BC/Canadian Wood Council

Guest Speaker - David Young: former faculty member of the Graphic Design for Marketing program, helped kick off the new academic year with an open workshop, attended by students across all our programs. The focus of the workshop was branding, how branding helps to define an organization and how much influence the community can have on shaping the direction of a company. David provided lots of engaging ex-



amples and sage words of advice on how students can approach their own design challenges.

Guest Speaker – Max Feldman: Max Feldman, Division Vice President at EdwardsX and also Advisory Committee Member for the Technical Apparel Design program recently visited the DETA 5200 Class: Business Strategies for Technical Apparel and shared his industry experience and discussed "Sourcing for Apparel Production".



Throughout his career, Max has helped a variety of organizations optimize their resources, increase efficiency and improve strategic decision making. Through his expertise in Sourcing, Product Development, Quality & Production, he has helped globally recognized brands such as Lululemon, Arc'teryx, Kit+Ace & Sugoi build resilient value chains and maximize opportunity. After 15 years of working at top-tier organizations, Max now focuses on emerging brands, social enterprises, educators & entrepreneurs driving positive impact for people,

planet & profits.

THESA Conference: On Friday October 21st, Heather Clark, Fashion & Technology Program Chair, attended the THESA (Teachers of Home Economics Specialist Association) annual conference to represent the Wilson School of Design. This was the first in-person conference in two years so there was lots of excitement, and great attendance. At the WSD table we had lots of giveaways for teachers to bring into their own classrooms including solar dye kits in a jar, pattern drafting and sewing instructions for a zippered bag and tool roll, WSD Colouring books and more. Those teachers in attendance were thrilled to receive all and to be connected with the WSD and hear about the updates and activities going on with the faculty of design.

<u>Information Sessions</u>: We are underway with a complete schedule of information sessions, both in-person and online, with the support of our Furure Students' Office, the KPU International Department and the Major Events Team.

PUBLICATIONS/SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

Sue Fairburn – International Conference: Our faculty are experts at staying up to date in their areas of expertise, and staying connected to their industry. Sue Fairburn, one of our researchers and Product Design faculty took no time diving in to the semester! "First week of term is always



exciting and this year, while teaching capstone research courses asynchronously, I was in London, England to attend the 24th International Conference on Engineering and Product Design Education Conference. This year's theme was Disrupt, Innovate, Regenerate and Transform. I had the opportunity to contribute two co-authored papers, and present both on Innovation and Creativity in Design and Engineering Education."

<u>Victor Martinez—International Conference:</u> The Systemic Design Association's RSD11 (Relating Systems Thinking and Design) is a four-day symposium, that was held October 13—16, both inperson and online, hosted by the University of Brighton. The SDA provides an international community home for the wide range of designers and scholars leading emerging practices, design-led systems research, and advanced design



methods evolving from systems thinking and design. Victor Martinez, researcher and faculty in the Product Design program was invited to present his research to an international audience, as part of the digital stream of the symposium. His presentation titled "14 years of Experimenting with Design, Systems and Stability" can be view here.

<u>E-Portfolios/Pebble Pad</u>: Paola Gavilanez, faculty from Interior Design, has been working with Gillian Sudlow from Teaching and Learning on the implementation and benefits of using PebblePad and e-Portfolios in general. Paola and Gillian have done presentations for the Wilson School of Design's Faculty of the Whole as well as a presenting at the Appreciating Teaching Excellence event. Paola is also leading other faculty in the practice of e-Portfolios by working directly with many WSD faculty around strategies and setup.

<u>School Visits – Heather Clark:</u> On Tuesday October 4th, Heather Clark, Fashion & Technology Program Chair, visited previous Fashion and Technology advisory committee member Joe Tong and his class of grade 9-12 textile students at Steveston-

London secondary. When visiting the classroom and students, Heather shared an overview of the Wilson School of Design, the programs that we offer, and the types of activities that the Fashion and Technology students engage in. An overview of the portfolio requirements for the Fashion and Technology programs were shared, along with general tips to consider when putting a portfolio together for any art or design program.

<u>Visiting Students – From Yukon, NWT</u>: On October 19th, a group from the Fashion Art Design School with Porter Creek Secondary in the Yukon visited the Wilson School of Design Campus. The students started their visit with Amanda Naseri, Future Students Office liaison who led the group on a building tour. After the tour the group engaged in a block printing activity to design their own tote bags, while hearing about the Fashion and Technology program in more detail, and sharing questions about the Wilson School of Design and its many programs.

Product Design Vertical Studio 2022: Designing with Materials. The Product Design program held a week long event, which involved students from all program years 1-4. Student were organized into groups comprised of a mix of students from various years and presented with a design challenge. Each team received a variety of materials to work with and had a faculty point person for advice. Other materials and fasteners were allowable but comprised only 10% of the final product. The results were thoughtful and innovative and each team presented their projects to the whole school at the end of the week.

FIND Students – Design Exploration: Foundations in Design students had the opportunity to visit Inform Interiors and the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Chinese Garden on October 4th for their Design Exploration and Drawing for Design courses. Students were given an insightful tour of



the garden, learning about its history through a design perspective, and then used the grounds as inspiration for sketching. This was followed by a tour of Inform Interiors where students were able to closely observe and experience high-end contemporary furniture design.

Product Design Transformative Thinking Project: In this 2nd year product design class (Transformative Thinking) students were tasked with an opportunity to reimagine an everyday object by using bio-inspired methods as a new approach to sustainable design that explores biostructures within contextual purpose and mechanism. One of the research venues was the Beaty Biodiversity Museum, the natural history museum located on the UBC campus where students met with Ildiko Szabo, Collection Curator of the Cowan Tetrapod Collection.

ALUMNI STORIES

Alumni Wins Core77 Honoree Award: Clarissa Martins, a 2021 Product Design alumna received the Core77 Honoree Award for the Core77 Community Choice Commercial Equipment category this past summer. Core77 is an online magazine focused on industrial design. Their yearly awards are an opportunity to celebrate innovation and creativity across 18 different design categories. When Clarissa discovered police agen-



cies only bought male or unisex armoured vests that weren't as good at protecting women, Martins was determined to do something about it, making it her capstone project. Building on in-depth research of female anthropomorphic characteristics, Martins developed an optimized design that can be adapted across a highly detailed and customizable sizing chart. This ultimately resulted in designing a female-focused body armour called Active-Duty Impact Resistant Armour (ADIRA) that improves protection, mobility and comfort for female police officers.

Alumni – Guest: Technical Apparel graduate, Hanae Yaskawa visited the DETA 5200 (Technical Apparel Design) class as a guest speaker on October 7th, 2022. As a Product Development Assistant with Arc'teryx, Hanae shared her experience and perspective as a young professional in the technical apparel industry. Hanae's Red Dot Award-winning capstone project prior to graduation was the Resilience Climbing Pants, outdoor paraclimbing



pants for climbers living with spinal cord injuries.

Alumni Launches Boutique: Faculty members Jimmy Choi and Sharon Greeno visited 2019 Fashion Marketing graduate, Michael Bardaro, who recently opened a curated vintage store in New Westminster. Uncommon Vintage is a boutique store that sells reworked and upcycled vintage, streetwear, and designer apparel and accessories. They strive to reduce textile waste and pollution while offering products at an inclusive price.



Alumni Selected for National Competition: Founded in 2004, the international award-winning Cashmere Collection is an ardent supporter of Canada's fashion design community and the Breast Cancer cause. The highly anticipated kick-off to October's Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the Cashmere Collection heralds the annual return of Cashmere's awareness and fundraising activities for breast



cancer. 12 leading Canadian designers, including our very own Fashion & Technology alum, <u>Sam Stringer</u> were selected to participate in the competition where the designers were tasked to create a dress from Cashmere Canada's Ultraluxe Bathroom Tissue. With each vote, Cashmere Canada will donate \$1 to the breast cancer cause. We look forward to the results of the final selection of winners!

STUDENT SUCCESS

Award-Winning Interior Design Students: 3rd year interior design student Alyssa Scott was the student winner of the annual competition hosted by hospitality industry network <u>NEWH</u> and <u>Woodcraft Hospitality</u>. The competition challenges practicing and student designers to refine their skills through developing and furnishing a hotel room interior. The latest contest involved developing a line of hard furniture that included a

headboard, tables and supporting fixtures. These furniture items, known as casegoods, were placed in a virtual hotel room focused on the modern traveller. For winning the student category, Scott was awarded a \$10,000 scholarship.



Year 3 Interior Design students Hailey Bassiri and Josh Swanson placed second in the newly launched Liv Student Design Challenge. The challenge was for interior designers to consider how spaces might be brought to life and contribute to a more balanced and productive future (that includes work). Hailey and Josh's project, Reorder, was inspired by the multifunctionality of a Swiss Army knife. Their designed space encourages physical movement and mindfulness to suit a variety of workspaces.

2nd year Interior Design student Paulina Jaszczewska recently won IDIBC's Tom Park Bursary. The bursary, named in honour of the life, legacy, and volunteer spirit of Tom Park (1946–2012) is awarded to a student who best exemplifies the spirit of participation and volunteerism within the interior design profession. Paulina embodies this amazing spirit and gives KPU and the Wilson School of Design great pride.

Recent 2022 alumni Carmen Bowering won an IDIBC award as well as the Sandy Fraser Award for her 4th year capstone project. Carmen attended the IDIBC Shine Awards where she

PROGRAM/POLICIES/INITIATIVES

Sherman Jen Research Chair Appointed: Through a generous donation from the Dr. Sherman Jen Education Foundation endowed through the KPU Foundation, Stephanie Phillips was appointed As the Sherman Jen Research Chair in Next-Generation Design. Phillips will focus on biodegradable functional materials, exploring how enhanced natural materials that remain recyclable can be used in the apparel industry. At the Wilson School of Design, Phillips has taught textiles in the fashion design and technology, design for technical apparel, product design, and fashion marketing programs, but she's

excited to be getting back into research. Sherman Jen Research Chairs come with a term of five years, renewable for an additional term, in key research areas for KPU.



WSD Awarded Research Fund: A \$1-million federal grant will expand research capacity at Kwantlen Polytechnic University's Wilson School of Design and provide new opportunities for students and faculty. The Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada grant announced on October 14th that they will support The Wilson School of Design students who want to engage with research projects and create real-world impact. The New NSERC funding for the Wilson School of Design comes from its College and Community Innovation program, which supports applied research at post-secondary institutions across the country.

<u>Technical Apparel Start-Up</u>: There could be no better way to describe a "polytechnic" education than the semester start-up for the Technical Apparel Design program. Students and facul-

ty "headed for the hills" for an immersive outdoor experience at Golden Ears Provincial Park. In teams, students were required to design and build a sleeping enclosure with provided materials to camp in overnight. A fantastic design challenge, in a beautiful setting.



Interior Design Start-Up Week: The Interior Design program held their annual Start Up Week which includes an in-person Vertical Studio. The first week of classes becomes a mix of course introductions interspersed with a vertical studio project which includes the participation of students across all four years of the degree. This year students were challenged to an activity dubbed COLLECTIVE PERSPECTIVE; this was a mix of observation, hand sketching/drawing, perspective and reflection around a variety of mini "themes".

<u>Teaching and Learning Innovation Grant:</u> Faculty Erin Ashenhurst and Carley Hodgkinson were awarded a Teaching and

Learning Innovation grant in June 2022 to support development of their conference, "Big Pictures: Murals, Billboards, and Urban Interventions," to be held May 5 to 7, 2023. The TLIF grant focuses on hiring a student research assistant for a work-integrated learning opportunity and on bringing in speakers to support conference-related teaching activities across three courses in Graphic Design for Marketing.

Interior Design Honours Degree Added: Joining a growing list of Honours degrees, Wilson School of Design's Interior Design program recently launched their new Honours Degree option. This option will become available to students starting in the fall of 2022. The first of its kind in Western Canada, the honours program gives interior design students a chance to advance their design knowledge by working on an additional research or creative project in their fourth year.

Vancouver Mural Fest: On October 12, teams of students from the Graphic Design for Marketing 3rd year Interactive Technologies & Society class set out on exploratory, self-guided tours of Vancouver's Mural Fest. Many students had not seen any of the murals and reported being both surprised and inspired by their experiences. In reflecting back on the importance of public art in building community, Elias Lemke writes "[Murals] are often metaphors, or commentaries on the key social events happening at the time they were created, becoming time capsules of the culturally significant events that make up a city's past."

<u>Fashion Marketing Advisory Meeting</u>: The Fashion Marketing program held it's first in person meeting since the Fashion Marketing Advisory started in December 2019. The committee membership is listed below.

OFFICE OF THE REGISTRAR

Spring Convocation

After a two-year, in-person hiatus, KPU once again welcomed graduates back to campus for an in-person Con-



vocation celebration in June. With eight ceremonies held across four days, the Office of the Registrar supported the event with the coordination of 200 support staff from across the university, celebrating over 1,200 graduates as they crossed the stage.

Recruitment Season Kick-off

The FSO (domestic recruitment) team hit the ground running, now back in person in BC high schools. Through September and October FSO attended 89 in person school visits.



All grade 11/12 students attend

these visits, with about 300 students per school. The targeted regions in the months of Sept-Oct were Surrey, Langley, Fraser Valley, Okanagan, Whistler/North Shore, Kamloops, Richmond, and Vancouver Island. Additional events included:

- Greg Moore Youth Centre Community Fair: Primarily promoting ACP programs to high-risk youth needing to upgrade English skills.
- Whitehorse, YK, Wilson School of Design school visit: Students flew in from Whitehorse, were provided a
 KPU tour and attended a workshop facilitated by the
 WSD.
- PICS Mega Job Fair: FSO attended the largest career and education fair in the Surrey region with over 5000 people in attendance.

University Calendar

The Office of the Registrar recently published the 2022/23 <u>University Calendar</u>, KPU's official guide to academic programs, including admission requirements, curricular requirements,

course descriptions, academic regulations, fees, and the academic schedule. The calendar constitutes KPU's contract with students and a new edition is published each June, just a few weeks prior to the start of registration for the fall semester. Each edition is in effect for one academic year, from September through August annually.

Automated Communications

The FSO team implemented their first automated workflow using the CRM (constituent relationship management) system. The workflow provides new opportunities for engagement with prospective students. Once a prospect expresses interest, they are sent a series of emails inviting them to connect with a recruiter and join a campus tour, while alerting application deadlines.

Faculty Self-Service

Over the last 3 terms, Faculty Self Service was upgraded to include enhanced features and added functionality. In the new application, instructors can access their class lists, enter official grades, and see their teaching schedule. Specifically, the new Class List includes student photos, the use of student's preferred/chosen first name, the ability to email students directly from the application and consolidates a variety of items in one place.

In the Final Grade Entry application an instructor can now see all courses assigned, enter grades either directly or download a grading spreadsheet that can be used to upload their grades from this spreadsheet file. In addition, and consistent with the Class List, the Contact Card is also in Grade Entry and contains the student name including preferred/chosen first name if one exists, photo, program, major and email. The instructor's Course Details are also displayed including the course subject, number, section, title, CRN, course dates, instructor(s) and grading numbers.

More detailed instructions can be found in the <u>Faculty and Instructional Staff Handbook</u> and the <u>Faculty Self Service - Faculty Guide</u>.

Expansion of STRIVE Dual Credit

FSO hosted the first intake of Dual Credit Scotiabank STRIVE for the Richmond School District, touring all of the Learning Centres in the Rich-



mond School District to promote this inaugural cohort. They have now received over 25 applications for this cohort.

SUCCESS Clients

FSO welcomed 275 SUCCESS clients to KPU Richmond campus. Over three days, they hosted 6 group sessions, which included a presentation and comprehensive tour of the campus. Primary programs of focus were English Language Studies/Pathways to post-secondary.



Zena Mitchell, AVP, Enrollment Services and Registrar, has been appointed to Council for the BC Council on Admissions and Transfer (BCCAT). Council members are appointed by the Minister of Advanced Education and Skills Training.

The mandate of the Council is to support and facilitate admission, articulation, application

and transfer arrangements among British Columbia's postsecondary institutions for the benefit of students. The Council fulfills its mandate by bringing together representatives from public and private institutions to cooperate in the planning and administration of programs and admission policies to ensure an accessible and responsive system.

STUDENT AFFAIRS

Growth in the Career Development Centre

The Career Development Centre shows 996 new students registered on KPU's student job board, *Career Connection*, along with 207 new employers. A remarkable 1,704 employment opportunities were posted, with students assisted through 57 career advising appointments.

Co-operative education this Fall saw 351 postings with 86 student placements.

Assessment & Testing Services (ATS)

The new ATS location continues to balance student support for Access exams and Admissions testing, both on campus and virtually. With more students on campus, the test centre is seeing a significant increase in activity.

ATS recently launched a new Math Placement Test (MPT) platform for both on-campus and remote math placement testing, providing prospective students with opportunities to do tutorials and practice work before they take the KPU math placement test.

This chart shows one student's hours of tutorials indicating the skillsets they learned and mastered in preparing for the test.

The new testing space has also allowed ATS to meet the needs of



KPU community members seeking employment upgrading, as well as applying new sessions for English proficiency and recertification exams.

Counselling Services

Counselling Services has recently established a mix-mode service, offering both in-person and virtual sessions to students. In person Counselling Groups, *Drop-in Snack and Chat* and *Mindfulness; Riding the Waves of Emotion*, are now ongoing throughout the Fall term.

THRIVE Month

THRIVE is an annual university-wide initiative that is coordinated through the Health Promotion department, and is supported by a number of KPU departments and services, including Student Affairs and Student Services. A variety of on campus and virtual events were hosted through the month of October.

Peer Wellness Newsletter

The Peer Wellness team, comprised of student volunteers and a student assistant, has created a semesterly newsletter. Each iteration highlights KPU health & well-being resources and features student written articles. The first edition was published in the Spring.

National Health & Fitness Day

Sport & Recreation collaborated with Student Health Promotion to host a *National Health & Fitness Day* event. The goal of this event was to promote a healthy lifestyle and showcase unconventional ways of being active.

Fall New Student Orientation

The Fall 2022 Orientation Cycle included 7 unique initiatives focusing on a "just in time" approach to welcoming new KPU students. The re-developed *Online Orientation Course*, in partnership with the Global Engagement Team at KPU International, was framed around Schlossberg's 4s Model (self, situation, support and strategies), seeing 1,939 registrants. *KPU Welcomes You*, the on-campus orientation event, welcomed 1,463 students over 4 days across all campuses with the help of over 120 student volunteers.



Student Awards and Financial Assistance (SAFA)

SAFA supports the Institution's efforts to recruit outstanding students through the Major Entrance Scholarships Program. This Fall, SAFA welcomed four recipients of President's Scholarships worth \$20,000 each; 14 Merit Scholarships of \$5,000 each; and one Indigenous Entrance Scholarship of \$5,000, respectively. Scholarship recipients are spread throughout the five undergraduate studies Faculties.

In summer 2022, SAFA awarded a total of \$362,365 to almost 200 students in high financial need, have received 432 applications for the term.

OFFICE OF INDIGENOUS LEADERSHIP

Appointment of Associate Vice President, Indigenous Leadership, Innovation and Partnerships

Student Services is delighted to announce the appointment of Gwa'lgum'ax Gayle Bedard as Associate Vice President, Indigenous Leadership, Innovation and Partnerships.

Gayle is Tsimshian, born and raised in an isolated First Nation community in northern BC. Her Indigenous name, Gwa'lgum'ax, means "Water on Fire." Much of her career has focused on supporting Indigenous students in the BC public education system and First Nation Band run schools. The last twenty plus years have been in administrative leadership positions.



Gayle is currently serving as Indigenous Coordinator with the Council of Ministers of Education Canada (CMEC). Previously, Gayle was District Principal Indigenous Education with the Coquitlam School District. She has also worked with the Nicola Valley Institute of Technology, Stzuminus First Nation, GGAX Consulting, and the Vancouver School District. Earlier in her career, Gayle was a Director with the Tsawwassen First Nation, Yukon government, and the Surrey School District.

Along with several other professional credentials, Gayle has two master's degrees from Royal Roads University and UBC. Her undergrad degree is a Bachelor of Education through the NITEP program at UBC.

Reporting to the Vice President, Students, Gayle will work closely with others in our KPU community continuing the work in reconciliation, decolonization and Indigenization. She will help implement a new, soon to be launched, KPU Indigenous action plan: xé?el4 Pathways to Systemic Transformation. In addition, Gayle will serve as a key member of the Indigenous Advisory Committee (IAC), assist with the Indigenous Dialogue series, and support the University in our individual and collective efforts to address the TRC 'Calls to Action' and responsibilities under the articles and legislative requirements of

UNDRIP.

In Gayle's words, "Equity for Indigenous people is one of the great stories of our time. It is also fraught with difficulties, despite so many meetings that have been held. The first reaction is sometimes opposition because educators lack the necessary understandings as to the 'why' or would prefer others offer a solution, but the opportunities for Indigenous students to succeed, and for Canada to become stronger is now."

Gayle brings a passion for education and the well-being of people. She brings emotional intelligence and clear thinking to the work. She has very good judgement about what is best to do and when. Gayle is trusted and well respected, authentic, intentional and empathetic towards the diverse needs of individuals. Above all, Gayle puts students first!

We are very pleased to introduce Gwa'lgum'ax Gayle Bedard to the KPU community. Please join me in welcoming Gayle to her new role at KPU as Associate Vice President, Indigenous Leadership, Innovation and Partnerships.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation

As Elder Lekeyten and President Davis raised the flag, Elder Ray Thunderchild from Thunderchild Cree Nation Saskatchewan sang in honor of those students who attended Residential Schools and Indian Day Schools across Canada.

KPU INTERNATIONAL

Office of Global Engagement

Carole St. Laurent (AVP International) and Ada Lee (Global Learning & Partnerships Manager) represented KPU at the <u>European Association for International Education (EAIE)'s annual conference</u> in September. More than 6300 participants from over 90 countries attended the 32nd annual EAIE Conference and Exhibition in Barcelona, Spain. Click here for <u>event highlights</u>.

Over the three days, Carole and Ada completed:

- 15 meetings with existing institutional European partners (student/faculty exchange agreements, articulation agreements, COIL partnerships)

Advising: International Advising Unit

The Advising Team has:

Resumed in-person drop-in services as of September. Currently, two weekly sessions are offered, Wednesday on

- the Surrey campus and Thursday on the Richmond cam-
- Sent 541 Post Graduate Work Permit (PGWP) Program completion letters to September graduated international students to assist them in transitioning to the work field.
- Completed the program declaration handout and published it on the international advising website. Program declaration is a necessary step for students to complete their degree, and this handout provides the definition and timeframe of program declaration, as well as the screenshots of detailed step-by-step declaration instructions.
- Finalized the Employer Scheduled Break Letter project. This automated platform allows international students to download their customized scheduled break letters.

Office of Recruitment, Admissions and Articulation

Fall is the peak season for international student recruitment. The KPU International team has been actively attending student recruitment fairs and agent visits in key markets virtually, as well as in person where the travel restrictions were lifted. In the past two months, KPU International has attended events in South Korea, Brazil, Mexico, Denmark, Dubai and India.

In Mainland China, the team faces challenges in conducting recruitment activities due to the regional lockdown policies that are still in place. However, KPU International managed to deliver in-person training/meetings and attend fairs with the field representative based in China, which put KPU an at advantage compared with institutions that do not have on-the-ground representatives.

In India, KPU International visited 20+ major agents in person for the first time in three years, with a focus on diversifying the source of students within India and reducing the reliance on students from one





region, particularly Punjab. Recruitment efforts were also being strengthened in other South Asia regions, such as Nepal, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. A 43% increase in applications is achieved in year-to-year comparisons in these regions.


COMMUNICATIONS

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

MUNICIPAL

Municipal elections were held in BC on Saturday, October 15, 2022. New mayors have been elected in Langley City, Langley Township, Surrey, Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows. In Langley Township and Pitt Meadows, the former Mayors in both cases were not seeking re-election.

Upon resumption of council, Surrey's key priorities include speaking to the province about reversing the transition to the Surrey Police Service, housing affordability, property tax rates, and ethics and government transparency

Richmond's key priority includes reviewing the official community plan, which will define how the city will approach affordable housing, rental housing options, and numerous other housing opportunities.

Langley City is focused on community safety, reducing homelessness and affordable housing. Langley Township has a proposed housing strategy which includes requiring developers to include a minimum of 10% of affordable units in any housing stock they build, and streamlining permit processes to reduce construction delays. The inaugural council meetings for Surrey, Richmond and Langley will be Monday, November 7, 2022.

PROVINCIAL

As reported in June, the redistribution of provincial electoral boundaries has been underway and the commission has released its <u>preliminary report</u>. The preliminary report shows an increase from 2 to 3 electoral districts in Langley, an increase from 9 to 10 electoral districts in Surrey, and no change in Richmond, it will remain with 6 electoral districts.

FEDERAL

As reported in June, the redistribution of federal electoral boundaries has been underway; public hearings are being held between May-October 2022. Providing there are no delays, completion of the report is expected to occur between October -December 2022.

OFFICE OF ADVANCEMENT

Institute of Sustainable Food System (ISFS) Donor Stewardship Event

FACILITIES SERVICES

UNIVERSITY SPACE, DESIGN & CAPITAL PROJECTS

Faculty of Health, Office of the Dean: Suite 1853 in Langley was renovated to become the new FoH Office of the Dean. The renovation scope includes new carpet, paint and furniture in all rooms.





Main Building Indigenous Signage: New signage that features the həṅḍəmiṅəṁ dialect was added to all of the entrances into the Surrey Main building.



Surrey Fir Building Accessibility Improvements: The accessibility improvements in the Fir building are complete. The main scope of work includes adding a ramp to the courtyard area leading to Fir and filling in the sunken study areas between Fir and Spruce. Universal Washroom 138 along the east wing was upgraded with an adult-sized changing table and ceiling lift.





Richmond Library: All Richmond Library employees received new ergonomic task chairs as part of the Workstation Refresh project.

Richmond Main Renovation: The SE portions of the second and third floors of the Main building, a total of 3,300m², are being refreshed to accommodate the Entertainment Arts program and future technology-based programs. An Architect has been engaged, and the project's governance structure, which includes a steering committee, working group and end users, has been established. The project, which is currently in the design phase, has a \$6M budget and will be completed by August 2023.

Surrey Spruce Room R126: This room is being renovated with research funding received by Dr. Paul Adams to create a Genomic Research Lab equivalent to the Level-2 containment biosafety lab recently created in Spruce 214. The steering committee has been engaged and has finalized the scope and design. Construction is expected to start in October 2022 and be fully complete by March 2024.

Langley Room 2030: A 35-seat general-purpose classroom in

the Faculty of Health's (FOH's) scheduling region will be transformed into a lecture capture room by Teaching and Learning by installing an auto-tracking camera and other related technology. When not being used by the FOH, the room will be available for interested others to use.

Richmond Main Scheduling Region Room Assignments: In response to the re-assignment of eleven35-seat classrooms to the renovation for Entertainment Arts and future technology-based programs, the scheduling regions of the remaining classrooms were reviewed via consultative process and equitably reassigned based on the average number of sections offered and average weekly scheduled hours.

Richmond Rooms 1350, 1360, 1370: Have been re-assigned to Assessment and Testing Services, which is currently located on the second floor and is being displaced by the renovation for Entertainment Arts and future technology-based programs.

Surrey Fir Room 124: A 40-seat general-purpose classroom in a no scheduling region has been temporarily assigned to the Faculty of Health (FOH) for pilot delivery of the lecture component of the Health Care Assistant Program, a Langley-based program at the campus to address declining enrolments.

MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS

Light Up the Sky Orange, National Day For Truth and Reconciliation: To commemorate the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and to honour the survivors, their families and communities, buildings across Canada are illuminated in orange from September 30th at 7:00 pm to sunrise on October 1st. For a second year, during the week leading to September 30th KPU lit up high-profile frontage features at all campuses with orange lighting.











Door Systems Installed at Langley: The Langley campus received a new automated telescopic slider door system for the Faculty of Science and Horticulture office area 1040. The new door system allows touch-free operation and a wide door opening with a telescopic design. The door installation was finished with new glazing above the system to increase light transmission within the office area.





Surrey Hydronic Heating Pipe Replacement: A supply and return section of hydronic heating pipe was replaced between the Arbutus and Birch buildings due to the end of its service life. Contractors successfully navigated through the complex underground services of IT cabling, electrical and piping infrastructure to find a suitable path to replace the hydronic heating pipe between the Arbutus and Birch buildings. The project was finished with a new section of pedestrian pavement and completed before the Fall heating season.













Exterior Painting: Exterior painting was completed on the exterior stairs of the Fir and Spruce buildings, and the Yew building (chemical bunker) was painted in its entire-



Surrey Yew Building (chemical bunker) Roof Replacement: The Yew building's roof was at the end of its life and was replaced at the beginning of October.




Preparation for Semester Start-Up: Facilities support generalist ensured all classrooms were correctly set up and ready for September's return to class. Exterior pressure washing was completed for all campuses at the beginning of September. Window cleaning took place both interior and exterior for most campuses, and the floors, furniture, high dusting and area cleaning were done.

Landscaping: Facilities Services and our contracted landscaping company ensured that grounds across all sites were ready for return to campus.

Events and Setups at KPU (June 22nd - Oct 22nd): The Facilities Services team managed 391 events during the June through October period, and 153 of those events included setups performed by our Facilities Support Generalists (FSGs). This was in addition to the multiple return-to-campus activities

also supported by our FSGs. Since [the month of October is not complete, we expect these numbers to change slightly.



ANCILLARY SERVICES

Surrey Bookstore - A notable increase in foot traffic with the increased return to campus has resulted in increased sales in most categories. Revenue in Learning Material sales continues to decline mostly as a direct result of KPU's Open Educational Resources initiative, but reduced foot traffic, changes in the industry and evolution in students learning styles have also had an effect.

The Bookstore participated in the Surrey Open House, opening on Saturday, October 1st and redeemed \$40 coupons given to enrolling students to purchase KPU crested material. Bookstore continues to seek out new vendors for general merchandise products and to bring in proven sellers such as Herschel.

Every Child Matters (Orange Shirt): T-shirts were brought into the KPU Bookstores for the first time and were sold with 100% of the profits donated to the Orange Shirt Society. Plans are underway to increase quantities and include a small offering of child sizes for next year. Bookstores on all campuses also distributed the Truth and Reconciliation Booklets brought in by the Office of Research Services.



Fleet: Dedicated one of the shared Fleet vans to Facilities.

Parking: The transition of our Parking Management service provider from Impark to Concord Parking was completed on July 1, 2022. Students, Faculty and Staff have access to a variety of permit options through on-campus meters, SMRTPass and PayByPhone Apps, and an online parking portal. Permits no longer need to be displayed as Concord uses license plate recognition technology (LPR).

SMRTPass Campaign: As a welcome back to school campaign, Concord gave away four free semester parking permits to eligible students who signed up for a parking pass through the SMRTPass app.

Food Services: Catering has increased with the return to campus this Fall. A new Fresh Fork catering menu will soon be available, featuring a selection of appetizers, cocktail food, hot entrees and buffet offerings.

Tim Hortons Renovations: Renovations of our two Tim Hortons locations have now been completed. The Surrey Campus

location re-opened on September 6th and the Richmond Campus re-opened on September 28, with full-service menus and a new updated look.



Market Café Events: Golden Ticket Event (September) - Two \$100 pre-paid Mastercards were given away to Café customers who dined on campus.

Connecting Through Food Event (October) - From October 5th - 16th, the campus Market Cafés helped to support the KSA Food Bank by donating proceeds from sales of poutine, using potatoes donated from the KPU Farm Schools.

Spin to Give Back Event (October) - On October 5th, Chartwells donated items, such as proteins, grains, fruits, and vegetables, to the KSA Food Bank through the Spin to Give Back event. As an added element to this donation, over fifteen recipes have been developed by Chartwells' dietitian using these items to support students in reaching holistic nutrition.

Food Dehydrator: A food dehydrator has been installed in the Richmond Market Café, which reduces kitchen food waste volume by up to 93%, creating a nutrient-rich reusable compost product in 24 hours. The compost end product will be given to KPU Richmond Farms.

New Food Stations: **Pizza** - Personalized pizzas are now available to order from Surrey and Richmond Cafés, featuring vegetarian, meat and Chef special options. **Chop'd and Wrap'd** - A new food station, Chop'd and Wrap'd, opened in September in the Langley, Richmond and Surrey Cafés, offering made-to-order bowls and wraps with a variety of protein, vegetable, and topping options.

Print & Logistics Services - The Print Shop team welcomes Faculty & Staff to campus this Semester servicing more and more customers as they enter into a more on Campus presence. We continue to accept outside work from the Surrey School Board as an external customer since their Print Shop closed down.

IT INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES

Mobile Workforce Project

The deployment of laptops within the Mobile Workforce project is now complete. The project was able to deploy laptops to 90% of all targeted staff and faculty. KPU IT will now continue to deploy and refresh laptops through its annual hardware refresh cycle. No further updates on this initiative will be provided on future reports.

Campus WAN Upgrade

The upgrade of internet and campus interconnect links in Richmond, Langley and Cloverdale campuses are now complete. Langley and Cloverdale's circuits have been upgraded to 5GBps and Richmond's circuit has been upgraded to 10GBps. No further updates on this initiative will be provided on future reports.

Entertainment Arts Program

IT has completed phase 1 of this initiative. By mid-June the circuit provided by Hosted Advantage had been turned up and tested. All traffic previously routed through KPU's WAN connection to support EA classes from semester startup in May is now routed through the delayed 10GBps circuit provided by the vendor.

IT is now working on Phase 2 of this initiative:

- Cloud feasibility assessment a consultant has been engaged to establish budgetary estimates for hosting a cloud and on-premise VDI environment to support this program.
 The consultant is also tasked with conducting a proof of concept (POC) of running this VDI / DAAS in the cloud.
- Risk Assessment of Solutions IT has performed a risk and requirements assessment of available IT options to support the computing needs of the EntA program. The risk and requirements assessment ruled out powerful desktop PC's as it does not meet the remote learning requirements of the program.
- IT is working through the requirements of the EA classrooms, collaborative spaces, and tech ready labs to establish a list of AV and networking hardware we need to order as soon as possible due to potential issues with supply shortages.

Tenant Merger Project

The Tenant Merger Project is an IT initiative to create a better overall IT environment to allow for more collaborative tools to be leveraged. The project is targeted to complete on May 6th, 2023. The project team is working closely with internal stake-

holders across the University, and Microsoft (the vendor). The project is on track overall.

AV and Digital Classrooms

- Finished the last 29 desk upgrades in one project and commencing another 18 desk upgrade project with Facilities
- Finished Fir 136 lecture capture room, minor tweaks
- Out fitting an existing classroom in Cloverdale 2116 with full AV equipment (previously no AV)
- Upgrading 2 existing areas in Cloverdale classrooms with new AV equipment
- Started upgrade plan for both Conference centers AV. As old equipment is dying. Install summer 2023
- Working on ENTA 12 classrooms, 4 tech ready, video wall, and special work areas
- Working on the AV upgrade for the Langley Auditorium
- Working on replacing old plastic signage in front of Surrey main with new digital signage
- Continue to upgrade another 20 rooms with new projectors that are end of live
- Continue to upgrade another 40 rooms with new room controllers that are end of live
- Working on the new lightboard recording studio in Langley

IT APPLICATION SERVICES

The Curriculum Information Management System Project

The CIM course project go-live in August with great success with deployment out to the KPU Academic departments. A special thanks to Meredith Liard in keeping the project on track ensuring a successful application rollout. The project team has now moved onto the next phase of the CIM project for Program development with an anticipated go-live of May 2023.

BANNER Cloud Migration Project

The University is underway with Ellucian to migrate the BAN-NER ecosystem to the cloud for May 20th, 2023 (moved from October 2022 due to resourcing issues). The project teams continue on the transition and testing of integrations into the cloud with more stakeholder involvement through to May 2023.

BANNER Initiatives

The Banner teams completed the BANNER fall upgrade successfully over the thanksgiving weekend. The teams completed the Moneris Ecommerce rewrites and a Financial Aid upgrade. Current initiatives underway are Online Transcript requests and preparing for the year end regulatory upgrades.

Other Projects

- Fusion Fitness Project: The implementation of a new fitness application to allow for better management and a web interface for the KPU Fitness department is completed with a go-live in September. The next phase will work toward enhancing door access security for fitness rooms.
- Single Sign-on Security Updates: To enhance our single sign on and collaborative strategies, KPU is merging their IT security model for students and employees into one Microsoft Tenant (a standard strategy in the market and with other post-secondary institutions). We are working with all stakeholder areas in this transition as the student email domain will change from @EMAIL.KPU.CA to @STUDENT.KPU.CA. The employee domain will remain unchanged.
- Bookstore POS Cloud Migration: Migration of the current bookstore (PrismRBS) point of sale to the cloud will be completed by March 2023.
- KPU Website migration to cloud: IT is working with Marketing to transition the KPU.CA website to the cloud for business continuity. An RFP process is currently underway.

INFORMATION SECURITY SERVICES

Cyber Insurance Self-Assessment

The competed Cyber Assessment was utilized by KPU Organizational risk to successfully obtain an annual Cyber Insurance policy for KPU. This was a great achievement as many Post-Secondary Institutions are struggling to obtain a insurance due to the maturity level of their information security programs.

Staff Security Awareness Assessments and Training Program for High Risk KPU Departments.

This 2022 assessment has been completed with excellent support from the department's senior leadership, Support and customized cyber awareness training has been provided to these areas to lower the risk of staff falling victim to Cybercrime from Phishing and other related scams. Additional departments will be added to this assessment in 2023.

National October Cyber Security Awareness Month

KPU Information Security is recognizing Cybersecurity Awareness Month in October. The unaware employee is KPU largest Cyber Risk. Ongoing training, support and outreach are being provided year-round with additional employee training and fun cyber awareness activities provided to recognize this important national campaign.

Institutional Research Data Management Strategy (RDM)

A working group facilitated by the KPU Research Data Management Librarian and supported by the Director of Information Security is developing an institutional research data manage-

ment (RDM) strategy, both to fulfil the first requirement of the Tri-Agency Research Data Management Policy1 and to articulate their commitment to RDM at the institutional level.

CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY PLANNING ("CCP")

xé?el4: Pathway Toward Reconciliation

CCP and the AVP, Indigenous Leadership, Innovation and Partnerships are continuing to finalise 'xé?el+' or a strategic pathway for KPU towards advancing reconciliation and facilitating systemic transformations. As the project nears completion, a draft of the document is anticipated for the Board's review early in the New Year.

Childcare Facility

CCP has initiated the Architectural design process related to the childcare facility for the Surrey campus. The childcare facility, which represents a partnership between KPU, the Metis Nation of BC (MNBC), and the Province is intended to ultimately accommodate approximately 61 spaces, along with integrated space to support an Early Childhood Education and Care Certificate (ECECC) program. The current design work is the first step towards delivering consistent, quality, and inclusive childcare in an effort to meet the needs of families that might be working or studying at KPU, members of the Metis Nation of BC, or from the wider community.

SDG Mapping and Reporting

The Provost's Office and CCP launched a project to map KPU's pedagogical and administrative ecosystems in order to illustrate the leadership being undertaken at KPU in advancing the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The project will highlight areas of strength that might be offered as best practice examples and/or potential opportunities for collaboration with other post-secondary institutions. Further, and acknowledging that all of the SDGs are inter-connected, once KPU's strengths and the associated core SDGs are highlighted, such efforts are also intended to inform ongoing reporting efforts as well as the monitoring of KPU's overall support of

the Sustainable Development Goals. This latter objective will be increasingly important as KPU also signed the SDG Accord in June 2022, a global commitment by learning institutions to accelerate the delivery of the SDG's and to annually report on the progress of each institution. Dr. Candy Ho is leading the project through a time-release, and is supported by two KPU student research interns with partial funding for the internships being provided through the CiCan Impact Career Launcher program.

Transit Plaza

In response to the pending launch of the R6 RapidBus, CCP has recently initiated a design process intended to advance preliminary concepts for an enhanced plaza area that will connect KPU students and employees taking transit with the heart of the Surrey campus. The concepts create a transit-oriented gateway for KPU Surrey and an opportunity to collaborate with Indigenous communities and organizations to ensure Indigenous cultures and values are included and celebrated through this improvement to the campus' public realm. The design work, along with detailed project costing, will be advanced through to completion of the construction drawings, to help inform future discussions related to capital planning and funding.

Learning Gardens

Similarly, CCP has launched a new process to complete the design drawings for a series of Learning Garden projects at the Surrey campus. The idea for the Learning Gardens emerged as a quick impact project under the KPU2050 Official Campus Plan (OCP), to help further support KPU's vision as a "transformational learning environment". The Learning Gardens are also intended to enhance the open space network of the Surrey campus, and through them, foster further awareness, dialogue, and reflection on critical issues including reconciliation, diversity, equity, inclusion and climate change. The design effort and a detailed cost estimate, once completed, will further inform subsequent capital planning and funding decisions.
