

Exam Accommodations

Reader

A reader reads text aloud verbatim without any interpretation, restructuring, paraphrasing, comprehension support, or prompting. A student using a reader may also require the reader to read back their written responses. Alternatives to a reader include text-to-speech technology and/or audio recordings of tests read aloud by instructors.

- Sit so that it's easy for the student to see the exam paper as you read aloud.
- Arrange with the student how they would like to direct you in what to read. Students may need you to
 - \circ $\ \$ read the whole exam read aloud.
 - o read only certain content, questions, or words read aloud.
 - o pause or repeat during reading.
 - read the whole paper first and then re-read each question.
 - Point to words or track with your finger so the student can see and hear the words.
- Read clearly, at a steady pace, with intonation, and as accurately as possible.
- Check in with the student to ask if your volume or pace is meeting their needs and make adjustments if requested.
- Semind students that, if requested you will
 - o spell a word that occurs in the exam questions.
 - o read the student's answer back to them.
- Sespect the student's privacy and do not read their exam answers if they don't ask you to.
- Watch your body language. It is easy for non-verbal signals such as facial expressions or stance to demonstrate approval of an approach or answer, frustration or impatience, or concern.
- Sk for feedback at the end of the exam.
- Interpret, reword, or in any way explain or clarify words, questions, or content in the exam.
- Use intonation or volume to emphasize or stress words in an attempt to help the student give the correct answer.
- Give advice on how to approach the test, such as which question to choose, when to move on to the next question, or any test taking strategies.
- Spell a word that does not appear in the exam.
- Decode symbols and unit abbreviations (such as saying "centimeter" instead of "cm."
- Share any discussions you have with the student outside of the exam setting. It's confidential.
