# Meet the Maestro

**A unique opportunity!** TALK is excited and honored to welcome Bramwell Tovey, Music Director of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, who will talk and share some music as he leads the audience through a typical day at the VSO while revealing some of the secrets behind the music performed.

Appointed in 2000, GRAMMY and Juno award-winning conductor/composer Bramwell Tovey is Music Director of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and Artistic Adviser of the VSO School of Music. Under his leadership the VSO has toured to China, Korea, and across Canada and the United States. A renowned composer, he won a 2003 JUNO Award for *Requiem for a Charred Skull*. Commissions include the New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics, the Toronto Symphony and Calgary Opera who premiered his first full length opera *The Inventor* in 2011. Mr. Tovey has appeared as piano soloist with major orchestras including the New York, Sydney, Melbourne, Los Angeles, Pittsburgh, St Louis, Toronto, Royal Philharmonic and Royal Scottish. Mr. Tovey is an Honorary Officer of the Order of Canada, a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Music (UK) and the Royal Conservatory of Music (Toronto) and holds honorary degrees from the universities of British Columbia, Manitoba and Winnipeg and Kwantlen Polytechnic University.

Young people share a lot on line: their thoughts, experiences, photos and videos of their everyday activities. Recently the Canadian law and educational policy have been grappling with how to handle the increased sharing of digital images of young peoples' bodies on line.

Selfies and sexting are increasingly everyday activities as interpersonal communication and the development of intimate relationships moves online.

This talk will present the larger Canadian context for this timely topic and then will share the empirical findings of a three-year study working with young people who share images of themselves online.

Join us to learn about social media usage by young people and about Canadian legal and policy handling of topics around social media sharing. You will also be introduced to some of the cultural/social differences between different social media platform uses.

Katie Warfield is a faculty member of the Department of Journalism and Communication at Kwantlen Polytechnic University. She is the Director of the Visual Media Workshop, a centre for research and learning into digital visual culture.

Do you know why simply dividing people into twelve signs wouldn't ever work? Astrology is anything but simple. ## Remote control plane building from foam-board using free online plans and learning tools

The hobby of remote control building has gone through a complete change with the simplicity of electric motors, inexpensive online ordering of components, building with foam board (from the Dollar Store!), free online plans and step-by-step building videos.

This presentation will be an introduction to the fastest-growing part of the hobby, where we find plans and online resources (all free) and provide an overview of the techniques used for foam-board building of planes, which is so rewarding and a great sport to include kids and grandkids. The planes we build are not the finicky balsa, gas powered hassles of a generation ago. These are made out of foam board, hot glue and packing tape. We crash, we tape and fly again...right away...all the time. This will be a fun and interactive course.

Andreas Bernauer is a professional photographer ([www.andreasbernauer.com](http://www.andreasbernauer.com)), licensed pilot, band manager, and RC plane nut. Andreas has flown and built RC planes for years after receiving a plane as a present. He started building his own planes out of insulation foam cut with a hot wire, and eventually discovered the foam board method and online plans and build videos and never looked back.

Marc Schouten is a specialist with financial planning firm PlayCheques Financial ([www.playcheques.com](http://www.playcheques.com)), director with Pt. Biosolutions and an active dad. His old friend Andreas introduced him to the RC plane building hobby which Marc does with his daughter. He builds when it rains and flies when it's dry.

The black comedy is notorious for pushing the boundaries of decency, good taste, and moral certainty. As a film genre, it encourages the viewer to find humor in its twisted outlook on otherwise taboo subjects. In what other medium can you vicariously have your wife kidnapped so that you can extort a ransom from your wealthy father-in-law (Fargo) or swap murders with your two best friends to collectively get rid of your bosses (Horrible Bosses)? This two-part course will look at several cinematic variations on the black comedy, with a main focus on Damian Szifron's *Wild Tales* (2014), an anthology film comprised of six shorts united by a common theme: revenge. Delve into the cathartic, visceral power of the black comedy in this film study. Isn't it better to choose laughing over crying?

Back by popular demand! Greg Chan teaches academic writing, literature, and film studies courses in Kwantlen Polytechnic University's English department, where he has been an instructor since 1995. Greg is Editor-in-Chief of *Mise-en-scène: The Journal of Film & Visual Narration* and is Community Outreach Coordinator for KDocs, KPU's official documentary film festival ([www.kdocsff.com](http://www.kdocsff.com)). Greg has given us several excellent course on Hitchcock' and Linklater's movies. No one who took these courses will ever look at films in the same way again!

Two years ago Colleen McGoff Dean presented a program that could have been called “Always Look on the Bright Side of Life.” The major thrust of the program was that lots of organizations use Appreciative Inquiry “stories from the bright side” to help their employees love their jobs, create ideas and help the organizations thrive.

We too can be “good news bearers”; we can ask each other “What went well?” and then listen loudly, and then make plans to ask other friends and acquaintances to do the same.

“But good news doesn’t sell papers,” you say.

That’s often true but we are not here to sell papers – we are here to help each other remember our better selves because it helps us laugh, may make us want to sing, and activates our creativity. When people ask the “What went well?” question and learn to love listening to each other’s stories, we bring our values into the present, we become more aware of our strengths, and we add meaning to the moments of our lives.

In this two part program we will ask each other “What went well”, we’ll listen to each other’s stories and ask questions to help each other broaden and build our ability to activate pleasure as a constructive force in each other’s lives. We will also do some reflective writing that can help us get even more value from these ideas.

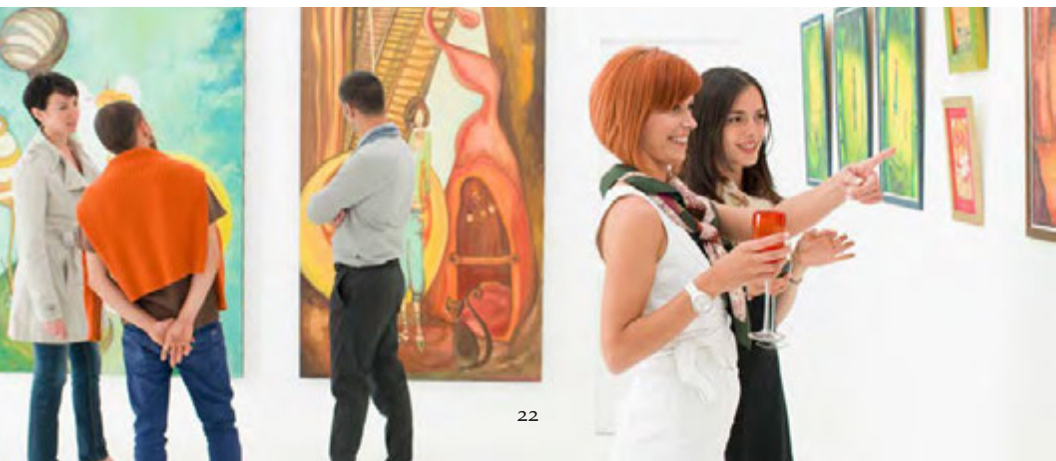
## Vancouver Special: Special Ambivalent Pleasures Vancouver Art Gallery Tour and Workshop

In her latest book, *Once They Were Hats: In Search of the Mighty Beaver*, Frances Backhouse examines humanity's 15,000-year relationship with *Castor canadensis* and the beaver's even longer relationship with North American landscapes and ecosystems. From the waterlogged environs of the Beaver Capital of Canada to a bustling workshop where craftsmen make beaver-felt cowboy hats, Backhouse sifts through the millennia of *castorid* existence in the company of biologists, paleontologists, archaeologists, First Nations elders, historians, hatters, fur traders, trappers, and, of course, beavers. Join her to find out what the beaver means to Canada, what happened after we nearly wiped this essential animal off the map, and how we can learn to live with beavers now that they're returning.

## How can we understand the complex issues in our world?

System dynamics is a method for modeling our complex social, managerial, industrial, economic and ecological systems, thus helping us understand—and perhaps fix—the complex problems that we face in them.

This approach is used in a wide range of areas, from improving industrial supply chain management to identifying key issues in climate change. The field developed initially from the work of Jay W. Forrester at M.I.T. His seminal 1961 book, *Industrial Dynamics*, established the field. Within 10 years of its publication, the span of applications grew from managerial problems to include urban stagnation and decay and the dynamics of growth in a finite world. It is now applied in economics, public policy, environmental studies, defense, theory-building in social science, and other areas, as well as in its home field, management.

So how can you learn about this powerful, insightful paradigm for helping us figure out how the world works? Come to this introductory session!

Geoff teaches college-prep math and physics at KPU. He was a student at M.I.T. when *Urban Dynamics* was published. As a volunteer tutor in the housing projects behind the school, he disagreed with some of its conclusions. He was teaching in New Jersey when *The Limits to Growth* was published, and did find that convincing. He's followed the field ever since, and, with the crisis of climate change we're now all facing, wishes strongly that the field had been more widely taught.

## Ikebana in Japan: Economy and History

This presentation on the nature and practice of Ikebana, Japanese flower arranging, will examine the historical origins and economy of Ikebana as well as demonstrate two styles of flower arranging. As an art form developed in Buddhist monasteries, popularized by court officials, and widely practiced by samurai until the 19th century, the artistic, economic, and social shifts of the practice in the late 19th and early 20th century are particularly interesting. The demonstration will include arrangements of both the Ohara and Sogetsu schools.



Jack Hayes joined the Asian Studies and History faculty at Kwantlen Polytechnic University and the Center for Chinese Research at UBC’s Institute of Asian Research in 2013. His teaching and research focus on late imperial and modern Chinese, Japanese, and Tibetan environmental history and culture, forest, and pastoral resource development and ethnic relations in western China, and twentieth century environmental policy development. He serves on the editorial board and as Associate Editor (China) for the journal *Pacific Affairs*. He has published articles on Chinese environmental history, most recently on fire ecosystems and Chinese legal history, and WWI and the East Asian environmental footprint. His book on the social and environmental history of Sino-Tibetan north Sichuan was published in 2013. In addition to his academic activities, Dr. Hayes has served as a consultant on number of environment and history projects in China and the United States. He has given TALK several popular courses in the past.

## Frequently Asked Questions

### Do I have to be a TALK member to attend courses?

Yes, TALK is an organization run by the members. The \$10 yearly membership dues pay for a small honorarium and parking passes for the presenters. Course registration fees pay for the cost of registration, mailings, etc. There is an exception for some single events where non-members may attend for a slightly higher fee.

### What if I find I will not be able to attend a course I have registered for?

Members are entitled to a refund of course fees if withdrawal occurs before the "Please Register By" date. TALK membership fees will not be refunded.

### Do I have to be a TALK member to attend a Philosophers' Corner?

Philosophers' Corners are open to the public. You do not have to be a TALK member to attend. Pre-registration is not necessary for a Philosophers' Corner and attendance is on a first-come, first-served basis. There is a suggested minimum \$2.00 donation for each Corner.

### May I register after the course "register by" date?

Yes, you may register after that date. However, it is preferable to have members register earlier so that we know if we have enough people to run the course. Some courses fill up quickly so it is a good idea to register as early as you can.

### Is there parking available on campus?

Parking is available on all Kwantlen campuses. The cost is \$5.00.

- **Remember your car's license plate number.**
- Go to a Paystation located at main building entrances.
- Key in license number (not your stall number); select time; then pay. Coins (\$0.25, \$1 and \$2 coins only), Visa, MasterCard, American Express or PayByPhone are accepted at all Paystations. They do not accept debit cards)
- Take receipt - no need to display on vehicle dash. The pass will be valid on all campuses for the day of purchase.

There is also free parking at the Newton Athletic Centre near the Surrey campus. Please allow plenty of time for parking and finding your classroom so that you arrive before the course start time.

If you have a handicapped placard, parking is free in the marked handicapped spaces only. If you park in a regular stall, you are expected to pay. 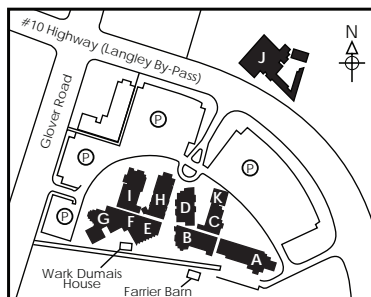
