The Chair, Bruce Choy, called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

4. Chair's Report

4.1. Vice-Chancellor's Report to Senate

Vice-Chancellor and President Bruce Choy presented his written report noting recent federal and provincial budgets offer minimal benefit to KPU. Most new funding is directed toward capital-intensive research initiatives and union training programs, areas that do not directly support KPU's needs. He added that a recent provincial announcement regarding increased trades training funding may provide some benefit, though specific details have not yet been released. He emphasized the importance of diversifying KPU's revenue streams, noting that no additional government support is anticipated in the near term. He indicated that further discussion on financial responsibility would take place during the upcoming budget presentation.

4.1.1 Request to Review KPU's Mission, Vision and Values in Accordance with GV10

Catherine Schwichtenberg moved that the Senate approve Dr. Bruce Choy to review KPU's Mission, Vision and Values, in accordance with KPU Policy GV10.

Catherine Schwichtenberg presented her written report.

9.1. Fiscal 2026-27 Draft University Budget

Bruce Choy, as well as Peter Smailes, Vice-President, Finance and Administration and Carole Laplante, Associate Vice-President, Finance, presented the draft budget and explained that KPU faces a significant and ongoing revenue decline that requires major staffing and non-salary reductions, strategic use of one-time deferred funds, and tightly controlled capital spending to maintain a balanced budget.

The presentation outlined how the draft 2026–27 budget addresses these pressures while prioritizing financial stability, essential safety and security investments, and positioning the university for long-term sustainability.

Senate discussed the use of deferred funds, student retention, the impact of budget cuts on services, capital asset utilization, and continued layoffs. Senators emphasized a focus on protecting student supports and services.

Catherine Schwichtenberg moved that Senate endorse and advise the President that the draft Fiscal 2026-27 Budget aligns with the Budget Principles and Priorities, as presented.

Report to Senate January 2026 Dr. Diane Purvey Provost and Vice President, Academic

Faculty of Health

Dean Sharmen Lee of the Faculty of Health, along with two faculty members, attended a career fair at the Katzie First Nation in Pitt Meadows, BC on November 19, 2025. At the career fair, our representatives took a career first approach and spoke with a variety of prospective students on how the Faculty of Health can be the start of a rewarding future. By connecting with prospective students on this level, they fostered a strong connection with the Katzie First Nation and continued KPU's focus on respect and interconnectedness with Indigenous communities.

On November 27, 2025, the Faculty of Health hosted a pinning ceremony to celebrate the completion of our inaugural "LPN to BSN" Pilot Cohort 1. The ceremony carried out a centuries-old tradition, where nursing students receive a pin to celebrate their transition from student to practicing professional, and was made memorable with notable guests from Fraser Health and the BC Nurses Union. This cohort represented a unique approach with licensed practical nurses from Royal Columbian Hospital upskilling their education to ultimately become registered nurses, while remaining employed as licensed practical nurses.

In addition to our students successfully completing the program, the pilot demonstrated an effective partnership with the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills, alongside the support from Fraser Health and the BC Nurses Union. These partnerships and supporting organizations will play key roles for Cohort 2 and Cohort 3 students. Cohort 2 students will be completing in the Summer 2026 term, and Cohort 3 students have started in January 2026.

Faculty of Science

The Faculty of Science is currently highly focused on student success and retention.

During the 2025 fall term, we have had several meetings, both with specific departments and at the all-faculty level, focused on success rates, examining pre-requisites, and exploring how curriculum structure can support forward progression.

Report of the Associate Vice President, Research and Innovation

Dr. Brett Favaro was appointed AVP, Research and Innovation, effective December 1 2025. **Dr. Favaro's** priority is to support the advancement of research, in all its forms, across the entirety of the academic portfolio of KPU. Over the coming months, **Dr. Favaro** will engage with researchers across KPU, as well as relevant governance committees, to discuss the research enterprise and how best to support its growth.

Climate Strategy

The Draft KPU Climate Strategy: Vision, Values, and Strategic Priorities has been posted online since May 9 2025, at <https://wordpress.kpu.ca/climatestrategy/>. A revised second draft was posted on September 23, 2025 and further consultation has occurred on that second draft. A fulsome discussion of this draft occurred at the October 21, 2025 meeting of the Sustainability Hub. As we work towards finalizing and developing an implementation plan, **Dr. Favaro** welcomes further discussion and can be reached by email to arrange a 1:1 or small group meeting.

Faculty of Trades and Technology

Coquitlam Trades Tour

The Faculty of Trades and Technology hosted 18 Career Program staff members from the Coquitlam School District at the KPU Tech campus on December 17, 2025. The two-hour visit allowed us to showcase our campus and our programs to influencers in the education sector.

The Faculty of Trades and Technology has seen an increased number of students attending our Youth Train in Trades offerings, and we are gearing up to run another Trades Safety class for Coquitlam School District teachers. These ongoing efforts are strengthening our relationship with the Coquitlam School District and directly support their students and teachers by building future pathways and opportunities.

Squamish First Nation - Partnership

The Faculty of Trades and Technology is running a Plumbing Level 1 program in partnership with the Squamish First Nation. This Plumbing Level 1 is an 11-week program that commenced on November 17, 2025 and finishes on February 14, 2026. This is the first time in four years that we have run this program.

This program is being taught by **Hameed Khan** and has been supported through funding from SkilledTradesBC in support of our Indigenous partners. Some previous graduates of the program have continued in the industry, securing employment to support ongoing industry development and needs in the Lower Mainland through the Sea-to-Sky region.

In addition, we continue to see growth in our Carpentry programs in partnership with the Squamish First Nation, which are taught by **Terry Williams**. Terry will be finishing up a Carpentry Level 1 intake at the Squamish First Nation Training and Trades Centre at the end of January 2026.

International Society of Scholarship on Teaching and Learning (ISSOTL)

From November 3 to November 7, 2025, **Dean Laura McDonald** presented alongside **Dr. Chad Flinn** at the International Society of Scholarship on Teaching and Learning (ISSOTL) conference in Christchurch, New Zealand. They presented on compassionate disruption in Canada's post-secondary system as well as ways to put the student back at the centre of the conversation. This speaking engagement fostered many conversations and connections with the New Zealand trades training community and highlighted potential future recruitment and exchange opportunities for students and faculty members. This built on the Canadian Construction Women event that **Dean Laura McDonald** spoke at in October 2025, which was attended by approximately 200 young women considering a career in the skilled trades. Laura's focus was on considering not only a career in their chosen trade, but also the adjacent careers which are available beyond the tools such as site supervisor and university instructor!

Wilson School of Design

On November 16, 2025, the Museum of Vancouver hosted an exclusive guided tour of the exhibit, *Future Makers: Chairs by New Designers*. The event was moderated by Product Design Chair, **Iryna Karaush** and led by Product Design students **Aiden Fornier, Nilvia Morales, Samantha Spencer** and **Jodh Sidhu** – some of the emerging designers behind the chairs on display. The students provided insight on their inspirations, challenges and processes behind their mahogany chair prototypes.

Graphic Design for Marketing instructor, **Matt Heximer**, was also a guest speaker at the awards ceremony on November 20, 2025. His presentation provided a behind-the-scenes look at his six-week residency in New York's East Village while attending Cooper Union's Condensed Type Design Program.

Holiday cards designed by Graphic Design for Marketing students, **Sarah Nelson** and **Monica Snow**, have been selected for the BC Children's Hospital annual Holiday Card Program fundraiser. Thirteen designs made by local artists are available for purchase [online](#) and at select London Drugs locations this season, with all proceeds going towards supporting pediatric care programs and services at the BC Children's Hospital.

Graphic Design for Marketing graduates, **Veronika Kansaka** and **Cody Garcia**, were recently honored with 2025 Trailblazer Awards by the Association of Registered Graphic Designers of Canada (RGD). The Trailblazer Awards acknowledge and celebrate students from underrepresented and marginalized communities, assisting winners in covering the cost of their design education and recognizing their exceptional design skills, hard work and resilience.

Policy and Academic Affairs Team

The Access applicant category in AR2 Admission Procedure is being proposed for revisions to remove existing barriers for students with intellectual, developmental, and/or learning disabilities, so that the students can be considered for admission to select programs at KPU through the Including All Citizens Pathway (IACP). Applicants who apply under the Access applicant category will be evaluated by a newly established Access Admissions Committee using the principles of Universal Design for Learning and inclusion. Nadia Henwood, Associate Vice President Enrolment Service and Registrar and Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh, Lead Advisor on Disability, Accessibility, and Inclusion and Sociology faculty, will be consulting with the Senate Standing Committees on Policy and Curriculum for their feedback this month.

Over the past academic year, the Policy and Academic Affairs team conducted sector scan research and internal consultations on graduate students' leave of absence, academic progress, and minimum admission requirements for graduate degrees at KPU. On December 1, 2025, the Graduate Studies Council moved that the draft graduate studies general regulations on leave of absence, academic progress, and minimum admission requirements be recommended to Senate for approval, effective September 1, 2026. The draft regulations will be presented to Senate Standing Committees in January and February 2026 for recommendation to Senate on March 2, 2026 for motion.

Academic Integrity Team

An [Academic Integrity Kahoot game](#) has been developed to support faculty in having conversations about academic integrity in their classes. [Moodle H5P Reflection Activities](#) have also been created for faculty to insert into their Moodle shells to encourage students to engage in ongoing reflection about academic integrity. The unit also presented to the Central Advising Team on Academic Integrity and Restorative Justice, answering questions to help with supporting students through breach processes.

The team participated in the Long Night Against Procrastination event hosted by the Library on December 1, 2025; reaching over 90 students, sharing academic integrity information and tips to avoid procrastination, as well as reducing the temptation to turn to unauthorized help.

Continuing Professional Studies Team

In December 2025, CPS launched its Youth Summer Camp marketing campaign. The campaign was launched to encourage parents and youth to sign up for the mailing list in order to receive up to date information about summer camp registration information at KPU. Registration is set to open during the first week of March 2026.

During the fall 2025 term (September to December 2025), 155 unique learners utilized the StrongerBC future skills grant, compared to the September 2024-March 2025 term, where 164 unique learners had utilized that grant.

Flexible Learning Office

A new [partnership](#) has been forged between KPU and Western Community College (WCC) that aims to enhance student mobility and educational opportunities. The Memorandum of Agreement focuses on creating flexible, streamlined pathways for WCC students to transfer to KPU and pursue further studies, including bachelor's degrees. Both institutions emphasize commitment to accessible, flexible learning and student success, with plans for joint activities and resource sharing to align programs and support students.

The Flexible Learning Office also facilitated the signing of a partnership with eCampusOntario to list KPU offerings in the National Upskilling Platform, <https://skillsforjobs.ca/>, which is integrated with the federal Job Bank. This initiative aligns with **Prime Minister Mark Carney's** September 2025 [announcement](#) about the platform's role in helping Canadians reskill for the evolving job market.

A new video showcasing student testimonials on the benefits of Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) is now available on the [Flexible Learning website](#). To further support students, a dedicated [Student Resources](#) tab has been added, with details on the Rapid PLAR workflow and answers to frequently asked questions.

Work Integrated Learning Team

The Journalism and Communications department is taking advantage of this opportunity for prerequisite removal for four second-year classes. Context and Background

The Post-Baccalaureate Diploma in Human Resources Management (HRMT) is currently a 42-credit program originally designed to meet the needs of a primarily international student body. Recent intakes have been cancelled due to low enrolment linked to changes in the international education environment. At the same time, there is clear evidence of a strong domestic market for this program in

three segments: career changers, HR professionals seeking to upgrade their education, and degree transitioners.

The proposed program revision is intended to realign the diploma with the needs of this mature domestic market. Proposed changes include updating the program learning outcomes to reflect current HR knowledge/practice and the readiness of the new target market. The proposal also seeks to reduce the total number of credits to better reflect domestic student needs. Our market research and feedback from the Program Advisory Committee highlight the importance of creating more expedited pathways.

Given the new program learning outcomes, all course outlines have been reviewed and revised, including enhanced learning outcomes, refreshed course descriptions, and the removal of prerequisites where possible.

In addition, the proposed delivery model shifts to include intersession timeslots and a combination of asynchronous and synchronous delivery using a technology-enhanced (hyflex) classroom. The proposed delivery model recommends a 6:00–9:00 p.m. timeslot and allows students the option to be admitted for a single course. These recommendations are currently being explored with the Office of the Registrar.

Key Messages

1. Reduced program credit hours from 42 credits to 33 credits
2. Updated program learning outcomes and course learning outcomes
3. 2 “new” courses that are reduced credit course versions of 2 current required courses
4. Delivery change from semester based to intersessions across all 3 semesters
5. Scheduled synchronous classes using technology enhanced classrooms

COMMITTEE REPORT

On November 28, 2025, the Joint Senate Standing Committee on Academic Planning and Priorities and on University Budget recommended that Senate approve the suspension of the Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security program, effective January 1, 2026.

Context and Background

The Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security (CCAS) is a 15-credit program developed by the Computer Science and Information Technology department in the Melville School of Business. Intakes have been opened three times; the first in Fall 2024. Each of the three intakes was cancelled due to lack of demand. No students are currently enrolled or progressing through the CCAS program.

Key Messages

1. Each of the three intakes generated an insufficient number of applications. Efforts to drive demand included revision of admission requirements, promotion to industry professionals, recent graduates and current students, and a paid marketing campaign that generated interest, but few applications.
2. The paid online marketing campaign generated more than 30,000 visits to the program website, and over 200 leads; these failed to translate into applications. We conclude that there is potential demand for the program if we identify and remove as yet undetermined barriers to enrolment and/or redesign the program to appeal to a clearly defined target market. During the suspension period, Melville will hold consultations, conduct research, and make modifications that could increase demand.

Implications/Risks

As there are no students enrolled or progressing through the program, there is no impact to students and no financial implications to the proposed cancellation.

Proposal to Suspend the Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security (CCAS)

Context and Background

The Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security is a 15-credit program offered by the Computer Science and Information Technology department in the Melville School of Business. It was developed in response to the growing demand for IT professionals with expertise in cloud computing and security and was intended to attract recent graduates, current students and IT professionals. Intakes have been opened three times; the first in Fall 2024. Each of the three intakes was cancelled due to lack of demand. No students are currently enrolled or progressing through the CCAS program. Policy AC 10 permits a maximum of three intake cancellations in 2 consecutive years.

i. Impacted Credential and Field of Study

Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security (CCAS)

ii. Program Location

Blended format with in-person sessions hosted at KPU Surrey.

iii. Faculty, Department or School Offering the Program

Computer Systems and Information Technology (CSIT), Melville School of Business.

iv. Proposed Date for Suspension, Notification Period, Date for Review

Date for Suspension: January 2026

Notification Period: Starting December 2025

Date for Review: September 2027

v. Rationale for Suspension

Lack of enrolment demand

Intakes for the Citation in Cloud Architecture and Security (CCAS) program were opened three times: Fall 2024, Spring 2025 and Fall 2025.

- Fall 2024:	8 applicants	0 admitted	0 enrolled.
- Spring 2025:	1 applicant	0 admitted	0 enrolled.
- Fall 2025:	2 applicants	0 admitted	0 enrolled.

Each intake generated an insufficient number of applications. Further, most of the applicants failed to meet the minimum entrance requirements. Efforts to drive demand included the following:

- Admission requirements were revised after the first intake to make the program more accessible to students and working professionals looking to upgrade their skills. The requirement for IT-related work experience was reduced to 2 years from 5, and completion of 30 credits in a related discipline was added as an alternative to the completion of a diploma in IT, computer science, or computer engineering.

- The program was promoted at open houses, industry events, and information sessions. Some CSIT faculty members also promoted the program to their industry networks and current students.
- A paid marketing campaign was launched to raise awareness. Below is a summary of campaign results:

Campaign dates:	April 14, 2024 – March 31, 2025
Marketing spend:	\$48,000
Clicks to program website:	34,000
Cost per click:	\$1.41
Total leads generated:	205
	138 asked a question, 67 registered for an info session

From this we conclude that there is general interest in programs teaching cloud architecture and security. The campaign succeeded in driving awareness of KPU's CCAS program and generated 34,000 clicks to the program website, but these interactions failed to translate into applications. The low lead-to-application rate suggests that there are issues beyond marketing campaign performance. There may be as yet undetermined barriers to enrolment, or the current program may not be a good fit for the intended market.

To translate interest into applications and enrolments, market research will be undertaken during the program suspension period to explore competitive offerings. A detailed comparison of course fees, program length and delivery format could reveal program modifications that could drive demand. Other avenues of investigation will include consultation to identify key needs and benefits sought by different groups of learners (current students, recent graduates, and industry professionals).

Curricular issues

The CCAS program was intended to appeal to recent graduates, current students, and practicing IT professionals. It is likely that each of these groups has different decision-making criteria and may seek out a more targeted curriculum than the CCAS program currently provides. Potential issues include, but are not limited to:

- Program length: The courses in the CCAS program follow the standard academic semester format. The program requires a minimum of two semesters to complete because CCAS 1110 is a prerequisite for three of the program courses. This extended program length may not appeal to working professionals wanting to upgrade their qualifications while working full time. Recent graduates and current students may prefer a more condensed format that does not add two additional semesters to their studies.
- Program breadth: Experienced IT professionals may not perceive value in every CCAS course. The extra time and cost required to take all five courses in the Citation may diminish the appeal to this target group, making individual CPS courses or more targeted industry certifications more appealing by comparison.

- Industry relevance: The IT sector frequently uses short, targeted industry certifications to demonstrate mastery of specific skills. An academic citation may not have the same appeal to working professionals or potential employers, especially in a field experiencing dynamic change.

In summary, given consistently low application numbers despite concerted promotion in 2024-2025, it is likely the CCAS program will fail to generate sufficient, sustainable demand without significant changes or improvements. The CSIT faculty and the Melville School of Business leadership team unanimously support the proposal to suspend the CCAS program to hold consultations, conduct research, and make modifications that could increase demand.

vi. Plan for Suspension

1. Proposed review date to reinstate or discontinue the suspended program:

September 2027

2. Consultations with faculty and staff

CSIT faculty and Melville staff are aware of the intake cancellation for Fall 2025 and the indefinite postponement of further intakes. A motion to recommend suspension of the program, distributed to faculty in the CSIT department, received unanimous support.

Endorsement by the Provost

The decision follows the cancellation of three consecutive intakes due to low enrollment:

- Fall 2024: 8 applicants, 0 admitted, 0 enrolled
- Spring 2025: 1 applicant, 0 admitted, 0 enrolled
- Fall 2025: 2 applicants, 0 admitted, 0 enrolled

Currently, there are no students enrolled or progressing through the program. In accordance with Policy AC10, we are now required to either suspend or discontinue the program. After consultation with the CSIT department, a unanimous decision was made to suspend the program. This suspension period will allow time to conduct market research and explore meaningful revisions that may enhance the program's viability in the future. Therefore, I endorse Alia Somji, Dean pro tem, Melville School of Business recommendation that the CCAS program be suspended for a period of up to two years, beginning in the Spring 2026 semester.

On behalf of Melike Kinik-Dicleli, Meredith Haaf (Director, Planning & Accountability, OPA) presented the monthly report on the status of program reviews across the university, noting that 32 programs are currently at various stages of the program review process, with a significant number of them in the self-study phase.

Chair's Report to Senate Senate Standing Committee on Teaching and Learning December 4, 2025

The final SSCTL meeting of 2025 was busy, well-attended, and productive. The Committee received a detailed report from Leann Waddington, AVP Teaching and Learning. This report included updates about recent and upcoming TL Commons workshops and information sessions, the Simple Syllabus initiative, and guidance materials (including updated guidance on Teaching use of Generative AI).

The Committee welcomed Susan Xia, from the Academic Integrity Unit, who delivered a report on academic integrity trends and initiatives, as well as a growing collection of resources (Compiled on an Academic Integrity Resource Shelf – [December 2025 edition](#)). The presentation also covered upcoming research on Restorative Justice and Academic Integrity that will be led by Alana Abramson, and we hear that a centralized restorative justice website is planned for the new year. The Committee was provided an overview of the results of the [2025 Faculty and Researcher Feedback Survey](#), and a report on current academic integrity statistics. The Committee posed questions and discussed the reported trends and initiatives.

Jovita Vytasek, Learning Strategist, provided the Committee with an update on the now-completed Gen AI Student guide (available [here](#)), which incorporates feedback from accessibility services, indigenous leadership, and deans, and is now available for faculty and students to clarify AI usage parameters. This was followed by a discussion about efforts to centralize generative AI resources at KPU in order to improve navigation and access for students and faculty.

Catherine Schwichtenberg led the Committee in a discussion about student representation on SSCTL. The Members were enthusiastically supportive of student participation and representation on this committee, noting that it is a governance body where the voices of students are particularly important. Discussion touched on resources and supports to facilitate student participation.

Mike Larsen led the Committee in a discussion about the SSCTL annual workplan. In light of recent announcements regarding an updated strategic plan for the University, the Committee agreed to refocus its workplan to provide recommendations to Senate on teaching excellence and program quality.

The Committee agreed to dedicate time at the next meeting to discuss emerging challenges associated with wearable AI technology.
