Students will have experienced a primarily exambased assessment system. Exams are often cumulative, with course grades based mostly, or all, on a single exam. Focusing efforts towards the end of a course may have been a successful strategy. The semester-based system, with its faster pace, is unfamiliar.	Familiarize students with the style of continuous assessment that will be used in their courses. Have students review Course Presentations and Moodle pages at the beginning of the semester. Many students attended English medium schools throughout their education. These students may not identify as ESL students, and are familiar with academic work in English. However, writing may be organized differently from expected Canadian conventions.	Approaching language issues through a "Global Englishes" lens may be helpful, recognizing the validity of varied English forms. At the same time, provide any cultural information needed to help the student acquire additional communication strategies for the Canadian context. In secondary school, most students will have written only short assignments that do not require the use of outside sources. Writing instruction may also have focused on IELTS test preparation (ie. "the five paragraph essay" supported by personal examples rather than research).
