OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT AND VICE CHANCELLOR

Events

In addition to regular governance and administrative duties, my focus since the late November 2024 meeting of the Board has been to grapple with the enrolment, revenue and financial pictures for Fiscal 2026 and beyond. Meanwhile work continues on building relationships and exploring new ideas for KPU locally and beyond.

On January 7th I joined KPU International and others in a splendid meeting with colleagues from Al Baha University who were visiting from Saudi Arabia. The potential for exchanges and pathways to study at KPU is considerable.

On January 10 I met by Teams with Dr. Gervon Fearon, President at George Brown College" to plan a dialogue both here and in Toronto on issues facing higher education, nominally entitled "A Tale of Two Cities".

I was pleased to join the Invisible Conditions workshop offered by OEIC on January 15 and the Generative AI Community of Practice on January 17th.

The annual reception for the BC Cabinet and the Fist Nations Chief was held in Vancouver on January 20th and I was pleased to attend, along with several other KPU colleagues. KPU was a proud sponsor of the event.

I have had a number of follow up meetings with colleagues from KPU, TRU and Ontario Tech on the potential project in Kazakhstan, and I was invited to meet with an informal group of semi-retired presidents on January 23rd to discuss leadership at this time of disruption in higher education. See also my visit to KZ in March as mentioned below.

January 24 saw the regular meeting of the Ridge-Meadows steering committee that is working on a feasibility study for post-secondary education in that region.

On February 3 to 5 I attended the Presidents' Roundtable hosted by EAB. It was a very productive set of sessions looking at enrollment strategies, the

political environment in the US, AI in higher education, and Advancement. I am sharing presentations with my senior colleagues and following up with EAB on having some session at KPU.

I dipped my toes into using AI to develop a keynote that I have been invited to give in Beijing in April on the topic of Quality, Trust and Safety as they relate to sustainable international education development. Craig Wright in the T and L Commons did all the heavy lifting and it was useful to see the benefits and shortcomings of using AI to create a cogent presentation.

On this topic, on February 11th I was pleased the sign an agreement with the China Services Centre for Scholarly Exchange: an important organization in China for advancing partnerships related to the student and faculty exchanges, study tours etc.





Also, that day I attended the CAEL Advisory Committee meeting, and the KPU Foundation Board met in the evening where I heard about a number of amazing projects funded through the Foundation and the lke Barber endowment.

The council of presidents of the Association of Governing Boards met virtually on February 19th, and on the 20th. I was excited to participate in the first Faculty Connect event to be held at KPU. It was an amazing event, with Leidy Klotz there to engage with us on "the untapped science of less".

Spring Convocation was held from February 24 to 28, with 10 ceremonies. We were pleased to honor several local heroes with Doctor of Laws degrees: Harry Bains, Bruce Ralston, Amos and Edith Kambere, and David Young.

On March 6 and 7, I attended the national Al academy, hosted by Higher Education Strategy Associates, and then from March 10-19, I returned to Kazakhstan to explore further opportunities for KPU to recruit students, foster exchanges, and work with other universities to establish a campus in the Ulytau region. Along with colleagues from KPU International I attended educational fairs hosted by the Canadian International School, and signed an MOU with Satbayev University.

On March 21st I attended KPU night with the Surrey Eagles Junior Hockey game.

OFFICE OF COMMUNICATIONS

Events

During this reporting period, which covers October 1, 2024, to January 31, 2025, the Office of Communications relaunched the employee newsletter after a multi-year break. Prepared using resources already available to the department, the newsletter is intended to keep employees connected to different areas of the university through a human focus on some of the people that make it tick. The newsletter directly aligns with Goal A2 of the Vision 2026 strategic plan. The first issue in October received 667 views and the second issue in December received 720 views. Communications is continuing to evolve and develop the newsletter to enhance the offer.

Alongside the re-launch of an employee newsletter, the university's Employee Portal intranet platform continues to see growth with total viewership over this period remained consistent with last year (4,309 views in 2023, 4,332 views in 2024), despite 23 per cent fewer stories being published in 2024. The change in story publication was a result of shifting some focus to the employee newsletter.

Communications supported the development and the launch of the myKPU student portal with a full communications plan and deliverables. Ahead of work on the employee portion of myKPU, the department worked collaboratively Information Technology, Human Resources and other key areas to review employee communication platforms to ensure the university is making best use of current resources and to identify future needs.

Communications worked with multiple departments across the university on many projects, including the continued impact of federal government changes on international student enrolment, student affairs issues, analysis and optimization of internal communication plans and processes, convocation materials, and research and writing support for webpages, including for Melville School of Business, Faculty of Health,

Wilson School of Design, Nursing, Biology and Sustainable Agriculture.

In October 2025, Communications welcomed Lena Shulman as an interim Media Specialist. Lena's collaborative work with several departments generated extensive media coverage for KPU projects and initiatives, such as her story about the Wilson School of Design researcher working to create the perfect T-shirt.

Collectively, Communications highlighted a wide variety of activities at KPU, including the Flex program, archaeological overview assessments of campuses, university recipients of the King Charles III Coronation Medals and more. An Applied Genomics Centre study on heat stress in cows, a Lifespan Cognition Lab study on memory failure, an anthropology student's research on humanbear conflicts and Dr. Tara Lyon's research on mapping the Surrey drug crisis were among the research stories spotlighted by the team. Further stories promoted university events, including the President's Dialogue Series and Creative Connections.


The department continued to put faculty members forward to media to provide expertise on topics such as the 2024 B.C. and U.S. elections, the Taylor Swift phenomenon and the U.S. presidential inauguration.

Communications' efforts have seen KPU's news and instructors receive coverage from the Canadian Press, CBC, CTV, The Globe and Mail, 980 CKNW and Black Press Media. KPU also reached broader audiences through specialty media outlets such as Drishti Magazine and Fairchild TV.

The team's digital communications specialist has enhanced these efforts through video coverage to support media outreach, social media engagement, internal communications and government relations.

From October 1, 2024, to January 31, 2025, the Office of Communications helped KPU gain 1,183 media mentions with a potential audience reach of 1.33 billion (source: Meltwater). Of those

mentions, 1,055 were positive and 128 were neutral. In addition, Office of Communications stories and news releases drew 170,649 impressions on the KPU LinkedIn and KPU News X accounts combined.

INDIGENOUS LEADERSHIP

Counselling and Student Engagement for Indigenous Students

Overview: The following initiatives and programs were undertaken to enhance the mental health and well-being of Indigenous students at KPU throughout this academic school year. These efforts reflect Indigenous Service's commitment to creating an inclusive and supportive environment for Indigenous students, fostering both mental health and personal success.

Indigenous Medicine Garden Project: The Indigenous Medicine Garden project continues is a key initiative aimed at supporting the mental health and well-being of Indigenous students. This culturally significant space will provide students with access to traditional Indigenous healing practices, including the use of medicinal plants. The garden will serve as a site of learning, connection, and healing, offering students opportunities to engage in both physical and mental wellness activities rooted in Indigenous culture.



Hub Project: The Hub project aims to improve access to a variety of university services for Indigenous students. The Hub acts as a centralized point where students can easily access support services such as counselling, accessibility services, and learning supports. By removing barriers to accessing essential university services, the Hub project ensures that Indigenous students receive streamlined and personalized support

students need for academic success and mental health and well-being.

Drop-In Engagement and Connection Workshops at the Gathering Place: In addition to the formal counselling and support programs, informal engagement opportunities were provided through drop-in connection workshops held at the Indigenous Gathering Place. These workshops are designed to foster community, encourage peer support, and offer students a safe space to share their experiences and connect. The connective setting of the Gathering Place helps to promote open dialogue, resilience-building, and strengthened connections among Indigenous students.



Mental Health Groups for Indigenous Students: These groups were facilitated to address unique mental health and personal challenges faced by Indigenous students. These groups provided students with the opportunity to share their experiences in a culturally sensitive and supportive environment. The groups focused on building mental health resilience, coping strategies, and addressing issues such as intergenerational trauma and identity challenges.



Workshops for Indigenous Students: A variety of workshops were offered throughout the year, covering topics such as academic success strategies, stress management, navigating university life, and fostering cultural pride and connection. These workshops were designed with Indigenous students' needs in mind, ensuring they had the tools and support necessary to thrive in their academic and personal lives. The workshops also included topics related to traditional knowledge and practices to honor the students' cultural identities. Some examples of workshops include: Medicine Bag workshops, Spoon Carving, Talking Circle Series, and Rock Painting.



Clinical Counselling for Indigenous Students: Clinical counselling services have been continuously provided to Indigenous students, with a focus on dismantling barriers centered around accessing counselling services. Having a counsellor with Indigenous ancestry and a mental health background allows for the capacity to offer a culturally responsive approach to therapeutic support. In addition to supporting Indigenous student mental health, my service aims to provide students with the tools to overcome challenges related to mental health, identity, and academic pressures.

Outreach to Classrooms Regarding Mental Health: In efforts to raise awareness and reduce stigma around mental health, I will engage in outreach initiatives that directly engage Indigenous and non-Indigenous students in classroom settings. Presentations and workshops were conducted to inform students about available mental health resources, highlighting the importance of self-care, seeking help, and building a supportive academic community, including the importance offering supports from a non-Eurocentric lens. This

outreach helped normalize mental health discussions and encouraged students to seek support when needed.

Conclusion: The initiatives outlined above reflect a holistic and culturally responsive approach to supporting the mental health and academic success of Indigenous students. Through targeted programs, workshops, and outreach efforts, Indigenous Services and KPU continue to foster an inclusive and supportive environment where Indigenous students can thrive both academically and personally. Moving forward, we will continue to build on these initiatives to ensure that Indigenous students feel seen, heard, and supported in all aspects of their university experience.

Indigenous Student Events: Fall Semester 2024 into Spring Semester 2025

Throughout the Fall Semester 2024 and into Spring Semester 2025, various events were organized to foster engagement, build relationships, and establish trust among Indigenous students. These included casual lunches, such as the Bannock Tacos lunches, where students connected over shared meals and important information. Creative and cultural activities were also prominent, with a Beading Circle and a Métis Flower Beading Workshop, allowing students to explore traditional arts. Theatre outings, including performances of "As You Like It or The Land Acknowledgment" and Grease," provided thought-provoking experiences. The community spirit was further strengthened during the Indigenous Student Christmas Dinner. Additionally, tutoring services began in Spring Semester 2025, offering academic support with flexible meeting times. These events collectively aimed to create a supportive and connected community for Indigenous students.


OFFICE OF PLANNING AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Experience

Student Experience

2024 Student Satisfaction Survey: This survey collects a range of information from students on their KPU experience to identify areas for improvement. The 2024 survey was launched on October 25 and closed on November 24. Reporting thus far has included results relating to housing, including students' preferences for on-campus student housing to support next steps in KPU's development of a student housing strategy.

2023 Student Satisfaction Survey: The dashboard reporting the results was published last year, but during this reporting period two additional reports were created: an infographic on student diversity and a report on the gendered violence results, which was included in the survey based on a collaboration with KPU faculty member Dr. Cherylynn Bassani. The gendered violence survey questions assessed student experiences with sexism and inappropriate behaviour at KPU, including but not limited to inappropriate treatment based on gender, unwanted sexual behaviours and sexual assault (on and off campus). The student diversity infographic (see image below) is available on OPA's public and SharePoint sites and the gendered violence results can be found on OPA's SharePoint site.



International Peer Mentorship Program Surveys: This program matches senior KPU students with new international students in order to increase social connections and help them navigate services and resources while studying at KPU. Surveys were conducted of both mentors and mentees to elicit feedback on their experiences in the program. The surveys were conducted November to December and a report of the results was delivered to the Office of Global Engagement in January.

Field School Surveys: These surveys provide feedback from students who recently returned from field school experiences abroad. Reports of the most recent surveys, conducted in the summer and fall semesters and covering students who travelled to Barcelona, Guatemala, or Tanzania, were delivered to KPU's Office of Global Engagement on December 5.

Supported KPU International's scholarship programming by providing them with a list of International students who are eligible for the International Student Merit Scholarship, as defined by their criteria.

Employee Experience

2024 Employee Engagement Survey: This survey covered three main areas: employee engagement, health and well-being, and diversity and equity. It was sent out to all employees on November 6 and closed on December 4. The report was delivered to Human Resources and the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities, and communication is being developed to release the report to the KPU community.

Members of the OPA team attended the 2024 joint conference of the British Columbia Institutional Research and Planners' (BCIRP) association and Pacific Northwest Association of Institutional Research Practitioners (PNAIRP), as well as the Canadian Institutional Research and Planning Association (CIRPA) annual conference. These are the primary conferences for institutional researchers and planners and were valuable opportunities for OPA to explore new ideas, practices, and strategies in institutional research. At BCIRP/PNAIRP, one team member delivered a well-attended presentation on institutional research process improvement using Power BI.

Sustainability

Integrated Planning

Continuously monitored enrolments and applicants to estimate the international student decline for spring 2025. Developed enrolment projections for FY26 based on an analysis of changes in number of applicant and conversion rates to assess the impact of declining international enrolments on the budget for FY26.

Presentation on enrolment projections for FY26 delivered for townhalls in December 2024 and February 2025, as well as to various governance committees.

Developed the enrolment and workload plans and the tuition estimates for the financial assessment of the proposed Masters in Operations and Supply Chain Management.

Assessed the demand and financial impact of the proposed certificate in Brewing and Brewery Operations.

Delivered Annual Program Metrics reports that consolidate existing dashboard data to provide key performance metrics on 33 limited-intake programs and 40 open-intake disciplines that provide information on the health of KPU's programs.

Ongoing enhancements and updates of OPA Power BI dashboards: Academic Standing, Grade Distribution, Credential, Applicant Funnel, Enrolment Tracking, Current Enrolment, Enrolment by Year, Over-Enrolment, Seats, Employee, Retention Overview, Limited-Intake Retention, and others.

Provided Human Resources (and Payroll) with the list of instructors and classes with over-enrolment due to Last Class to Graduate (LCG) for fall 2024 and spring 2025 to provide to the KFA in compliance with article 11.02.a of the KPU-KFA Collective Agreement.

Enrolment Planning

Created the Midterm Enrolment Report for fall 2024 as of November 4, 2024 and the Stable Enrolment

report for spring 2025 as of January 20, 2025 in the PowerBI Enrolment Tracking Dashboard.

Developed and distributed an infographic fact sheet that provides an overview of enrolment (e.g., headcounts, FTEs, and international student seat utilization) for the most recent semester and academic year for KPU decision-makers. In this reporting period, a fact sheet was produced for spring 2025. The fact sheets are updated each term following the stable enrolment date and published on OPA's SharePoint site.

Provided KPU International with a report on students given "No show" status to support enhanced understanding of changing applicant behaviour in light of recent IRCC policy changes.

Applicant Funnel dashboards: Applicant funnels for summer 2025, fall 2025, and spring 2026 are currently running and dashboards are updated weekly. The dashboards provide information on the number of applicants and their conversion through each step in the application process to qualified, offered, admitted, and ultimately enrolled. The dashboards also include information on country of origin of international applicants.

Applicant Tracking Reports: Provides weekly updates during the final six months of the applicant cycle on expected conversions of applicants to admitted, and admitted to enrolled. Once registration begins, the report also includes the number of admitted who actually registered in courses. The weekly updates for summer 2025, fall 2025, and spring 2026 are ongoing.

Creativity

Research, Scholarship and Innovation Partnerships

Supported the Office of Research Services (ORS) by providing faculty numbers that meet the criteria of being in Social Sciences, Humanities, or the Arts for their grant application to Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC).

Quality

Continuous Improvement

Program Review: OPA's Quality Assurance (QA) Team supports the Program Review process, from planning to data collection to coordination with the Senate Standing Committee on Program Review (SSCPR). The work the QA team supported this reporting period includes:

Program Review kick-off meetings were held for four programs that started the Program Review process in January 2025:

- Sociology on November 18, 2024
- Human Resources Management on December 9, 2024
- Legal Administrative Studies on December 9, 2024
- Engineering on January 14, 2025

Organized and hosted External Review site visits for the following programs:

- Economics External Review Site Visit on December 3 and 4, 2024

In addition, Administrative Data reports were prepared and delivered to five programs; student, alumni, faculty, and discipline/sector surveys were conducted, and reports of results were provided to four programs; and student, alumni, faculty, and discipline/sector surveys were developed for seven programs.

Course Feedback surveys for fall 2024 were conducted for 1,806 sections. The Quality Assurance Team prepared and delivered 958 reports to instructors. In addition, 109 aggregated reports were delivered to post-probationary instructors. Deans received the reports for probationary instructors and aggregate reports for post-probationary instructors. We continued to use social media and incentives (chance to win a \$200 gift card) to promote the course feedback surveys and increase response rates. The response rate for fall 2024 was 30%, which is slightly lower than the 32% response rate for fall 2023.

Completed major revisions to AC3 (Program Review) Policy and Procedure, which was approved by the Board of Governors November 27, 2024. The key changes included standardizing the timeframe for review of degree and non-degree programs to every five years and implementing a 24-month time limit for completion of program reviews to support KPU's compliance with ministry expectations. The new Policy and Procedure will come into effect September 2025.

Provided the Melville School of Business with a dashboard to track their accomplishment of target competencies in their Business Education Framework and Program Learning Outcomes, which also satisfies requirements for external accreditation.

Nursing Simulations Pilot Survey: The Faculty of Health began a pilot in which additional simulation experiences were integrated into the BSN curriculum. This survey asked students in the pilot to identify how helpful the additional simulations were in preparing them for clinical experiences, and how they could be improved. The survey was administered on January 15 and the report of the results was delivered to the Faculty of Health's Simulation Lead on January 22.

Accountability and Transparency to Friends,
Communities, Partners and Governments

Received ministry approval for the 2024 Accountability Plan and Report and posted the report on the KPU website.



Submitted to the Board Governance committee the first annual progress report on VISION 2026, which is based on data reported in the 2023/24 Accountability Report, and benchmark data on ministry-required metrics from comparable institutions.

Submitted KPU data (April 1, 2002 to September 15, 2024) to the ministry's Central Data Warehouse (CDW).

Submitted the Interim FY 2024-25 FTE Report to the ministry.

Completed the IRCC Compliance Report by providing the status of 6,296 International students as of fall 2024.

Completed KPU's annual submission to Statistics Canada's Full-time: University and College Academic Staff System (FT-UCASS) survey.

Submitted the KPU cohort to BC Stats for the Diploma, Associate Degree, Certificate, Trades Foundation and Trades-Related Vocational Student Outcomes (DACTFTRV-SO) survey and the Apprenticeship Student Outcomes (APPSO) survey.

Assisted Human Resources in the review of the Post-Secondary Employers' Association's (PSEA) summary of KPU's submission to the Human Resources Database for KPU sign-off.

Along with KPU International and the Faculty of Academic and Career Preparation, completed KPU's submission to Languages Canada's 2024 Annual Member Survey.

Provided KPU program data required by the ministry in relation to the administration of KPU's Provincial Attestation Letters, a new process implemented by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) to limit the number of international students.

Supported IT by providing KPU Headcounts of students (full-time, part-time and CPS only) and employees (full-time and part-time active) for the annual National Cybersecurity Assessment conducted by Canada's National Research and Education Network.

Supported the Office of Communications and Media Relations by providing student and faculty numbers needed for their regular submission to Business in Vancouver.

OFFICE OF THE PROVOST AND VICE PRESIDENT, ACADEMIC

Policy and Academic Affairs Team

Graduate Studies

On January 9, 2025, the Graduate Studies Council (GSC) met and received KPU's first master's degree proposal, Master of Operations and Supply Chain Management, from Melville School of Business. At the meeting, the Council passed the motion to recommend the proposed degree to Senate for recommendation to the Board of Governors for final approval. On January 28, 2025, Senate recommended the degree proposal to the Board of Governors for final approval at its upcoming meeting on March 26, 2025.

On February 5, 2025, the GSC met and discussed with guest speaker **Alena Buis**, Associate Dean of the Faculty of Arts, about ideas for future master's programming. At the same meeting, the Council also discussed University-level standards and expectations for the concluding dialogues of capstone projects or theses in future master's programs.

The Council will continue to conduct business items in support of future graduate studies at KPU, including the review of the Council's by-laws, draft policy and regulations framework, and discussion on future master's programming at KPU.

Updates on the work of the GSC and its bylaws and membership are located on the **website** and **SharePoint** of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS).

AC15 Micro-credentials, AC16 Academic Title Awards

From September to October 2024, the Policy and Academic Affairs team (PAA) conducted preliminary consultations on proposed revisions to current Policy AC15 Micro-credentials (to be renamed Digital Credentials (Non-Credit)), including visits to various Senate Standing Committees over the two-month period.

The team received feedback and suggestions on ways in which the current Policy and Procedure can be further clarified and strengthened. From November to December 2024, **Josephine Chan** and the team shared a set of preliminary drafts with a number of Senate Standing Committees and departments and subsequently received valuable feedback. Josephine and the PAA team continue to conduct consultations, as well as review and consider all suggestions and feedback. The team plans to have an updated set of drafts for a Phase Two Posting on the KPU Policy Blog sometime in early March 2025.

Draft AC16 Academic Title Awards has completed its second round of Phase Two Posting on the KPU Policy Blog as of January 27, 2025. **Dr. David Burns** and the PAA team have reviewed and considered all feedback received, and subsequently responded to all the comments on the Blog as well as those received from Senate Standing Committees in January.

On February 11, 2025, the final drafts of AC16 Academic Title Awards were submitted to the Senate Governance and Nominating Committee (SGNC) for discussion. The SGNC passed two motions unanimously: one for suggesting a wording amendment; the other for approving in principle the creation of a Senate Standing Committee on Academic Title Awards, if AC16 was approved by Senate and the Board of Governors. On the same day, the Senate Standing Committee on Policy met and passed a vote by ballot to recommend to Senate the approval of AC16 and the proposed mandate and membership of the Senate Standing Committee on Academic Title Awards.

<u>Updates to Enhance Accessibility on Policy</u> <u>Development at KPU</u>

As of November 2024, the PAA team has completed all short-term tasks identified in the accessible policy development project, such as adding or updating alt-texts to diagrams and visuals, ensuring compatibility with screen reader software and screen magnification software, and developing standard text formatting and color schemes compatible with accessibility standards.

In January 2025, the PAA team sent a progress report to Senate Standing Committee on Policy, the Office of Equity and Inclusive Communities, and

Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh, Lead Advisor for Disability, Accessibility and Inclusion. The PAA team will now move onto medium- to long-term goals, including developing a toolkit for policy writers and revamping the Drupal site to enhance accessibility.

Curriculum Support Team

KPU Flex

The Flex team is continuing to support candidates who wish to have prior learning assessed for credit in their program of interest. The initiatives to reach potential candidates include a press release and communications to drive traffic to the Flex webpage on the KPU website. The programs of focus for the initiative this year are Brewing and Brewery Operations as well as all programs in the Melville School of Business.

CourseLeaf

The CourseLeaf project team is preparing for an upgrade to CourseLeaf software which supports the University Calendar as well as course outline and program proposals. The upgrade will provide superior reporting and dashboard tools for administrative users and will permit the Curricular Support Team to adjust forms and workflows, permitting more nimble changes than is currently possible through the software vendor's support ticket system.

Generative Al

A set of new courses will be offered in September 2025 pending approval by Senate. These courses will provide students an opportunity to learn about Generative AI in ways that are specific to their disciplines.

A single web location is under development which will house materials related to AI at the university. Messaging and resources that are relevant to the public, faculty members, students, and staff will all be available through sites linked with this single location, and access permissions will be assigned as appropriate for the general public and for internal users.

Micro-credentials

Several new micro-credentials are under development and will issue digital badges starting in September 2025 pending approval by Senate.

Academic Integrity Team

The Academic Integrity Unit has been developing resources to further support faculty and students with Policy ST2, including a Faculty FAQ, and a Case Study Resource in collaboration with the Arts Academic Integrity Committee, and an infographic on Policy ST2 for students. Work is also underway for a resource for when emergency disruptions occur during an on-campus final exam.

The unit presented at the Establishing your KPU Teaching Practice workshop for newer faculty hosted by the Teaching & Learning Commons on December 17, 2024. On February 20, 2025 the unit participated in the Faculty Connect event at the Richmond Campus, interacting with faculty and staff through our Jeopardy game and sharing our Faculty Resource Shelf and answering questions.

The team has also been active in multiple orientation events (International Virtual Live Orientation, KPU Welcomes You, First Year Festival, Faculty of Health Kickoff), providing class presentations and ongoing tabling events in collaboration with the Library and Learning Centres. The student ambassadors have also been sharing academic integrity tips through social media in partnership with the Library.

Restorative Justice

Dr. Alana Abramson offered Lunch and Learns on Restorative Justice and Academic Integrity on February 6 and February 27, 2025. The unit has also been sharing monthly Today@ Announcement posts on restorative approaches. A restorative justice infographic contrasting approaches to academic integrity breaches has also been completed.

Continuing Professional Studies Team

The Continuing & Professional Studies (CPS) continues to manage the StrongerBC Future Skills Grant, which has supported 148 learners as of February 2025. The majority of the grant recipients have enrolled in short-term nursing courses, reflecting the demand for healthcare-related training.

The Melville School of Business has offered three new CPS courses for Spring: Being a Creative Entrepreneur, Finding the Right Product, and Startup Finances. These courses are also eligible for funding through the Future Skills Grant.

To enhance student support, CPS Central, in consultation with Student Affairs, developed a one-page information document outlining the basic supports for CPS learners. This resource provides basic information on counselling services, accessibility, library resources, housing support, and course inquiries. Having this resource connecting the CPS' mature learners to the available resources provides them with clear information, encourages them to seek help when needed, and supports their academic and personal journey. This is available at https://www.kpu.ca/cps/resources.

Efforts to promote CPS courses to a broader audience are being expanded. In collaboration with Marketing, CPS has produced video testimonials featuring learners who credit their professional growth to CPS courses. These inspiring stories aim to motivate mature learners to pursue continuing education as a means of career advancement. These testimonials can be viewed at https://www.kpu.ca/cps/testimonials. Additional promotional campaigns, including digital ads and transit shelter ads, are also underway to reach a wider audience.

The Board of Governors has approved the elimination of Policy and Procedure AD4 on Continuing Education and Contract Services. Originally passed in 2002 with the establishment of CPS, the policy has since been supplanted by updated policies, operational practices, and process documents, ensuring a more streamlined CPS operation.

Work Integrated Learning Team

Dr. Larissa Petrillo, Lead Advisor on Work Integrated Learning

Each term, we hold an informal community of practice with the 'Practicum Meeting group.' The name is a bit of a misnomer because it is made of instructors who are involved in practica, applied research, work experience, Co-op and experiential learning – all manners of Work-Integrated Learning. Since 2021, we've now had more than 75 different faculty members join us for these meetings. Each Faculty is represented, with the Faculty of Arts making up almost a third of the total attendees, and the Melville School of Business following a close second.

The other Faculties each represent about 10% of the overall attendees, making for superb interdisciplinary sharing. In general, we have been discussing ways of saving time around partnerships and practices, with strong expressions of care for our students and the opportunities we are able to bring them at KPU.

Including All Citizens Team

Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh, Lead Advisor on Disability, Accessibility and Inclusion

In addition to the work that supports Including All Citizens Pathway (IACP) and other initiatives, I have had a been working several key initiatives. In addition to co-chairing KPU's Accessibility Committee and being a member of the Accessibility Consultation Committee and the University's Diversity and Equity Committee, I continue to participate in provincial and national committees including being the vice-chair of New Society Institute (formerly IRIS) Board of Directors.

I continue to attend monthly meetings with Skills Trade BC, Community Living BC, and various community partners regarding bringing Including All Citizens Pathway (IACP) into the Trades at KPU. We have submitted a funding request to the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction to support this work.

Further, I was invited to become a member of a working group, *Reimaging Community Inclusion: Inclusive Employment*, for the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction.

The film series, Transforming Post-Secondary Education for Students with Disabilities and Deaf Students, that is part of my research and was created in collaboration with Simon Driver (EACS) and Gordon Cobb (videographer), is complete. The Vancouver company, Descriptive Video Works, has completed adding closed captioning and audio descriptions making each of the five films fully accessible!

I continue to give presentations on my research, Transforming Post-Secondary Education for Students with Disabilities and Deaf Students, including the films, across the university to various programs and departments.

KPU Climate Strategy Development Update

The KPU Climate Strategy is currently in development, led by **Dr. Brett Favaro** (normally, Dean of the Faculty of Science; currently, Climate

Strategy Lead). This project aims to produce a comprehensive strategy that will provide direction for the University in how it will respond to the climate crisis and contribute to the growth of a clean, renewable British Columbia economy. The production of this Strategy was called for in the 2024-2027 Academic Plan. Further, it is responsive to a directive in the most recent mandate letter from the Government of BC to the KPU Board, which directs us to advance results in delivering a "clean and fair economy that delivers affordability and prosperity".

Work-in-progress materials are being posted to https://wordpress.kpu.ca/climatestrategy/ as they are developed. At present, a 'core team' of 20 individuals from across the University has had two meetings, and we anticipate a draft strategy will be ready for consultation across the KPU community by May of this year.

As this Strategy is being developed, **Dr. Favaro** is, in parallel, working with others across KPU to advance initiatives that would accelerate climate-related action even before the Strategy is finalized or approved. Two such examples include an external grant application co-authored with Faculty of Trades & Technology Dean **Laura McDonald** to explore development of a heat pump-focused program, and collaboration with Campus and Community Planning to explore installation of BC Hydro electric vehicle chargers at KPU.

Nov.6, 2024: "The whitemen have taken our land and we have never got anything": Kwantlen, Katzie, Kwikwetlem, Musqueam, Semiahmoo, Tsawwassen First Nations Sovereignty, 1910s by Dr. Maddie Knickerbocker, History, Kwantlen Polytechnic University; Natasha McConnell, KPU BA History Student (and future UBC History MA student). This research delves into statements made by chiefs of the Kwantlen, Katzie, Kwikwetlem, Musqueam, Semiahmoo, Tsawwassen First Nations to the Royal Commission on Indian Affairs for the Province of British Columbia. The commission, which was examining reserve size in BC, posed a renewed threat of settler colonial encroachment onto these Nations' territories. We argue that in response to this settler governmentality, the leaders of these Nations demonstrated not only their deep connections to their territories, but their strong sense of sovereignty over those lands. "Here be Dragons – How we map our World" by Dr. Parthi Krishnan, Geography and the Environment, Kwantlen Polytechnic University.

Nov.27, 2024: "An Interdisciplinary Approach to Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion" by Dr. Leland Harper, Philosophy, Kwantlen Polytechnic University. In this talk, Dr. Leland Harper discusses framework the of an interdisciplinary micro credential developed for degree-seeking undergraduate students. This program combines from various disciplines, resources experiential learning, to help students better understand and address some of society's most pressing issues of today and tomorrow.

Dec.4. 2024: "Findings and recommendations from a mixed-methods study investigating the experiences of 2SLGBTQIA+ students at teaching focused universities in the Lower Mainland" by Dr. Tara Lyons, Criminology, Kwantlen Polytechnic University: Luka Wall, Manager, OPA: Liam Ruel, KPU Psychology honours student; Camille Bédard, KPU Psychology student; Kayla Garvin, KPU employee; Kai Barcellos Luna, KPU Creative Writing student. The findings of our mixedmethods study suggest that 2SLGBTQIA+ students at teaching focused universities in the Lower Mainland lack the support, resources, and educational environment they need to thrive. We present participant-driven recommendations for post-secondary administrators, service providers, and educators on ways they can better support 2SLGBTQIA+ students.

Jan.22, 2025: "Decolonizing Language Revitalization in Mexico: The Nahuatl Language" by Carlos Octavio Sandoval, Sociology, Kwantlen Polytechnic University. Nahuatl, the ancestral language of the Aztecs is still the most widely spoken Indigenous language of Mexico. However, in the past century, this language experienced a dramatic decrease in the number of its speakers due to government policies of cultural

assimilation. Current efforts towards revitalizing this language can only be successful if they are formulated from a decolonial perspective that challenges existing power inequalities and recognizes Indigenous peoples as agents of their own history.

Jan.29, 2025: "Incendiary Alchemies: How Conspiracy Theorists, Bot Nets, and Fake News Stories Foiled First Responders and Undermined Evacuation Orders in the Shuswap Forest Fires" by Dr. Wade Deisman, Criminology, University of Fraser Valley. This paper uses a range of investigative techniques to excavate and analyze



social media activity during the period of July 20 through to September 17. Over that period, while wildfires were raging across the Shuswap, police, paramedics, and firefighters found themselves at odds

with some several local communities because of false reports, conspiracy theories, disinformation campaigns. Burroway's extended case method (1998) is used to argue that the events in the Shuswap ought not to be understood as a singularity, but instead reflect themes and patterns common to other recent emergency response events, including Hurricane Hilton and Hurricane Helene. Stepping back toward the theoretical, the work explores the degree to which the success of public safety responses depends broader judgements about trustworthiness of agents of officialdom and the degree to which such perceptions of trust are increasingly imperiled in the wake of foreign actors, malicious deployments of artificial intelligence, fake news, and conspiracy theories.

Feb.12, 2025: "Building Youth Resilience in Post-War Uganda: The Wang Oo Relit Project" by Jonna Evans, Psychology, Kwantlen Polytechnic University; Dr. Kyle Matsuba, Psychology, Kwantlen Polytechnic University. The Wang Oo Relit Project (WORP) is designed to build resilience among youth living in northern Uganda. WORP

incorporates mental health lessons and activities with cultural practices for the goal of improving the mental wellness of youth.



Initiatives and Activities

The event brought together 400 high school students from across the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island to compete in a series of handson science challenges. With the support of 50 volunteers, including KPU students and faculty, participants engaged in lab-based experiments, theoretical problem-solving, and engineering challenges across disciplines like biology, chemistry, physics, mathematics, and sustainable agriculture. The event provided students with an opportunity to apply their scientific knowledge. develop teamwork skills, and experience



university-level science in action.

KPU Science participated in the **3rd Dream It, Be It Conference** on Feb. 8 at the KPU Surrey Newton Campus. The event, organized by Soroptimist International of Surrey/Delta and White Rock, provided career support for young women



exploring future opportunities. During the career and resource fair (12:00–2:00 PM), KPU Science hosted a table with instructors from Mathematics and CADD (Computer-Aided

Design and Drafting). Approximately 150 high school students attended, engaging with faculty to learn about KPU's science programs, research opportunities, and career pathways.

From Jan. 23-25, the KPU Faculty of Science showcased its Sustainable Agriculture and Food Systems program and Applied Genomics Centre research at the Pacific Agriculture Show in Abbotsford. Faculty, staff, and students engaged with industry professionals, exploring collaborations and funding opportunities. Attendees showed strong interest in KPU's work on crop consistency, yield improvement, and sustainable farming. As a leading agricultural tradeshow in Western Canada, the event provided a valuable platform to highlight KPU's expertise and strengthen industry connections.

VanWorm is a quarterly gathering of C. elegans research labs from UBC, SFU, and now KPU, providing a collaborative forum for sharing research. With principal investigators, postdoctoral researchers, and graduate students from UBC and SFU making up the majority of attendees and presenters, this event presents a

valuable opportunity for Adam to receive feedback on his honours project and highlight KPU's growing presence in research.



Dr. Mehdi Salimi (MATH) co-authored "Decision Making Based on Interval Type-2 Neutrosophic Numbers Involving the Optimal Selection of a House", which has been accepted for publication in Soft Computing (Accepted on Nov. 6, 2024).

Mary Hosseinyazdi (MATH) was an organizer for the Canadian Mathematical Society Winter Meeting (Nov. 29 – Dec. 1). She also presented her research on "The Solution Set of a System of Max-Min-Product Fuzzy Relational Inequalities." Dr. Barnabe D. Assogba and Ashpreet Kaur (BIOL) attended the Annual Biomedical Research Conference for Minoritized Scientists (ABRCMS-2024) in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. At the conference. Ashpreet Kaur presented a poster titled "The SARS-CoV-2 Spike Protein and Its Detrimental Effects on Human Splenic Cell Function."



Dr. Barnabe D. Assogba and Ashpreet Kaur "Optimizing (BIOL) published Transfection Efficiency in Primary Human Splenic Fibroblast Cells" as a preprint article in bioRxiv (https://doi.org/10.1101/2025.01.19.633792). This study explores the optimization of transfection efficiency in human splenic fibroblast cells using calcium phosphate as a transfection reagent. The research identified a critical eight-hour window in which transfection efficacy peaked at 95%, while morphological analyses revealed significant cellular stress responses, including vesicle formation and eventual disintegration after 72 hours. These findings contribute to refining transfection methodologies and enhancing the understanding of transfection-induced cellular changes in biomedical applications.

Christian Lange (BIOL) co-authored "Ebolavirus Evolution and Emergence Are Associated with Land Use Change", published in Ecological Monographs (2024; e1641, https://doi.org/10.1002/ecm.1641). The release for this publication was picked up by *Black* Press Media and featured in various local news outlets. Additionally, Lange discussed the study's findings in a radio interview on Sher-E-Punjab AM 600 Radio Vancouver.

Ben focuses on **assembly, testing, and installation** of the cyclotron's electrical and control systems. Their work exemplifies the impact of KPU's *Physics for Modern Technology* program in advancing science and healthcare.

On Feb. 4, Instructor Dominic Bernard (BREW) wrote a letter on behalf of Canadian Brewing

Highlighting KPU's Agri-Food and Agri-Tech Innovations at The Langley City Council Meeting

On Monday, February 24th, along with other KPU colleagues, Dr. Gupta was invited to speak at a Committee of the Whole meeting of the Langley City Council. They are currently implementing a new Economic Development Strategy, inclusive of a proposed Innovation District focused on Food-Tech. and the presentation's purpose was to inform Mayor, Council, and staff on KPU's Agri-Food and Food-Tech contributions and activities. This was a good opportunity to demonstrate KPU's synergistic applied research presence in Langley and elsewhere, and the positive impact of our innovation in this sector.

OFFICE OF RESEARCH SERVICES

Funding Announcement – NSERC Lab to Market Grant

KPU has participated in a successful NSERC Lab to Market Grant application as a co-applicant. Lab to Market grants support post-secondary institutions and their affiliates, colleges, and college centres dedicated to developing and delivering entrepreneurial skills training. This successful application, *Lab2Market*™, is led by Dalhousie University and co-led by Simon Fraser *University* and the University of British Columbia, and has been awarded more than \$32 million over the next five years. *Lab2Market*™ is a national network for

commercialization, innovation, and entrepreneurship skills training of students and researchers, providing them with the essential tools, resources, and knowledge to transform academic research and innovative ideas into market opportunities and impact. These immersive, experiential, and nationally standardized training programs develop the mindset, skills, and competencies of students and researchers who go on to transform researchbased ideas into innovative solutions and impact, create and grow research-based start-ups, and thrive in industry or other non-academic careers. As a co-applicant, KPU members will have access to the training programs offered by Lab2Market™. Amit and Keith will actively participate in regular meetings, and identify individuals with sectorspecific expertise to provide strategic support when needed.

Responsible Conduct of Research Webinar

The Office of Research Services hosted a webinar on "Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR)," attracting over 150 registrants from KPU and beyond. Dr. Grace Kelly, senior advisor for the Secretariat on Responsible Conduct of Research, delivered an insightful presentation on ethical standards and compliance in research, focusing on the Tri-Agency Framework: RCR. Participants learned about the fundamentals of RCR, researchers' responsibilities, and practical strategies for maintaining integrity in research.

ORS Welcomes a New Research Ethics Board Coordinator and Research Communications and Events Coordinator

ORS welcomed two new team members on December 2, 2024.

Damaris Muganda joined as the new REB Coordinator. With over 10 years of experience in research coordination, she holds a master's degree in public health and specializes in research ethics. Damaris has assisted students and staff with ethics applications and acted as a liaison with national ethics authorities.

Marina Miller joined as the new Research Communications and Events Coordinator. A Burnaby native and SFU Environment graduate, she brings three years of experience in Communications and Marketing from a tech startup, including two years in London. Marina is eager to deliver creative communications and collaborate across teams.

2025 Canadian Association of Research Administrators Western Conference in Whitehorse

The Canadian Association of Research Administrators held their annual Western conference in Whitehorse, Yukon, from November 20 to 22, 2024. Catherine Parlee from the ORS and Shannon Rego from AGC attended the conference, along with approximately 50 other delegates and 20 presenters from across Canada. Notable sessions included ways to engage faculty to do research, novel approaches to building research capacity, and using knowledge translation strategies to develop research partnerships with Indigenous communities, to name a few. Particularly inspiring was a panel session of Indigenous academics who discussed 'Offsite Action: Indigenizing Calls Administration in the Yukon and across Turtle Island'. Sharyn Farlinger and Sébastien Denizé from CFI also hosted a session which highlighted grant opportunities, plus a question-and-answer segment for their 2025 Innovation Fund competition.

Open-Source Intelligence (OSINT) For Research Security Course

Taranum Sultana attended a one-day course organized by UBC in collaboration with Decision Space on Open-source intelligence (OSINT) for research security on November 6, 2024. The goal of the course was to teach practical skills and proven methodologies for using OSINT to conduct research security-related organizational due diligence and person-focused investigations.

SRIG Podcast

In January 2025, ORS launched both internal and external communications for the SRIG Podcasts program, highlighting an episode moderated by Dr. Diane Purvey. The SRIG podcast program aims to provide insights into the research objectives, progress, and outcomes of SRIG projects. It is aimed at both internal and external audiences: To the KPU community, generate awareness for student research projects, encouraging future scholarship. And to external audiences, highlight KPU's diverse research activities and capabilities, helping secure new partnerships and boost our reputation for research.

Internal Review Process for NSERC College and Community Social Innovation Fund (CCSIF) Competition 2025

This year marked the introduction of our first internal review process for the NSERC CCSIF grants, in response to the increased interest observed last year. The CCSIF grants support multidisciplinary research and collaboration on projects with community partner organizations. The funding aims to facilitate collaborative and innovative research across the social sciences, humanities, health sciences, natural sciences and engineering research fields. Here are some details about CCSIF:

Value: Up to \$120,000 per year

Duration: 1 – 3 years

KPU Quota: 5 applications

Given that the program limits the number of applications per institution, we implemented the internal review process to select the 5 strongest applications that KPU submitted to maximize our chances of success.

In November 2024, we invited interested researchers to submit an Expression of Interest (EOI). We received 22 EOIs, and those applicants were subsequently invited to submit an internal application. By the internal deadline on January 3, 2025, we received 10 applications, which were reviewed by an internal review committee consisting of Associate Deans. Following this

review, 5 applications were selected to move forward.

This first internal review process provided the ORS and reviewers with a valuable learning opportunity and will be beneficial for future internal reviews. The selected applicants proceeded to submit their final applications on February 26, 2025.

AURP Spring Training 2025

Dr. Amit Shukla was listed among the attendees for the Association of University Research Parks (AURP)'s annual Spring Training from February 24 to February 27, 2025, at the Omni Tempe Hotel at Arizona State University. This year's theme, "NEW BEGINNINGS: Voices of Impact," focused on interactive sessions covering critical topics and current challenges in the industry. Participants had the opportunity to engage with experts and peers, facilitating a dynamic exchange of knowledge.

N2 Canada Conference 2025

Dr. Taranum Sultana attended the virtual Network of Networks Canada (N2 Canada) Conference titled "N2 Conference 2025: The Next Chapter in Clinical Research: Tomorrow Starts Today" on February 11 and 12, 2025. The conference emphasized the importance of evolving clinical research paradigms and provided insight into ethics, AI, and clinical trial modernization. Topics included fostering inclusive research with Indigenous Peoples through relational approaches, enhancing Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion within clinical trials, and addressing the enduring impacts of COVID-19 on the field.

ANIMAL CARE COMMITTEE

November ACC Site Visit

KPU has made significant progress toward achieving Good Animal Practice (GAP) certification and recently completed the Canadian Council on Animal Care (CCAC) inspection, submitting their application to the CCAC committee in October 2024. Following this, the KPU Animal Care Committee (ACC) conducted their annual inperson site visit in November 2024. During this visit, any outstanding action items were addressed, and feedback was provided to ensure continued compliance with GAP certification requirements for the fish facility at the Surrey Campus and the Farrier program at the Cloverdale Campus.

Monthly PAM Visits

Additionally, monthly Post-Approval Monitoring (PAM) visits with the facility staff manager and the Animal Care Coordinator have been initiated and are ongoing to ensure adherence to GAP certification standards.

Bi-Annual ACC Meeting

In December 2024, the ACC held its bi-annual meeting, during which three current protocols were renewed, and a new amendment to the Zebra Fish protocol for 2025 was discussed and approved. The committee also reviewed notes from the site visit, veterinary reports, and new Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), all of which were approved.

APPLIED GENOMICS CENTRE

Events

On November 13, 2024, Sarah Watts-Rynard, Chief Executive Officer, and Vincent Custode, Director of Policy, of Polytechnic Canada visited KPU and had a tour of the AGC.

Staffing Updates

On November 4, 2024, the AGC welcomed two new student research assistants: Renzil Estrella, a second-year student in KPU's Bachelor of Science in Health Science program, and Taran Reed, a second-year student in KPU's Bachelor of Horticulture Science program.

Funding Advancement

Following the submission of the Letter of Intent (LOI) in August 2024, Dr. Paul Adams is now developing the final proposal for the Technology Access Centres grant, requesting funding of \$350,000 annually for five years.

Publications/Scholarly Activity

- On November 20, 2024, an article titled "A structural analysis of the splice-specific functional impact of the pathogenic familial hemiplegic migraine type 1 S218L mutation on Cav2.1 P/Q-type channel gating" was published in the Springer Nature open-access, peer-reviewed journal Molecular Brain. AGC employees Erick Samera, RJ Wester, and Dr. Paul Adams are the authors of this publication. You can read the full article on the publisher's website.
- With funding received in 2023 from Fisheries and Oceans Canada and the Province of B.C. through the British Columbia Salmon Restoration and Innovation Fund, the AGC developed a more reliable and practical diagnostic test for a key bacterial pathogen affecting salmon. In collaboration with the Animal Health Centre at the B.C. Ministry of Agriculture and Food, the AGC sequenced and analyzed bacterial genomes to create a highly specific qPCR test. To support further research, the genome sequences have been made publicly available on NCBI's database. This new test enables rapid and reliable diagnosis, enhancing salmon health and conservation efforts.

On February 8, 2025, AGC employees took part in the Dream It Be It - Girls Conference 2025, which took place in the Spruce Atrium at the Surrey KPU campus. INSTITUTE FOR SUSTAINABLE HORTICULTURE

Staffing Updates

ISH welcomed Dr. Sarah Murria as a Post-Doctoral Fellow in December to work with Dr. Li Ma on a three-year NSERC ARD + MITACS project with Sollum Technologies entitled "Optimization of Greenhouse Strawberry Production and Disease and Pest Management with Dynamic LED Lighting".

Initiatives

ISH and KPU are co-lead applicants for a CFI Innovation Stream 1 grant, with Toronto Metropolitan University with two other university partners; University of Ottawa and University of Windsor, numerous industry and other institutional collaborators in a proposal entitled: "Advancing Agri-Innovations within a Networked Research Fostering Innovation Ecosystem for Sustainability in Controlled Environment Agriculture (CEA)" with an estimated total value of \$10M in infrastructure across the four institutions. If successful, the infrastructure at KPU would be an expansion of the ISH research greenhouse on the Langley campus to incorporate a cool-crop compartment with high tech features and climate and nutrient automation, two small self-contained vertical farm units and novel equipment to direct air capture CO2 for use in the growing infrastructure. Besides supporting our industry partners with state-of-the-art CEA facilities for research, it will provide opportunities for Horticulture students to experience the newest technologies in CEA production. With or without this grant, ISH is involved in establishing a national CEA research network to better coordinate research efforts and respond to industry priorities.

KPU is expanding its ZTC Initiative to include materials that have Low Textbook Costs (LTC). A low-cost designation allows for instructors to assign materials that may be necessary for their course while remaining mindful of high costs and making decisions to keep total course costs under a certain threshold.

Open Ed curriculum mapping project – analysis of KPU courses with OER was completed to determine which would be most beneficial in increasing the number of ZTC programs at KPU.

<u>Increasing Accessibility and Inclusion at KPU</u> <u>Library</u>



KPU Library launched our <u>Braille Printer Service</u> at the end of January. The purpose of this service is to provide access and equity in printing for library users who wish to print documents in Braille. Like our other printers on campus, this embosser supports printing within Canadian copyright fair dealing guidelines and personal documents. This service increases inclusion at KPU Library and is another way we are supporting KPU's Accessibility Plan.

The creation and implementation of this service was coordinated by Kelsey Chaban, Interim Indigenous and EDIA Liaison Librarian, and has involved all levels of library staff and working closely with KPU IT. The successful launch of the Braille printer can be attributed to the contributions of everyone involved. There has been media interest over the launch, including from CBC, Global News, Surrey Now-Leader, and Fairchild TV.

The library also recently introduced a new option in our <u>LinkScanOpen</u> service: KPU Library now provides scans with increased accessibility by request. An 'accessible PDF' at KPU Library has been scanned using Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology and has been reviewed and

edited to ensure basic document tags (headings, titles), reading order, and alternate text have been applied. Previous to this offering, scans provided with this service were not reviewed or edited.

New Research Help Sign



Langley Library's recently renovated Research Help Desk now has a bright new "Ask Us" wall decal. The decal serves to encourage library users to ask questions to library staff and librarians. At all KPU Library locations, research help is available. Librarians can help users explore their research topic, search and evaluate sources, and recommend resources.

Research Help and Research Appointments

KPU Librarians answered 1,062 walk-in questions at the Research Help Desk over the Fall Semester. Most questions came from students and the remaining came from faculty, alumni, staff, and community borrowers. There were also 73 one-on-one research appointments with Librarians. After having a research appointment with Librarian Mirela Djokic, students had the following to say:

"I really had a great and knowledgeable meeting with Mirela, as she asked me about the selection of my topic, later on she helped me with the type of essay like I should go for literature part or the fiction part. It is proved helpful for me because while searching the article on the University library

website, I got easy access on the exact type of article which I was looking for"

"I want to start by saying I've never used the library search engine before and for Mirela to teach me step by step on how it works and how easy it is to navigate was very helpful! She even sent me links during our talk after finding some articles for me that were relative to my essay. She showed me the buttons on the side that can narrow down the search even more, and also told me how to identify a solid peer review article by pinpointing a few things."

Appointments with liaison librarians can be booked from our <u>Contact your Librarian</u> page.

Our online chat reference service, AskAway, was used 1,183 times in the Fall Semester. AskAway connects users to real librarians for research help through a chat box.

Finally, Library FAQs were viewed 1,284 times during fall. Some of the most viewed questions included: How can I find peer reviewed articles? How do I get a KPU card? How do I know what textbooks are required for my course? How can I check if these sources actually exist?

KPU Library looks forward to answering many more questions in the semesters to come.

Library Instruction

KPU Librarians taught 132 instructional sessions in the Fall 2024 Semester. These sessions covered basic or subject specific research strategies, including how to effectively search for information, evaluate resources, cite information, and how to create research questions.

Tree of Cans

In December, KPU Library collected nonperishable donations for our Holiday Tree of Cans at our Cloverdale Library. All donations benefitted the Surrey Food Bank. Thank you to everyone who donated!



Initiatives

Library Research Tutorial

The KPU Library Research Tutorial was completed by 309 students in Fall 2024. Launching at the end of last summer, the tutorial is designed to cover essential library research strategies. Content includes tips and guidance on developing and searching research questions, searching in Summon and in databases, and evaluating and understanding different types of sources. The tutorial is self-enrolled and badged in Moodle and consists of five core-modules. Instructors can assign the tutorial as a badged option or embed the modules into their courses. After completing the tutorial, feedback from students included:

This time, around 200 students attended the event at Surrey Library for stress relief activities, tea and coffee, therapy dogs, and and support from librarians and campus partners such as Sports and Recreation, Academic Integrity, and the Learning Centre.

This event encouraged students to drop by, enjoy a free hot drink, make a bracelet, and pet therapy dogs from St. John Ambulance. KPU Librarians were available for research and citation help at both of these events.

Organizational Development

Employee Engagement

To foster connection and wellbeing across the university, ongoing Campus Engagement events are being held monthly at various campuses. These events offer an opportunity for colleagues to come together and strengthen community ties through a variety of engaging activities.

The recruitment process for the new Employee Engagement Committee (EEC) began in November and the final selection of seven committee members was completed in February. This diverse group has been chosen to represent various departments and perspectives, ensuring a well-rounded approach to enhancing employee engagement across the University. Each member brings unique insights and expertise.

In an effort to enhance faculty wellbeing and engagement, HR partnered with the President's Office to launch a new event for faculty members called *Faculty Connect*. The theme was Discovery, Community and Wellbeing. The event was a huge success and over 250 faculty members attended for a day of connection, learning and self-care.

Programs

The launch of *Elevate: KPU's Leadership Foundations* program was announced in October. This leader enablement initiative is specifically designed for new leaders, aiming to provide the training and tools needed for success in people leadership roles at KPU. Monthly sessions have been held regularly since the program's inception.

Employee Workshops

The team also facilitated a variety of needs-based sessions for various departments/areas at KPU.

People Services

Compensation

The Compensation Team, along with other key parties, completed and submitted KPU's first ever Pay Transparency Report (available by clicking this link: Pay Transparency Report) as required by the Government of British Columbia as part of the Pay Transparency Act introduced in 2023.

Health and Benefits

The first of two phases of the Employee Health and Wellness Strategy has launched with the creation of new SharePoint pages dedicated to Employee Wellness, Employee Supports and Resources and Relationship Violence. These initiatives provide KPU with a venue to showcase the various supports, offerings and resources that KPU has available for employees.

The revision of HR18 Job Accommodation for Employees Policy and Procedure was approved by the University Executive on December 18, 2024, and become effective on January 1, 2025, after extensive consultation and multiple amendments.

Human Resources Information Systems

The HRIS team created a new Admin Third Party employee class to track third-party hires from agencies who need access to Banner or FAST, improving reporting and access control capabilities.

Risk and Security

Emergency Planning

KPU participated in the Great British Columbia ShakeOut which involved conducting a university-wide earthquake drill to test the Emergency Notification System and reinforce Drop, Cover, and Hold On procedures. Emergency Planning also facilitated a fire drill with horses at the Farrier Barn (Tech Campus) to meet Animal Care Committee certification requirements. Awareness efforts continued through presentations to the Academic Council and Student Affairs.

A new evacuation procedure has been introduced, outlining key responsibilities for all employees. This update reflects the challenges of a hybrid work environment, where campus presence varies daily. To support this transition, the Emergency Procedure online course was updated and now includes a detailed section on employee roles and responsibilities.

Additionally, designated Refuge Zones have been established in stairwells for individuals requiring evacuation assistance. These areas are clearly marked with signage indicating their exact location and emergency contact information.

Occupational Health and Safety (OH&S)

The OHS Team continues to support the University's commitment to a healthy and safe environment for employees and students. Recent initiatives include:

- Collaborating with Facilities to complete First Aid Assessments at each campus, ensuring compliance with WorkSafeBC's requirements.
- Organizing annual training for Joint Occupational Health and Safety Committee members, focusing on Incident Investigations.
- Publishing the third edition of the OH&S at a Glance report which includes a number of safety metrics.

Risk Management

Risk continues to support the university with various ongoing engagements including the renewal of KPU's Kidnap and Ransom insurance policy and the optional insurance program. In addition, Risk met with functional leads across the university as part of the annual risk review process resulting in an updated high-level risk register.

Security Operations

During this reporting period, Campus Security Operations generated approximately 317 Incident Reports, addressing a variety of issues including alarms, property crimes, suspicious activity, trespassing, harassment, and sustained issues surrounding the Gateway of Hope shelter in Langley. In response, Campus Security engaged a third party to assess the safety and security situation at the Langley Campus. Ongoing discussions have been held with Shelter Management, nearby businesses, City Bylaw and RCMP leadership.

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Finance Department

Procurement Services

Despite experiencing a high turnover of resources in the Financial Services area, the procurement team concluded the year on a positive note by successfully completing 24 major procurements, an increase from 17 the previous year.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

Minister of Post Secondary Education & Future Skills Visits KPU

KPU's government relations team was one of the first in the province to host Minister Anne Kang, who was reappointed to the Ministry of Post Secondary Education & Future Skills. Kang was joined by Surrey Newton MLA Jessie Sunner, Parliamentary Secretary for Anti-Racism Initiatives and Amna Shah MLA for Surrey-City Centre and Parliamentary Secretary for Mental Health and Addictions and Deputy Government Whip. The trio toured the KPU Tech campus, including: electrical, plumbing and carpentry programs. Minister Kang even learned how to use a power actuated tool (photo) to attach studs to concrete and other materials.

Post-Provincial Election Outreach

Following the results of a close provincial election, the government relations (GR) team has also been busy meeting with newly elected MLAs, including: MLA Elenore Sturko (BC Cons), MLA Hon Chan (BC Cons), MLA Judy Toor (BC Cons), MLA Harman Bhangu (BC Cons), MLA Misty Van Popta (BC Cons). The GR team also attend events with Minister Garry Begg, Minister Jagrup Brar, and Deputy Premier Niki Sharma.

OFFICE OF ADVANCEMENT & ALUMNI AFFAIRS

Since the previous Board of Governors' report (October 2024), the Office of Advancement raised \$766,380. Annual fundraising to date for the fiscal-year-ended March 31, 2025, is \$2,154,800, which is about 150,000 over last year.

Y.P. Heung Foundation pledges \$300,000

The Y.P. Heung Foundation, a charitable organization based in Vancouver, was established in 2012 by Raymond Heung and his wife, Terry, to honour his late father, who arrived in British Columbia in the 1960's to a seek a better life for his family. The mission is to positively impact British Columbia by providing grants to support programs that benefit youth in the areas of Arts, Culture, Education, and Health.

Their first gift to KPU was \$10,000 in 2014 to support a media and digital literacy program.

Since then, the Y.P. Heung Foundation has established several awards for students across multiple faculties and program areas at KPU, including Arts, Design, Horticulture, Science and a dedicated award for Indigenous students.



In 2023, the Y.P. Heung Foundation provided \$18,000 to support Sustainable Agriculture and address food insecurity among the KPU student population making fresh produce accessible and available to KPU students.

In 2024, the Y.P. Heung Foundation donated \$50,000 to the Sustainable Agriculture and Food Security Program and the KPU Farm to purchase an industrial refrigerator. This made a significant impact to the fresh produce that the KPU Farm can bring to market and to food banks.

Their most recent pledge of \$300,000 over five years, will support 16 annual awards ranging from \$2,500 to \$5,000 each across multiple program areas over the next five years. The Y.P. Heung Foundation now has an accumulated lifetime-giving to KPU of more than \$630,000, making them one of the KPU Foundation's top donors.

Alumni Engagement Survey

Alumni Affairs hired Engagement Analysis Inc. (EAi) to conduct a survey of KPU alumni. This robust survey used response data and KPU data to examine the current level of alumni engagement and gather alumni interest in programs and services.

The process provided valuable insight into the level of engagement of KPU alumni, the key drivers of that engagement and how KPU engagement compares to Canadian scores (overall and peer group). Special focus will be given to understanding the differences in engagement across key demographic segments (age, region) and KPU groups. The findings and Index scores will support the development of Alumni Affairs next 3-year business plan.

Alumni Communications

We are pleased to report that as of the February convocation ceremonies we crossed the threshold of over 75,000 alumni.

In addition to the monthly alumni e-newsletter that we send to over 40,000 alumni, we also send targeted communications to our graduating students through our Welcome Newsletter introducing our newest alumni to all the perks and privileges of being KPU alumni.

In addition, we supported numerous segmented communications to alumni on specific topics for Faculties, programs and departments.

Alumni Events and Activities

Coop Connect: Alumni Bridging the Past and Present Last October the KPU Career Development Centre and the Alumni Affairs office collaborated on a successful event that fostered meaningful networking connections between co-op students and co-op alumni. This event, generously sponsored by the KPU Alumni Association, provided students with a safe environment to develop their networking skills while connecting with alumni, and an opportunity for alumni to share their expertise, and strengthen their ties to the University, fostering connection with KPU. Building Out Housing Resources

As KPU advances its business case for on-site housing, we continue to seek opportunities to ease the burden

of the housing crisis. To that end, Student Affairs has signed an MOU with <u>SpacesShared</u>, an innovative online home-sharing platform that is helping to solve the growing challenge of affordable student housing. SpacesShared uses an online platform and a team of people to match students looking for safe and affordable home sharing with hosts evaluated by SpacesShared. A formal announcement is anticipated in mid-March.

Complementing this initiative is the launch of a <u>student housing resources webpage</u>. This page consolidates information previously spread across our site under one roof for consistent and easy reference. Information regarding SpacesShared will be added following the formal announcement.

Strong Student Employment Continues

The Career Development Centre (CDC) shows 783 new students registered on KPU's student job board, *Career Connection*, with students assisted through 63 career advising appointments, 207 resume reviews, and 59 employer introduction meetings. 288 co-op jobs are currently available for the Spring 2025 work term.

The CDC hosted the annual <u>Trades and Technology</u> <u>Career Fair</u> which saw 300 student participants and strong employer engagement. The CDC launched a new initiative, <u>Co-op Connect</u>, in partnership with KPU Alumni Affairs and the KPU Alumni Association. This well-attended gathering created opportunities for our current students to engage alumni in networking, gleaning industry insights and fostering career development.

Launch of Awards Advisory Committee

The Student Awards Advisory Committee held its first meeting on February 7. Established under Policy ST1, the committee aims to advise regarding student awards policies and practices at KPU.

Supports Through Counselling

KPU's Counselling Services now offers a monthly *Cultural Connect* drop-in group at KPU Richmond, and a weekly drop-in support group, *Snack and Chat*, to help support community building and combat

loneliness among international and domestic students.

Counselling is also continuing with the <u>GuardMe Student Support Program</u>, which provides 24/7 support to students, with a contract renewal starting in February.

Sport and Recreation Events

Over the winter months, events have seen great turnouts, including:

- Indoor soccer tournament
- FIFA campus gaming event
- Introduction to the Fitness Centre workshop
- Dodgeball tournament

Thrive Month

October saw Student Health Promotion lead the 9th annual <u>Thrive Month</u> health and wellness program with more than 20 on-campus events on all five campuses hosted by campus partners such as Human Resources and Campus and Community Planning. This year, activities were focused on self-care and social connection and were well received by the KPU community.

Pride Peer Drag Show

KPU student assistants working as Pride Peer Leaders hosted the first-ever <u>Pride Peer Drag Show</u> at KPU on November 8. The event consisted of fabulous performances by KPU students and fostered a welcoming and inclusive environment for fun and celebration!

Student Mental Health Fair

The 3rd annual <u>Student Mental Health Fair</u> was hosted at KPU Surrey, providing students with resources and education to support their mental health and well-being. Activities included colouring, video games, and information booths with representatives from KPU, the KSA and the external community.

Naloxone Training at KPU

Harm reduction teams from Fraser Health & Coastal Health visited all five campuses throughout October with information and resources about substance use and the toxic drug supply in BC. They also provided on-the-spot naloxone training and an in-person workshop where students got hands-on naloxone training and an opportunity to learn from community members.

Welcoming New Students this Spring

350 new students attended <u>New Student Orientation</u> events across all KPU campuses where they learned about the different resources KPU offers. Thank you to the small army of 35 student leaders and 30 KPU employees for their support across these activities!



The <u>KPU Collective</u> peer mentorship program has amassed a team of 60 domestic students who connect with their mentors through educational/social programs and weekly communication.

Student Awards and Financial Assistance (SAFA) Supports Students in Need

SAFA saw an unprecedented 1,003 student applications for the <u>full-time bursary program</u>, indicating a need of nearly \$2.5 million. SAFA distributed \$860,550 in assistance to 448 students facing considerable financial hardship.

SAFA launched a new <u>Food Relief Program</u> in partnership with Save-On-Foods, providing vital support to 108 students with dependents with \$250 food youchers.

Relationship Violence Webpage

The Student Rights and Responsibilities Office (SRRO) and HR partnered to launch a new <u>relationship</u> violence resources <u>site</u>. This webpage is a direct result

of an idea born at the SVM Advisory Group as a proactive response to an increase in reports about relationship violence from both students and employees.

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OFFICE OF THE REGISTRAR

Updates from the Future Student's Office (FSO)

The Future Student's Office has been promoting KPU at many events and community activities to showcase KPU and ensure our domestic recruitment activities reach as many prospective students as possible. Here are some of the highlighted activities they have undertaken throughout this period.

Make It Safe Vancouver 2024 - NGen Youth Challenge

KPU attended this event alongside UBC, BCIT, and Langara to engage students in Occupational Health and Safety and Manufacturing fields, showcasing KPU's programs and career opportunities.

WorkBC Job, Education, and Resource Fair Maple Ridge

KPU participated in this event designed to connect job seekers, students and those looking to further their education/training. The team engaged, networked,

and shared information about academic programs and career opportunities.

Creative Connections at KPU Richmond

We showcased KPU's creative programs to high school students and their families, boosting recruitment efforts and community visibility.

PSBC Surrey Week

This week provided the opportunity for postsecondary institutions to visit high schools across Surrey. We engaged with high school students across Surrey, promoting KPU's diverse and unique offerings and discussing academic interests.



Counsellors' Conference

We hosted 100 counsellors on the Surrey campus, providing updates on KPU's programs and admissions processes, with a keynote speech by Dr. David Burns. This event helps strengthen these vital relationships

with the educational counsellors who play a key role in advising students on their post-secondary aspirations.

Fraser Valley PSBC week

This focused on high school recruitment in Hope, Agassiz, Mission, Chilliwack, and Abbotsford, allowing direct outreach to a wide range of high school students to help them make informed choices as they consider KPU's programs as their choice for post-secondary education.

Education Career Fair at Aria Banquet Hall

We engaged with high school students from across the Lower Mainland, answering questions about KPU's programs, admission and student life. Recruiters interacted directly with students and families, building relationships and adding a personal touch to our recruitment efforts.

Education and Career Fair in Kelowna

We connected with students, young adults, and new immigrants at this event which was held at the KF Centre for Excellence, Okanagan Aerospace and Aviation Centre. It was a key event showcasing KPU's programs to potential students in the Okanagan region.

WSD Virtual Information Session

This session provided an overview of KPU's eight Design programs to over 100 prospective students specifically interested in studying design, giving them the opportunity to ask about course structure, admission and careers in the design field.

Dual Credit Orientation Sessions

We held Spring 2025 orientation sessions for Dual Credit students from Surrey, Richmond, and Langley. Programs showcased were the Surrey HSOC Dual Credit and Nursing Prep Dual Credit, giving students valuable insights into course content, expectations, and academic opportunities available to students in these programs.

Digital Media Youth Expo

This event focused on ENTA programs, engaging with prospective students and their families. This provided an opportunity for direct interaction with many faculty members from ENTA, Arts, and WSD to speak about career paths in the creative and entertainment fields and promote KPU programs.

Campus Tours with local high schools in December

We hosted 240 students at KPU Surrey over 3 days, showcasing KPU's academic programs and facilities, engaging with faculty, and getting a feel for what life at KPU is like. This tour was part of ongoing efforts to raise awareness about KPU and create strong connections with local high schools.

Vancouver Education Career Fair

This is BC's largest career development fair. This event provided opportunities for our recruiters to connect with secondary students preparing for higher education and exploring career options, young adults looking to transfer their work experience & skills to a different industry, and new immigrants seeking employment and further training to integrate into Canada.

Future Business Leaders (YELL) Conference

We hosted grade 11/12 students interested in entrepreneurship and leadership at KPU Richmond and Surrey. Teams of students participated in team activities, developed business ideas and pitched their ideas. Prizes for tuition waivers motivated students to explore KPU's business programs.

Capstone Interviews at Clayton Heights Secondary

We helped grade 12 students understand their career paths and how KPU can support their aspirations with guidance from our recruitment team.

Career Life Education (CLE) at West Vancouver Secondary

Our team had the opportunity to introduce KPU's academic programs to grade 10 students. This was the first CLE presentation at this school and feedback from both the professors and the school's counsellor indicated that KPU made a positive impression on the students, providing valuable information for their future decisions.

SD42 and SD43 Trades Info Nights

Provided information about Youth Train in Trades programs. This event provided essential information about trades education, helping students and families make informed decisions about their future career paths.

KPU's Discovery Days

We held immersive events across Richmond, Langley, and Surrey campuses for prospective students in a hands-on, engaging environment.

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Career Fair at Queen Elizabeth Secondary

Discussed KPU's programs, support services and career paths with prospective students.

Dual Credit Orientation for Surrey SD Nursing Prep Cohort Students

Dual Credit students were introduced to the program's curriculum, expectations, and faculty members, and discussed upcoming courses.

Declaration Day Partnership

Student Enrolment Services (SES) collaborated with Degree Advisors in Arts, Business and Science during Declaration Day in January. Students could drop by the event to speak with a Degree Advisor regarding program declaration eligibility and receive on-the-spot support from an SES Officer to submit their declaration. Program declaration requests doubled on the day of the event as a result of these collaborative efforts.

KPU International Recruitment Activities and Events

Key Takeaways from Fall 2024 International Recruitment

- There is an increased global demand for STEM, Al-related programs, and master's degrees.
- Canada's standing as a preferred study destination has been affected, highlighting the importance of strong agent relationships and KPU's presence in markets.
- KPU's global engagement included attending over 20 recruitment events and visiting more than 35 high schools across 14 countries.

Regional Recruitment Progress

- South Asia: Hosted Pre-Departure Sessions in India and Nepal, engaging with newly admitted students, families, and agents. KPU will also attend the ICEF South Asia conference in February 2025 to strengthen agent partnerships.
- Southeast Asia: Hosted "Study in BC" in Manila with six BC institutions to rebuild Canada's study abroad brand.
- Latin America: KPU welcomed 40+ Brazilian students to the Richmond campus for an interactive session. High school and fair visits in Guatemala and El Salvador successfully promoted KPU's programs.
- Middle East: Attended KPU-focused agent events in Turkey, Saudi Arabia, Jordan, and Dubai to expand KPU's presence despite visa challenges. A return visit is planned for 2025.
- **East Asia:** Senior leadership visited top agencies in China to strengthen

collaborations. Conducted agent training and recruitment events in Hong Kong, China, Taiwan, and South Korea, strengthening relationships through program updates and leadership engagement. Notable events included Shu-Zen College in Taiwan, an agent appreciation event in Guangzhou, and CPF Beijing.

 Local Efforts: Participated in Richmond School District fairs, supported international students requiring second-language assistance, and held agent training sessions in December.

Agent Management

An Agent Welcome Package has been launched, the Agent Relations webpage has been enhanced, and refund processes have been revised for greater transparency. Policies have been aligned with BC's International Education Code of Practice.

International Advising

The International Advising Unit conducted a virtual registration webinar to support new international students in their preparation for studies at KPU. With attendance exceeding 300 participants, the session delivered comprehensive information on important



topics such as course registration, academic requirements, and visa-related procedures. By addressing these fundamental areas, the webinar equipped students with the necessary tools and confidence to successfully navigate the registration process and commence their academic journey. The team collaborated with community partners to create a career initiative program for international students seeking jobs in Canada; equipping students with the necessary knowledge, skills, and resources to navigate the Canadian job market effectively. The

program included 85 international students. Feedback showed that participants found the program relevant and practical, with many saying they felt more confident and prepared for their job search.

International Student Life

The International Student Life team offers both oncampus and off-campus activities to help students integrate into the KPU community and adjust to life and studies in Canada. Student life events are crucial for integration and success. Below are some events that have been organized in recent months:

Thanksgiving Cooking Workshop

The International Student Life team hosted two Thanksgiving cooking workshops, where students teamed up to prepare traditional holiday meals.





For many, it was their first-time celebrating Thanksgiving in Canada. The workshops concluded with a shared dinner, offering students with the opportunity to enjoy delicious food and make new friends.

Halloween Costume Contest 2024

At the end of October, the team organized a university-wide Halloween celebration, featuring a costume contest with prizes. Attendees arrived in creative costumes and enjoyed a vibrant atmosphere, complete with themed decorations. The event offered Halloween-themed snacks, beverages, games, pumpkin carving, and dancing. With over 150 participants, it was one of the most well-attended events of the year.

Diwali 2024

A vibrant Festival of Lights celebration brought together over 200 attendees. The event featured incredible performances by talented singers and dancers, creating an energetic and festive atmosphere. Guests enjoyed delicious food, lively music, and hands-on activities such as Diya crafting and henna. A photo booth added to the fun, allowing everyone to capture special moments. Appreciation Day for Mentors

KPU International organized several events to recognize and appreciate the contributions of mentors in supporting the transition of new international students to life at KPU and in Canada. These gatherings provided an opportunity to celebrate their efforts in fostering a welcoming and supportive community for incoming students.

Spring 2025 Orientation and KPU Welcomes You

The International Student Life and Transitions team supported new international students through a virtual orientation session, which drew approximately 70 participants. In addition, the team played an active role in the KPU Welcomes You event for all students, by setting up interactive booths tailored to international students. These booths served as a key resource for students to learn about available services, upcoming events, and ways to get involved. Mentors and staff engaged with students, answered

questions, and distributed KPU-branded swag and snacks. The International Peer Mentorship booth also helped students connect with their mentors, providing guidance as they adjusted to life in Canada. Over the course of two days, around 200 new students visited the booths at the Richmond and Surrey campuses, helping to foster a sense of community from day one.

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Tenant Rights Webinar

In collaboration with the Tenant Resource and Advisory Centre (TRAC), a webinar was hosted to educate students about their rental rights and responsibilities in BC. Topics included landlord obligations, lease agreements, and key considerations when renting.

Social Insurance Number (SIN) Webinar

A session was delivered in partnership with Service Canada to provide students with essential information about the Social Insurance Number (SIN). The webinar covered the importance of the SIN, the application process, and best practices for protecting it from identity theft.

Partnerships

State of Mexico Short-Term ESL Program



The State of Mexico Short-term ESL Program, held from October 7 to 31, 2024, successfully concluded with a second group of 30 students at KPU. KPU International provided comprehensive support including homestay coordination, arranging for temporary medical insurance and transportation via Compass cards, and organizing a pre-arrival webinar, orientation event, various extracurricular activities, and a graduation ceremony. The students' feedback was overwhelmingly positive, highlighting significant improvements in their English language skills and the formation of friendships with KPU volunteers.

Development Projects

Canadian International Development Scholarships (BCDI) 2030 Proposal Success

KPU's proposal for the Canadian International Development Scholarships (BCDI) 2030 has been successfully approved, resulting in an agreement with Global Affairs Canada to secure approximately \$500,000 in funding. This grant will support KPU in hosting 25 students from Tunisia from 2025 to 2029, reflecting the university's growing role international development projects. collaboration involves Nova Scotia Community College (NSCC) and University Ibn Khaldoun (UIK) in Tunisia, where the students will join KPU as visiting students to enhance their learning experiences.

Kenya Blue Economy Skills Training (KBEST) Proposal to CICan

KPU's participation in a consortium with NAIT for the KBEST proposal marked a significant advancement, reaching the competitive second stage of proposal submission and funder interview. Although not ultimately selected, the experience underscored our growing expertise in proposal development and collaboration with the Dean of Trades. This initiative provided a valuable learning opportunity and demonstrated our potential for success in future projects.

Delegation Visits

From October 2024 to February 2025, KPU hosted several key delegation visits focused on strengthening international partnerships and exploring new opportunities:

- 1. **Lille Catholic University from France** visited on October 21, 2024, to discuss potential exchange partnerships.
- Centro Studi Italiani from Italy visited on October 23, 2024, exploring field school and summer programming opportunities in Italy for KPU students.
- The Myanmar Trade Commissioner visited on October 29, 2024, to learn about the student recruitment market and partnership opportunities in Myanmar.
- 4. Representatives from **DUNIS in Senegal** visited on November 7, 2024, to continue discussions around articulating a 2+2 program into our Melville School of Business and a Political Science degree in Arts.
- 5. Nottingham Trent University from the UK, an existing student exchange partner, visited on November 12, 2024. They met with the Dean of Design to discuss expanding partnerships for design students and introduced a one-year top-up international fashion business degree. An information session on January 30th attracted over 20 interested students from the Wilson School of Design.
- Shih Chien University in Taiwan, also an existing exchange partner, visited on November 14, 2024, to discuss hosting their lecturers at KPU through the Huayu Best

- Talent program. We are expecting a visiting scholar in March 2025 to provide workshops and extracurricular activities through our Asian language and cultural programs.
- Bond University in Australia visited on November 25, 2024, to discuss potential pathway progression for KPU students into their JD in Law program, primarily targeting our Faculty of Arts and Melville School of Business.
- 8. The **Brunei Trade Commissioner** visited on November 29, 2024, to explore the recruitment market and potential partnerships in Brunei.
- 9. **Al Baha University from Saudi Arabia** visited on January 7, 2025, to learn about KPU and our Nursing programs.
- 10. CSCSE (Chinese Service Center for Scholarly Exchange) and the Consulate-General of the People's Republic of China in Vancouver visited Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) for the first time on February 11, 2025, and signed an Agreement of Cooperation. This agreement will enable KPU to conduct visits, exchanges, promotions, or other activities with CSCSE Partner Universities related to the SQA programs, as well as engage in commercial cooperation with Partner Universities concerning the SQA programs in China. The delegation expressed their admiration following tours of the Traditional Chinese Medicine department, ENTA, School of Design, and KPU's Agriculture Farm.

These visits highlight KPU's ongoing commitment to expanding and strengthening its global educational partnerships.

International Focus Week

The 15th annual International Focus Week took place from November 18 to 22, 2024. The campus wide celebration continued the theme of 'Around the World in 5 Days', bringing a journey of world cultures to KPU's campuses through student, staff, and faculty events. A pop-up Global Fair traveled between 3 campuses—Richmond, Civic Plaza, and Surrey Main—featuring a carnival of interactive games and trivia, tea and snacks from around the world, a gaming station, virtual reality global travel, and more.



OFFICE OF EQUITY AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES

Events

OEIC hosted an encore presentation of the one person show 'Fat Joke' addressing Fat Liberation on November 13, 2024.

The OEIC collaborated with Tim Reitsma of Invisible Condition to provide KPU employees with four online workshops to deepen learning around disability inclusion. The 90-minute workshops were offered between November 2024 and February 2025 with a total number of 120 registrations.

As part of its Black History Month celebrations, the OEIC collaborated with Dr. Nicole Kaniki of Senomi Solutions to offer a series of online workshops designed to expand employees' understanding of anti-racism. The three workshops focused on EDI in Academia, Black History and Culture in Canada, and anti-racism and anti-oppression strategies. They were offered in January and February of 2025 with a total number of 80 registrations.

On January 29, 2025, the OEIC and University Executives wore green squares on their lapels as part of The Green Square Campaign. This campaign occurs annually during the week leading up to January 29th to honor the victims and survivors of the Quebec City mosque attack and to raise awareness about Islamophobia.

Trina Prince of the OEIC hosted their workshop "Oops, the power of learning from mistakes" twice at the Faculty Connect Event on February 20, 2025. Over 15 people attended each workshop.

VP Sayed attended and presented at the CANNEXUS 25 Annual Conference on career development, in Ottawa, January 27- 29, 2025.

VP Sayed attended the Scarborough Charter Engagement Session, January 30, 2025.

VP Sayed attended the Climate Strategy Core Team Meetings 1 and 2, February 4 and 11, 2025.

Steve Adames, Divisional Business Manager of the OEIC, joined the Employee Engagement Committee as a member. He attended the first meeting of the year on February 14, 2025.

OEIC set up a booth for the Faculty Connect event held in Richmond campus, February 20, 2025.

At the Faculty Connect event, VP Sayed participated in a Speed Networking session, where faculty had the

opportunity to meet with key university leaders in an informal setting, February 20, 2025.

Program/Policies/Initiatives

Accessibility Consultation Committee: OEIC formed this new committee to address the growing number of requests for consultations on various institutional projects that require an accessible and disability justice lens. The first meeting was held on February 24, 2025.

Accessibility Committee: The Accessibility Committee continues to support the work of the implementation of the recommendations from the Accessibility Plan launched in October 2023.

UDEC Sponsorship Fund: Two funding proposals were approved during this period. The UDEC Sponsorship Fund is provided through the OEIC and it supports events and initiatives that further the goals of equity, diversity, inclusion, anti-racism, accessibility, decolonization, and intersectional social justice at KPU.

OEIC Sponsorship Fund: Two funding proposals were approved during this period. The OEIC Sponsorship Fund is designed to support innovative projects, events, and initiatives that champion equity, diversity, inclusion, anti-racism, decolonization, social sustainability, accessibility, and intersectional social justice at KPU.

Anti-Racism Toolkit: The Anti-Racism Toolkit, developed by Teaching and Learning Commons with VP Sayed, will be launched on March 21, 2025 at the Third Annual Anti-Racism Symposium.

OEIC, and its committees, provided EDI-lens feedback on several new and under-revision policies across the institution.

VP ADMINISTRATION

CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY PLANNING

Campus and Community Planning has initiated work to update KPU's Official Campus Plan: KPU2050.

This update will:

- Ensure KPU2050 is aligned with policy and legislative changes that have occurred since it was first adopted;
- Add scope and detail to KPU2050, such as more detailed open space plans, specific performance metrics, and an implementation plan; and,
- Advance planning and preparation for the development of KPU Communities Trust (KPUCT).

The first phase of the work, focused on technical assessments, is underway, and includes:

- Soil testing to inform hydrogeological assessments;
- A number of site servicing studies to assess the condition and capacity of existing services;
- Updates to environmental and geotechnical assessments;
- The preparation of draft stormwater management plans for each land-based campus; and,
- An assessment of potential shadowing and view impacts to inform subsequent planning efforts.

Surrey Child Care and ECCE Facility Update

In January 2025, a building permit application was submitted to the City of Surrey for the future KPU Surrey Child Care and Early Child Care and Education facility. While the design team awaits feedback from the City, the project team is concurrently finalizing the working drawings in anticipation of preparing the Issued for Tendering drawings later in the Spring.

Salmon-Safe Certification Update

Administered by the Fraser Basin Council, Salmon-Safe British Columbia is one of Canada's first and only peer-reviewed certification programs that evaluates the impact of land management practices on urban watersheds for the protection and enhancement of salmon health and habitats. As salmon are a keystone species, the health of their population signals the health of an entire ecosystem.

KPU's interest in the Salmon-Safe certification originated during discussions with the Surrey Learning Gardens and Welcome Plaza Working Group. We explored different Salmon-Safe certification options and found that a single institution-wide certification for all KPU campuses would be the most cost-efficient and impactful approach for KPU.

In 2023 and 2024, KPU's four land-based campuses were evaluated using Salmon-Safe's Urban Standards, by an interdisciplinary team of scientists with expertise in aquatic ecosystems, storm water management, and landscape architecture. As part of this evaluation, a draft report with site-specific recommendations and KPU-wide recommendations was prepared for KPU.

The draft recommendations have been shared with KPU Indigenous Leadership and Facilities Services teams. The draft report is also being reviewed by an indigenous assessor - George Chaffee, a Councillor with the Kwikwetlem First Nation, who is highly involved in Kwikwetlem's work to protect and improve salmon habitat within their traditional territory. Following review, the draft report will be updated with recommendations provided.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Information Security Services

Student Multifactor Authentication (MFA) Expansion

MFA has been applied to all active KPU student accounts which was completed in early 2025. As of December 31, 2024, 70% of these accounts had been successfully enabled with MFA.

Privilege Access Management (PAM)

All three phases of PAM implementation were successfully completed by the end of 2024. All KPU accounts that have privileged access (special access or abilities beyond that of a standard user) are now protected and audited.

National Cybersecurity Assessment (NCA)

NCA commissioned by CANARIE, was conducted through a collaborative series of workshops facilitated by IT, involving cross-functional teams including Privacy, Enterprise Risk, Legal, Records and Information Management (RIM), and Campus Safety and Security. This thorough self-assessment examines the institution's security controls to evaluate its cybersecurity readiness with results expected by March 2025.

IT Application Services

<u>Ellucian Experience Portal – Self-Service Portal</u> (MyKPU)

The student self-service portal has been successfully implemented for current students. The next phase of this project will concentrate on the development of the employee and faculty self-service portals.

Ellucian Customer Relationship Management (CRM) Advise

New Advising cards were made available on MyKPU self-service portal in January 2025. The Ellucian CRM Advise project is on track for phase 2, focusing on early alerts.

Waitwell Implementation

KPU has procured a new solution named Waitwell to manage student lines effectively. This new system provides enhanced tablet and mobile features for appointment booking for the Office of the Registrar, Student Services and International offices across all campuses.

OneCard Migration to Cloud

The OneCard Project team has successfully migrated the student and employee card system to the Ellucian OneCard cloud. This migration enables KPU to utilize digital ID cards for mobile access to doors, library services, printing, and other related functionalities.

IT Infrastructure Services

Childcare Project

IT has been involved in plans for the childcare facility and child development program's space. A site visit was conducted and a pathway for network connectivity has been identified. Electrical engineers are currently assessing whether the existing KPU generator has sufficient capacity to supply emergency power to the childcare facility. If the current capacity is found to be inadequate, the KPU IT generator will be utilized, as it has been confirmed to have sufficient capacity for this purpose.

Langley Music Program Renovation Project

IT has been approved to purchase all necessary IT, audio & video, and networking hardware for the Langley Music Renovation Project.

Hacking Lab / Front-End Web Development Project

IT has been involved with the classroom setup for the Front-End Web Development program which completed in August 2024 with the program proceeding in Fall 2024. The internet connection and systems for the hacking program have also been set up, in anticipation of the next program start date. This concludes the project.

Non-Banner Cloud Project

All targeted systems have been migrated to the AWS Cloud, completing this project.

Audio & Video and Digital Classrooms

- Surrey and Richmond Conference Center AV refresh and upgrades completed
- 20 new laser projectors were installed to replace old end-of-life units
- Decommissioned end-of-life Sony AV classroom in Civic Plaza (603) and completed conversion to a standard digital classroom
- Set up four high fidelity sim rooms to support live streaming within KPU's Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program completed
- Installation of four new outdoor digital signage completed Surrey in tandem with Facilities.

MARKETING SERVICES

Faculty Campaigns

Faculty marketing and recruitment campaigns launched successfully over the past few months. KPU introduced a digital ad strategy and billboard ads in Surrey for Continuing and Professional Studies, along with a short-term digital campaign for Graphic Design for Marketing. Digital assets for the Front-End Development program were refreshed, with ads displayed on digital billboards at key locations including the Alex Fraser Bridge and Tsawwassen Springs.




Other marketing and promotions initiatives included ads in industry-specific publications including the BC School Counsellor's Association, City of Surrey Recreation Guides, PLAN Canada, and Fraser Valley Current E-newsletters.

Two paid campaigns also completed:

- The Total R3call Contest on Jack 96.9 featured KPU over 500 times on air and social media over three months.
- PSAs on the Telus network aired 3,848 times from end of October to end of December, 2024.

Recruitment \ External Event Support

Marketing supported major recruitment events including the KPU Open House and Creative Connections. Both required significant resources to ensure their success. Creative Connections helped strengthen ties with the Lower Mainland design community, while the Open House continued its annual success with prospective students and their influencers.





Marketing also created ads to support external affairs and various community partnerships, including the Cloverdale and Langley Chamber of Commerce Business Excellence Awards.

Creative Connections Campaign:

- Results: 372,281 impressions, 32,282 clicks, 88 conversions, and 14 info session signups.
- TikTok performance: 122,946 impressions, 22,762 reach, and 29,268 clicks.
- User demographics: Most clicks were from mobile devices (1,018); the 25–34 age group had the highest engagement.

The campaign effectively engaged the target audience, driving significant interest and conversions.

Social Media

Marketing continues to analyze social engagement data and has begun implementing new tactics and segmenting specific messaging on social media to speak to both prospective students and current students. Additional strategies to put specific and contextual messaging in front of current students has boosted engagement rates, link clicks, and followers across all platforms. Instagram and LinkedIn saw notable gains, with engagement up 25% and link clicks up 46% compared to 2023.

CRM Strategic Work & Domestic Recruitment Efforts

Throughout the past year the Marketing Department inherited new responsibilities to enable the institution to utilize the CRM to its full recruitment potential. New workflows, email automations, and valuable reporting have been set up to better engage with prospective students. Marketing is now able to provide real-time reporting to multiple areas of the institution to better understand the results of marketing and recruitment efforts both offline and online.

Marketing initiated a project to develop visualizations of CRM data to share recruitment efforts and the prospective student funnel from an advertising perspective. These reports are being shared with respective teams across the institution and have become a great collaboration tool with valuable data analysis for many faculties and departments.

Additionally, lead forms were added to the bottom of most program pages on kpu.ca and has resulted in a significant increase in leads on the website that are being sent through to the Future Students' Office. An analysis of those leads is in progress. A new automatic response to all prospective lead submissions was also created and implemented to support the Future Students' Office recruiters in communicating with prospective domestic students.

Info Session Analysis

Marketing has started to utilize the CRM's data to visualize information session data and the results of the sessions across the institution.

In total this year KPU had 3,493 prospective students registered for information sessions across the institution. Of those registrants, 343 students applied to KPU, resulting in a 9.8% conversion rate. This ongoing data will be valuable for planning information session strategies.

Digital Advertising

- The "Celebrating KPU Grads" convocation video and TikTok reels continue to receive high impressions, reach, and clicks.
- The KPU brand banner ad resulted in ~80 conversions, with the "What will it mean to

you" form achieving the highest Google Ads conversion rates.

- Facebook campaigns generated 1,038 signups, including "Get Started" and info session forms
- Most website traffic came from Google and TikTok.

Website Analytics

The KPU website recorded 2.94M pageviews, 1.4M sessions, and 665K total users, including 606K new users (not active in over 3 months). Most website visitors came from Surrey, Vancouver, Richmond, Langley Township, Burnaby, and Delta.

FACILITIES SERVICES

Design & Capital Projects

Music Wing Renovation

The renovation of the Music Wing on the Langley Campus has successfully completed the concept and design phases. The project will revitalize the space with new finishes and state-of-the-art audiovisual equipment in the multipurpose room and study areas, fostering collaboration and creativity.





<u>One-Time Funding – KPU Pathway to Systemic</u> <u>Transformation</u>

KPU's Indigenous Committee allocated \$20,000 for two major projects: the Langley Campus Music Wing and Surrey Campus Black Box Theater Renovations. This funding will help hire a local indigenous artist to create custom artwork for both projects, enhancing their cultural significance. This initiative supports KPU's Pathway to Systemic Transformation, fostering a culture of inclusivity and emphasizing the vital role each employee plays in promoting positivity and respect.

Black Box Theater Renovation

The Black Box Theater at the Surrey campus has reached the construction drawing phase. Preparations are also in progress to submit the Building Permit application, a key step toward completing the project.

Electrical Shop Renovation

The electrical shop renovation at the Tech campus is now in the construction stage for the south workshop, which is expected to take three months and be completed by early April 2025. With available funding, we are renovating the existing teaching lab and building a new lab to enhance the educational experience and better prepare students for careers in the electrical field.

<u>Surrey Courtyard – Digital Signage</u>

The old pylon signs are showing their age, and it is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain the accuracy of information and physical appeal. The efforts to modernize these signs continued in 2024, with four additional signs upgraded to digital signage boards. The locations include Arbutus, Birch, Cedar Northeast & Cedar Northwest.

Langley Executive Suite - Furniture Refresh

This furniture was refreshed in October 2024. Along with the updated quality of furniture, improved ergonomics, and a fresh coat of paint, this refresh also increased the number of desks and workstations in many areas, allowing more employees to work out of this updated space. An updated entry and lounge area created a welcoming space for incoming visitors and an elevated feel to the overall space.







Langley Faculty of Science, Dean's Office - Furniture Refresh

The furniture in the Faculty of Science, Dean's Office Suite was updated to provide greater functionality and ergonomics for all team members. Accessibility considerations include having wide floor spaces to support easy maneuvering and a reception desk with a lowered counter and open knee spaces underneath for users in wheelchairs.





Tech Faculty of Trades & Technology, Dean's Office -Furniture Refresh

The Dean of the Faculty of Trades & Technology and her team received a furniture update to replace outdated furniture in their four offices.

The Department received a refresh in October 2024, adding a mixture of furniture, including a computer workspace for students, a collaboration area, and a lounge space. Tech Meeting Room 2210 - 2220 – Furniture Refresh

Phase one of this project included increasing accessibility, updating finishes and reducing eye strain for both rooms. Accessibility updates included replacing battery-powered card readers with

hardwired readers adjacent to new door actuators, relocated light switches and new automatic blind controls adjacent to the entry door. Updated finishes included grey and white tones for the walls and a color-neutral carpet selection. Lastly, in an effort to reduce eye strain, automated blinds were installed to filter the glare and tinting from the coloured glazing.

Richmond Main 2320 - 2370 Research Hub Centralization

Facilities assisted in consolidating and increasing the footprint of the Research Hub into a centralized area on the second floor of the main campus. All furniture was repurposed inventory to give a fresh new look for the teams.

Richmond Main 3030 - 3034 - FOA Criminology Relocation Centralization

Facilities assisted in consolidating the Faculty of Arts – Criminology into new offices of an underutilized 3rd floor of the ENTA space. This move provided the group with more office space, a meeting room for faculty meetings, student one-on-one meetings, and space to hold virtual classrooms while other faculty occupy their offices. All furniture was existing built-in millwork or surplus new-to-user inventory.

Richmond Garden City Lands, ISH

Facilities completed the installation of concrete slabs inside and outside the storage area, along with electrical work and interior and exterior lighting installation.

<u>Surrey Campus Electrical Upgrade project – recent</u> <u>milestones</u>

This two-year, \$4.5 million project will upgrade the existing electrical supply to KPU's Surrey Campus, adding 55kv of new capacity to current 25KV service. When complete, this additional capacity will allow for future decarbonization of the campus' HVAC units as they reach end-of-life, eliminating a major source of KPUs greenhouse gas emissions.







Richmond Campus DHW Heater

The Richmond campus has been upgraded from natural gas-fired to an all-electric DHW heater. This new equipment will help reduce KPU's carbon footprint while providing hot water.



All Campuses Low Carbon Feasibility Study

The completed study identifies and evaluates pathways for optimizing heating system equipment and electrification to reduce carbon emissions. This study information was used to develop our carbon reduction plan to reduce greenhouse gas emissions at KPU as required by the BC Government.

Ancillary Services

Campus Store

The Campus Store has recently transitioned to a new, more accessible website template, enhancing the online shopping experience. The Campus Store actively engages with the KPU community by participating in orientation events and providing a relaxing space within the store for students and staff.







Food Services

With the support of mid-year funding, a food open house event was organized across the Surrey, Langley, Richmond, and Cloverdale (Tech) campuses. The project aimed to increase foot traffic and visibility while informing staff, students, and faculty about Dana's offerings and catering options.









Food Operations

A review of current natural gas cooking equipment was completed to understand where we can move to electrified equipment. This approach will allow further reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. The first stage of this project is complete, and infrastructure requirements will be reviewed next to determine the full scope of this change.

<u>Fleet</u>

A new hybrid vehicle was acquired for the KPU fleet pool.
