
Snapshot of B.C. Seniors

95% aged 65+ live independently

Income Gap

- Median seniors income is \$32,990
 25% of seniors live on less than \$22,000
- 45% of seniors live on less than minimum wage
 6% of the labour force earns minimum wage




Cost of Aging

- Most seniors **do not** have a private extended health plan
- No comprehensive provincial programs exist to provide dental care, eyeglasses, hearing aids, or medical equipment

Home Support

 Seniors with an annual income of \$28,000 charged \$8,800 a year for a 45-min daily visit of publicly subsidized home support









Shelter Aid for Elderly Renters (SAFER)



- **24,000** SAFER recipients
- **95%** live alone
- **81%** have incomes between \$15,000 \$25,000


Homeowners

- No program to fund repairs
- No coverage for strata fees, hydro, insurance, etc.
- Property Tax Deferral program does not cover coops or manufactured homes




